Dr. Keirste Had F

The passing of Rev. Dr. Wilfred Currier Kierstead, retired professor of education and philosophy, was received with sadness by the stu-dents of the University. Although he had been in poor health recently, his death came as a shock to many. Himself a graduate of the University of New Brunswick, Dr. Keirstead was a member of the faculty for thirty-six years. During that time he distinguished himself in the fields of education, philosophy and economics.

Dr. Keirstead was educated at the Provincial Normal School, University of New Brunswick and the University of Chicago, where he took his Ph.D. He also studied at



St. Marun's Seminary, Bates Coll age and Divinity School. He served in the Baptist Ministry for some years before joining the faculty of this University. He never gave up his close contact with the church. He was a valued member of the George Street Baptist Church in Fredericton.

Dr. Keirstead was professor of Philosophy and Economics until the chair was divided in 1922, when he became professor of Philosophy and Education. His son, Burton S. Economics at this time and cor tinued in that capacity until 1941. Dr. Keirstead was formerly a member of the American Economic
