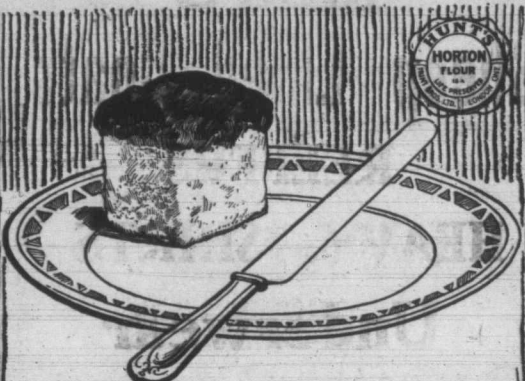

Death F. C. Trimper.

A sad event occurred between the Davidson Lumber Co's Camp, No. 6 at Birch Lake and South Tremont, four miles distant, on the day before Christmas in the death by exposure of Mr. Fletcher Trimper of Clementsvale, Annapolis Co., aged 73 years.

He was the mechanical member of said camp for making ox-yokes, axe-handles and general repair work. For the purpose of moving his tools, etc., to the settlement he constructed a sled with which he made several short trips daily Wednesday and Thursday returning to the camp for the night, but Friday night he did not return and they naturally supposed that he had got to Tremont to take the train on Christmas at Kingston.

As he did not arrive home for Christmas, after waiting a few days, his son Harland Trimper came to learn the cause. After a few days search his tools were found a mile from the settlement and his body was found not far from the camp about a rod from the old log road which led to Tremont where he perished from cold and fatigue while returning to the camp for the night.

An inquest was held at Kingston on Jan. 4th, 1916, before the arrival of the west bound express.

Death of Mr. Henry Munroe.

One of our highly respected citizens passed away in the death of Mr. Henry Munroe of Kingston Village, Dec. 29th, 1915, aged 75 years, after a very useful and active life.

He entered the teaching profession in 1855 at the age of 15 years and taught regularly until 1883 when he was elected to the legislature of Nova Scotia for Annapolis Co. and again a few years later on the death of Deacon Chute of Bear River with a large majority. After which he spent his time teaching and in taking Government contracts especially in bridge construction. Until from age and failing health he retired from business. His children are F. M. Munroe, on the homestead at Kingston Village; Mrs. Harry McNeil of Melvern Square; Hibbert, post master of Tabor, Alta., and George, manager of Canadian Bank of Commerce, Toronto.

Rev. George Hudson attended the funeral services at the Monroe homestead.

The burial was at the Melvern Square cemetery beside his wife who predeceased him several years.

Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Munroe, who cared for him during his failing years are highly commended for their kindness and thoughtfulness for his comfort.

Mrs. Gates is a daughter of Brother George Fraser, our oldest member, who joined the order in Canning which became dormant over forty years ago. He carefully preserved his certificate now yellow with age—awaiting the time when there would be an opportunity of again becoming an active member of the order. Through all these years his interest in the cause has never flagged and through his efforts P. C. M. Bligh was able to arrange the visit of the Grand Organizer at Port Williams who was so hospitably entertained by Brother and Mrs. Gates.

This lodge is in a very flourishing condition. It is expected that several candidates will be initiated at a special meeting to be held on the 17th inst.

How to Knit Socks for the Soldier Boys.

The following instructions, how to knit should be clipped from our paper and carefully preserved for future use. This is the latest instructions for knitting issued to Red Cross workers:

Day Socks—Measurements of finished sock: Length from the top of sock to bottom of heel, 14 1/2 inches, 11 1/2 ins. Length of ribbing, 4 1/2 ins. Length of leg to commencement of heel, 12 inches.

Cast on 68 stitches; rib 4 1-2 inches, 2 plain, 2 purl; knit plain 7 1-2 inches (12 inches in all).

HEEL—Knit plain 34 stitches on to one needle; turn, purl back these 34 stitches; turn, knit plain; repeat these two rows (always slipping the first stitch) sixteen times (17 in all).

With the inside of the heel towards you: purl 19 stitches, purl 2 together, purl 1.

Turn, knit 6 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1, turn, purl 7 stitches, purl 2 together, purl 1.

Turn, knit 8 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1, turn, purl 9 stitches, purl 2 together, purl 1.

Turn, knit 10 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1, turn, purl 11 stitches, purl 2 together, purl 1.

Turn, knit 12 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1, turn, purl 13 stitches, purl 2 together, purl 1.

Turn, knit 14 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1, turn, purl 15 stitches, purl 2 together, purl 1.

Turn, knit 16 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1, turn, purl 17 stitches, purl 2 together, purl 1.

Turn, knit 18 stitches, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit 1, turn, purl 19 stitches, purl 2 together, purl 1.

Pick up and knit 18 stitches down the sides of the heel piece.

Knit the 34 stitches of the front needles (on to one needle) Pick up and knit the 18 stitches at the other side of the heel piece. Divide the heel stitches on to the two side needles, and knit right round again to the centre heel.

First needle: knit to within 3 stitches of the front end of side needle, knit 2 together, knit 1.

Front needle plain. Third needle: knit 1, slip 1, knit 1, pull slipped stitch over, knit plain to end of needle.

This reducing to be done every other row until there are 69 stitches on the needles.

Knit plain until the foot (from the back of the heel) measures 9 1-2 inches.

TOE—Divide the 69 stitches between the 3 needles, 23 on each.

1st row: knit together 1st and 2nd stitches on each needle.

2nd row: knit together 2nd and 3rd stitches on each needle.

3rd row: knit together 3rd and 4th stitches on each needle.

And so on, beginning again with 1st and 2nd stitches after reaching the last stitches on each needle. Decrease to 9 stitches. Draw wool through stitches, and darn in carefully.

Reception and Banquet To General Manager Graham.

On Thursday evening Manager George E. Graham of the D. A. R. was given a reception and banquet by the citizens of Windsor at the rooms of the W. C. T. U. About 50 guests were present and the total list was quite an extended one. Manager Graham with his usual tact replied to the toast to himself and the railway and asked that all work together for the advancement of the town and that meant increased business for the railway.

KENTVILLE TO HAVE NEW MODERN THEATRE.

Up-to-Date Fire Proof Structure to be Erected in the Spring.

What has long been felt as a necessity in Kentville is at last to be realized. A new theatre, modern in every particular is to be erected on the property of Mr. Perry Bishop on Main St. This is easily the best location in town and Mr. Bishop is to be congratulated on his public spiritedness in undertaking a proposition of this kind. The plans call for a theatre of 44x98 feet in dimensions, with large balcony and boxes and will have a seating capacity of about 800. Two large stores will be on each side of the theatre lobby the dimensions of which will be 16 x 45 feet. A steam heating system of latest type will be installed.

Church Union Carried By Large Vote.

Toronto, Jan. 6—Church union has been carried in the Presbyterian Church. The majority for union with the Methodist and Congregational churches, according to official figures announced today, was 53,086. The minority, however, is so large that it is considered doubtful if the General Assembly, which meets in Winnipeg next June, will force union on the 93,156 members who voted against it. The total vote was 239,398. The majority given by this vote on the church union question is considerably lower than that given in 1911. The majority then was 80,251 and 14,299 more were recorded.

Will Keep A Part of Pay Due Soldiers.

Ottawa, Dec. 31—Action has been taken by the government to secure for each Canadian soldier at the front a nest egg in the way of accumulated pay on his return to Canada at the conclusion of the war. It is understood that an order-in-council has been passed retaining a considerable portion of the monthly pay due the soldiers who have not assigned their pay to relatives in Canada, and who are now overseas, where there is no need for any immediate expenditure, and practically of their whole monthly pay.

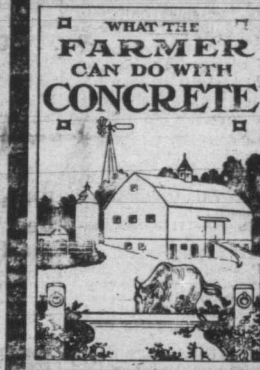

American Citizenship No Guarantee of Safety.

On New Year's Day the Canadian Press despatches contained the announcement from Washington of glorification over an alleged great diplomatic victory won by the United States Government over Austria: But alas, a few inches further down the sheet there was a cablegram from somewhere in Europe, that the alleged Austro-German submarine had sunk a British liner the S. S. Persia without the slightest warning and sent over hundreds of people to death, including an American Consul, who as a representative of the United States was journeying to his diplomatic post at the extreme point of South Arabia.

It is a great problem which the United States. It involves a difficult mathematical proposition. If the indemnity for the drowning of a few American-Italians is \$5.60 per head and that for the drowning without warning some English speaking American citizens is \$6.60, what will be the indemnity of a full-fledged American Consul? asks the Moncton Transcript. It is to our friends at the south a mere question of dollars and cents.

Perish honor! Perish national respect! Perish national dignity! Perish insistence upon respect being shown to American citizens so long as the almighty dollar tendered is sufficiently large to save a national affront.

In the United States Senate a few years ago, a senator from the New England States paid in language which was memorable a high tribute to the respect which the British Empire insists shall be paid to its subjects. He told the wonderful story of how a British army was sent into the mountains of Abyssinia and that the Empire stretched out its arm and plucked one of its citizens from the darkness of a dungeon and restored him to his family, and then left the country. That expedition cost millions of dollars, but from that day to this, British power has been respected in Abyssinia.

If the United States were true to itself today it would stretch out its arm and compel the military and naval brigades of Central Europe to respect the lives and liberties of American citizens. The accumulation of wealth is a commendable ideal for a great people, but it is not an ideal which insisted upon on all occasions makes a people truly great.

LINCOLN AND LLOYD GEORGE

Years ago protectionist newspapers began to print what was said to have been a phrase of Lincoln's. "If an American buys \$50 worth of English steel, America has the steel and England the \$50, but if he buys of an American, America has the steel and the \$50, too." The quotation passed as genuine, and it harmonizes with some references to Protection in the edition of Lincoln's writings prepared by his son.

But Free Trade critics last year began a searchlight campaign, and the expressions quoted cannot be found in Lincoln's papers. It appears that the precise words were uttered in a speech as a reflection of Lincoln's teaching, and not as a literal quotation any more than the oratorical burst in Daniel Webster's famous speech is to be taken as the literal text of John Adams.

Yet here is a quotation which may console Protectionists for the loss of the Lincoln phrase. Nearly seventy years after Peel's experiment with Free Trade, David Lloyd-George said: "If profits of our manufacturers are too high in some cases, that can be rectified, but at the worst it is not so grave an evil as the sending of orders to neutral countries when by so doing we send money out of our own country and reap none of the benefits. Profits which English manufacturers and workers make will be spent among Englishmen, while profits Americans make are altogether lost to this country."
