THE POULTRY SHOW.

Continuation of our Report.

Mr. D. Allen, Galt, is another large and well known exhibitor. He has nineteen entries, and carries off sixteen prizes. He is largely represented in game fowls and Bantams, in which he shows two pairs of Black-red game, two of Duckwing, one of Seabright Bantams, two of Duckwing Bantams, the salls one is the wing Bantams—the only one in the show—one of Pyle, and one of Black Bantams. He also shows two coops each of Black Spanish and Dark Brahma, and one coop each of Polands, Buff Cochins, Dorkings, and Boues, Duckey.

How this is to be done is fully explained in the first section of the bill. The second section specifies that the necessary buildings are to be provided and fitted up, which shall be examined and approved by the School Inspector. When this is done the Police Magistrate grants a certificate that the provisions of the Act have been complied with, and Act have been complied with, and after this is published in the official being opened, any person may bring before the Police Magistrate any child apparently under the age of fourteen years who is found begging, or wandering about without any home or settled place of abode or proper guardianship; or who is found destitute, either being an orphan or whose surviving parent may be in prison; or those whom their parents or guardians certify they are unable to control, and desire them to be sent to the school; or any child who by reason of the neglect, drunken be sent to the school; or any child who by reason of the neglect, drunkenness, or other vices of parents is suffered to be growing up without salutary parental control and education, or in circumstances which may tempth him to lead an idle and dissolute life. The child is then admitted on the certificate of the Magistrate, the time for which he has to be detained at school being specified. Children may be sent to the school at the request of the Trustees, on commitment by the Police Magistrate, and they have power to place them at such employment, and cause them to be educated in such branches, as shall be suitable to their age and capacity.

Members of the civil service are

be educated m such branches, as shall be suitable to their age and capacity.

The religious training of the children is also provided for. With the consent of the Chief Seperintendent a child belonging to any Industrial School may be permitted to live at the house of any responsible, trustworthy citizen, but such permission may at any time be revoked. On the child refusing to return or run away, he can, when caught, be taken back to school. A School Board can make rules and regulations for the government of the School, but they must be sanctioned by the Board of Public Instruction. The parent, step-parent, or guardian, of any child in an Industrial School may be summoned to appear before a Division Court Judge, who may make an order as to the amount he shall pay towards the maintenance of such child, but the Judge may vary or change the order at any time as he may think fit. 

Report of the Provincial Farm Cemmission.

To the Hon. Provincial Scoretary.

Sin,—The undersigned Commissioners, appointed by His Excellency the Lieutsanat Governor of Ontario in Council to "inquire and report with reference to the Government Farm near the town of Guelph, and especially in regard to all matters proper to be considered in order with a due regard to economy to, adapt the said Farm and the management and control thereof to the purpose of a model and experimental farm, and in such a manner as may conduce to the greatest possible benefit of agricultural interests of the Province," have the honour to report that they have given the important matters entrusted to them their most careful attention, and have agreed unanimously to the following report:—

The Commissioners, in all their deliberations, have endeavoured to keep steadily in view that the great object sought to be attained by the establishmen of this institution is the advancement of practical agriculture in the Province. They have sought to keep before them the existing position of this great industrial interest in Canada, and to ascertain in what manner the Guelph farm can best be made conducive to the extension among us of a higher and more profiteble system of husbandry. They have had careful regard to the character and results of the Agrizultural Colleges established in other countries—and while anticipating the enlargement of the scope of the school and the elevation of its scientific curriculum, from year to year, under the guidance of experience, they have endeavoured to avoid the error of sarificing the practical to the theoretical, into which so many similar institutions have unhappily fallen, and to place its operations (at the outset at any rate) on a strictly practical basis.

The Commissioners, it will be observed, have recommended that the knowledge necessary for admission to the School shall be at first merely that which, under our School Law, every boy must possess in passing from a Common School into a High School of the Pr

nation of a component pupil for admission, a wide-spread interest in the success of the School is sought to be quickly created.

The agricultural interest greatly surpasses all the other industrial interests of Ontario in magnitude and importance. Its successful prosecution gives life and tone to all classes of business, and a bad crop, here as elsewhere, entails stagmant markets and monetary stringency. By no other way could the prosperity of our country be so vastly and rapidly increased as by the general adoption of an improved system of farming. It has been estimated that the cash difference in value between a good crop and a bad crop in Canada exceeds fifty millions of dollars per annum, but this sum falls far short of the enhanced cash gains which could be annually realized from thorough drainage, and the general improvement of our herds and flocks.
