A SECOND WORD TO ALL NEW BRUNSWICKERS.

Report of Victory Loan Campaign

Yesterday three districts in the province won the Prince of Wales special banner by attaining their objective in the Victory Loan Campaign. The aggressive and hustling districts are Southampton-Queensbury, in York County; Napagon, in York County, and Westfield, in King's county.

In St. John city and county the drive went on with undiminished vigor, 222 subscriptions being received, which totalled the excellent amount of \$169,200. This district, however, has not gained much more than one-sixth of its objective, which is \$4,000,000.

St. John city and county, 775 subscriptions totalling \$770,150

King's county, 36 subscriptions, totalling \$24,050.

Madawaska, 262 subscriptions, totalling \$74,800.

Queens-Sunbury east 26 subscriptions, totalling \$21,900.

Queens-Sunbury west, six subscriptions, totalling \$8,000.

Upper Gloucester, 119 subscriptions, totalling \$246,850.

Restigouche, 93 subscriptions, totalling \$30,200

York, 166 subscriptions, totalling \$128,050.

Albert, eleven subscriptions, totalling \$5,550.

Westmorland, 867 subscriptions, totalling \$235,900.

Kent, 21 subscriptions, totalling \$63,000.

Northumberland, east, 78 subscriptions, totalling \$42,350.

Northumberland, west, 46 subscriptions, totalling \$17,100.

Victoria, ten subscriptions, totalling \$17,950

Merinton, 31 subscriptions, totalling \$34,350.

Charlotte, 115 subscriptions, totalling \$13,330

The total amount raised by the province to date is \$1,838,000—slightly over one fifth of the objective of \$9,000,000 which represents 2607 individual subscriptions.

McN Matthews, Millerton, Rev. Geo. Grant, Blackville, Rev. Alex. Pirth, Douglastown, Rev. J. H. A. Anderson, Chatham and Messrs. E. A. McCurdy, Newcastle, N. B. and George Harper, Millerton.

The speaker outlined the main objectives of the Movement as follows: 1. Intercession; 2. Family Worship in Every Home; 3. Personal Evangelism; 4. Religious Education; 5. Life Service; 6. Missionary Education; 7. Stewardship; 8. Money.

The chairman outlined the main on the position of the church as the institution in which we have confidence and through which we must work out to its fullest extent the Forward Movement.

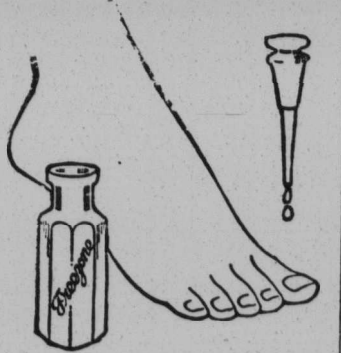

Finger Prints Show Long Criminal Record

Again illustrating the value of the finger print system in keeping track of suspected persons who from time to time wander across the pathway of the police, Chief Rideout, who makes systematic use of the Bertillon Method, Saturday received word from Ottawa, that the prints of one Arnold Reid, who a short time ago applied at headquarters for protection over night, are identical with Arnold Reid, No. 7320, whose criminal record is a long one. At the time this man was in Moncton, the police were convinced that he had a record and accordingly saw to it that he left the city the next day. His record as furnished Chief Rideout is as follows:

- October 28th, 1907, charged at St. John with theft and given suspended sentence.
- November 18th, 1907, charged with truancy, and given two years in the Industrial Home at St. John.
- July 27th, 1910, charged with theft, St. John and given suspended sentence.
- February 26th, 1911, sentenced at St. John to six months common jail for theft.
- April 25th, 1911, escaped lawful custody at St. John and given suspended sentence.
- October, 13th, 1912, sentenced to six months common jail for theft.
- June 28th, 1913, sentenced to five years in Dorchester penitentiary for theft.
- June 18th, 1916, charged with theft before County Court Judge, St. John and jury disagreed. Accused let go to join the 115 Battalion.
- June 22nd, 1916, charged with theft of horse and wagon and sentenced to two years in Dorchester penitentiary.

STRUCK BY TRAIN AND WAS KILLED.

Apothiqui, N. B., Oct. 26—News of the tragic death of George Long, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ezra Long of Collina, was communicated to them on Friday. The young man, met instant death at Lowell, (Mass.) by being struck by a railway train. Besides the grief-stricken parents, four sisters and one brother are left to mourn. The sisters are Mrs. Joseph Sharp and Mrs. Auonzo Baxter of Collina; Mrs. Geo. Kane, St. John; Mrs. Frank Sprague of Sussex. The brother, Frank Long, resides in Collina. The unfortunate young man who was thirty-two years of age was unmarried. He had returned from overseas service only a few months ago. His untimely and regrettable demise is deeply mourned by many friends who sincerely sympathize with the relatives. The funeral took place at Collina on Sunday afternoon. The service was conducted by Rev. C. S. Young and interment was made in the Upper Springfield cemetery.

FORTY PERSONS BURNED TO DEATH.

Silesia, October 25—Forty persons were burned to death following the collision of a passenger train with a freight train near Kronowitz, Silesia. The cars took fire following the accident. Sixty persons were injured and eighteen were slightly hurt in the wreck.

Dutch Press Against Kaiser's Surrender

The Hague, Oct. 26.—(By the Associated Press)—The entire Dutch press joins in scathing criticism of an article advocating the surrender of the former German Emperor for trial which appeared recently in the weekly journal New Amsterdamer. In the article the editor, Professor J. A. Van Hamel, the Dutch publicist, who was selected by Sir James Eric Drummond, Secretary General of the League of Nations, as head of the legal department of the secretariat of the League, argues that the question of extradition of the former Emperor should not be treated as a purely legal matter. It should instead be regarded from the point of view of the new jurisprudence, belonging to the new era and formal judicial obstacles should not be permitted to stand in the way of the extradition of Wilhelm of Hohenzollern.

COAL STRIKE CANNOT BE AVOIDED

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 29—"A strike of bituminous miners cannot be avoided," was the outstanding conclusion of a statement issued today by the conference of the United Mine Workers of America. Blame for the situation was laid at the feet of the operators because they had refused to negotiate a wage agreement notwithstanding the fact that the mine workers' representatives had urged and beseeched them to do so. The miners, the statement claims, will be exercising constitutional rights in striking. The statement of President Wilson as it appeared in the newspapers and added that no communication on that subject had been received from the federal administration.

Canadian National Railways Increased Service

A daily Transcontinental service between Toronto—Winnipeg—Vancouver—Victoria, is the principal feature announced in the Canadian National Railways Fall and Winter time table. This train will leave 9.15 P. M. daily and will be equipped with up-to-date sleeping, dining, first-class day coach, tourist and colonist cars. Between Toronto and Winnipeg there will also be a compartment-observation library car. A parlor car will be attached for the convenience of passengers, while travelling through the Rockies, so they may enjoy, in the utmost comfort, the magnificent scenery for which the Canadian National route is famous. Further particulars can be obtained from Passenger Officers of Canada's National system of Railways.

Boosting the Victory Loan

The Victory Loan campaign is now started on the Canadian National Railways. From the Atlantic to the Pacific the various departments have been asked to participate. On every district, every division, a systematic and thorough canvas will be made and every employee will be given the opportunity to be a bondholder. Draft Horses Needed Overseas

The scarcity of draft horses both for city trade and farm work exists not only in Great Britain but on the continent. Belgium is in need of large numbers of moderately priced draft horses for the use of repatriated peasants. In the Agricultural Gazette for October appears a statement by Mr. H. S. Arkell Live Stock Commissioner, who recently visited Europe and found on inquiring into the horse trade that France is in the market for farm horses of Percheron type. In fact country work horses are scarce and worth six thousand francs each. Greece, according to the Live Stock Commissioner, is now making inquiries regarding light horses and dairy cattle.

LOYAL POLICEMEN BOSTON GET \$200 BONUS

Boston, Mass., Oct. 25—Every patrol man of the Boston police force, who refused to go on strike on September 9 and remained at his post received today a check for \$200 in recognition of his fidelity. The sum thus expended, taken from the fund for the defenders of public safety, amounts to \$103,200, the exact number of beneficiaries being 516. The trustees of the fund have also distributed more than \$100,000 to members of the State Guard in need of pecuniary assistance. The total contributions to the fund now amount to \$500,510.22. The remarkable spurt of the last week in the recruiting of the new force has carried the total certifications by the civil service commission to 675, in the week, including last Saturday, the total certifications amounted to 328.

New Congress Likely to Consider Turkish Problem

Paris, Oct. 28.—(By A. P.)—The Entente representatives in the peace conference apparently are persuaded that the United States will not voluntarily accept any mandate in the Near East, and it now seems assured that the Turkish question will not be touched by the present peace conference, but will probably be taken up by another conference to be held within a few months.

Conditions are so unsettled in the Near East that it does not seem possible to delay settlement of the Turkish problem very long.

Prince Emir Faisal is pressing for the establishment of a new Arab Kingdom immediately, and the Italian and Greek positions in Southern Anatolia are so distasteful to the Turks and so untenable without authority from the Entente that the European countries cannot delay much longer in their effort to persuade the United States to accept a mandate of some sort in Asia Minor and thus simplify the difficult task of dismembering Turkey.

When the commission headed by Charles R. Crane returned from Asia Minor it was made clear that the United States would not be advised by its Near Eastern specialists to accept a mandate for Armenia alone, because of the difficulties in restoring the devastated and depopulated waste.

The mission under Major General Harbord is even more emphatic in its opposition to the plan for the United States to become mandatory for Armenia.

At one time it might have been possible to induce France and Great Britain to grant to the United States the Turkish mandate, including European Turkey, Constantinople and Anatolia, as well as Armenia. But it is considered doubtful now whether the great European powers would trust such a large part of Turkey over to the United States even were the United States to express willingness to administer it.

The United States will doubtless be urged to sit in the conference for the dismemberment of Turkey, whether it agrees to accept the mandate there or not, as the various European powers are so at outs that they want some disinterested power to act as arbiter, and in the opinion of the American delegation the United States will probably accept this responsibility and endeavor to assist in any way it can in the disentanglement of the Near situation.

French investments are so large in Constantinople that France naturally is anxious to have that city, but it is difficult at the present time to see how Great Britain and France can reconcile their ambitions.

There is much speculation as to where the conference for the division of Turkey will be held. It probably will not be in Paris. The suggestion of Geneva has not met with great favor, as it is not regarded as a good place for a winter conference, and it is believed that Turkey must be disposed of before Spring. Mention of The Hague also has not been received enthusiastically. London is considered a possibility.

France Wants Cables.

Paris, Oct. 28.—(By the Associated Press)—In French peace conference circles the foundation of an international commission for the purpose of distributing among the Allies supervision and management of the submarine cables seized from the Germans is being advocated. When the armistice was signed France and Japan had a brief interchange of views under which it was proposed that all war booty should be retained.

This point of view was not adhered to then by the United States, and a temporary agreement was reached under which the Emden-Vigo, one of the Emden-Azores cables, the Monrovia-Lome (German West Africa) and the Constantinople-Kustentzi (Roumania) cables should be placed under British management; the Emden-Teneriffe, the Emden-Tenariffe, the Emden-Azores and Teneriffe-Perambuco, and Emden-Brest and the Azores-New York cables revert to the temporary direction of the French, and the Japanese controlling all the Far Eastern German cables.

This situation obtains at the present time, but the desire is to reach a final settlement as to the status of the one-time German lines. The sentiment among the French peace delegation is that the cables should be apportioned between the Allies, France retaining those which she is now operating.

To Visit London.

London, Oct. 28.—Fourteen Germans of prominence and several equally

prominent Austrians will arrive in England November 5 to confer in London with a number of English people who during the war and since the armistice was signed have interested themselves in the internal conditions of Germany, says the Daily Mail.

Among those who will entertain the visitors will be Baron Parmoor, judicial member of the privy council, and the government are expected to hold communication with them, though whether directly or indirectly is not known.

The visitors will include Edward Bernstein and Carl Kautsky, Socialists; Count Montgelas, commander of the 4th Bavarian division during a part of the war and formerly a friend of Emperor William; Max Warburg, a Hamburg banker, and Professors Bonn and Brantano.

The Daily Mail says this will be the first gathering of Germans and Austrians in Great Britain since the beginning of the war. The newspaper apparently is not aware of the purpose of the Conference, but says that doubtless it will arouse great public interest.

Heavy Death Toll When Steamer Goes to Pieces

Muskegon, Mich., Oct. 28.—With fourteen known dead and six or more missing, only time can bring an accurate count of the toll of the great seas which early this morning bodily lifted the Crosby passenger steamer Muskegon, formerly the City of Holland, and smashed her to pieces on the piers at the entrance to Muskegon harbor. The list of dead is being added to almost hourly. The steamer, a side wheeler, bound from Milwaukee, for the harbor in the early morning darkness but is said by Captain Edward Miller to have struck the bar at the entrance. The wheel paddles jammed in the sand, checking the headway and the great combers threw the ship about and hurled her on to the pier, the huge mountainous seas pounding into the wreckage.

Fifty of the seventy-two passengers and crew, guided to safety by a signal flashed by a light in the hands of a coastguard, were tonight known to have been saved from the vessel Fear is held that several were caught between the decks. Survivors, most of whom escaped only in their night clothes, were being cared for by the Red Cross.

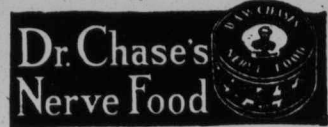

Government Should Go to People With G. T. Bul

Ottawa, Oct. 28—While the leading Conservative organ, the Montreal Gazette, is attacking Hon. N. W. Rowell and Hon. A. K. MacLean, two Liberal-Unionist members of the cabinet, for refusing to help in the by-elections decided yesterday and refers very bluntly to "the two factions in the cabinet," Hon. Dr. Reid rises in the house of commons and makes a vigorous attack upon the Liberals for messing things up in respect to the Grand Trunk Pacific and pictures the Tories as "struggling to save something from the wreck that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his followers made of the railway situation."

The minister of railways says the Grand Trunk Pacific has already cost the people two hundred and sixty millions of dollars, exactly twenty times what the Liberal government said it would cost.

"The Transcontinental Railway has cost up to date, including losses, \$250,000,000," declared the minister. "The interest on that even at four per cent means an annual loss of ten millions to this country. In addition to that we are losing six million dollars every year on the Transcontinental in operation. That makes sixteen million dollars every year which the people of this country are liable for on that one transaction. In addition to that the Liberal party launched out on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway scheme and forced the road to go through to the coast."

The government up to date has advanced to the G. T. P. \$64,000,000 on account of loans and interest on the same advances by the received and so forth. In addition to that there is a balance due to the Canadian Government Railways by the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific, on operating accounts, of \$1,040,346.

"The dominion government and other bodies have invested \$260,000,000 in the Grand Trunk Pacific as follows: Dominion government guarantees and loans\$140,684,769 Local governments16,786,440 Grand Trunk Pacific72,301,253 Subsidy from dominion government1,220,480 Advances by Grand Trunk Railway to Grand Trunk Pacific Development Company and branch lines22,840,354 Implementing6,203,032

"So instead of it costing us \$13,000,000, the people of this country have invested \$266,000,000 in the Grand Trunk Pacific," said Dr. Reid.

"We are trying to save something from the wreck that the Liberal party made of the railway situation. We are trying to link up with the old Grand Trunk instead of saving a judgment system.

"How can we make the road pay without connections in Ontario and Quebec? It is impossible for us to continue without feeders and branch lines in the east."

Fears C. P. R. Would Get It

"If we refuse to take over the Grand Trunk now they will make an agreement with the C. P. R. and the C. P. R. will take the road over. The opposition answers that the C. P. R. would have to get the consent of this parliament before doing so. The policy of the opposition means handing the road over to the C. P. R., and the leader of the opposition says if you cannot do that let the railway go into the hands of the receiver. That means it will go into the hands of the C. P. R. If the opposition would come out into the open and say we want this railway (The Grand Trunk) to go over to the C. P. R., so far as I am concerned, I want to say that we cannot continue to operate the Grand Trunk Pacific and the National Transcontinental and the Canadian Northern except at such a loss that the people of Canada would not stand for it.

"I say that we should acquire the Grand Trunk and link it up with the others we already have and if they are operated efficiently they will make just as much money as the C. P. R. Opposition critics say the government cannot successfully operate a railway system. The government intends to appoint six or eight of the very best railway men available, men who have been connected with railways to such an extent that they will know exactly how to operate the National railways in the most economical way, and I again say that they should have a very free hand and not be influenced or interfered with by the government or political parties. If that policy is carried out they will make a success of the system.

"I believe a private corporation could select six or eight men today who could take that system and make

money out of it."

W. D. Euler (North Waterloo)—"Does the proposed re-organization of the National Railway Board imply that the men who are now in control of the road will be retired altogether, or may there possibly be some smugling of officers?"

Systems Combined.

Hon. Dr. Reid—"The Canadian National, the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific and Intercolonial Railways will be combined into one system. We should have half a dozen of the best railway men available to operate that system. I believe myself that the men who are mentioned we surely should be able to find men who would be able to operate the combined system successfully. I know that on the I. C. R. we had a number of very able men, also on the Canadian Northern there were several first class men, and the same will prove true of the Grand Trunk. If we cannot find men in those three systems, which I believe we can, then the government is in a position to select the very best men, no matter where they come from, to operate the National system of railways."

Mr. J. Ham Burnham (West Peterboro)—"Is it not true that the government and parliament have made an appalling mess of the whole situation?"

Dr. Reid—"We are struggling with the legacy of the Liberal party. We are trying to get the railways consolidated so that we may be relieved of the annual deficits that the people have been obliged to pay heretofore."

"I believe that under government ownership the freight rates will be kept down and as the population increases the people will get the advantage instead of millions of dollars being paid to a private corporation. We will have a system that can compete with the Canadian Pacific Railway, without injuring the C. P. R. because that is the last thing we wish to do. The two roads will be able to work together harmoniously, we believe, and make money."

J. H. Burnham—"Would it not be well to wait for a while and consult the Farmers who will be here in a few days?" (Laughter).

D. D. McKenzie wanted to know why this harangue from the minister of railways and said if the minister would promise the Grand Trunk deal would not be concluded before a general election could be held on it the opposition would not oppose it any longer in the house. He charged that minister's ambition was to build up a monopoly of railways that would serve as a gigantic political machine.

Mr. Burnham again butted into the landscape. "As a member who never expects to come back to this house, but as a patriotic Canadian," he said, "Let the people speak on this question of the acquisition of the Grand Trunk Railway." His suggestion was greeted by faint opposition applause and cold silence from the government benches.

A Chance for Thirsty Ones in U. S.

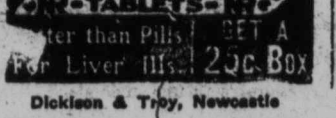
Washington, D. C., Oct. 28—The Senate passed the Prohibition Enforcement Act over the President's veto today and made immediately effective machinery for preventing sale of beverages containing more than one half of one per cent alcohol.

The vote was 65 to 29, or eight more than the necessary two-thirds majority.

Before congress finally clinched enactment of the enforcement law, despite Presidential objection to linking war time and constitutional prohibition acts, there came from the White House the announcement that the war time, which was put into effect after the cessation of hostilities, would be annulled the moment the Senate formally ratified the German peace treaty.

Despite the clamor set up by Wet and Dry forces over the White House pronouncement Senate leaders said they would proceed with consideration of the treaty as heretofore.

Formal denial was issued from headquarters of the Anti-Saloon League, that its officers would take part in any movement calculated to delay the treaty.

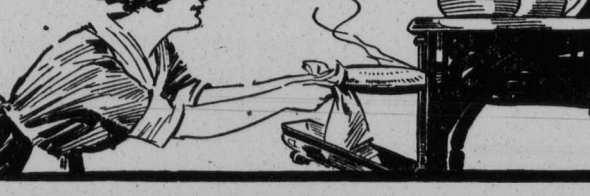

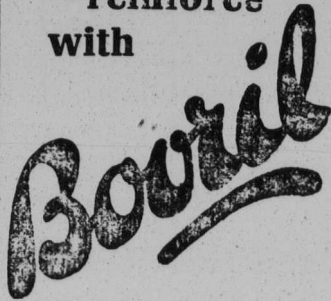

Horne Found Guilty

Werner Horne was found guilty shortly after noon today, of dynamiting the C. P. R. Bridge between St Croix N B and Vanceboro, Me. Foreman Joseph A. Cain of Fredericton announcing the verdict after the jury had been out thirteen minutes. Horne took the verdict with unconcern. He was remanded by Judge Barry for sentence.

F. R. Taylor K. C. of St John appeared this morning on behalf of the C. P. R. Hon J P Byrne Attorney General completed the case for the Crown, the only witness being Victor Harshaw of this former C. P. R. superintendent at Woodstock, and then briefly summed up the case for the prosecution.

The evidence of Mr. Harshaw concerned the damage done the bridge by the explosion and the delay caused to traffic over the structure.

Horne's Statement

His Honor Judge Barry asked Horne if he wished to make a statement pointing out that if he were sworn and went on the stand, he would be liable to cross-examination. Horne then made the following statement not under oath:

"The neutrality of the United States was violated by transporting food-stuffs, ammunition and soldiers across American territory and across this bridge. I make it on behalf of my government, ordered by my own government, as I say in the first statement given, to the American government, to hinder the transportation of ammunition, etc, as an officer of the German army under the protection of my German flag and armed as foreseen in German instructions. I have not any right to make any other statement without the consent of my own government.

I could have settled the whole question in a diplomatic way. I was ordered to transport ammunition in the United States and I was personally responsible. I have said that I was transporting the dynamite. The government of the United States asked my word of honor if I had transported dynamite and I admitted it. I was alone responsible in transporting dynamite on the train on the American side, and I was punished for this on the American side. I have violated the neutrality of the United States. My act of war in behalf of my Fatherland was carried on Canadian soil.

Judge's Charge to Jury

In his direction to the jury Judge Barry pointed out that Horne when on Canadian soil was amenable to the laws of the country. His contention that he had a right to commit the act because so ordered by his government could hold no weight. The statement he had made was not evidence but could be taken into consideration. It was a matter of regret that counsel had not represented the prisoner as there might have been a full presentation of the contention of the defence. The evidence was full and without contradiction the accused admitting what he had done.
