Mr and Mrs G.W. Parker and son Whitney, motored to Truro on Sunday, returning on Monday.

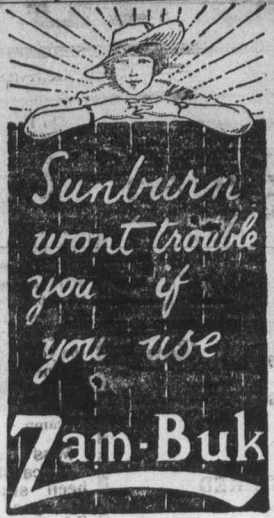

Death of Principal Fearon at Wolfville.

He Was Principal of the Halifax School for the Deaf for 27 Years.

Halifax lost one of its most highly respected citizens when death removed Mr. James Fearon who for the past twenty-seven years has been principal of the School for the Deaf. His death adds another name to the list of victims of the Great Disaster for Mr. Fearon had not been in good health since that fatal December day. Since then he had resided in Wolfville with the pupils, who have been domiciled at Acadia College, and it was there that his death occurred at ten o'clock on Saturday morning last. Mr. Fearon did splendid work in connection with the School for the Deaf, which had grown four times as large as it was when he took charge. During the time that he was Principal he had many difficult pupils to teach, but his effort were always attended with success. He was the first to introduce the oral system into this country and it was later introduced into the schools for the deaf in Canada and the United States. He was born at Portadown, Ireland, fifty-two years ago, and is survived by his widow, who is a daughter of Mr. H. D. MacKenzie of this city, and two daughters. The funeral took place Monday afternoon, at 3 p. m., from the residence of Mr. C. C. Blackadar, Halifax.

Hospital Ship From Halifax Torpedoed.

Great Loss of Life

London, July 1st.—A German submarine seventy miles from the Irish coast on the night of June 27th., torpedoed the 11,000 ton hospital ship Llandovery Castle which had been chartered by the Canadian government and has been in the service of carrying wounded and sick from England to Canada for many months past. The ship was then on her way to England. She had on board 258 persons, including 80 men of the Canadian Army Medical Corps and 14 female nurses. Up to the latest reports only 24 of those on board, including the captain have survived the treacherous attack, which came without warning. The text of the admalty announcement follows—
"About 10.30 o'clock on June 27th., one hundred and sixteen miles southwest of Fastnet, the hospital ship Llandovery Castle was torpedoed by an enemy submarine and sank in about ten minutes. She was homeward bound from Canada and there were no sick or wounded on board, but her crew consisted of 164 officers and men and she carried eighty Canadian army medicals and 14 female nurses. Of this total of 258, only one boat, containing 24 survivors has so far reached port. Search still is being made and there is a bare possibility that others may yet be found.

Democracy at War

Lecture by
Frank Dixon
At Kentville Chautauqua
Which Opens July 31st.

One of the most interesting lecturers who will appear at the local Chautauqua is Frank Dixon, of New York. He was born in North Carolina after the Civil War, of Scottish parents, and graduated from the University of his native state. He taught school a year, entered the ministry, held pastorates in West Virginia, California and Connecticut and about twelve years ago became a Chautauqua lecturer where he at once achieved national distinction. The lecturer must be the aggressor and call all men to give a reason for the convictions that they hold or abandon them for better.

Frank Dixon does this and more. He stirs the communities in which he lectures that something has to be done. He has been well described as radically conservative and conservatively radical. He is an orator with a wonderful personality. He is returned to the Chautauqua towns at almost a unanimous request from the towns.

This year his lecture, "Democracy at War," has been carefully prepared and it is a big, timely all-American constructive lecture.
Frank Dixon has spent the winter in France with our armies, as a special representative of the American Red Cross. He returns just in time to begin his Chautauqua season. He will have important things to say, something fresh and worth hearing.

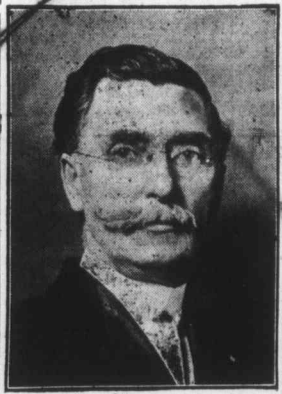

To one who has been so intimately associated with her in the last few years of her work, the news of her death causes a deep consideration of the inner purposes and ultimate value of human effort. Human beings work for various ends, worthy and unworthy. The one aim of Miss Grierson's labors seemed to be that others might be benefited or made happy. All life's battlefields are not in Europe, neither are all the heroes and heroines. We cannot, and should not attempt to estimate the value of a human life, but to one who has witnessed its strong uplifting influence on hundreds of little children, the life just closed cannot but remain a lasting inspiration.

Potato Spraying

BY G. E. SANDERS,
Dominion Entomological Laboratory
Annapolis Royal, N. S.

Of all operations conducted on the farm it is probable that spraying potatoes is the most profitable. In fact when one considers that the increased crop due to spraying one acre of potatoes at a cost of about \$15, is about 100 bushels, it becomes apparent that probably the operation or investment that can be relied upon to give the greatest returns of any open to farmers at least is potato spraying. It is equivalent to buying potatoes at 15 cents per bushel and it is more than probable that the price of potatoes will be more than ten times fifteen cents during 1918-19. Experiments carried on by the laboratory staff on the school plot at Annapolis in 1917 show that an acre of potatoes at the height of the growing season will store about 5 bushels of potatoes per day. The potato being mostly starch is made up almost wholly of materials that are gathered from the air by the leaf and not of materials taken from the soil. As soon as the top dies the storing of starch in the form of potato tubers stops. Unsprayed potatoes are likely to be and usually are attacked by potato blight when the normal crop of tubers is from one third to one half stored, and as soon as the tops are killed by the blight the storage of tubers ceases. Spraying with Bordeaux will protect potato plants absolutely from blight and will result in a normal season in keeping the tops green from ten to fifty days longer than normal. potatoes, and this year the country seeds the potatoes. Potatoes should be sprayed when about eight inches high with a poisoned Bordeaux mixture, repeat every one or two weeks until the tops are done growing. Make sure that all parts of the plant, the tops and undersides of the leaves and the stems are thoroughly wet with the mixture. To make Bordeaux mixture—dissolve 4 pounds of bluestone in 20 gallons of water and slake in another barrel 4 pounds of stone lime making it up later to 20 gallons of milk of lime. Pour the two by alternate buckets into the spray barrel and add the poison. In using hydrated lime, dissolve the 4 pounds of copper sulphate or bluestone in 40 gallons of water and add 5 pounds of hydrated lime stirring rapidly all the while.

As a poison one can use any of the following they being arranged in order of value, present prices considered. To 40 gallons use.
1 1/2 lbs. arsenate of lime powder.
2 " crystal arsenate of soda.
1 " fused arsenate of soda.
1 1/2 " arsenate of zinc powder.
4 " arsenate of lead paste.
2 " arsenate of lead powder.
1 " paris green.

Death of Frederic C. Rand Collector of Customs for Kings

Frederic C. Rand, collector of customs of Kings County, died at his residence here after an illness of several months. The deceased was a son of the late Ebenezer Rand of Cornwallis and was born on March 11th 1858.

Mr. Rand received his early education in Wolfville and later attended Harvard Law School. He also studied in the law office of Silas W. Aylward of St. John N. B. In 1888 he succeeded his father as collector of customs in Kings county and retained the office until his death, the commission of Ebenezer Rand as collector was received in 1859 under Earl Musgrave as governor and Hon. Charles Tupper as provincial secretary. The lives of father and son have thus been identified with the customs office of Kings county for a period of nearly sixty years. Such long and uninterrupted terms of service under so many successive administrations is the best possible testimony that need be given to the rare efficiency with which the customs affairs have been administered in Kings county.

Few men were better versed in the political conditions of Canada or read more truly the signs of various changes. Not long since he was commended by Lord Robert Cecil for an excellent survey of the political outlook in Canada. He was a person who invited confidence which he never betrayed. Thus he had hosts of friends who cherish memories of years of pleasant personal relations with him and now mourn with sincerity his departure. The deceased married in 1885 Mary H. Locke daughter of Jonathan Locke of Lockeport, and is survived by his wife. Their only daughter, Ida Locke Rand is the wife of Dr. Charles Wesley Woodall Schnectady, N. Y., who is now in service as a captain in the American

expeditionary forces. The brothers and sisters of Mr. Rand are Dr. Benjamin Rand of Harvard University Fenwick W. Rand on the Cornwallis Homestead and Mrs. Noble Crandall of Bedford.

The religious affiliations of Mr. Rand were Baptist and in politics he was a conservative.

The funeral was held from the residence on Saturday afternoon conducted by Rev. A. W. West who spoke very feelingly and appropriately in the loss sustained in the community and family. The pall-bearers were His Honor Judge Webster, Mr. J. E. Kinsman, M. P. P., A. E. Calkin Esq. and H. G. Harris. Burial took place at Canard in the family plot beside his father and grandfather.
