He only escaped capture by crawling into the bush. His present whereabouts is unknown to his own followers.

TAKING ALL **PRECAUTIONS**

City Board of Health Will Protect Chatham From any Outbreak of Smallpox.

An Important Meeting of Board -- Physicians Notified to Report all Cases.

A special meeting of the Board of Health was held Saturday afternoon at four o'clock in Harrison Hall for the purpose of dealing with the smallpox contagion in Dover.

Dr. Hall, the Medical Health Officer of the city, reported that, accompanied by Dr. Bryce, the secretary of the Health Board of the Province, he had visited a number of the cases in Dover, seeing the disease in its different stages, and that Dr. Bryce was of the opinion that there was no doubt of it being a mild form of small-pox. Also that Dr. Bryce had said it was the same as what they had in the lumber camps down east.

"This disease," continued Dr. Hall, 'is mose severe in cold climates. It is supposed that it was brought to the United States by return soldiers from the Philippines or Cuba and carried the colder climates."

"Have these cases had ince?" the doctor was asked. es," he replied, "but I am sorry

ay they have not been reported as they should have been. Dr. Sharp, of Tabury, reported it a week ago last Thursday to the clerk, but no notice was taken of it, and I knew nothing of it until I at once notified Dr. Bryce, who came down and investigated it with me."

The Medical Health Officer thought hat a compulsory vaccination of all he school children should be made that they have a certificate of vac-cination before entering school after he holidays, and that the city should provide a vaccination station and do free of charge. He also said that the person vaccinated was not the only one benefitted, but that the com-

munity at large was. Re the quarantining of Dover, Dr. Bray moved that David Dagneau, who knew the people of the infected district, be placed at Labombarde to keep all those from that district out placed at Labombarde to of the city, also that Jas. McGregor be placed on the town line for the same purpose, both to be in their places from early morning until dark, to take their instructions from the Medical Health Officer and to stay at

their posts until further notification. It was decided that Dr. Hall and W. Richards meet with the Dover Council on Monday morning and ar-

range the matter.

The question was brought up about the local doctors notifying the Medical Health Officer of contagious diseases, which had not been as promptly done in some cases as the law quires, and the following resolution was passed by the Board:

That the Board request the inspec tor to personally notify each medical doctor in the city that they wish all cases of contagious diseases to be reported within 24 hours after they have attended them or they (the Board of Health) will be compelled to prosecute under the health act.





PURE MILK.

"While in London the other day," said J. A. Wilson, the Queen street grocer, "I noticed the milk system, which is so far ahead of our own The milk is bought by the company, which supplies it to the people, and is just put through a cooling process, which takes all the animal heat out of it, then it is clari-fied, after which it is either pasturized or sterolized. The people have this pure milk delivered to them the same day as it is brought in to the company at 5 cents per quart, while we here pay 6 cents per quart for what goes through none of these processes. The dairies that supply the company with milk are inspected by an inspector of the company once about every two weeks.

#### MORMONS IN CANADA

THEY HAVE A TOWN IN ALBERTA AND DO NOT PRACTICE POLYGAMY.

The People, However, Believe in the Teach ings-A Singular Case of a Man With Two Wives Obeying the Letter But Not the Spirit of the Law-Daughter of Brigham Young Is Couspicuous.

A new town is rapidly growing into existence on the rich irrigation lands of Southern Alberta, says the Calgary Herald. It is named Raymond, in honor of the son of Jesse Knight, a rich Mormon capitalist who has taken a great interest in the Mormon settlements of Southern Alberta.

A few years ago, a number of the Mormon settlers in Alberta sowed some sugar beets and had them sent to Utah for the purpose of testing them. They were found to contain a remarkable quantity of the saccharine essential for sugar making purposes. In some cases they were found to contain fifty per cent. more of this matter than the beets grown in the State of Minnesota. Mr. Knight, who makes his headquarters at Salt Lake City, took an interest in the matter, further tests were instituted, and the results were that could be desired. Mr. Knight has accordingly purchased a large tract of land in the vicinity of big irrigation canal, and is allowing settlers to take up holdings on his property under certain conditions

One of the conditions is that at least twelve acres of sugar beets should be grown every year; another condition is that no liquor establishment should ever be operated on the land. A site has a!ready been located for a rannery, and plans drawn, and within the next month building operations will be

Mr. Knight is a very devout Mormon and is very popular with the people of that religion settled in The Mormons have always been good settlers, being progressive and up to date in agricultural operations. The whole of Southern Alberta contiguous to the boundary line is given over to them, and they have transformed a wild country into a perfect garden.

Although a great many of the Alperta Mormons are polygamists, they don't practice ploygamy in Canada. Most of the older men have a wife in the States and one

A peculiar incident occurred recently which shows the desire of the Mormons to live within the letter of the law. A prominent resident of Cardston, the little Mormon metropolis here, had brought one wife with him from Utah, while wife number two remained in the States. him in Canada was his little son, the child of his absent wife. The little boy became very ill, and his mother was sent for. The same train that brought her into Canada carried away the father, as he not remain in the country would with both his wives. The child recovered and his mother took back to Utah with her. This Mormon is very much attached to both his wives, and regularly visits wife number - two in the States for a period each year

Although the Mormons don't practice polygamy in Canada, there is no doubt that they still believe in it, and they will defend it vigorousv. in argument. They are very re igious, and the old men are especially devout. The younger ones are at times inclined to kick against the restrictions imposed by the church, but they usually find that it is to their advantage to stand in well with their ecclesiastical leaders. One Sunday in each month they have testimony meetings. As these meetings are held at two o'clock in the afternoon and those participating are supposed to have fasted since he previous midnight, they are ofen in an excited and overwrought condition. Some little time ago, at one of these testimony meetings at Cardston, a young Mormon woman got up to recite her experiences. She was in a very overences. She was in a very over-wrought condition, and stood for a minute or so gasping for the utterance that would not come. Then all at once she began to speak freely in an utterly unknown tongue, gesticulating freely. She continued like this for about a quarter of an hour, then subsided into her seat the picture of mental and physical exhaus-

Then up rose the old Mormon Bishop, as if nothing out of the way had happened, and said: "The Lord has given our sister the gift of tongues; who is there here who can interpret?" Several people jumped up at once, but an elderly woman, the wife of a dignitary he church, caught the eve of the bishop first, and he motioned her to proceed. She declared that the language just heard was ancient Sv-riac, and that, being interpreted, it was a message of the Lord to bereaved parents who had recently

lost their children. After this there was a perfect epidemic of speaking in "tongues" which continued until a high church dignitary from Utah arrived in Cardston and put a stop to it.

One of the most conspicuous fig-ures among the Mormons in Alberta is Mrs. Card, the wife of Charles Ora Card, who is the head of the Mormon Church in Canada. This is a daughter of Brigham Young, the famous Mormon leader She is a woman of great natural shrewdness, and being possessed of great force of character, exerts, a great influence upon the whole com-munity. Last fall when the election for the Dominion Parliament was on, both sides, knowing Mrs. Card's influence, made many efforts to en-list her sympathies. She, however, to the Liberal side. Her remark to Mr. Bennett, the Conservative candidate, was a non-committal masterpiece. She said: "We like the Government, we like Mr. Oliver (the sitting member), and it you are elected we will like you."

#### OUR GRANDMOTHERS

WHEN WOMEN WORE "STAYS" AND TOOK NO EXERCISE.

Thousands Who Went Out Only to Attend Religious Services-A Radical Who Recommended the Skipping Rope.

In looking over a file of old Connecticut newspapers I came across the following excerpt from an English treatise on "Diet and Regimen" that warmed the cockles of my heart; "The skipping rope, a toy which is dis-

carded by the young girl when entering a premature womanhood, but which ought to be looked upon as a necessary article in every boudoir or a private room occua woman of civilized life and civilized habits, is one of the best if not the very best kind of gymnastic exercise that I know. It exercises almost every muscle in the body. There are few women who do not neglect exercise. Thousands upon thousands of English women never cross the thresholds of their houses oftener than once a week, and then it is to attend to the public worship of their Maker. And it is seldom that in town the distance to the church or chapel is such as to occupy more than ten minutes in going thither.

It may be presumed that this extract is intended to draw the attention of American women not only to their neglect of physical exercise, but also to the superi-ority of the skipping rope as an implement to assist in stirring their sluggish

circulation. From the lips of an old lady who was in her early girlhood at the time this treatise was written (1835) I obtained the following graphic description of one article of dress worn by women in every station of life at that period:

"I was a vigorous, romping girl of thir-teen, who hated restraint of any kind, above all that of dress, and was common ly in disgrace because of my careless hab its in regard to clothes. However, my older sister, Martha, was determined to bind me into a proper shape with 'stays.' "One Sunday, in spite of protestations, I was laced into that cruel instrument of torture and started on a two mile walk to 'meeting.' Did you ever see a pair of

stays? From a drawer in a mahogany chest the old lady drew out a pair of old fashioned corsets beautifully made out of a kind of buckram, covered with fine white linen. Small gussets were set in the front, and it was stitched between the materials. The opening was in the back, where ivory or horn eyelets were provided for the lacings. The front was re-enforced with a sort of pocket two inches wide, open at the top for the insertion of the "busk" or "board," which was literally a piece of thin board, a "straight front" such as we never dreamed of. The stays measured sixteen inches around the

"Such agony as I endured before that long morning service was over!" contin-ued my old friend as she carefully replaced the stays. "Noon came at last, how-ever, and when I went out to eat my cookies I rushed behind the meeting house, jerked out that board and, after breaking it in two, threw it away. I was soundly whipped for doing it, but children in those days expected whippings.
"When I was fifteen or sixteen years

old, my sister and I used to help each other lace our stays on Sunday, and we did not take them off until the next Saturday night."

An examination of the fashion books of that period confirms this story of tight lacing. The imagination conjures a comical spectacle when it pictures those tortured matrons, with their wasp waists, tiny caps with flowers "drooping in the neck" and voluminuos skirts "gauged with one or two rows half an inch apart with care that they hang evenly and well," solemnly skipping the rope in the privacy of their boudoirs.

The prevalence of recipes for lotions and pastes for the complexion and the universal use of paints and powders leads to the conclusion that there were defects to be covered that might have been re moved by the use of the skipping rope or other exercise assisted by the lavish use

of soap and water. The girl or woman of this generation, moving about with the glorious freedom made possible by the short skirts, loose waist and stout shoes, is as different physically from the woman of preceding generations as the bird that enjoys the full freedom of the heavens is different from the one that is caged and whose

wings are clipped.

The ten minute walk taken once a week in "prunella shoes" has lengthened to a ten mile walk taken in shoes her brother might wear. The skipping rope wielded in the privacy of her boudoir has been re-placed by the golf stick wielded in the open air. The sixteen inch waist has ex-panded to twenty-five inches. It is within the power of this fine creature to overcome her inheritance of weak nerves and the tendency to hysteria, the natural re-volt of nature against tight lacing, thin shoes and lack of physical culture. It is also within her power if she will cultivate repose as assiduously as she cultivates out of door exercise to eliminate "nerves" and "hysteria" from her vocabulary, and the children of future generations might search with curiosity for the meaning of those obsolete words in old dictionaries that have found a place by the side of the "stys" and the "Treatise on Diet and Regimen" in the ancient chest of draw-ers.—Agnes E. Blanchard in New York Times.



> Beck, as quoted in the Draper's Dictionary, asserts that at the time that Stephen usurped the crown of England (twelfth century) umbrellas were in common use among the English. The first mention of the umbrella in English literature is in Florio's "World of Wonders" (1598), where it is described as a "kind of round fan or shadowing that they use to ride with in summer in Italy; a little shade."

In 1656 an umbrella was exhibited in the "Museum Tradescantianum; or, Collection of Rarities Preserved at South Lambeth, Near London, by John Tradescant," which was known as "one of the wonders of the ark."

In the church of Cartmell, in Lancashire, England, there was preserved until a few years ago an umbrella said to be over 300 years old, which was used chiefly to protect the host.

References to the umbrella are to be found also in Blount's "Glossographia" (1674) and Phillips' "New Worlde of Words" (1678). In the first the reference reads: "Umbrello, a fashion of round and broad fans, wherewith the Indians (and from them our great ones) preserve themselves from the beat of the sun, and hence any little shadow, fan or other thing wherewith the women guard their faces from the sun." The second runs: "Umbrello, a screen against the sun's heat, used chiefly by the Spaniards, among whom it is known

by the name quitasole." The imaginative Dean Swift in the "Tale of a Tub" (1696) depicts Jack, an ever resourceful type, making use of a parchment copy of his father's will as a nightcap when he went to bed and as by local applications, as they cannot an umbrella in rainy weather. fringed with gold lace. The precise date when Jonas Hanway, who died in 1786, introduced the umbrella into England is not recorded in any of the encyclopedias I have at hand, but they all state that he was

popularly known as its introducer. With the Dutch, as with the Indian grandees, the umbrella was first an attribute of dignity, and well it might be, for the prices paid for them at The Hague in 1650 ranged from \$75 to \$120 each. The Dutch colonists who settled at the Cape of Good Hope were not slow to insist on preserving the dignity of the umbrella, for Ryk van Tulbagh, governor of Cape Colony in 1752, enacted that "No one less in rank than a junior merchant or those among the citizens of equal rank, and the wives and daughters only of those who are or have been members of any council shall venture to use umbrellas, and those who are less in rank than merchants shall not enter the castle in fine weather with an open umbrella."-Frank H. Vizetelly in New York Times.



dred dollars.

The largest number of patrons for any one month was one hundred and fifteen, in July of this year.

While this we think is a very good showing, there is no reason why the farmers of Kent County should not receive twenty-five thousand dollars for next year's milk and cream from

the Maple City Creamery.

The Pan-Amerikan reports show Canadian creamery butter to score from 92, to 95,75, with Maple City creamery butter scoring 94.25. Michigan creamery butter scored from 91.25 to 94.25.

Our butter is in good demand every month in the year, having established an unlimited market in Scotland for all we can make during the sum-mer months and a good home market for fall and winter, so that even now we are not making enough to fill our orders promptly, and if we cannot get orders promptly, and if we cannot get more milk and cream in a week or two we will have to buy butter from some other creamery to fill our orders.
