PHENIX-LIKE SEAFORTH.

The collegiate institute is a massive two-story brick building, with basement, comprising 9 rooms all fitted up with the latest furnishings approved by the Educational Department, and the Simons' system of heating and ventilating is employed. The teaching of practical chemistry is greatly facilitated by an abundantly supplied laboratory and a vast variety of valuable apparatus, including electrical machines, microscopes, and other interesting and instructive machines. The music room is supplied with an excellent piano, and a complete gymnasium convenient to the building, well equipped with bars, rings and general apparatus, affording every opportunity for muscular development. Indian clubs for the girls and wooden guns for the boys show that athletics and military drill are not neglected. The school was established in 1879 and in January, 1883, rose to the dignity of a Collegiate Institute. About 150 pupils are now in attendance and the institution stands very high. The following staff of 9 teachers are employed: O. Clarkson, B.A., headmaster; J. D. Dickson, B.A., mathematical master; A. J. Charles, B.A., moderns; G. Anderson, science. The Public School building is brick, and has 8 rooms and a playground. It is overcrowded, and two of the rooms are on the half day system. A primary school to relieve the pressure is projected, and will be built in the spring. L. L. McNeil is headmaster of the "Public School" Institute is better appreciated than in most towns, and the history of its growth is a most interesting story. For seven years ago its membership was 28; at present it is 417, probably the largest membership of any institute in the province. The library has 3000 and the circulation last year was 14,621 volumes. The reading room is a large, airy, and comfortable place. Wm. THE HURON EXPOSITOR and the Seaforth Sun occupy the field of journalism, and are both well conducted journals. WATERWORKS AND ELECTRIC LIGHT.
The Council and citizens have shown commendable enterprise in the construction of an efficient system of waterworks. The plant consists of 2 engines of 25 horse power each, and boilers to correspond. The water is pumped direct through the pipes for fire purposes, and as steam is constantly kept up water can be thrown at any point in the town at a few moments' notice. The capacity is 7,500 gal. an hour. There are 14 hydrants on the streets and the railway tank is kept supplied, for which the corporation receive \$350 per annum. So far the works have cost about \$200. Negotiations are now going on for the production of the electric lights, to be run with the same power.
