

Not shadow work as we have known for several seasons past, but shadow applique is the latest thing that is attracting the attention of needleomen who are always on the lookout for something novel in fancy work It is nothing more than an applique of a heavier material on a sheer fabric, but instead of the applied figures being on the right side they are underneath, and shine through the transparent stuff on top with a fascinatingly shadowy effect.

SHADOW APPLIQUE CAN

While this work is very showy and durable it is extremely simple of execution and can easily be picked up, even by the novice in embroidery who can only do plain buttonholing, satin stitch and outlining.

It is now being used in many ways, both for gowns, blouses and trimmings and for toilet accessories, such as pincushion and bureau covers, glove cases dainty pillow tops and table covers. Perforated patterns of appropriate designs can be bought in almost every up-to-date needlework shop. It is well, however, in selecting such designs, to choose those of rather bold outline, as the more complicated and smaller patterns are apt to give trouble when the cutting away of the underlying mater-

The materials for this work must b of two kinds, a diaphanous fabric such as Swiss batiste, sheer muslin or Per an lawn for the article to be made, for the applique. The design is stampgoods, and the sheerer is then basted on top of it, care being taken that the warp threads run in the same direction. The stamping is plainly seen through the covering and the embroidery is done through both mater-

Though as a rule this applique is daintier in all white, it is very attractive when a color is used for the under and heavier part of the work. Care should be taken to have the color set before using, or otherwise it fades long before the article is worn

SEASONABLE MEAT DISHES.

Braised Beef.-Take a slice from the top of the round, weighing about three pounds, and cut an inch and a half thick. Season it with a teaspoonful of salt and a quarter teaspoonful of pepper; cut gashes in the top or upper side, and fill with stuffing. Koll the meat up and skewer it, dredge with flour and brown it in a frying-pan in some salt pork fat. Put it into the braising pan, with one-third of a cupful of diced carrots, three slices onion and a small bit of bayleaf. Pour on three cupfuls of boiling water and let simmer three hours. pepper, a little sage and the grated rind of one-fourth of a lemon. Now put the stuffing in the pocket and tie up or fasten with toothpicks securely. Rub the meat over with lemon, dredge well with flour, into which a little seasoning of salt, pepper and a little ginger has been sprinkled. Put the roast into a good hot oven, and leave it uncovered until the flour is a light brown (there must be flour also in the bottom of the pan), and then pour over it nearly a pint of boiling soup stock or hot water. Cover closely and cook more slowly for two hours, bast ing frequently and adding water if necessary. When the roast has been removed a nice brown gravy may be made of the liquid left in the pan. Set the pan on the top of the stove and add water or stock, salt and pepper, and, if required, a little flour. Strain and serve. Any veal left over, with the dressing, will make excellent

Dr. Loudon Tells Some Unpublished History of Northwest Rebellion. A finely appreciative and illumina ing review of the life and work of the late Mr. Justice Street is contributed to the current issue of The University of Toronto Monthly by ex-Presiden Loudon, a life-long friend and asso ciate of the deceased jurist. The article contains some very interesting references to incidents in his life which have not hitherto been given publicity, especially in relation to the important public services he performed as chairman of the Northwest Half-

breeds' Claims Commission appointed in 1885.

The mission of the commission was to make lists of persons entitled to land grants in compensation for their dispossession at law by the Dominion when it assumed ownership in 1870. The Government at the time of the The Government at the time of the appointment of the commission was not prepared with any definite policy regarding the plan of allotment, and Mr. Street was told that the commissioners must do the best they could, and if the half-breeds did not come in to enter their claims no blame could attach to him or his associates for their failure. Just at this jumeture, on March 27, 1885, news arrived at Ottawa that the smouldering disat Ottawa that the smouldering discontent among the half-breeds of the Northwest had burst into flame, and a conflict had taken place at Duck Lake. That same evening Mr. Street applied to Sir John Macdonald for increased powers for the commission. He asked that they be given authority not only to make lists, but to give each half-breed as he applied.

Luncheon for Eleven Cents.

A dainty and well-appointed practice luncheon was served recently at the Technical School, to seven guests, the Technical School, to seven guests, at the enormous cost of 75 cents, for the whole meal, which as may be seen, averages a little less than 11 cents a head. By "practice" luncheon is meant a luncheon served by one of the students taking the Domestic Science course at the school, who demonstrates in this practical way what she has been learning. The hoswhat she has been learning. The hos-tess, this time a very young girl in the High school course, arranges the menu, buys the supplies, and, with the assistance of two fellow students the assistance of two fellow students as cook and waitress, cooks and serves the meal. As the luncheon was an achievement in good cooking, and economical buying combined, The Toronto Star asked permission to publish the menu with a few general pointers as to the making of the dishes.

The soup was cream of tomate soup, made with milk, the thickened milk and strained heated tomatees being mixed at the last moment. The hadmixed at the last moment. The haddock was cut in cross sections, dipped in bread crumbs, then in egg, then in bread crumbs again and dropped into deep boiling fat. The stuffed potatoes were baked first, the contents scooped out, and thoroughly mashed in the stuffer and cases in the stuffer and c with milk, butter and seasoning, re-placed in the skins, and heated again. The salad was of equal parts of celery and cabbage, shaved firm, mix-ed with chopped walnuts, and served with boiled mayonnaise dressing on small cabbage leaves.

The rice was cooked with shavings of lemon rind, then molded with gelatine, and whipped cream.




