There is no romance at all in these well-guarded vaults in the Bank of England; all is strict, methodical, and prosaic in the extreme. The gold and bullion here appear in the weekly bank returns, under the head of "gold coin and bullion," and under the provisions of its charter, the Bank has the privilege of issuing notes to the amount, and on the security, of this gold, thus ensuring the convertibility of the bank note, and giving to the familiar "promise to pay" all that security which the Bank of England note at present enjoys. The Bank has also the privilege of issuing notes, beyond this coin and bullion, to the amount of the debt due to it by the nation. In addition to the gold and bullion, against which the Bank of England issues its promises to pay on demand, the vaults also contain large quantities of gold and bullion, diamonds, jewels, plate, and other treasures deposited there for safety, importers being allowed to deposit and remove these treasures free of charge, the Bank being remunerated as custodians by small payments for the use of the Bank scales, and a small profit is derived from this department.—London Scotsman.
