ly necessary to the health of the rabbits, while a close impure atmosphere is the sure source of much disease. Better an open woodhouse than a confined noom. Rather than my rabbits should breathe a tainted atmosphere, I allow the thermometer in my rabbitrary to stand at from 10° to 15° of Fahrenheit, and occasionally it will, in the night, register the temperature to have been as low as zero -- and this without any injury

'On the subject of feeding, I would offer a caution against the use of lettuce when going to seed, and recommend green corn sown broadcast as an excellent substitute. Hay should be fed with a liberal hand; no matter how coarse, it will oftentimes be preferred to oats; and if what is thrown out on cleaning the futches is within a the reach of cattle, they will eat it with a vidity.
