





MAN CAUGHT IN MACHINERY LEG TERRIBLY MUTHATED FEMORAL ARTERY SEVERED. Shortly after 3 p.m. yesterday a man named Westcott, who had only come to work there a short while, and who is a boilermaker's assistant at the R. N. Co's. shops on the Dry Dock, met with an accident which might have cost him his life but for the prompt manner in which aid was afforded him by Dr. Carberry of the Calypso, Dr. Paterson and Dr. Pritchard. The man was working at the roller which rolls the plates of iron or steel when his loose overalls caught in the cogs of the gear wheel and instantly, his right leg at the thigh was drawn in. The screams of the man drew attention to the predicament he was in, and the compressed ment he was in, and the compressed air, which is the motive power of the machinery, was shut off instantly, but not before the unfortunate worker was terribly wounded. The flesh was torn from the leg in places and the femoral artery was severed, so that he lost much blood before Dr. Carberry of the Calypso reached him. A tournequet was applied, and when the hemorrhage was checked the man was removed to Mr. Brown's office, where everything possible was done for him the ambulance called. He then taken to Hospital. Some of the organs of the body were also seriousy affected, and though the doctors elieve the man will pull-through, he vill be many weeks in Hospital.




