Shoulder collars are very large and round. They are frequently of hand-embroidered batiste or of marine in two different shades, finished with a metal cord ornament.

Some of the newest sashes are finished with a single end and a rosette at the waist line. This rosette is laced quite as frequently at one side as at the front or back.

Considerable attention is being directed toward coat suits of rather straight loose lines. These are termed box, but they differ widely from the ordinary box coats.

Thirty-Seven Met Death

Two trains collide on the Illinois Traction System, Bringing Death to Many Passengers.

Stanton, Ill., Oct. 4.—Thirty-seven persons were killed and sixteen to twenty-five injured in a collision two miles north of Stanton, Ill. The trains were going forty miles an hour when they met; the collision occurred at the bottom of the double decline and sharp at the curve. The cars were so close that it was impossible for either of them to stop or slow. The crews were able to do nothing except set the brakes and jump for their lives. The crew of the special, which were composed of E. D. Dunan, conductor, and E. J. Young, both of Springfield, Ill., jumped as soon as they saw the collision was inevitable, and all four men escaped without serious injury.

They were badly shaken up, but were able to lend assistance to the injured.

None of the passengers had a chance for safety, as the crash between the cars followed immediately the cries of warning uttered by the conductors and motormen, as they lay jumped from the trains.

The cars came together with a terrific crash, and both were demolished and piled in one huge mass of wreckage, through which the bodies of the dead and wounded were scattered.

In a short time a car containing 25 bodies was sent to Carlinville, where they were placed in an undertaking establishment.

Pepper Reports to the President on Reciprocity.

On Monday last we stated that "people here are anxious to know what the policy of the present Government is." And we put the following queries:-

Does the Ministry intend to join Canada in reciprocity negotiations, or stand alone? What is to be the old Tory Policy or the Liberal Policy? Or will the Government stand pat and do nothing?

After a week's delay our morning contemporary has been put in a position to say: "On the highest authority, that in this connection, nothing has been done either directly or indirectly."

We thank our courteous contemporary and ask him now how he reconciles that statement with the following statements, which are not the fragment of Judge Prowse's imagination. The first is from the Chronicle of a recent date:-

"By yesterday's express Professor Charles M. Pepper, one of the tariff experts of the United States, arrived in the city to confer with the Premier on commercial matters and will have a conference with him in relation thereto. . . . We understand that Mr. Pepper came here direct from Washington at the instance of the State Department, and it is presumed that his visit is the first fruits of the new conditions credited by the award of The Hague Tribunal last week."

The fact that a similar statement was sent the rounds of the Canadian press as a press message, dated St. John's.

The fact that Mr. Pepper represented the United States at Ottawa last winter in negotiations between his Government and the Canadian Government as to the formation of a reciprocal treaty.

The fact that a Washington despatch of Oct. 1st stated that "Mr. Charles M. Pepper of the Bureau of Trade Relations has been in New-

foundland preparing the way for a treaty, and the negotiations are perhaps more advanced than those with Canada."

The fact that a Washington despatch of Sept. 28th stated that "As to Newfoundland, an informal interchange of views indicates a probable satisfactory agreement, now that the fisheries arbitration has been removed."

The fact that Mr. Pepper gave out in Sydney, on his way back, that the United States Government were interested in the pulp wood supply and the pulp industry of Newfoundland, and wanted from him an estimate of it.

If Judge Prowse's report is a figment of his imagination, how comes it about that the Evening Chronicle, an Associated Press correspondent here, Mr. Pepper himself, and newspaper correspondents in Washington have all been sending forth to the world reports which corroborate Judge Prowse's report. But the editor of the Daily News has it, on the highest authority, that there's nothing in it. How singular. And how remarkable that different persons in St. John's and different persons in Washington should all have been giving rein to these vain imaginings.

We thank the Daily News for drawing our attention to the Premier's declaration early in the year against permitting the export of wood for pulp making. In reply we point out that times change and so do policies, and he does not quote the highest authority in his article the morning as to the present policy of the Government, nor did the Premier state he was prepared for all time "not to make a deal with America on the pulp wood question."

Lastly, we beg to correct our courteous contemporary. On Wednesday last we did not virtually or otherwise demand the closing of the herring fisheries. We stated merely that the Hague award made it clear that the Government was giving virtually something for nothing by renewing the old arrangement. We expressed no opinion as to the wisdom of the Government in doing so.

The Daily News characterizes the story as the latest mare's nest. If the Daily News is right, then it has to thank the press agents friendly to the Government, as well as Washington, journalists, for its production. The story so far as Newfoundland is concerned came from those who are booming the P. P. Government.

MOIRE PEPPER.
And how is this for a clincher, which we culled from to-days mail after writing what is written above?

"Beverly, Mass., Oct. 7.-Henry M. Hoyt, Counsellor of the State Department and C. M. Pepper, Commercial Adviser, came to Beverly to-day from Valley Forge, Pa., where they conferred with Secretary Knox, to report to the President, and receive instructions regarding Canadian reciprocity. It is understood that the negotiations which were begun last spring will be resumed sometime during the present month, probably at Ottawa."

"It is reported that the reciprocity programme of the administration also embraced an arrangement with Newfoundland."

More Bankers Here.

The Lunenburg banker, Montana, Capt. Bernkey, arrived here from the Grand Banks yesterday with 600 qtls. fish after 3 weeks work. She fine fish plentiful but no squid and had a deal of rough weather. She has to-date 3,200 qtls. of fish.

The Gloucester banker Meteor, Capt. Cleon, which arrived last night fishing at the Virgin Rocks and has 1,200 qtls on board for this trip, which lasted 2 months. She also reports fish plentiful but no squid and she has 2,300 qtls. to-date for 9 dories. She is a fine vessel of 96 tons, and reports several Frenchmen doing well. There was a gale of wind on the Banks on Monday last in which one French vessel lost her anchors and all her trawl gear. Jobs are looking after both vessels.

Marine Notes.

The schr. Ruth which arrived here from Glasgow yesterday, takes her coal cargo to Roser, P. B. The launch Minora, which had been around Placentia Bay collecting fish for Saine, Johnstons arrived here at 10.30 last night.

The Crustacean which had been around the Bay on a similar errand for James Baird, Ltd., also arrived to-day.

The barg. Olinda arrived at Penumbuco this morning after a run of 35 days from this port. The Florizel leaves New York tomorrow for this port via Halifax. The Rosalind sails for Halifax and New York to-night with a big cargo, and Miss Pike, one additional saloon passenger. The cruiser Cornwall sailed for Sydney at 10.30 to-day.

Republic Firmly Established.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Oct. 9. Senor Costa, Minister of Justice in the new Portuguese Government, has sent the following despatch to the Times: "The Provisional Government has just received the final adhesion of the military divisions stationed in the Province. Perfect order and satisfaction prevails everywhere. The banks are showing restored confidence. The Customs and other Government departments have resumed business. All activities necessary to discharge the nation's obligations are in progress. At the council we were able to consider the revolutionary period as definitely ended, and in a era of progressive government and moral regeneration beginning. We have already received warm congratulations from foreign peoples on the heroic and marvellously correct attitude of the revolutionary forces and the generosity displayed by them and their leaders to the vanquished."

Lisbon is Quiet.

Special to the Evening Telegram.

LISBON, Oct. 9. Quiet continues to reign in this city and thus far there has been no sign of any reaction in favor of the old regime. The monarchial party is generally regarded as dead, particularly since the Radicals under the leadership of Dr. Joz Maria Alpoim have thrown in their lot heartily with the Republicans. Of all its monarchial leaders only three, including Gen. Pimenta and two Franciscans, Ocazillos Porto and Agnes Ornelas, are said to have taken any part in attempting to suppress the revolutionary movement. The complete disappearance of the monarchial party is reflected in the discontinuance of the Royal newspapers which represent the entire monarchial press. It is not yet indicated what action the new government will take against the leaders of the opposition. However, General Pimenta, who is a former Minister of War, and other officials have been directed to report themselves at once at headquarters. The date for the reassembling of the national assembly has not yet been fixed.

Attempted Demonstration Frustrated.

BARCELONA, Oct. 9th. An attempted demonstration of sympathy with the Portuguese Republic which took place before the Portuguese Consulate here last night was interrupted by mounted police, who charged the mob. A regiment of dragoon which was about to leave for the manoeuvres was sent back to Barcelona, and most elaborate military precaution have been taken to preserve order. Every flag or decoration in windows which might be considered an emblem of celebration over the victory of the Portuguese Republic had been ordered down by the police. The newspaper Lapublicad which acclaimed the Portuguese Republic has been seized by the authorities. The Republicans are protesting against the repressive measures of the Government and the severity of the censorship. The coal miners at Teruel have declared a strike.

Royal Fortune Large.

Special Evening Telegram.

BORDEAUX, Oct. 9. Advice from Lisbon say that the new Republican Government has declared its intention not to seize the private property of King Manuel. There has been much speculation over the matter. The Republican leaders said several weeks ago in outlining their social programmes they would favor the seizure of the King's property and the payment of annuity pension to the King. The Royal fortune is very large but his personal property, insurance, and lands, however, pays taxes upon all his property like any Portuguese citizen.

King Manuel Exited.

PARIS, Oct. 9. A despatch to the Petit Parisien from Lisbon says the provisional Government has issued a decree of exile against the Portuguese Royal Family. Admiral Suicides.

LISBON, Oct. 9. Tendi Candido Reis, who committed suicide on his flagship shortly after the uprising began, in the belief that the revolution had been unsuccessful, was taken a place in the minds of the people alongside the other so called "martyr of the Revolution," Dr. Bombarda, whose assassination was the occasion for an outburst which led directly to the events of the past few days. Admiral Reis took the initiative in precipitating the revolutionary movements among the vessels of the fleet, which lay anchored off Lisbon. He had agreed with the other Republican naval leaders that a salute of 31 guns should be the signal of each ship by apprising the other that the uprising was successful. In the confusion only three guns were fired. Admiral Reis hearing these three guns jumped to the conclusion that the whole movement had failed. In despair he drew his revolver and fired a shot into his head dying at once.

Revolutionaries Were Prepared.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON Oct. 9. Despatches from Lisbon say that owing to scarcity of food there the military Governor has issued an edict, ordering all provision dealers to open their shops at once. In the event of refusal, the military force will be used to compel obedience. A correspondent, who visited the headquarters from which the revolution was directed, found admirable arrangements, which enabled the revolutionaries to put up such an excellent fight, in contrast with the Municipal Guard, who had nothing to eat during thirty hours of the combat. The most admirable point in the Revolutionary movement, he says, is the perfect order which reigns in Lisbon. Dr. J. S. P. Kuhlth commences practice to-day, October 10th. Last Night's Storm.

The storm that raged in the Gulf of St. Lawrence yesterday, struck the city last night about midnight. The wind blew a gale from the S.S.W. and rain fell in torrents. The gully in front of Mr. Thomas McCarthy's store Water St. West, becoming choked with the flood coming down Springdale St. which tore up the street. On Sunday men were out dressed in their blankets from one o'clock till daylight this morning keeping the gutters clear in places where the street was overflowed. The storm abated at sunrise and the hard working toilers were able to wet their way home to get a "mug up."

Thieves Prowling Around Again.

On Wednesday and Friday nights of last week, thieves were busy around Mundy's Pond and visited several of the farms there, stealing cabbage and potatoes and turnips. One owner of land there lost 6 dozen heads of fine cabbage. These nocturnal prowlers took their time on doing this nefarious work; for they cut the green leaves off the cabbages and the turnips from the leaves. The next time they appear in this section their visit may be prolonged more than they imagine as the farmers have guns loaded with small shot for their reception.

Schooners Run Ashore

By Saturday night's shore train we learn that in the storm of Wednesday night last, the schr. Minnie Jane, owned by Geo. Button, dragged her anchors and went ashore at Old Perlican. She had only three casks of oil on board and as a high sea ran on the rocks she was quickly smashed to pieces. Three others the Gladys, Blanche and Brothers, also went ashore after dragging their anchors and were badly wrecked but may be gotten off and repaired later. The Minnie Jane was a craft of 22 tons and the owner had her insured.

Sailors Attend Church.

Most of the sailors and cadets of H.M.S. Cornwall, yesterday attended the services of the various churches in the city. A number of the cadets were present at 8 o'clock mass at the R. C. Cathedral yesterday and a contingent of the blue jacks attended mass at 9 o'clock.

At the R. C. Cathedral.

Rev. Father Wilson, of Mortier Bay, preached at the R. C. Cathedral last night at Vespers. Taking his text from Jeremiah the Prophet: "With desolation is the land made desolate because there is no one that thinketh in his heart." Father Wilson gave an instructive sermon on the motives that should actuate one in having contrition for sin. Worldly motives, such as loss of position or earthly gain would not avail in the sight of God. The best motive would be the pure love of God and to be sorry for sin on account of having offended Him who has been so good to us and who gave us all we possess. To be sorry for sin because of the suffering and death of Christ on the Cross. Next to this as a motive for contrition is the thought of the loss of God and of heaven for all eternity, and lastly the fear of the punishments of hell. The Rev. preacher depicted the subject of the different motives for contrition in elegant terms and in a voice that was strong and well modulated, filling the remotest corner of the church. The large congregation was deeply impressed by Father Wilson's effort.

At the eleven o'clock Mass His Grace the Archbishop preached the ten minutes sermon on the Gospel for the day, Matthew 18 chap. 23rd to 34th verse inclusive: "The wicked servant was forgiven his own debt by his lord, but he himself refused to forgive a small debt owed to him by his fellow servant." His Grace in plain and simple language expatiated on the text, and applied it to all our relations with our fellowmen in word, deed and thought. Most people are ready to condemn the conduct and neglect the character of those who they believe have injured them. They slender and culminate them and attribute the very worst motives to their every action. They will never forget or forgive an injury or admit that any possible merit on the part of the person whom they hate. In the face of these facts the aggrieved persons expect others to forgive them and overlook their faults and extend the hand of good fellowship and charity. Like the dishonest servant in the text they wished to be forgiven themselves but they refused to forgive others. They also expected that God would forgive them. His Grace deduced salutary lessons from the Gospel for the congregation and impressed on them the necessity of forgiving the injuries that others have done to us if we wish God to forgive us.

The S. S. Tobiasco, Capt. Yeoman, arrived here at 11 o'clock last night, after a run of 53 hours from Halifax. She brought about 600 tons of freight but no passengers.

Spanish Conspirators Taken by Surprise.

Special to Evening Telegram.

PARIS, Oct. 9. Despatches received from Madrid quote Dr. Ezquerdo, the Republican leader, in confirmation of the statement that a definite plan existed for simultaneous revolutionary movements in Spain and Portugal. Dr. Ezquerdo has just returned from Lisbon where he conferred with Dr. Bombarda and other Portuguese Republicans. In regard to the plan they decided on Oct. 13, the anniversary of Ferrer's death, as the date for the uprising. Bombarda's assassination precipitated the attack on the Portuguese Throne. The blow thus suddenly and successfully administered took "correct" Spanish comrades completely by surprise. The Spanish Republicans are loud in their resentment against the Government's severe attitude towards them. They are venting their wrath in the Press. The chief Radical newspaper accuses the Government of fearing to make a comparison between the situation in Spain and that in Portugal. It adds pointedly that in Portugal the army was believed to be loyal. The newspaper also prints a cartoon showing Alfonso and the Royal Family preparing to take a train. It is understood that the newspaper will be prosecuted.

Russian Warship For Lisbon.

TOULON, Oct. 9. It is understood that the Russian steamer Admiral Maharoff, which was under instructions to sail at once for Cronstadt, has to go to Lisbon to watch the course of events and to cooperate with the other foreign warships for the protection of interests of foreigners.

The shot penetrated the woman's arm and right side. She was taken to the hospital and may recover.

When Polwarschney returned home early this evening he found that his wife had fastened the door against him. He burst it open and following her upstairs, whither she had run, threw her bodily down to the floor below. Then he picked her up again and threw her out of doors. The woman crossed the street and asked a child to go for an officer. Then she entered her house again. Polwarschney reproached her for sending for an officer, and picking up a double barrel shot gun, discharged it at her. Then he ran from the house, and was found later with his head blown off. Each was about fifty years old and they had been married about eight years. It was the woman's second marriage.


