

Politics and Government Railways

A warm discussion arose in th House of Commons on Wednesday ove the allegation that Intercolonial employes interfered in the recent byeelection in Guysboro, N. S. Hon. Mr. Emmerson, Minister of Railways, promised an investigation, and laid down the salutary rule that while a Government employe had the right to vote he had no right to be a violent partisan or an election agent. He charged that under the previous administration Intercolonial employes, thought to be Liberals, had been sent away on polling day, to deprive them of their votes. This practice had been stopped.

Hon. John Haggart, the former Minister of Railways, denied that he had authorized such methods. Mr. Emmerson replied that a list of Intercolonial employes going out of Moncton was prepared for the election of 1896, and those who were Conservatives were allowed to remain in the town. The present administration had had to contend with the treasonable conduct of certain employes. Mr. Emmerson said he had personal knowledge that dispatchers had delayed trains, and boasted of it afterward, with the ob-

ject of discrediting the management. Mr. Ingram charged that the Intercolonial was overloaded with useless officials, and was a financial failure because the manager's hands were tied for political reasons.

Dr. Sproule urged the elimination of political influence from the management of the road. Mr. Emmerson re torted that Dr. Sproule's friends should have adopted that principle 20 years ago. Within two months after the Conservatives came into power in 1878 they discharged 400 Liberals employed in the Moncton railway shops, and they appointed no Liberal afterward The minister said he would not permit the road to be loaded up with useless employes, but he frankly declared tha when men were required he would give the preference to his political friends.

Charges of this nature were bandied from one side of the House to the other. There is no blinking the fac that the Intercolonial has been used by both parties, and that every branch of the public service will continue to be exposed to political influence until we have a Government of angels. The country can judge by experience what a tremendous power would be put into the hands of any Government by public ownership and control of a railway system five times the extent of th Intercolonial. The patronage would be greater than that of any other department of the public service, and there would be the constant temptation to sacrifice sound business principles to the exigencies of party. Such a railway could be made a vast political machine and a demoralizing factor in the public life of the country. The electors may well pause on the brink of such an experiment. Mr. Borden's daring proposition should be read in the light of Wednesday's discussion on the Intercolonial.






