



JAPAN'S STUPENDOUS DEBT

The War Will Leave Her With \$1,-250,000,000 To Be Met.

Tokio, Oct. 5. - Former Foreign Minister Okuma, leader of the prochambers of commerce today, referring to the sudden expansion of Japan's finance, said that when the withdrawal of troops is completed she will find herself confronted with a debt of \$1,-250,000,000, the interest on which alone, roughly speaking, will be \$75,000,000, or nearly twice the revenue of the country ten years ago. The per capita rate of taxation before the war was \$2. Now it is \$6. The per capita share in the national debt before the war was \$6. It is now \$25. Count Okuma, however, was not pessimistic. 
