As will be seen by reference to our news

 conflagration. Lynn is only ten miles from
 Boston, and is a large and thriving city,
 principally devoted to shoe manufacturing.
 This fire will be the means of depriving a
 great number of people of employment.

A Chicago dispatch of the 1st inst.,
 says: An eye witness of the fire of Van
 Tassel, the Honolulu account, says the

 the account reached the water they dis-
 covered the presence of a school of sharks
 lying in wait for him. The horrified specu-
 lator escaped in wild dismay, but Van
 Tassel was beyond human assistance and
 almost before he touched the water he was
 grabbed and dispatched by the man-
 ners.

REV. FARMAN LEITCH, of Harbor Grove,
 Newfoundland, who is here soliciting aid
 for the rebuilding of the Harbor Grove,
 Cathedral, destroyed by fire a few months
 ago, preached in St. Dunstan's Cathedral,
 on Sunday last. Before commencing his
 sermon he announced to the congregation
 his mission amongst them, and gave a
 most interesting description of the beau-
 tiful cathedral destroyed, and a pathetic
 account of its destruction. Father Lynch
 received \$1,275 in Halifax, and we feel
 sure he will be successful here.

MARINE DISASTERS.
 A German barque loaded with empty oil
 barrels and rags, was wrecked at Long
 Beach, N. J., last week. Eleven of the
 crew were drowned and four saved.

The barque Germania, and not a steamer,
 was the vessel wrecked on the 27th ult.,
 at Long Beach, N. J. Before a life line
 could be shot to her the vessel's rigging was
 by the board and quickly went to pieces
 and disappeared. Five of the crew were
 saved. Capt. Windroth and eight sailors
 drowned.

The steamer Gladstone, of Gloucester,
 Mass., reported sinking the schooner Ger-
 rard on the 27th ult., who reported
 Alonzo Callahan, a member of her
 belonging to Oystero, N. S., was drown-
 ed by capsizing a dory while attending
 to her.

The schooner Ocean Belle, Ruggles, mas-
 ter, from Boston to Brighton, N. S., with
 a general cargo, which left Boston on the
 27th ult., when passing Thumb Cape Island
 on the following morning at 7 o'clock,
 struck the ledge and the cargo in the
 cargo is a total loss. Capt. Ruggles and
 the mate, Henry Milson, after remaining
 on the rocks 30 hours were finally rescued
 by Benjamin Westral, one of the crew, who
 was drowned.

SALISBURY'S PROGRAMME.
 The Conservative Conference at Notting-

A FAMOUS CASE DECIDED.
 The famous case of the Royal Electric
 Company versus Edison Electric Light
 Company, was finally decided at Ot-
 tawa by the Minister of Agriculture on the
 29th ult., who reversed the former decision
 of the deputy commissioner of patents,
 and upheld the Edison patent in Canada.
 The petition against the Edison patent
 which was brought into his
 country in parts and combined here, but
 that the patent articles was not manufac-
 tured in Canada. Against the Edison
 patent the parts imported were general
 articles of commerce and that the com-
 mercial articles covered the real patent.
 The case was some months ago heard by
 a deputy commissioner, who decided
 against the Edison patent and annulled
 the patent. His authority to hear and
 decide the case being subsequently ques-
 tioned, the case was referred to the
 Minister of Agriculture and Sir John
 Thompson. The latter prepared an elab-
 orate report of the evidence, which forms
 the basis of the present decision. Among
 other things it is, perhaps, the most im-
 portant case ever decided in Canada and
 the decision will lead to many fortunes
 and falls.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN BOSTON.
 TEN MILLIONS WORTH OF PROPERTY DE-
 STROYED.

The most disastrous fire which Boston
 has suffered since 1872 and one which in
 its extent and loss rivals the great
 conflagration at Lynn on the 29th ult.
 broke out at 8.30 on the 29th in the six
 story building owned by Jordan,
 Marsh & Co., and occupied by Brown,
 Burritt & Co., dealers in fancy goods on
 Bedford Street, near Kingston Street.
 The great fire of 1872 broke out corner
 of the streets in the city of Boston.
 The fire raged for six hours and burned over
 two acres of territory, covered by magnifi-
 cent structures and containing a loss not
 estimated at ten millions. It soon became
 apparent that a long and hard fight with
 all the forces before the firemen and
 general alarm was sent out. This was
 soon followed by calls upon all the neigh-
 boring cities and towns for assistance,
 which request a prompt response was
 made. The flames soon poured from all
 directions and the roof of the Brown,
 Burritt building and at 8.45 had spread to
 the show and leather granite structure
 of the building owned and occupied by Taylor
 Brown, and completely obliterated it. Then
 the fire broke out in the granite building
 at the corner of Chancery Street and burned
 out a hole black clear way round Revere
 Street to the granite building, and ad-
 vancing west the flames soon had hold
 of the stone enclosed in Exeter place,
 almost street running from Harrison
 Street to Chancery Street where the fire was
 the upper stories of which were burned.
 Three stories along Chancery Street toward
 the corner of the street were burned.
 The fire then spread to the big sandstone
 building owned and occupied by Taylor
 Brown, and completely obliterated it. Then
