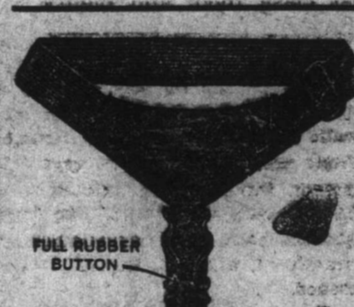

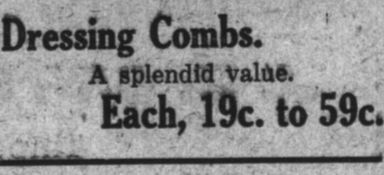

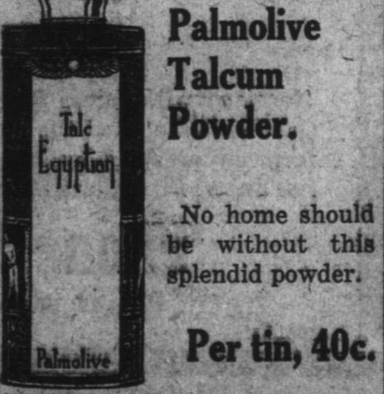

Public Given Draft of New Constitution for Ireland.

Free State on Similar Basis to Dominions—Privy Council Dismiss Appeal of Steel Company—Destructive Fire at Seaside Resort—Russia's Position Will be Taken up at the Hague.

THE NEW IRISH FREE STATE CONSTITUTION.

LONDON, June 15. The draft of the new Irish Constitution made public to-night on the part of the Irish elections gives as the document itself states, the force of law to the Anglo-Irish Treaty and expressly declares that any provision of the Constitution or any amendment thereto or any law enacted upon the constitution which is in any regard repugnant to the treaty shall be void and inoperative. The constitution also embodies connection with the British Crown as already established by the Treaty, and generally places the relation between Ireland and the Empire on same basis as Canada and other dominions. The Constitution requires every member of the Free State Parliament to subscribe his name and allegiance to the Constitution, and swear to be faithful to the King in virtue of the common citizenship of Ireland and Great Britain and Ireland's membership in the British Empire and the League of Nations. The document contains seventy-nine articles and is considered an up-to-date instrument, not only granting female representation to the people, but also giving the people themselves to initiate legislation. It gives to the nation great power with

money bills, without control from the Senate, thus duplicating the position as between the British House of Commons and the House of Lords. It exempts the Free State from active participation in war without consent of Parliament, except in case of actual invasion, and gives the Irish Supreme Court the fullest powers, only stipulating for the right of the citizen to appeal to the King in Council against the Supreme Court's decision. It provides for freedom of religion and conscience and gives Free State citizens full protection against arbitrary power of court martial and extends to Parliament the exclusive privilege of control over armed forces as stipulated in the Treaty.

STEEL CO. APPEAL DISMISSED.

LONDON, June 15. In the action of the Nova Scotia Steel Co. vs. the Minister of Finance and Customs, of Nfld., before the Privy Council to-day, the appeal by the plaintiff company from the decision of the Newfoundland Courts concerning the claim for taxes under the Business Profits Tax Act on the applicant's business in Newfoundland, was dismissed by the Judicial Committee.

WHEAT BOARD'S POWERS.

OTTAWA, June 15. As a consequence of the consen-

rence of the House in the report of the Agricultural Committee recommending the establishment of a Wheat Board, the Minister of Trade and Commerce has given notice of a resolution preceding the introduction of a bill to give legislative effect to the committee's recommendation. By the terms of the resolution the Governor in Council is empowered to appoint a Wheat Board of not more than ten members and to nominate the Chairman and Vice-Chairman. The Board will have power throughout Canada to receive and take delivery of wheat for marketing as offered by the producer or other having possession or being entitled to deliver same, to sell wheat, store, transport and market wheat. Moreover the Board may sell any quantities of wheat which it may possess in excess of domestic requirements to purchasers overseas or in foreign countries at such prices as may be obtainable, when advised by the consignee of such wheat or his representative to do so. The Government of Canada is not to be responsible for any contracts of the Board or for any liabilities or deficits. The Board is authorized to make advances to sellers of wheat and after the conclusion of operations to distribute the balance available pro rata among the holders of the participating certificates.

\$4,000,000 FIRE AT NEW YORK SEASIDE RESORT.

NEW YORK, June 15. Fire swept through the seashore bungalow colony at Arverne, between Rockaway and Farrockway to-night and between 600 and 700 summer residences and hotels valued at \$4,000,000, were burned, rendering the population of 20,000 people temporarily homeless. Thirty firemen and patrolmen suffered burns or otherwise, required medical attention.

\$50,000 FIRE LOSS.

WINNIPEG, June 15. Incendiarism is suspected as the cause of a fire which yesterday wiped out the business district of the town of Emma, fifty miles from here, with an estimated loss of \$50,000.

20 SHIPS TO BE LAID UP.

OTTAWA, June 15. The Hon. W. C. Kennedy, Minister of Railways and Canals, announced in the House late tonight, that twenty of the smaller vessels of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine are to be laid up this year and disposed of when possible.

WILL BE GIVEN FULL APPROVAL.

LONDON, June 15. The amended draft of the Irish constitution came before the British signatories to the Anglo-Irish Treaty to-day for final consideration, and it is believed full approval will be given to it.

HAGUE CONFERENCE OPENS.

THE HAGUE, June 15. All Europe centered its hope to-day on the opening here of the International Conference which takes up the task of making practical arrangements for the re-entry of Russia into the concert of nations. The temporary failure of the International Bankers Committee to arrange an international loan for the restoration of Germany has served to augment the pessimism concerning the prospects of making definite arrangements with Communists in Russia on such vital matters as credit, treatment to be accorded to foreigners, and payment of Russia's debt. France and Belgium will, it is said, not depart from the position taken at Genoa, and the Russian delegates announce that they will adhere to their memorandum of May 11 in which they contended that Russia would not sacrifice her new policy of nationalizing property. Soviet Russia wants a loan of one billion dollars.

U. S. COAL SITUATION.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 15. The state of the coal supply above ground demands a conference of the miners and operators in the very near future. John L. Lewis, President of the mine workers of America said here to-day. The United States "faces a coal shortage of unparalleled intensity," Mr. Lewis declared, adding that only the sultriness of summer weather is keeping the public from realizing the peril of the situation.

With the Rod.

(Western Star.) There is a good sign of salmon at Crabbe River. There were no salmon taken at South Branch up to Thursday. Most all the West Coast Rivers were in fair condition for fishing last week. Harry's Brook is a little high yet for fishing and up to Saturday there was no one fishing there. Dr. Clapp and companion are fishing at Tidal Pool, Lower Grand River. Up to Thursday they had secured three salmon. Colonel Nicholson and Major Montreux have been fishing on Robinson's River the past three weeks, and have landed 23 salmon up to Saturday, ranging in weight from 9 to 12 pounds.

A party of eight returned from Crabbe Brook a few days ago. They report that trout have not yet gone up the stream and the only fishing is at the mouth of the brook.

Municipal Council

HOLDS REGULAR WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon; Mayor Cook presided and with the exception of one the full Board were present. After the minutes of the previous meetings were read, the following business occupied the attention of the Council:

Inspector General Hutchings, replying to Council's communication with reference to assistance electricians performing work in buildings, stated he was of opinion it would be necessary to have legislation passed to insure such work being done by competent men. It was thought the Council might consider suggestions in this respect.

The St. John's Gas Light Company asked reconsideration of Council's decision to abolish gas lamps in the city, stating, in view of their long service, they were entitled to more consideration. The Lighting Committee will go into the matter.

Messrs. Wm. Hoop & Co. offered to supply cement for Municipal works. Communication ordered filed.

Letters were tabled from the Carritte Co. of St. John, N.B., and Mr. D. M. Baird, local representative for "Tarriv" Company, with regard to closing of streets, and were ordered placed on file. The matter will be given further consideration.

A. E. Worrall called attention to the necessity of repairing the retaining wall at corner of Springdale and Gilbert Streets. Referred to City Engineer.

A Hamlyn applied for position as assistant to the Sanitary Supervisor or other position that may offer in the service. No vacancies at present.

W. E. White, on behalf of Pedlar Metal Co. offered to supply Steel Garages. The Sanitary Committee will consider same.

Jos. McKinley's application for permission to install gasoline tank at garage, Lime Street, was ordered forwarded the Inspector General.

M. A. Shea wrote, drawing attention of the Board to inconvenience caused him through the erection of an electric light pole immediately in front of his dwelling, Water St. West. The Engineer will enquire into the matter for readjustment.

Capt. A. Bulley, on behalf of the C.C.C. Band, asked permission to hold concerts in Bannerman and Victoria Parks during the summer season. This request, as well as that of the other brigades, was acceded to, and the City Clerk will arrange matters to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Aaron Smith & Sons, Elliott's Cove, offered to supply brick for Municipal Works, and referred to the need of assisting local manufacturers. Should the Council require any material of this kind, his offer will be considered.

Robert Parsons complained of inconvenience caused the residents of Goodridge's Street, owing to lack of water, sewerage, lighting, etc. A Committee of Council will visit the place and see what can be done.

Attention was called to the condition of Water Street pavement, which has not been replaced by parties responsible for disturbance of same. It was ordered that, in future, sufficient deposit to cover cost of replacing pavement must be made at the Council Office before repairs to house drains or other work of this kind be permitted.

In connection with report of last meeting, it was pointed out that the Gas Co. were not responsible for the opening referred to. Certain repairs were ordered made to the Screen House, Windsor Lake. The City Engineer is to prepare specification, and the work will be put out to tender.

The following plans were passed subject to the approval of the City Engineer: Dwellings—C. J. McCarthy, Murray Meeting Road; Major Baird, Barnes Road; M. Ehsary, Southside (Store); Dr. Campbell, Duckworth St.; J. Hiscock, Cabot St. (extension).

Permits for repairs and alterations will be issued the following: A. all, Patrick St. Downey, Hamilton St.; J. J. Short, Garages—W. Vey, Convent Square; F. T. Brehm, Forest Road, on condition that water and sewerage are installed, and ventilators placed in the building.

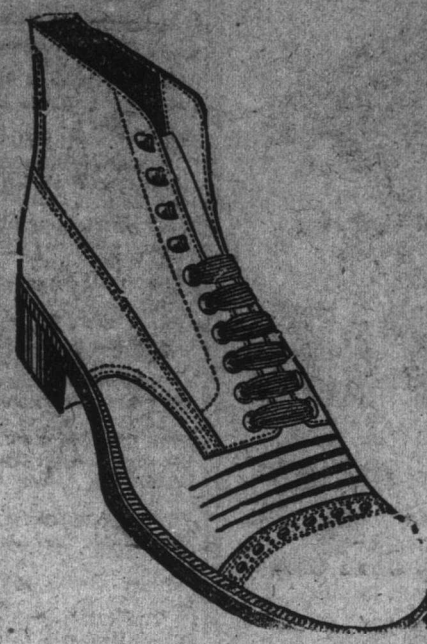
G. Love will be permitted to build outhouse, Quidi Vidi Road, provided he gives guarantee same will not be used as a stable.

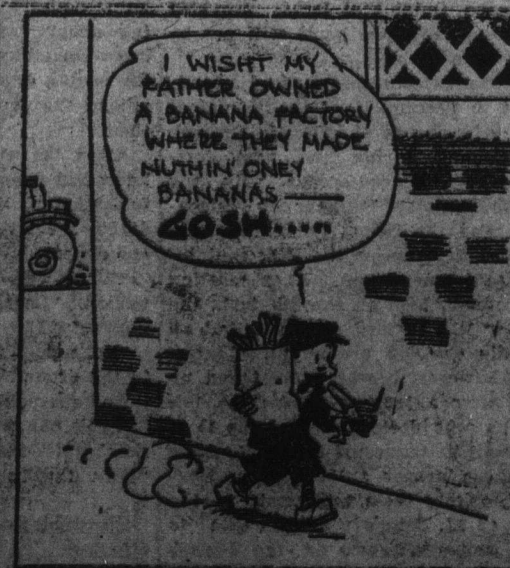

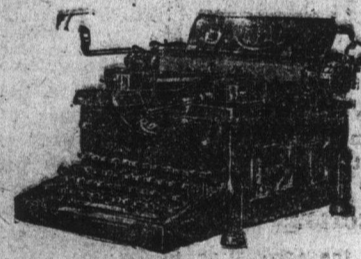

Roads Discussed.

MOTOR ASSOCIATION HAS IMPORTANT MEETING—ONLY \$5,000 FROM ROAD COMMISSION—MAYSON'S PROGRAMME.

Roads and road work formed the subject for discussion at the annual meeting of the Nfld. Motor Association held yesterday at the Grand Hotel. It was learned that there would be only \$5,000 coming from the Road Commission this year. This was due to the amount spent in five equal instalments on suburban roads. Mr. Mayson presided over the meeting which was largely attended.

MOTOR FIELD DAY.

The committee on the proposed Field Day reported through Mr. Reg. Harvey. If the Field Day would materialize the course proposed is on the north side of Quill Lake. It would consist of speed climbing tests for all makes of cars. The arrangements would be worked out with the approval of the Inspector General. No definite date, however, was taken and further consideration was left to the Executive in the meeting. A vote of thanks was accorded the committee for their work.

THE ROAD COMMISSION.

Mr. T. Soper, the Association's representative with Mr. Harvey on the Road Commission, outlined the plan for the coming season. On Saturday a meeting of the Road Commission was held when the Auditor General's report was submitted showing the Commission over-expended for the year's grant to the extent of \$4,000. At the same time the Commission owes the Motor Association \$4,000. Mr. W. B. Jennings, Chairman, intimated at the meeting that he would like to sanction any over-expenditure this year, so that after last year's debts have been liquidated, the Commission will have little left of this year's grant to accomplish road work. Mr. Soper expected the amount after the motor tax had been collected would begin the year at \$5,000, and it had been desired under these circumstances to spend this amount in five equal portions on the following roads: Topsail and Portugal Cove Road, Thorburn, Petty Harbor Road and Water Road.

ROAD WORK.

In connection with the Petty Harbor Road, the Prime Minister would be allocating about \$1,500 out of St. John's West grants, and this money would be spent by the Road Commission. At present five men are at work with the tractors, etc., on the Water Road between Donovan's and Octagon, as the road along this section was in a particularly bad condition. The work on Molloy's Lane, which was done by the Relief Committee was now completed, and Mr. Soper understood that it was the intention to put 150 men to work on Blackmarsh Road. This he thought was a bad policy, his contention being that the Government should repair the main line first and let the branches come after.

TAX COLLECTION.

Impressed upon the Association the necessity of seeing that the City collect the motor taxes promptly, as it was general knowledge that a large number of car owners were as yet paid their 1922 license and he hoped the Inspector General would see that the law is carried out, and the delinquent ones pay. He understood there would be a general clean-up during the next week. In addition he advised the Inspector General to get in touch with the Police Department to have the out-of-order car owners on the Avalon peninsula rounded up and made pay their license. In 1920 there were altogether 1,200 cars registered. In 1921 the number fell to 410, and to date, 353 only registered.

BAD ROADS.

ous condition of the Asylum Road where the ruts were in many places 12 inches deep, and he advocated the spending of some money on this road to make it safe for traffic. He was supported by Mr. D. M. Baird, who said that considerable motor traffic went over this particular road and a bad accident would inevitably result if something were not done. Messrs. C. W. Tessier, W. White and T. Soper also spoke on the matter, and it was decided that the Secretary write the Road Commission bringing the matter to their notice.

A BAD POLICY.

Mr. H. E. Cowan did not agree with the proposed work on the Blackmarsh Road, when there were so many other important roads to be attended to,

and he proposed the following resolution which was carried: "That the Motor Association in the interests of the 'better roads movement' and recognizing that better returns have been obtained when monies have been expended and work performed under the direction of the Road Commission, than under any other direction, recommends that when any special work is being undertaken on roads in the vicinity of St. John's, that the Government be requested to place such funds and work under the direction and complete control of the Road Commission." Dr. Macpherson endorsed the motion, which passed unanimously.

BUS TRAFFIC.

Mr. Cyril Tessier took occasion to

refer to the large amount of bus traffic which passes daily over the Waterford Bridge Road. He stated that both vehicle and pedestrian traffic was in danger on this road, just now, and unless some better arrangement was made an accident is sure to occur. He suggested that the Southside Road be used by the buses going to the Park and return made by Waterford Bridge Road. This matter was referred to the Executive and will be brought before the Inspector General with a view to having it remedied. The matter of proper signals at crossings was also referred to the Executive to be dealt with by them in conjunction with the Inspector General. Before the meeting closed the work of Council Inspector Neville, on Corn-

wall Avenue, near the new Maternity Hospital, was referred to and the hope expressed that the Council would continue to improve the city roads.

Tuberculosis Public Service.

The annual report of the Medical Officer of the Tuberculosis Public Service to his Excellency the Governor in Council, was tabled in the House yesterday afternoon. The report is arranged under several headings and includes an interesting budget of statistics. The report says the new west wing was opened on June 13th, 1921. It is primarily for the accommodation of all consumptive ex-soldiers and soldiers. The construction of the wing is of the simplest and most inexpensive character yet it has been greatly admired. From the point of view of patients and staff this wing leaves little to be desired for the greater part of the year, but during cold weather it is ticklish to leave their beds, endeavoring to eat food which in a few minutes has been frozen solid. The report asks for a small outlay for steam pipes.

The Medical Officer reports that consumption may be treated as successfully in Newfoundland as elsewhere. The wing has admitted to date 62 military patients. The total number of patients treated at the institution from Dec. 31st, 1920, to Dec. 31st, 1921, was 154. Of these three were not tuberculous; 92 are completed cases and 59 are remaining under treatment. The statistical tables, the report continues, merits more than a passing glance, in that they show the prospect of recovery in each of the three stages into which consumption is classified. In at least 80 p.c. of first stage and 50 p.c. of the second stage cases the disease may be so effectually arrested that the sufferers can once again resume their regular avocations. Referring to consumption in the outports, the report says that as a result of the visitations of the Medical Superintendent and two or three nurses, it has been demonstrated that Newfoundland is not reeking with consumption as is popularly supposed: it would appear that in the past all prolonged illnesses have been labelled consumption. A visit to a northern district on the request of a clergyman to seven of his people reputedly consumptive, proved that they were all suffering from digestive derangements. In a southern district about 40 cases believed to be consumptive, were examined and of these not more than five were found tubercular.

Rugger Championship.

WELLDIANS WIN TROPHY FOR 1922. By a try obtained in the last few minutes of the game, the Bishop Field College Rugby Football team secured the Outerbridge Shield for 1922. They played the Methodist College team on their own ground yesterday afternoon, in what was the fourth game of the Inter-Collegiate series. The game was played under difficulties, as heavy rain set in soon after the start, and the field and ball became very greasy. Both sides played well under the circumstances, but it was chiefly a forwards day, and some very good dribbling was done at times by both packs. The three quarters could neither hold the ball or get away with it, and the slippery ground made good kicking for touch ineffectual. The only try for the game was secured by Anderson, who touched down when the ball went over his opponents' line from a mix-up following a five yard scam. In the absence of Mr. J. Paterson, it was found somewhat difficult to obtain a referee upon whom both captains could agree, and Mr. Howard, who very kindly consented to fill the position, found that playing Rugby and refereeing are very different undertakings. This is the sixth year that the Welldians have won the coveted trophy which was presented in 1914, when school rugby took the place of cricket, up to that time, the spring game. It has been won three times by the Methodist College. The trophy becomes the property of the team which has the majority of wins in twelve years, and therefore, if the Welldians obtain the Championship next year, it will eventually become their property. In 1914, 1916 and 1921 it was won by the Methodist College. Up to the present St. Bon's College has declined to play rugger. A game between a city team and a combined school team has been arranged for Monday afternoon in the Tannery grounds.

JUDGE WILL FIND HOME FOR GIRL. A girl who had been remanded on a charge of larceny of a watch, appeared again in the Magistrate's Court this morning. The Superintendent of Police said the remand had been asked for in the hope that the watch might be returned. It now appeared that accused had thrown the watch away. The girl's mother is dead and her father is ill, so that it was impossible to recover the value of the watch. The owner of the watch said it could not be found. The Judge said he would try and find a home for her under the new Protection of Children Act. Sentence was suspended.

Burglary Reported.

The police are now engaged investigating a burglary which occurred a few nights ago at one of the city newspaper offices. The back entrance to the place was forced and a roll of printing paper weighing several hundred pounds removed. What the miscreants were at work they took care that they would not be surprised, and tampered with the front door lock in such a manner that it could not be opened.

DREDGING THE SEWER. The Council's employees are now engaged in dredging the main sewer, Water Street East. A scoop dredge with a long cable operated by windlass is being used at the work of cleaning. Female Burglar.

BUYS RING FOR HUNGRY CHILD. A female resident of Whitbourne was charged before Judge Morris this morning with the larceny of \$150 from a shop in that place. The Department of Justice consented to summary trial. Inspector General Hutchings read accused's statement, made after she had been placed under arrest. She said that she had broken a window to enter the shop. Her husband was out of employment and her children were hungry. The Inspector General said accused had already served terms of imprisonment for obtaining money under false pretences. The woman's eleven year old son was implicated with her in the larceny. Police evidence showed that among other things bought by accused out of money so obtained, was a ring which cost her \$5. The Judge said the burglary was premeditated and the use to which the money had been put, showed accused had not stolen from necessity. A sentence of twelve months in the Penitentiary was given.

Ship Owner Charged.

SEAMAN WANTS TO RETURN HOME. Mr. Reid, the owner of S.S. "Pawnee" was charged in the Magistrate's Court this morning by the Commissioner of Public Charities with discharging a member of his crew in this port. The accused said the man had deserted. Prior to that, the crew of the "Pawnee" had asked the American Consul to compel the owner to send them back to the States. He agreed to send them back after June 30th. One man, Stafford, who was the cause of the present case, refused to agree to this arrangement. The owner said he had offered to pay Stafford's wages. The Judge said that the proper action for the accused to adopt would be to prosecute the man for desertion. Under the Act, Mr. Reid had made himself liable to a fine of \$100 if he did not send the man back. Mr. J. G. Higgins B.A. for the man, who had left the ship, said that the "Pawnee" nationality had been changed since her arrival here, and members of the crew would have to sign new articles. They could be discharged in any British port. Mr. Reid was ordered to give a bond that Stafford would be looked after while here. Accused consented to this arrangement as he did not wish the man to become a charge on the community.

A man charged before the Magistrate this morning with being drunk and disorderly and breaking a pane of glass in the office of a Cabinet Minister, pleaded that he was drunk and did not know what he was doing. A police witness said accused was crazy with drink when arrested. He had not been before the police on any previous occasion. A fine of \$10 to pay for the glass, was imposed.

Railway Agreement. Operations For Five Months--Ends on November 15--Government Will Bear Losses Incurred.

The House opened at 3 p.m. The Prime Minister tabled the report of Medical Officer Dr. H. Rendell on the Sanitarium for the year ending December, 1921. Mr. Moore availing of the opportunity drew the attention of the Prime Minister to the unsatisfactory telephone connections with the institution.

The Prime Minister replied that the matter had not been brought to his notice by the Medical Superintendent. Mr. Jennings said the system was defective, which was the fault of the Telephone Company, and he would see that the phone was put in working order. In answer to Mr. Moore the Hon. Minister of Marine and Fisheries said that the gentleman who is holding meetings of the F.P.U. is Rev. Francis Boone of Medford, Mass. He is not employed by the Government nor ever has been.

Figures in connection with a question about the price of Kerosene and Gasoline were tabled. The answers to questions directed to the Hon. Minister of Education were tabled, but not being satisfactory Mr. MacDennell asked to have the question remain on the Order Paper. To this the Minister consented. In answer to question by Mr. MacDennell the Minister of Marine and Fisheries said that no provision was made in the estimate to provide for inspection or supervision of the Lobster Fishery. The Prime Minister gave a lengthy reply to Mr. Walsh's question re the present Prohibition Act. He said he did not know of any petition of 20,000 voters asking for an amendment to the Prohibition Law. He did know of two petitions presented last year, one of which asked for Dry Laws and the other Moderation. Both were considered by the House. It was afterwards intimated that no plebiscite was desired. Since then the bills have not been considered. The Government as a Government has not considered if an amendment to the law was necessary. No amendments have been submitted to the Government during recent months, and the Government is interested in the enforcement of the present law. It is not the intention to introduce any legislation dealing with this matter during the present session. This is plebiscite legislation, said the Premier, and the spirit or policy must be determined by the people who put the act into force. His personal opinion was that no radical change from the present law should be effected. The Prime Minister also referred to the Social Service Congress represented by Rev. T. B. Darby and Citizens' Committee represented by Rev. A. B. S. Stirling. They desired a Board of Control with an official paid a substantial salary who would look after the enforcement of the act. At a special meeting of the Social Service Congress called in April by Rev. Darby the Premier said he informed the meeting that there was sufficient time for amendments to be considered by the House at the present session. The Premier in conclusion said that should either committee submit any amendments or regulations they will be laid before the House, and every member will be free to vote as he pleased on them.

THE RAILWAY AGREEMENT.

The Prime Minister informed the House that a provisional agreement for the operation of the railroad during the summer and early autumn had been entered into between the Government and the Reid Nfld. Co. The principle of the arrangement had been agreed upon, but the legal aspects were still under consideration by the legal advisors of both parties. Under the agreement entered into in May when the Government had guaranteed the payroll up to \$74,500, up to a few days ago, the amount had been practically liquidated and within a few days more the Government expects to be reimbursed for the full amount as only between five and six thousand dollars were outstanding. The present position is that the May and June payroll with certain bills for coal, and amounting to \$50,000 represented by income bills payable, inventories and engine parts is outstanding, and the Government proposes to finance the amount as was done in May, the Government hoping that it would be liquidated by the Reid Co. as was that guarantee. The situation being covered up to the 30th day of June. The Government assumes operation from June 15 to November 15 of the Reid railway line, steamboats and express business, the actual loss on operation for the period to be borne by the Government. Mr. R. C. Morgan would be placed in charge of operations. During the period no hire will be paid the Reid Co. for their steamers, nor will the Reids receive recompense for their services. All cheques will be issued on the authority of Mr. Morgan, and all receipts signed by him. The Prime Minister said he was not sure whether

they would be all signed by Mr. Morgan or Mr. Hill. Mr. Sullivan suggested that there should be at least three signatures. The Prime Minister replied that it was easy to get three and the Auditor General had a perfect right to sign. Mr. Bennett suggested that Mr. Reid's signature should be also on the cheque. He also asked if there were figures submitted showing what the cost of operation would amount to. The Prime Minister had not figures that he could submit. He said that as far as humanly possible the agreement was made without prejudice in its larger sense.

Mr. Archibald—"What will the programme of the Government be after November 15th?" Prime Minister—"This is as I stated before a five months' armistice." Mr. Archibald—"Your explanation of the agreement has raised serious doubts in my mind, seeing as you said the Reid Co. are not charging for wear or tear." Prime Minister—"It is correct that we have to bear only ordinary maintenance." Mr. Archibald—"The agreement looks weak and fishy. There is room for suspicion, seeing that the Government has to take advice from Mr. Morgan, who was first brought here as an employee of the Reid Co. His report was more favorable to the Company's interests than to the country at large. Periodically the C.P.R. people has allowed him to come and go."

Prime Minister—"That is a matter of courtesy." Mr. Archibald—"Why did the C.P.R. grant these courtesies?" Prime Minister—"I asked Lord Shaughnessy, whom I know personally, to help me out of the railroad mess. He said yes, go to it. He was only too glad to help me out." Mr. Archibald—"I am sorry the Government could not see its way clear to get a man who was not first an employee of the Reids. Secondly a man sent by Lord Shaughnessy. Is there a reason why there is no charge for depreciation?" Prime Minister—"Under the Railway Commission management there was a dispute about depreciation, but under last year's agreement it was specified that there should be no depreciation allowances. This point was not covered under the (Coaker) Railway Commission and the Reids came back with larger claims."

Mr. Archibald—"It is public property that Mr. Morgan advised the purchasing of the railroad for the sum of about 2 million dollars. Mr. Morgan was in the employ of the Reid Co. last year through the courtesy of Lord Shaughnessy, who is Chairman of the C.P.R. The C.P.R. is associated with Bank of Montreal, which in turn may be said to own the Royal Trust Co. The Reid Co. have heavy mortgages to the Royal Trust Co. and the connection is worth watching, and should we buy the railroad it is easy to see the connection. The Reid Co. will be relieved of a liability of 1 1/2 million dollars to the Royal Trust Co. in which Lord Shaughnessy is interested."

Prime Minister—"No. Reids ceased operating in May and the agreement ended June 15th."

Sir Michael—"What is the position regarding the boats seeing that they are mortgaged? Have any arrangements been made with the Mortgagees?"

Prime Minister—"No, the question was not dealt with. It is understood that the Government is under no liability regarding the boats, and they are covered by insurance."

Sir Michael—"Is the 1921-22 operations closed, and how is the new agreement provided for?"

Prime Minister—"Authority will be given to spend on railway account out of the million dollars earmarked from the last loan. It is not the intention to submit the contract for ratification, it would make it look too important."

Sir Michael—"I think the spending of one million dollars is something important."

Prime Minister—"I hope to bring down the agreement to-morrow" (to-day).

Sir Michael—"On the arrival of the trains and steamers have we the right to the use of all terminals?"

Prime Minister—"We can use them the same as Reids did, but we won't have to pay for their use. Light power, repairs, etc., will be supplied at the same cost as to the Reid Co. when they were operating."

Sir Michael—"I take it the Reids are now clear of operating the railroad, and the Government is hard at work preparing plans for the future?"

Prime Minister—"Yes. The House will meet during the latter part of October."

At the request of Mr. Bennett the Municipal Bill which was called was deferred. The Avalon Telephone Bill which was introduced by the Prime Minister and explained, was deferred as members wished to have an opportunity to enquire into its effect. The Street Railway bill was deferred for the same reason. There was a lot of skirmishing on these bills, particularly on the Avalon Telephone bill, Messrs. MacDennell, Bennett, Dr. Jones, Archibald, Jennings and Fox taking part.

The House adjourned at 5.30 until this afternoon at 3 p.m.

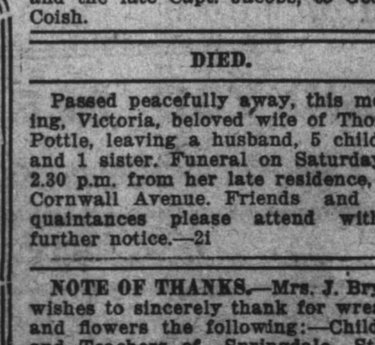

Curling Post Office

Burglarised.
REGISTERED MAIL STOLEN.
The Post Office at Curling was burglarised on Sunday night, 4th inst. and some registered mail taken. As a result three lads are now in jail awaiting trial. The S.S. Home arrived here from north on Sunday afternoon and the mail by her was placed in the waiting room of the Post Office by Mail Officer Skanes. It seems a pane of glass was removed from the front window and the lock of the sash opened. This enabled the rising of the window through which access was gained. The seal on the mail bag was cut, the letters removed and the bag sealed again. So carefully was the pane of glass removed and replaced that the tacks which held it were replaced in the same holes. And about the only clue that the office had been so entered was the unfastened sash lock, and even that was not conclusive. Therefore the police had very little to work upon. However, undaunted they set to work, with the result as stated above.—Western Star.

Big Refrigerator Plant.

TO BE ERRECTED AT PORT AUX BASQUES.
Rumor has it that a well known firm in Port aux Basques is about to finance with a large American fish concern to operate a fishing industry at Port aux Basques, where they will build stores and a 200 ton capacity freezer for bait and shipments to American and Canadian points. This will have a tendency to shift business to the northern side of the harbour where they have plenty of deep water and close to the steamers and trains. We understand operations will begin this coming fall or early in the spring. The establishment of a refrigerator plant at the Western Terminal is a want long felt. And we have on several occasions advocated it, and endeavoured to point out the advantages which would accrue therefrom to the general trade of this coast and to the fisheries particularly. In times past parties who wished to engage more extensively in the fishery industries have been deterred through the absence of cold storage facilities on the West Coast.—Western Star.

CHANGE OF BASE

From southern seas, astride of sharks a nd whales; the inland craft is out of plumb, and now it's desert tales. Afterward the people accompanied the Bishop to the quay and at his embarkment were called for and lastly the Bishop, accompanied by Father Kerwan and Father Gillen, proceeded to the church and met the people there for a short address on the education of youth, the parishioners of the parish of St. George's of about one hour was made at the home of Mr. J. J. McEvoy, St. George's. From there the Bishop proceeded to St. John's.

We have eagerly looked forward to the time when we again should have the honor and pleasure of paying our filial respects to our chief Pastor.

Through the greater part of your ecclesiastical career previous to your elevation to the Episcopate, you have spent in the Archdiocese of St. John's, we are aware of what you have accomplished there. We know that the important parishes of St. Bride's and Trepassy on the Southern Shore, and St. Patrick's in St. John's West, all bear eloquent testimony both to your capabilities as an administrator and to your zeal for the spiritual progress of those under your care. To indulge in language of praise of your Lordship's qualifications for the exalted office to which you have been called would not become us and might displease you. But in your Lordship's appointment to the See of St. George's, we see again exemplified the care and solicitude with the Catholic Church, guided by the Holy Spirit, exercises in the selection of her Bishops.

Your visit to us is at a time when every event is more or less shadowed by the industrial depression everywhere so prevalent. We venture the opinion that never in its history has the industrial world been in such a chaotic condition as at present. We had hoped that there would have been established ere this, in this section of the Diocese an industry which would not alone transform Bay of Islands but would have far-reaching effects in benefiting industrially the West Coast. We have not yet entirely abandoned this hope. We trust that the industry recently outlined in the daily press, having the sure foundation of an equitable basis as the best guarantee of its endurance, will soon be established, and thus rehabilitate the prosperity of the West Coast.

We understand that it is your Lordship's intention to make the Ad Limina visit to Rome this year. Our prayers will accompany you in the discharge of Christ's Vicar, and we shall in spirit kneel with you at the feet of his Holiness. We pray that your journey may be pleasant and that you will return safely to us in the near future.

In conclusion we pledge ourselves to co-operate loyally with you in your undertaking, and beg your Lordship to accept this address as a token of our filial respect and loyal obedience to you as our Bishop. We wish you many years of health, happiness, and fruitful labour in the Diocese of St. George's.

Money Made From Moths.

A Buttery Collection Worth \$200,000.

Ordinary specimens of the White butterfly can be bought at any time for twopenny. Yet recently a magnificent black butterfly was sold for £22.
 There are many people in this country who possess collections of moths and butterflies which, if they were sold, would realize big prices in the auction-rooms. But few collections rival that of the late M. Brahan, a Parisian collector.
 M. Brahan included in his collection specimens given to him by Viceroy of India, Governors of British West African colonies, and Indian Rajahs, altogether, his collection was worth more than £200,000.

Stolen Specimens.
 The larger part of it was stolen when the Germans sacked Calcutta in 1914, and only now are the Paris Courts making inquiries as to the whereabouts of the valuable specimens still missing.

While it is true that the highest priced specimens of moths and butterflies come from Africa—Notably from Sierra Leone—and from India and South America, it is not realized how valuable some of our own moths are. Everything depends upon their markings.

Collectors and gardeners are familiar with the common magpie moth. Thousands of its species hatch out every summer, and the collector values it at a penny. But if this moth happens to have the black spots on its forewings blurred, its value jumps to two guineas!

The blue moths seen near railway embankments, or flitting about corn-fields, can be bought for a penny, or even less. But when, as sometimes happens, the blue on the tiny creature's wings is rayed with black streaks, the collector does not hesitate to offer five pounds for a specimen.

The male cabbage-white butterfly has white wings tipped with jet black. The female has two black beauty spots on her wings, which are a set-off to her appearance. Sometimes a specimen is caught on which one wing is pure white and the other marked with the two beauty spots. It sells for four pounds.

One of our best-known collectors, the late Mr. A. B. Farn, had some unique specimens which were sold recently for very high prices. A black form of the silver-washed butterfly realized £17, while a silvery specimen of the high-brown variety was knocked down for £50.

A remarkable variety of the comma moth sold for £21, and £16 was paid for a unique white "painted lady." Several beautiful tiger moths, those well-known garden weevils, were sold for three guineas each.

Perhaps the most interesting chapter in the history of butterfly collecting is that connected with the hunting of tropical specimens in the jungle regions of Africa and South America.

Men have risked their health and even their lives in disease-laden swamps for the sake of a gorgeous specimen which, on account of its rarity, has afterwards been sold for hundreds of pounds.

In the tropics moths do not lay many eggs, and few of these mature. The brilliantly-colored butterfly, as often as not, becomes a prey of some jungle bird.

"Doctoring" moths with dyes has become a practice with certain unscrupulous dealers. But they have found it difficult to outwit the really keen collector, who has brought his knowledge of butterflies to a very exact science.

Poisons in Your Pipe.

How to Avoid "Smoker's Heart."
The use of tobacco by women has led to a great increase in the consumption of the drug, and a few words regarding the effects of its abuse may not be out of place.
It must be remembered that there are several poisons in tobacco, the most deadly of which is nicotine. One third of a grain of the latter is sufficient to kill a man. Fortunately for us, nicotine is as unstable as it is potent, and the heat of combustion of the tobacco is sufficient to render it volatile. There is no nicotine in the filthy mess which accumulates in a pipe, but some of the less powerful poisons are there.
The effects of nicotine depend upon the amount of it that actually enters the blood, and this depends upon the amount of absorbing surface exposed to the smoke. Naturally the amount which can be absorbed from the mouth is almost infinitesimal compared with what the lungs can absorb, and that is the reason why inhalation of the smoke into the lungs is so undesirable.

Dangers of Excess.

It is sometimes difficult to state what is an excessive amount of tobacco to consume within a given time, as that depends upon the individual. Some people with an idiosyncrasy towards tobacco may be profoundly affected by a mere fraction of what others can smoke with impunity; but the symptoms of excessive smoking may guide us in the matter.
The grouping of these symptoms indicates the existence of a "smoker's heart," and the indication is to cut short the allowance, or drop the habit altogether.
Sight is next to be affected. The patient finds that his vision is becoming less acute, and that he has a difficulty in distinguishing certain colours. Sometimes he may be afflicted with complete blindness. All these troubles cease after the tobacco supply has been cut off for a time, and their occurrence should be a warning to avoid excess in the future.

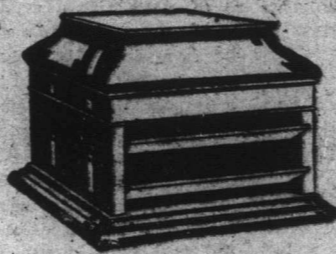

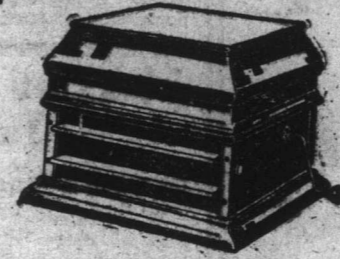

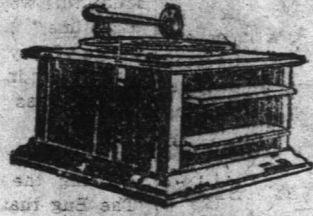

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Anson's Wonderful Voyage.

When the "Centurion," a British frigate of 60 guns, set sail from Spithead, in 1740, with five smaller vessels in her wake, her commander's instructions were to "Carry battle and reprisal along the Spanish coast in the South Sea, ravage the coast of Peru, make a dash at Callao, capture the great galleon 'Acapulco,' and return to England by way of China." But even George Anson, the most resolute sea-dog in his Majesty's Navy, must have felt his stout heart quail a little when he viewed the

crews assigned to him, many of them being out-pensioners of Chelsea Hospital. Long before Madaira was sighted scurvy was running riot in every ship and converting them into floating hospitals. Fortunately Pizarro, who was lying in wait with a Spanish squadron, to intercept Anson's ships, fled at the first sight of their spreading sails, but greater terrors than an enemy's vessel awaited the little British fleet off Cape Horn, one violent gale succeeded another for fifty days, while to add to their horrors, Anson's men were dying so fast from the most malignant type of scurvy that before June came, the "Centurion" alone had lost 200 men. Nor was this the full

tale of his misfortunes, for three of his vessels, the "Pearl," "Severn," and "Wager," were swept away, never to rejoin him. When at last Juan Fernandez came in sight, the "Gloucester" had lost two-thirds of her crew; on the "Trial" the officers alone were capable of duty, while of the 300 men alive on the "Centurion" there were scarcely hands enough to work the ship. Anson, however, after three months spent at Juan Fernandez to rest his ships and restore the health of his men, captured many valuable prizes, and then made a dash on Paita, which eclipsed the daring feats of Drake and Hawkins. Keeping his ships well out of sight of land the

boats had almost reached the fort when the alarm was given, but too late, for the tars leaped ashore swept the garrison like sheep before them, and captured the town with the loss of only one man killed and two wounded. In the "Centurion's" hold was 230,000 in silver coins, taken from the public treasury. Then Anson lay in wait for the "Acapulco" galleon with its treasury of gold from Mexico to Spain, but a furious gale fell on Anson's ships, and his squadron of six ships was reduced to two, with the supply of water and provisions almost exhausted, while he himself was at last struck down by scurvy. He arrived at the Ladrone Islands, and

again his ship was refitted, and on November 4, two years after leaving Spithead, he came safely to Mexico. In the following spring the "Centurion" turned her bow towards the Philippine Islands with the object of intercepting two Spanish gold ships. After three weeks of keen watching one was sighted. The "Centurion," with but fifty able-bodied fighters bore down on the Spanish ship, which carried 600 men with a hundred guns. For an hour the little "Centurion" and her towering enemy were locked in a life and death struggle. Then the yellow flag of Spain flattered suddenly down and Anson stepped on the bloodstained deck of his prize. The galleon's masts

were splintered stumps, her hull had been pierced by 150 cannon balls, and so many of her men were killed and wounded. The "Centurion" had lost thirty-one of her gallant crew, and she was left with a mere handful of men to guard nearly 600 prisoners and navigate the ponderous prize through unknown seas to England. Anson transferred his prisoners to the "Centurion," guarding them day and night by a swivel gun loaded with bullets at each hatchway, and placing a few men on board the galleon, he brought it safely to Canton. Seeing his prisoners free, he ran the gauntlet with both ships through the French fleet in a bay which

shrouded the English Channel, and on June 15, 1744, he cast anchor at Epithead. Of his six vessels he brought back only one, while three men of every four who sailed with him had perished--but in the galleon alone were 1,213,843 pieces of eight, with 35,000 ounces of virgin silver, and besides returning thus laden with rich treasure, he had given to the world an imperishable example of the fortitude and courage with which British sailors face and execute tasks that seem superhuman.

Launching of New Steamer.

AT SUMMERSIDE, BAY OF ISLANDS. On Monday afternoon, June 12, people from the various points in Bay of Islands proceeded to Summerside to witness the launching of the "Carmela," the latest addition to Newfoundland steamships, from the ship-building yards at Summerside. A flotilla of motor boats had conveyed the people to the scene from the different points, and the "Waterwitch," A. E. Brake's auxiliary schooner, came from Meadows with a full passenger list. Precisely at one-thirty the keel was cut, and the libation poured by Miss Kitty Stewart, of Innamara, which sent the "Carmela" on her way. The beautiful prize slipped swanlike from her berth and with a grace and a precision rarely equalled and never surpassed moved gently off into the waters of the Humber, amid the cheers of the throng assembled to witness the pleasing sight.

The design of the "Carmela" is the mental product of our genial friend and fellow-townsmen, David F. Barry, and her workmanship is also his. Any man might well feel proud of such handiwork, and the prolonged cheers of the throng at the launching for the builder attest their appreciation and paid tribute to his successful labour. The genial David bore his blushing honours most modestly and although from all sides poured in congratulations he showed no signs of elation.

The new steamer was built to the order of Capt. James Barry, of Curlew, and he may well feel satisfied with his new craft. To him also, congratulations have come in abundance for the faultless launching of the "Carmela" and for the graceful lines exhibited in her. We hope to have a cut of the new steamer in the near future for insertion.

In the launching of the "Carmela" all Bay of Islands takes a laudable pride. She is the concept of and is built for the requirements of one of our townsmen, she was designed and built by another fellow-townsmen, the ship-carpenters and caulkers employed in her construction were Bay of Islands men, and all the wood used in her construction grown locally. May prosperity crown the enterprise responsible for her construction, and may we see many and many more such ships constructed here to plow the seas and bring us treasures from the deep, and may they and those who go down to the seas in ships live up to the highest traditions of the mercantile marine.--Western Star.

American athletes had help in fixing their eyes on a red handkerchief before a race.

In regard to other colours, green possesses "cooling properties" which are useful in nervous diseases, as they subdue excitability. White is a cheering colour, which, combined with red, yellow, or orange, is stimulating.

BIRKENHEAD'S WONDERFUL CAREER.

Twenty years ago a man walked into a room with a bundle on his back and practically nothing in his pocket. He might have doubted your sanity if you prophesied that he would be a grandson who, at forty-seven years of age, would reach the pinnacle of the legal profession and become High Chancellor of England.

A Collision With the Police.

Birkenhead's only regret is that his father did not live long enough to see "the Pacific" of his own and teaching "so far as I was concerned." His father was seventeen years of age when he enlisted in the army in which he served for five years. At that time he was drafted to the front and saw active service in three campaigns, obtaining the rank of sergeant-major at the early age of 21. In addition to his military duties, he had to swell his income by improving the education of officers, and also by running a theatre, which it will be gathered that he did in his own person. Sergeant-major Smith was a very remarkable and versatile man.

Entered the Legal Profession.

When Birkenhead was a boy at school when his father died. But in his earliest years he was impressed by his father's untiring energy and determination, and he determined to himself "worthy of his teaching in every way, and strive for success in the manner I knew he wished me to strike. The only way was to work hard."

Drugged Off to Jail.

After leaving Oxford that he went to study for the Bar, being called in 1859, and ultimately starting in Liverpool. His first brief was in defence of a countess, for which he received a fee of £100; and his first big case was the Liverpool bank forgery trial, which he was briefed for. "Sordid," says Lord Birkenhead, "since fallen to me, but it was a pleasure to an amazing endowment of good luck. My appointment as Chancellor came as a surprise. I was sent for one day by the Prime Minister, and on arrival at Downing Street I was placed in the position of Lord Chancellor of the reconstituted Cabinet. I was that night to make up my mind, and to accept the post, though I was undertaking the most arduous and responsible duty."--Tit-Bits.

'I shouldn't struggle if I were you,' I said to him, 'I might drop you, and you're such a heavy man that you might break your back.' The words were scarcely out of my mouth when he became as quiet as a lamb, and gave me no further trouble! He was a great orator, and used to boast that he always started the day with three large chops.

Snuff for Sleepy Members. "I have carried out scores of members in my time, and once I had to deal with a woman who got into the House by some mysterious means and made a disturbance. I picked her up in my arms and passed her on to two constables. Members said it was the quickest thing they had ever seen, but I didn't like the job a bit. "For many years the chief doorkeeper at the House of Commons has had to carry an official snuff-box. Somebody left some money years ago to provide snuff to keep members awake during all-night sittings. Few avail themselves of the privilege now, but Mr. Winston Churchill is an exception.

"I have been at the House for twenty-seven years, and I have worked my way up from messenger at the bar, to chief doorkeeper. When I was superintendent of the members' waiting-room, I never allowed members to be untidy there. If they left their coats and other belongings lying about I used to put them away. Consequently, when members came to look for them they couldn't find them. They soon learnt that it paid to be tidy! "But I never went so far as the man who looked after the cloak-room. I remember once Lord Winterton came in late.

"You're late," said the attendant, severely. "Where have you been?" There's been a division and you've missed it. You ought to have been here.

"Lord Winterton apologized and promised to be in time in future! "I always made a point of knowing every member. It took me about a fortnight to recognize a new member, but after that I could tell them all from the front and from the back. Most important of all, I knew their voices. An extraordinary feature about the House is that almost always there are two members who look like twins!

"Of course, I was sorry to leave the House after all these years, and some of the members told me that the House won't be the same place without my smile! I'm sixty-five, but I don't intend to be idle. I'm going to take up dancing!"

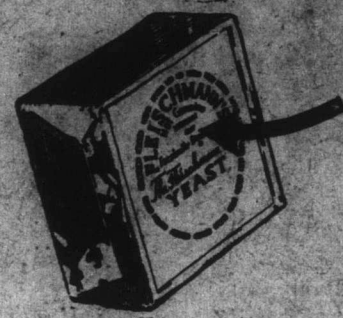
What Sharp Eyes Mean to Mankind.

bride and the bridegroom, the Queen and Prince Albert being somewhat appropriately dressed in the costume of the ancient Romans.

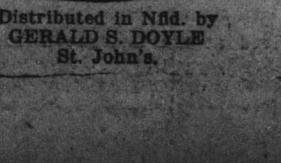
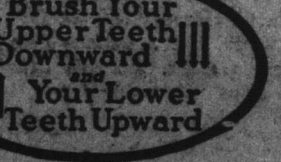
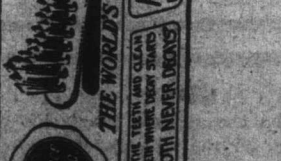
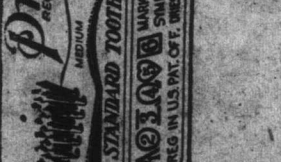
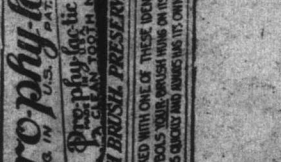
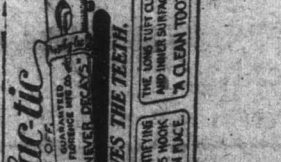
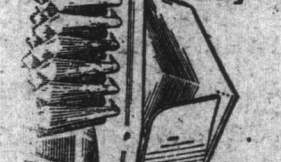
