NOTICE is hereby given that at the next session of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario application will be made by the Corporation of the Village of Waterdown for an Act to validate By-law Number Two Hundred and Twenty-two (222) of the said Village, authorizing the issuing of debentures for Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000) for the erection and equipping of a Memorial Hall. The existing debenture debt of the Village is as follows:—

By-law No. 217, \$55000. For Public School, of which there is unpaid \$52484.41.

By-law No. 227, \$25000. For Public School, of which there is unpaid \$19512.15.

The Corporation of the Township of East Flamboro has to pay the Corporation of the Village of Waterdown one half of the debentures unpaid under the two last mentioned by-laws.

Village Council Meeting

The village council met Monday Feb. 13th, the Reeve and councillors Speck, Crooker and Greene present. The minutes of the previous regular meeting and also the special meeting of Jan. 25th were read and adopted.

Communications were received from the Hespeler Council re raise in the standard for matriculation to Universities, and from the Waterloo Fire Insurance Co. re premium on old council chamber.

The Auditors' Report was presented by the Auditors, Messrs Green and Ryckman, and on motion of councillors Greene and Speck was accepted and the Auditors recommended to be paid their respective salaries.

On motion of councillors Crooker and Speck the Elementary Agricultural School for Wentworth County was given an additional grant of \$50.

On motion of councillors Greene and Speck this council placed itself on record as approving of the resolution passed by the Town of Hespeler stating that the standard of the matriculation examinations to Universities is high enough, also that the course of study for common schools be revised so as to facilitate education of more direct benefit to those who are not privileged to attend High Schools or other advanced educational institutions.

The Public School Board met in the new school, Tuesday, Feb. 7th, the following members being present, Wm. Thompson, C. Richards, G. B. Stock and R. J. Vance. Wm. Thompson in the chair. Minutes of the previous meeting was read and adopted.

A committee consisting of Mrs. John Anderson, Mrs. S. H. Carey and Mrs. Walker Drummond from the Women's Institute waited on the Board regarding the providing of a hot dish to those children who were compelled to take a lunch to school. The Board favored the scheme and promised its help.

A communication from the Spencer Heating Co. was read wherein they promised to send their representative D. M. Speirs to inspect and report on our heating system.

The following bills were ordered paid, W. G. Spence \$41.60, Miss Buchanan \$8.25, Miss Hamilton 75c.

Moved by G. B. Stock and Chas. Richards, and resolved that the Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer be authorized to sign all cheques for the Board. Carried.

Moved by C. Richards G. B. Stock that our principal, D. Harper, be appointed representative on the Entrance Examination Board for 1922. Carried.

Moved by G. B. Stock and C. Richards that tenders be called for one carload of No. 1 Buckwheat coal and that the chairman and secretary be a committee to purchase the same. Carried.

Moved by C. Richards and G. B. Stock that any supplies for use of school by the teachers be ordered by them through the principal who will lay the matter before the Board before purchasing same, unless some smaller items for immediate use when the Principal and Secretary shall order same promptly. Carried.

Moved by R. J. Vance and C. Richards and resolved that teachers will be expected to open their classrooms not later than 8.45 a. m. and remain there on duty until 12 noon and be in there rooms at 1.25 p. m. and remain there on duty until 4 p. m. excepting during the periods of recess, unless relieved by special permission of the Principal or the Board. Carried.

The meeting then adjourned.

Work of W. M. S. Appreciated

The W. M. S. of the Methodist church received the following letter from Mrs. W. Stanley, Morley, Alta. The Society shipped a bale of clothing and other articles last fall to an Indian Mission in Alberta, and the letter tells the results.

Dear Mrs. Daley—

It was good not only to hear from you but to receive the splendid bale which came to hand this week. The things you sent were so good and just what we needed most for the Indians. Quite a number of the Indian women have been here this week for clothing. This morning three women and two children about 4 years of age came. We give two of them each a coat, the other a quilt and the children a warm coat, cap and dress each. Most of these things came from your society. You cannot imagine how little they wear, just a thin waist with nothing underneath and something you cannot name tied around them for a skirt, and moccasins. Some have stockings, others none. The little children are pitiful to look at, not only unclean and uncared for but nearly all have some physical defects. Your bale came at an opportune time as the Indians here are facing a hard winter. We are trying to save most of the clothing and quilts to distribute between Xmas and New Years as the need will be greatest then as the weather becomes more severe, and we hope to give every one something to help them. At the present time we are two miles from the nearest neighbor and our site is not central. We are hoping to have the new church in use soon and are looking forward to doing greater things for the Master. Please thank all who so kindly helped in sending to our work here. We appreciate your interest more than we can say. Am writing the Willing Workers' class under separate cover to thank them and tell them how much we appreciate their efforts also.
