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
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
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

THE DOMINION CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS ACT.

Election of a Member of the House of Commons for the Electoral District of the City of London, holden on the 16th and 23rd days of June, A.D. 1896.

The Speaker of the House of Commons for the Dominion of Canada.

We, the Honourable Thomas Ferguson, and the Honourable Thomas Robertson, Judges of the High Court of Justice for Ontario, do hereby certify that on the 17th, 18th, 19th, 21st, 22nd and 23rd days of December, 1896, and the 18th, 19th, 20th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd, 25th, 26th, 27th, 28th, 29th, and 30th days of January, and the 8th, 9th and 10th days of February, 1897, at the City of London, in the County of Middlesex, and on the 4th January, 6th March and 5th and 26th of June, 1897, at the City of Toronto (to which last mentioned place certain matters appertaining to the trial were, by consent, adjourned) we held a Court for the trial of the petition above mentioned and referred to respecting the above-mentioned election, at which election the above-mentioned Thomas Beattie had been returned as duly elected, and that upon hearing the evidence adduced and what was alleged and stated by Counsel for the Petitioner and the Respondent, we found and determined:—

1st. That the said above-mentioned Thomas Beattie was duly returned and elected,

and that the said election was good and valid;

2nd That in the said Petition charges of corrupt practices having been committed at the election to which the petition refers are made;

3rd. That no corrupt practice has been proved to have been committed by or with

the knowledge and consent of the Respondent at such election;

4th. That Herbert Boyd, Thomas F. Haynes, Joshua Doty, Harry Wellsman and Harold Richardson have been proved at the trial to have been guilty of corrupt practices at the said election;

5th. That there is no reason to believe that corrupt practices have extensively

prevailed at the election to which the said Petition relates;

6th. That we are of the opinion that the inquiry into the circumstances of the said election has not been rendered incomplete by the action of any of the parties to the said Petition, and that further inquiries as to whether corrupt practices have extensively prevailed at the said election is not desirable;

And we further certify that appended hereto is a copy of the notes of the evidence

adduced at the said trial.

We, the Honourable John Edward Rose and the Honourable Hugh MacMahon, two of the Justices of the High Court of Justice for Ontario, do hereby certify that we held a Court at the City of Brantford, in the County of Brant, on the 2nd day of September, 1897, for the trial of the Petition between the above parties respecting the above election, at which election Charles Bernard Heyd had been returned as duly elected, and that upon the opening of the Court Counsel for the Petitioner stated that he was not prepare to adduce any evidence in support of the Petition or to substantiate the allegations made therein. We, therefore, thereupon, determined and adjudged:

1. That the said Respondent, Charles Bernard Heyd, was duly elected and returned

as a Member of the House of Commons for the said Electoral District.

2. We also report that no evidence was adduced before us, of any corrupt practices, and therefore we have no evidence before us to enable us to say whether or not corrupt

practices extensively prevailed at the election to which said Petition relates.

3. That we are unable to say whether the inquiry into the circumstances of the election has been rendered incomplete owing to the action of the parties to the Petition, and we have no evidence before us to enable us to say whether or not an inquiry as to whether corrupt practices extensively prevailed at the said election is desirable.

4. We herewith append and forward a copy of the notes of evidence taken at the

trial.

The undersigned, the Honourable Charles Borromée Rouleau and Honourable Thomas Horace McGuire, Judges of the Supreme Court of the North-west Territories, have the honour to transmit to you our Report and determination on the trial of the above Petition at Regina, on the twenty-fourth day of August, 1897, dismissing the said Petition of the said John McDougall and declaring the said Nicholas Flood Davin a duly elected Member of the House of Commons for the said Electoral District of Western Assiniboia.

At the said Court so held for said trial, Counsel appeared for the Petitioner and Respondent, and the Counsel for the Petitioner stated that he was not prepared to offer any evidence in support of the said Petition, and no evidence was in fact offered in respect of the same.

We therefore found and determined that the said Petition should be dismissed without costs, and that the said Nicholas Flood Davin was duly elected and returned as a Member of the House of Commons of Canada for said Electoral District of Western

Assiniboia.

In the said Petition charges were made that corrupt practices had been committed at said Election, but no evidence whatever having been given at said trial, we report that no corrupt practices were proven before us to have been committed by or with the knowledge and consent of either of the candidates at the said Election.

2. We have no means of forming a belief whether corrupt practices have or have

not prevailed extensively at the said Election.

3. We are unable to say whether or not the inquiry into the circumstances of the Election has been rendered incomplete by the action of the parties to the said Petition or whether or not further inquiry as to whether corrupt practices have prevailed extensively is desirable, and we are therefore unable to express any opinion that such further inquiry is desirable.

Bennett had been returned as duly elected; that no evidence was adduced or offered in support of the said Petition or any of the charges herein contained, and that we found and determined :-

1. That the said above-named William H. Bennett was duly elected and returned

and that the said election was good and valid;

2. That in the said petition charges of corrupt practices having been committed at

the election to which the Petition relates are made;

3. That no corrupt practice was proved to have been committed by or with the knowledge and consent of either of the candidates at the said election;

4. That no person or persons were at the said trial proved to have been guilty of any corrupt practice or practices, and we are, therefore, unable to report the names of any such persons;

5. That there is no reason to believe that corrupt practices extensively prevailed at

the Election to which the said Petition relates;

Sir Wilfrid Laurier introduced a Bill No. 1 respecting the Administration of Oaths of Office; which was read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported His Excellency's Speech from the Throne, and read a copy thereof to the House, which is as follows:—

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I have observed with great pleasure the remarkable advance in the political importance and material prosperity of Canada during the year which has just closed.

The loan recently effected has shown that the credit of Canada has never stood so high in European markets, and affords reasonable ground for expecting that the burthens of the people will, in the near future, be materially reduced by the substitution of a much lower rate of interest on our indebtedness than that which now exists.

I congratulate you upon the exceedingly cordial reception accorded to the representatives of Canada at the Jubilee Ceremonials, and also upon the warm appreciation manifested everywhere throughout the Mother Country in reference to the conduct of Canada in materially reducing the rate of duty upon goods imported from the United Kingdom into the Dominion.

The action of the Imperial Government in denouncing the treaties with Germany and Belgium, also affords most satisfactory evidence of their desire to facilitate your efforts to promote the closest possible commercial relations between Canada and the remainder of the Empire, and will, I trust, contribute materially to the development

of Imperial trade.

The extraordinary gold discoveries recently made upon the Yukon and its tributaries, appear likely to result in an enormous influx of people into that region, and have compelled the Government to take prompt action for the preservation of law and order in that distant and almost inaccessible locality; measures will be laid before you for that purpose.

A contract has been entered into, subject to your approval, for the completion at the earliest possible moment of a system of rail and river communication through Canadian territory with the Klondike and principal gold fields, which it is expected will

secure to Canada the larger portion of the lucrative traffic of that country.

The bountiful harvest with which we have been favoured by a benevolent Providence has contributed greatly to the increase of our prosperity, and I am glad to note that the trade and commerce of the Dominion, and more especially the amount and values of her principal exports, have increased greatly during the past eighteen months, and there is good reason to believe that this improvement may be maintained if not augmented, during the remainder of the present year.

I observe with pleasure that certain Government contracts recently let contain

provisions calculated to suppress the evils of the sweating system.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

The accounts of the past year will be laid before you.

The Estimates for the succeeding year will likewise be place upon the Table at an early date.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

Measures will be submitted to you respecting Superannuation, the repeal of the present Franchise Act, and a plebiscite on the question of Prohibition.

These and other measures I commend to your earnest consideration, invoking the

Divine blessings upon the important labours on which you are again entering.

On motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, His Excellency's Speech was ordered to be taken into consideration to-morrow.

Resolved,—That Select Standing Committees of this House for the present Session be appointed for the following purposes:—1. On Privileges and Elections.—2. On Expiring Laws.—3. On Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines.—4. On Miscellaneous Private Bills.—5. On Standing Orders.—6 On Printing.—7. On Public Accounts.—8. On Banking and Commerce.—9. On Agriculture and Colonization,—which said Committees shall severally be empowered to examine and inquire into all such matters and things as may be referred to them by the House; and to report from time to time their observations and opinions thereon; with power to send for persons, papers and records.

TO THE HONOURABLE THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The Joint Librarians of Parliament have the honour to report as follows for the year 1897.

The occurrence of the Queen's Jubilee celebration, in June, 1897, induced the Librarians to obtain and bind in volumes copies of all the London daily and weekly publications, illustrated and otherwise, containing details of the memorable event. This collection will certainly prove valuable and is probably unique.

All books and series of volumes relating to the history of the Colonial Empire

during the Victorian period have been provided or ordered.

The development of the new mining regions of the Yukon has naturally suggested the collection of all books, maps, pamphlets, official and non-official, that have been published concerning that country.

The newest books on the mining laws of Great Britain, the United States and the

British Colonies, as well as all available official reports, have also been provided.

The almost complete exhaustion of all available shelf space in the Library, compels the Librarians to refer again to the necessity of considering means of enlargement.

The increase in the number of periodicals, newspapers and books has been very rapid, and as the Library was found to be too small in 1876 when it was opened, its condition at present can easily be understood. Much inconvenience to many members arises from the want of promptness in the return of books, especially of new books. The Librarians are unable to suggest any remedy for a grievance, the redress of which is in the hands of the members themselves.

Among the notable donations to the Library during the year may be mentioned

the following:

From the Marquis of Breadalbane, K.G., "The Black Book of Taymouth," being papers from the Breadalbane Charter-room privately printed. This volume was compiled in the sixteenth century. It has long been used as an authority on the antiquities of the Central Highlands and the modes of life and thought of the people. It was first printed in 1855.

From J. W. Gordon, Esq., London, Eng., facsimile reprint of Declaration con-

cerning matter of Bounty, King James I, 1610.

From Archbishop O'Brien, Halifax, Pastoral Letters, 1883-1896.

From Executors of the late C. C. Walker, Shropshire, Eng., a pamphlet entitled: "John Henning and Henry Condell, friends and fellow-actors of Shakespeare and what the world owes to them."

From Hon. E. Blake, Q.C., M.P., London, Eng., Speech on over-Taxation of Ireland.

Several important additions have been made during recess to the Canadian Section of works out of print or of newspapers published in the first part of this century. Among others may be mentioned Memorial of Thomas, Earl of Selkirk, to His Grace Charles, Duke of Richmond, Governor-in Chief of British North America, Montreal, 1819. This book brings to twenty-eight the number of volumes referring to Lord Selkirk's enterprise in the North-west. As they all bear on the establishment of his colony and his troubles with the Hudson Bay Company they formed an important chapter of the early days of Manitoba. Two rare atlases have also been acquired since last Session. In one of them are to be found the plans of forts in North America, existing during the Seven Years War, namely, those of Montreal, Quebec, Frontenac, Kingston, Duquesne (Pittsburg), Ticonderoga and Louisburg. The other atlas contains plans of the camps in North America during the war of the American revolution, (1776–83). The newspapers referred to are Mackenzie's Gazette, from 1838 to 1840; Mackenzie's Weekly Message, from 1856 to 1860; the Examiner, Toronto, from 1844 to 1855.

A new catalogue covering in French and English, Law, Political Economy, Commerce and Statistics, Constitutional History and Law, Parliamentary Debates and Practice, Social Science and a variety of kindred subjects, has been completed during the recess.

The list of donations to the Library, and the list of books deposited under the Copyright Act, are annexed as usual.

That Canada is specially adapted for and has so many natural advantages for the

production of finest butter.

That whereas a large export butter trade would benefit not only the farmers as a whole, but the millions of money it would yearly bring into the country would do incal-

culable good to the whole community.

That, in view of the foregoing facts, our Government should take immediate steps to do something more to assist in the development of our butter trade, and this House is of the opinion that the Government should place in the Estimates for the present Session an amount to be paid to the farmers direct by way of a bonus of one cent per pound on a specified quantity of our finest fresh creamery butter to be exported to Great Britain while fresh and in condition to secure a reputation for itself and establish a lasting demand, and that this bonus be continued for three consecutive years. This bonus to be increased at the discretion of the Government on butter made during the winter months. All such butter to be subject to a rigid Government inspection.

That this bonus be paid to only those farmers who will furnish for export

regular supplies.

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

OTTAWA, FRIDAY, 4TH FEBRUARY, 1898.

PRAYERS.

Nine Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The House proceeded to the consideration of His Excellency's Speech at the opening of the Session.

Mr. Bertram moved, seconded by Mr. Gauvreau, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, to thank His Excellency for His Gracious Speech at the opening of the present Session; and, further, to assure His Excellency that—

1. We share the great pleasure expressed by His Excellency at the remarkable advance in the political importance and material prosperity of Canada during the year

which has just closed.

2. We rejoice to learn that the loan recently effected has shown that the credit of Canada has never stood so high in European markets, and affords reasonable ground for expecting that the burthens of the people will, in the near future, be materially reduced by the substitution of a much lower rate of interest on our indebtedness than that which now exists.

3. The exceedingly cordial reception accorded to the representatives of Canada at the Jubilee Ceremonials, and the warm appreciation manifested everywhere throughout the Mother Country in reference to the conduct of Canada in materially reducing the rate of duty upon goods imported from the United Kingdom into the Dominion, was very

gratifying to us.

4. We are happy to know that the action of the Imperial Government in denouncing the treaties with Germany and Belgium, also affords most satisfactory evidence of their desire to facilitate our efforts to promote the closest possible commercial relations between Canada and the remainder of the Empire, and, with His Excellency, we sincerely trust that this action will contribute materially to the development of Imperial trade.

5. It affords us much satisfaction to be informed that the extraordinary gold discoveries recently made upon the Yukon and its tributaries, appear likely to result in an enormous influx of people into that region, and we are glad to hear that the Government has taken prompt action for the preservation of law and order in that distant and almost inaccessible locality; and we assure His Excellency that any measures laid before us for that purpose will receive our earnest consideration.

6. We learn with much interest that a contract has been entered into, subject to our approval, for the completion at the earliest possible moment of a system of rail and river communication through Canadian territory with the Klondike and principal gold fields, which it is to be hoped will secure to Canada the larger portion of the lucrative traffic of that country.

7. We thank His Excellency for informing us that the bountiful harvest with which we have been favoured by a benevolent Providence has contributed greatly to the increase of our prosperity, and that the trade and commerce of the Dominion, and more especially the amount and values of her principal exports, have increased greatly during the past eighteen months, and that there is good reason to believe that this improvement may be maintained, if not augmented, during the remainder of the present year.

8. We hear with satisfaction that certain Government contracts recently let contain

provisions calculated to suppress the evils of the sweating system.

9. We thank His Excellency for informing us that the accounts of the past year will be laid before us, and that the Estimates for the succeeding year will likewise be placed upon the Table at an early date, and we shall carefully consider these estimates.

10. His Excellency may rest assured that all measures respecting Superannuation, the repeal of the present Franchise Act, and a plebiscite on the question of Prohibition, and all other measures submitted to us will receive our earnest consideration; and we trust that the Divine blessing will attend the labours on which we are again entering.

And a Debate arising thereon,—the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Foster,

adjourned.



OTTAWA, MONDAY, 7TH FEBRUARY, 1898.

PRAYERS.

The following Petitions were read and received:

Of W. H. Curle and others, of Ottawa; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to construct and operate a standard or narrow gauge railway from or near the shore of Lynn Canal, thence in a northerly direction by the most feasible route in the vicinity of Dalton Trail to a point on the Yukon River at or near Fort Selkirk, and for other purposes.

Of D'Arcy Scott and others, of Ottawa; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to construct and operate a standard or narrow gauge railway from or near the shore of Lynn Canal, thence in a northerly direction to a point at or near Lake Lindeman, thence by the most feasible route to a point on the Yukon River at or near Fort Selkirk, and for other purposes.

Of R. W. T. O'Hanly and others, of Ottawa; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to construct and operate a standard or narrow gauge railway, from a point on navigable water on the Stikine River, thence in a northerly direction by the most feasible route by the way of Lake Teslin and Hootalinqua River to a point on the Yukon River at or near Fort Selkirk, and for other purposes.

Of Molyneux St. John and others; praying for the passing of an Act incorporating them as a company, for the purpose of constructing and operating by horse power, steam or electricity, a tramway or tramways between the International boundary line near Lake Lindeman and the mouth of the Lewes River in the Yukon district of the North-west Territories of Canada, and for other purposes.

Of John T. Carroll and others, of the City of Vancouver and others of other places in British Columbia; praying for the passing of an Act incorporating them as a company for the purpose of constructing and operating a railway from Burrard Inlet or English Bay from or near the City of Vancouver to the City of New Westminster, thence in a southerly direction crossing the Fraser River, in an easterly direction through the Hope Mountains south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway to the Columbia River and Lethbridge in Alberta, and for other purposes.

Of the Hudson's Bay and Pacific Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to extend the time for the commencement and completion of

their railway, and for other amendments to their Act of Incorporation.

Of Alexander Fraser and others, of Ottawa, and others of other places; praying for the passing of an Act incorporating them as a company for the purpose of constructing and operating a railway and general traffic bridge across the Ottawa River between Bank and Kent Streets to a point in the City of Hull, and for other purposes.

Of the Canadian Railway Accident Insurance Company; praying for the passing of an Act for the purpose of reducing the quorum of directors to seven, and for other

amendments to their Act of Incorporation.

Of the Union Bank of Canada; praying for the passing of an Act authorizing them to divide their present Capital Stock into Fifteen thousand shares of One hundred dollars each, and for other purposes.

On motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, it was Resolved, That the Order for the consideration of the motion for an Address to His Excellency the Governor General, in reply to his Speech at the opening of the Session, have precedence over all other business except Introduction of Bills.

The House resumed the adjourned Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Bertram for an Address to His Excellency the Governor General in answer to his Speech at the opening of the Session.

And the Debate continuing,—the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Davin,

adjourned.

Mr. Fielding laid before the House,—Return of Treasury Board Over-Rulings of Auditor General's decisions between the Second Session of 1897 and the Session of 1898.

Mr. Fitzpatrick laid before the House,—General Rules and Orders of the Exchequer Court of Canada.

Sir Henry Joly de Lotbinière laid before the House, by command of His Excellency the Governor General,—Report, Returns and Statistics of the Inland Revenues of the Dominion of Canada, for the fiscal year ended 30th June, 1897; Part I. Excise, etc.

And also, -Part II. Inspection of Weights and Measures and Gas, for the fiscal

year ended 30th June, 1897.

Mr. Fitzpatrick laid before the House,—The Civil Service List of Canada, 1897.

Mr. Sifton presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 7th June, 1897, for copies of all correspondence of record in the Department of the Interior in regard to the keeping of Government horses by S. J. Donaldson, of Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, from October, 1894, until May, 1895, and referring in any way to the transferring of the keeping of said horses from Joseph Letellier de St. Just to the said S. J. Donaldson; together with all accounts received from S. J. Donaldson in connection with keeping of said horses and caring for other Government property.



PRAYERS.

One Petition was brought up, and laid on the Table.

Mr. Blair laid before the House,—Copy of the Order in Council and the Contract entered into between Her Majesty and Messrs. Mackenzie and Mann for the construction of a railway from the Stikine River to Teslin Lake, which is as follows:—

Extract from a Report of the Committee of the Honourable the Privy Council, approved by His Excellency on the 7th February, 1898.

The Sub-Committee of Council having had under consideration a scheme for the construction of a railway from the Stikine River to Teslin Lake, submit for approval herewith a contract entered into between Her Majesty and Messrs. Mackenzie and Mann for the construction of such a railway, and recommend that the said contract be approved.

The Committee submit the foregoing recommendation for Your Excellency's approval.

(Signed) JOHN J. McGEE, Clerk of the Privy Council.

This contract made the twenty-fifth day of January, A.D. 1898,

Between Her Majesty the Queen, herein represented by the Honourable A. G. Blair, Minister of Railways and Canals, and the Honourable Clifford Sifton, Minister of the Interior, Canada, hereinafter called the Government of the first part, and

William Mackenzie, of Toronto, contractor, and Donald D. Mann, of Montreal, contractor, and hereinafter called the contractors of the second part.

WITNESSETH AS FOLLOWS :-

1. The contractors covenant with the Government to lay out, construct, equip and fully complete a line of railway with proper terminal facilities from the navigable waters of the Stikine River in British Columbia, at or near the mouth of Telegraph Creek, Glenora, or the mouth of Clear Water River, thence running northward to the navigable waters of Teslin Lake, a distance of about one hundred and fifty miles, more or less, on or before the first day of September, A.D. 1898, the said railway when fully completed to be of the general standard and gauge of the Kaslo and Slocan Railway in British Columbia and according to the specifications to be approved by the Minister of Railways.

Provided also, that the said railway shall be the property of the contractors but shall be subject to inspection and approval by an engineer to be named by the Minister

of Railways and Canals before being accepted as complete by the Government.

Provided further, that for the purposes of the season of 1898 and of complying with the requirements of this contract in respect to the completion of the line on or before the said first of September, it shall be sufficient if, on or before that date, the contractors have the rails laid in such a manner as will permit of regular and efficient operation of the railway, although the whole work be not fully completed, and if the said railway be sufficiently equipped for such operation. Provided also, that the location of said railway between the points mentioned shall be such as the contractors may decide upon without filing plans thereof prior to completion, provided that the grant of land hereby contracted for shall not be made upon a larger mileage than the Minister of Railways considers reasonably necessary for traversing the distance between the terminal points.

2. The Government shall submit to Parliament at its next ensuing session a measure for the necessary Act confirming this agreement and authorizing the Government and the contractors to perform and carry out the same, also incorporating the contractors and such others as may become shareholders into a company-under the name of the Canadian Yukon Railway Company or other name approved by the contractors (hereinafter referred to as the contractors' company), with power to acquire and perform and carry out this agreement, and with all necessary provisions in that behalf, and with all necessary powers to build and operate a railway above mentioned and an extension thereof northward to Dawson City or thereabouts and an extension southward to a point in British Columbia to be designated by the Government and capable of being made an ocean port, also a line of railway from the waters of Lynn Canal to Port Selkirk or thereabouts by way of Chilkat Pass, also branch lines of railway from any points on the company's railways to any property owned by the company, also lines of railway from any navigable waters to any property owned by the company: Provided that the power to build said line from Lynn Canal to Port Selkirk and said branch lines and said lines from navigable waters shall not be exercised without the consent of the Governor General in Council.

The said Act of Incorporation also to give the company full and sufficient powers to build and otherwise acquire and operate docks, wharves and lines of steam and other vessels in connection with its railways and property, also telegraph and telephone lines, also to carry on mining and smelting operations and such other powers as may be necessary for the due operating and conduct of all business connected with and incidental to the development and working of the lands (to be granted by the Government as hereinafter provided) and the minerals therein, including power to issue land grant

bonds and bonds secured by the company's undertakings.

3. Upon the incorporation of said company and upon the assignment by the contractors to such company of this agreement and upon the said company covenanting with fhe Government to carry out the same, and upon the said railway from Stikine River to Teslin Lake being completed and accepted as aforesaid, the contractors shall then but not before be relieved from personal responsibility hereunder and the company shall be thereafter deemed to be the parties of the second part hereto in lieu of the contractors and shall be bound as such, and be entitled to their rights hereunder.

4. For five years from the first of September, 1898, no line of railway shall be authorized by Parliament to be constructed from Lynn Canal or thereabouts or from any point at or near the international boundary between Canada and Alaska into the Yukon District, and for five years from said date no aid in land or money shall be granted to any person or company other than the contractors and the contractors'

company to assist in building any such railway.

5. The contractors and the contractors' company shall be entitled to receive in preference to any other person or company during ten years from said first of September, 1898, such and or assistance in land or money as the Government may be authorized and may see fit to grant in aid of a line of railway from the Stikine River to an ocean port in British Columbia, provided that the contractors or contractors' company are

willing to undertake the construction of the same at once and completion thereof within

a reasonable time upon receiving notice thereof from the Government.

6. The tolls to be collected by the contractors or contractors' company upon the line of railway hereby contracted for between Stikine River and Teslin Lake shall be first fixed by the Governor General in Council, and the tolls so fixed shall not be liable to reduction until the said railway has been in operation for four years, but such tolls shall be reduced by the Governor in Council by twenty-five per cent from and after such four years, and after the said railway has been in operation for seven years they shall be reduced by twenty-five per cent off the tolls as previously reduced; but after the said railway has been ten years in operation the tolls shall be subject to the general railway laws of Canada in that behalf.

7. The land granted to the contractors or contractors' company hereunder shall be free from taxation for ten years from the granting thereof—except municipal trxation

by an incorporated city, town or village within the Yukon Provisional District.

8. The contractors shall immediately construct a practicable sleigh road from the mouth of Stikine River to Teslin Lake, and shall provide suitable shelters or stopping places for travellers at intervals of not more than twenty-five miles along such road, such road and stopping places to be available for use at the earliest possible moment, and in any event not later than six weeks from the execution of this agreement.

9. The contractors or contractors' company shall provide, or arrange with others to provide, steamboat transport of freight and passengers between the terminus of said railway on Teslin Lake, or other terminus northerly thereof, and Dawson City to and

fro.

10. The contractors shall, within ten days after the execution hereof, deposit with the Government, in cash or approved cash security, the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars as security that the railway from Stikine River to Teslin Lake, hereby contracted for, will be completed and equipped in accordance with the terms hereof, and on such railway being completed and equipped and accepted as hereinbefore specified, the said sum or security shall be returned to the contractors, or to whom they may appoint, and if the same be deposited in cash, interest at the rate of three per cent per

annum thereon shall be paid for the time such cash has been so deposited.

11. In aid of the construction of said line of railway from Stikine River to Teslin Lake the Government shall grant to the contractors for each mile of said railway, twenty-five thousand acres of land, to be selected as hereinafter mentioned, from the Yukon Provisional District and from that part of the North-west Territories of Canada lying west of the Mackenzie River and Liard River, and north of the 60th parallel of latitude, such land to be and become vested in the contractors upon the said railway being completed, and accepted as complete, by the Government, and upon the said land being selected as hereinafter set forth.

12. The lands shall be selected by the contractors along base lines, and the base

lines may be of two kinds :-

1st. The contractors may take as a base line a line which will correspond with the general course of any lake, river, stream or watercourse, such line to be determined by survey, or approximate survey to the satisfaction of the authorized agent of the Minister of the Interior and to follow the general course of the lake, river, stream or

watercourse for the required dietance; and

2nd. The contractors may take as a base line a line commencing at any point located by them and running from such point due north, east, south or west. The land along a base line shall be divided into blocks, each block to extend three miles along the base line and to extend three miles backwards on each side of the base line. On each base line there shall be at least eight of such blocks but there may be more at the option of the contractors. These blocks shall be numbered from one up consecutively, the odd-numbered blocks shall be the property of the contractors, the even-numbered shall remain the property of the Government. The contractors shall take at least 4 blocks on each base line established by them for the purpose of selection but shall not be bound to take more, but they may take as many more as they desire and as circumstances permit. Thus upon each base line so established there shall be laid out a tract not less

than 24 miles along the course of said base line by three miles on each side thereof in width, making eight blocks of three miles by six miles. Provided that if in the selection of lands along any base line the courses thereof prevent rectangular blocks being laid out, such blocks shall be adjusted to the required angles, preserving as far as practicable, blocks of an area of three miles by six. Any shortage or surplus of such area shall be adjusted by the prolongation or shortening of such base line.

The contractors may also at their option sslect additional blocks lying on either end of any odd-numbered block, along a base line, but such additional blocks must be three miles square each and they shall not exceed three in number on each end of each

such odd-numbered block.

13. The contractors shall make selection of one-half of the lands to which they become entitled under this contract within three years from the first day of September,

1898, and of the remainder within six years from that date.

14. No portion of the beds of the rivers Yukon, Lewes or Hootalinqua or of the Lakes Teslin, Bennett, Tagish, Labarge or Marsh (said lakes and rivers forming continuous watercourses) or of the banks thereof for twenty-five feet on each side of ordinary high water mark shall pass to the contractors under any selection of lands made

under the agreement.

15. The free rights of passage and use along navigable or floatable streams within the lands selected by the contractors shall not be impeded by them and if any stream be diverted by them from its natural channel an equally convenient navigable or floatable channel shall be provided in lieu, and the Gold Commissioner of the district shall decide any dispute which may arise as to whether such equally convenient channel has been provided and from his decision there shall be an appeal to the Governor General in Council.

16. Any and all mining claims actually held and recorded pursuant to Government regulations by a free miner or free miners and being within a block of land taken or selected by the contractors hereunder, shall be excepted from the grant and shall not pass to the contractors, provided that such claims have been so actually held and recorded prior to the base line, along or with reference to which such block is taken being actu-

ally run and marked on the ground by the contractors.

17. There shall be payable to and reserved by the Government a royalty of one per cent upon all gold mined by placer or alluvial or hydraulic mining upon the lands selected hereunder, and if and so long as any royalty up to one per cent is levied by the Government upon all gold got by quartz mining in Government land in the Yukon district, a royalty of an equal amount up to one per cent, but no more, shall be payable to and reserved by the Government upon all gold got by quartz mining in the land selected hereunder.

18. So soon as any ten continuous miles of said railway between Stikine River and Teslin Lake have been completed and in running order and certified so to be by an officer named by the Minister of Railways in that behalf, the contractors may select ninety-two thousand one hundred and sixty acres, or two blocks of land hereunder, and thereupon such blocks shall be reserved by the Government from sale or location or free miners' claims, and upon the completion from time to time in a similar way of any other ten miles, the contractors shall have a similar right to select ninety-two thousand one hundred and sixty acres, or two blocks, which shall thereupon be similarly reserved, and upon the completion of the said railway and acceptance thereof by the Government as completed, the blocks so reserved shall be granted to the contractors. All free miners' claims being excepted, as provided by clause 16 hereof.

19. In case any land is excepted out of blocks taken by contractors on account of free miners' claims, or otherwise, the quantity so excepted shall not be counted in the

acreage of lands to which the contractors are entitled hereunder.

20. The contractors shall upon application sell to actual settlers for farming purposes, at prices to be fixed by the Governor in Council, any arable lands forming part of those selected hereunder. Provided, however, that upon such sale all minerals and the right to mine same shall be reserved, and this clause shall not extend to lands suitable for village or town sites.

21. So soon as the contractors notify the Minister of Railways and Canals to send an engineer to inspect and approve of any ten miles of the line of railway hereby contracted for, such engineer shall be sent without delay to make such inspection and shall thereafter remain ready to inspect such, each ten miles, until the whole line is completed.

22. The grants of lands selected by the contractors hereunder, shall be in fee simple and shall include all precious metals and all minerals whatever, reserving only the

royalties above provided for.

23. Provision shall be made in the Aet incorporating the contractors, company against any discrimination by such company in operating its railways between customers, whether by discriminating rates or treatment or otherwise or by means of its steamships or other connections or otherwise.

24. Water available for hydraulic or placer mining on the contractors' lands, or on Government lands shall be used by those mining on such lands under such regulations as may be established by or under the authority of the Governor General in Council for the purpose of securing an equitable and fair division and use thereof.

25. This contract shall be subject to the approval of Parliament.



A gentleman from that region states that loggers are experiencing trouble with deep snow, and slow progress is being made. He furnishes the following approximate estimate of the quantity of logs being put in this winter by the several firms operating in the Georgian Bay District:—Alger Smith & Co., 8,000,000; Holland Emery Lumber Co., 20,000,000; Turner & Fisher, 20,000,000; S. C. Fisher, 1,000,000; Wm. Peter. 15,000,000; Saginaw Lumber and Salt Co. and Loveland, Rays & White, 16,000,000; Ontario Lumber Co., 8,000,000; Arthur Hill & Co., 15,000,000; McArthur Bros. & Co., 14,000,000; Spanish River Lumber Co., 15,000,000; Central Lumber Co., 8,000,000; Conger Lumber Co., 20,000,000; Hale & Booth, 30,000,000; Eddy Bros. & Co., 14,000,000; Moore & Glover, 4,000,000; Victoria Lumber Co., 15,000,000; Georgian Bay Lumber Co., 20,000,000; Union Trust Co., 14,000,000; Hardy Lumber Co., 10,000,000; Pitts & Co., 20,000,000; total, 328,000,000."

Three Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of George H. Perley and others; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to construct and operate a railway from the Town of Labelle, in the County of Ottawa, or City of Montreal, thence to some point on the Ottawa and Gatineau Railway or City of Hull, thence northerly to a point near the sources of the Gatineau and St. Maurice Rivers near the northern boundary line in the Province of Quebec, and for other purposes.

Of Thomas Sullivan and others; praying for the passing of an Act for the reduc-

tion of the hours of labour.

Of Thomas Sullivan and others; praying for such legislation as will provide for the adoption of Men and Women Suffrage throughout Canada.

PRAYERS.

Six Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of the Montfort Colonization Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act to declare their railway to be a work for the general advantage of Canada; to empower them to extend their line from its present terminus to some point on the Ottawa Valley and Gatineau Railway; to change their corporate name to that of the Montfort and Gatineau Colonization Railway Company, and for other purposes.

Of the Lake Manitoba Railway and Canal Company; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to amalgamate with any other Railway Company authorized

to enter into such amalgamation.

Of Henry O'Hara and others; praying for an Act of Incorporation under the

name of the Prudential Life Assurance Company of Canada.

Of William L. Nicol and others, of British Columbia, Provisional Directors of the Vancouver, Victoria and Eastern Railway and Navigation Company; praying for the passing of an Act to declare their railway to be a work for the general advantage of Canada.

Of the Nakusp and Slocan Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to construct, acquire and operate certain proposed branch lines of

railway.

Of Walter A. Aitken, Sub-Sollector of Customs at the outport of Montague, Prince Edward Island, together with reasons for which he was dismissed, also copies of all applications for his position and names of parties applying therefor, and by whom recommended?

Mr. Kaulbach-On Monday next-The following Resolution :-

That the industry of deep sea fishing by Eastern Canadians in the waters of the North Atlantic has been greatly interfered with during the past few years, and now is on the wane, owing to the policy adopted by France in the giving of a bonus to her fishermen of 10 francs per quintal, equal to about \$1.80, for every such quintal of fish exported and sold to a foreign country.

That the incentive given to French fishermen, particularly at St. Pierre, next Newfoundland, has greatly increased the quantity for export from that quarter, and, as a consequence, comes into competition with Canadian exports of the same article in a

foreign port, particularly in the markets of the West Indies.

That instead of Canadian fishermen in the North Atlantic being encouraged in that industry the past few years, their interests have been depressed by a reduction in the fishing bounty, which has not only discouraged the fishermen but also seriously curtailed the operations of the ship-building industry which was materially stimulated by the said bounty, the industries of fishing and ship-building being in this case identical and thereby silenced the shipyards, and is practically driving the ship-builder out of the country.

That the Maritime Provinces are specially adapted to push the industry of deep sea fishing to a success, if properly protected by the Government, and that, were the Newfoundland Government solicited to aid the Canadian Government, much good would

result.

That as the French at St. Pierre will not permit the purchase by our fishermen of bait on their shores, neither will they receive from us fish or fish products, our disposi-

tion should be in this case to deal with them on the lines laid down by themselves, as they deserve, and give them a quid pro quo.

That Governments of other countries have encouraged the industry of fishing by granting bonuses and expending large sums of money in fish culture, which has resulted in much good, not only to the fishermen as a class, but to the country as a whole.

That in view of the foregoing facts, our Government should take immediate steps to do something more than at present to assist in developing this trade, and this House is of the opinion that the Government should follow the example of France and other nations, and place in the Estimates for the present Session an amount sufficient to meet the exigencies, by the payment of a certain sum per quintal for every quintal exported and sold by us in a foreign market.

I am to add that it is further stated that on election day you were an active worker in the interests of Dr. Cameron, one of the candidates in the above mentioned election.

Twelve Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of the Montreal Island Belt Line Railway Company; praying for certain amend

ments of their Act of Incorporation.

Of the Kingston and Pembroke Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act authorizing them to call in their present preference debentures and to issue others n lieu thereof, to issue preference stock on certain terms and conditions, to reduce their apital stock, and for other purposes.

Of Toronto Humane Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals; praying hat the Bill now before Parliament, intituled: "An Act to amend the Criminal Code,

of 1892, in respect to Cruelty to Animals," may not become law.

Of the Dominion Woman's Christian Temperance Union, of Grimsby, Ontario; praying for more stringent legislation for the protection of women and girls.

The following Bills were introduced, read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow, viz.:—

By Mr. McInnes:—Bill No. 64, an Act respecting the Vancouver, Victoria and Eastern Railway and Navigation Company;—and

By Mr. Davin: -Bill No. 65, an Act further to amend the Criminal Code, 1892.

Sir Henri Joly de Lotbinière laid before the House,—Return of the names and salaries of all persons appointed to, or promoted in the Civil Service during the calendar year 1897, specifying the office to which each has been appointed or promoted.

The House resumed the adjourned Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Blair for the second reading of the Bill No. 6, an Act to confirm an agreement between Her Majesty and William Mackenzie and Donald D. Mann, and to incorporate the Canadian Yukon Railway Company; and the proposed motion of Mr. Borden (Halifax) in amendment thereto; which amendment is as follows:—That all the words after "That" to the end of the question be left out, and the following words be added instead thereof:—"the Bill No. 6, an Act to confirm an agreement between Her Majesty and William Mackenzie and Donald D. Mann, and to incorporate the Canadian Yukon Railway Company, be not now read a second time, but that it be Resolved, That this House while recognizing the necessity of providing adequate facilities for transportation into the Canadian Yukon

gold fields, regards as indefensible the terms and conditions of the proposed contract, but will cordially support the grant of substantial assistance in aid of the immediate construction of a railway on the best available route, under such conditions and safeguards as will prevent the creation of any railway or mining monopoly."

FRIDAY, 11th March, 1898.

And the question being proposed on the amendment;

Mr. McInnes moved in amendment to the amendment, That all the words after the word "but" in the eighth line of the amendment be struck out, and the following words be added instead thereof:—

"That it is expedient to provide transportation facilities with the least possible

delay, by an all-Canadian route to the mining districts of the Yukon.

That the recent action of the United States Senate gives reason to fear that every possible obstacle will be placed in the way of traffic by the proposed Stikine route, and justifies the re-consideration of the present contract with a view to securing a deep water terminus in Canadian territory.

That the route via Observatory Inlet and Teslin Lake is the only all-Canadian route free from the possibility of international complications, immediately available, or

suitable for railway construction at a comparatively moderate cost.

Therefore, be it resolved, that the Government should call for tenders, at the earliest date consistent with public competition, for the construction of a narrow gauge railway from Observatory Inlet to Teslin Lake, on either of the following plans:—

1. As a Government work.

2. On the basis of a cash subsidy to a company constructing the railway and oper-

ating it under stringent governmental control.

Provided, That, in either case, the portion from the Stikine River to Teslin Lake shall be completed by October 1st, 1898, and the whole railway by September 1st, 1899, and that the Government be authorized to enter into a contract for the construction of such railway with the party submitting the lowest tender, accompanied by satisfactory securities for the completion of the work, on either of the above plans."

And objection having been taken;

Mr. Speaker ruled the amendment to the amendment out of order on the ground, that it directed a specific expenditure of money which should be initiated by the Government under the constitutional checks required by section 54 of the British North America Act, and rules of the House relating to grants of money.

Mr. Blair moved, That the Bill No. 6, an Act to confirm an agreement between Her Majesty and William Mackenzie and Donald D. Mann, and to incorporate the Canadian Yukon Railway Company, be now read the third time.

Mr. Quinn moved in amendment thereto, that the Bill be not now read the third time, but that it be referred back to the Committee of the Whole for the purpose of

striking out section 8 and substituting instead thereof the following:-

"The capital stock of the company shall be ten millions of dollars, divided into shares of one dollar each, the whole of which shall be first issued for subscription to the Canadian public and left open for subscription until the first day of September, 1898. On the first allotment of shares no individual shall be allotted more than one thousand shares, but should the whole sum of ten millions of dollars be not then subscribed any person who shall have applied for shares shall be allowed to take up any portion of the balance remaining unsubscribed. In the event of applications for stock in excess of the ten millions of dollars being received, shares shall be allotted pro rata to each subscriber. The ownership of the railway and the contractors' interest in their contract with the Government shall be acquired by the company by paying to the contractors, out of the capital stock of the company, the amount expended by such contractors for the construction of such railway, together with a profit of twenty-five per centum on the gross expenditure so made by them."

And the question being put on the amendment; it was negatived.

And the question being put on the main motion; it was agreed to, on a division.

The said Bill was accordingly read the third time, and passed.

Mr. Moore moved, That in the opinion of the House it would be in the interests of the farmers, labourers and the country generally, to reduce the customs duty upon imported refined petroleum for illuminating purposes to three cents per Imperial gallon, and also to further extend the right of importing such oil in tank cars.

And a Debate arising thereon,—the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Fielding,

adjourned.

Mr. Davin-At an early day, on the motion to go into Committee of Supply:

That the leading members of the present Government gave the farmers of Canada, and especially of the west, assurance that a number of those things they buy would be placed on the free list, or the duty on them greatly reduced.

That apart from opinions respecting policy and the relative value of protection, free trade or revenue tariff, a sense that deception has been practised is widespread.

That responsible government will be imperilled and its efficiency certainly impaired if it should come to be accepted that men may, without incurring public reprobation, get into power by professing one set of principles and then carrying on the government of the country on opposite principles.

That honesty, honour, integrity and truth are called for in the interest of the public weal and by any true standard of morals as imperatively in public as in private

life.

That after the present Government came into power, the Prime Minister and his colleagues assured Parliament that only offensive partizans would be removed on political grounds from employment in the Government service, and that in every case the truth of any charge would be inquired into.

That these assurances have not been carried out.

That, while some of the pledges and promises may, in the opinion of some, have been economically unsound and whatever may be the economical or political standpoint, free trade or protection, liberal or conservative, cynical disregard of pledges, promises, principles, assurances, protestations, programmes, being thus systematic; this systematic disregard for their own word, whether outside or inside this House, by members of the present Government, individually and collectively injures seriously the machinery of government, uproots trust in public men, and is calculated to demoralize the community and minimize if not destroy the usefulness of parliamentary institutions.

Your Committee, in obedience to the Order of the House of the 14th instant, have again considered Bill No. 32, an Act respecting the Ontario and Rainy River Railway Company, and have agreed to report the same further amended.

Your Committee have also had under consideration Bill No. 22, an Act respecting the Hudson's Bay and Pacific Railway Company, and have agreed to report the same

with amendments.

The following Bills were severally introduced, read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow, viz. :-

The Bill No. 2, an Act to secure the better observance of the Lord's Day, commonly called Sunday, as a day of rest, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, and ordered for a third reading tomorrow.

The Bill No. 4, an Act further to secure the safety of railway employees and passengers, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, and progress having been made and reported,—the Committee obtained leave to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Reid moved, That the production of cheese in Canada has reached a very high and most satisfactory point, and any expenditure for the further development of this product alone, might be detrimental to the best interests of our dairy industry as a whole.

That Great Britain imports immense quantities of fine butter from foreign countries, of which Canada as one of her most important colonies, at present furnishes a very small portion.

That proper cold storage transportation facilities have been provided by our Government.

That the governments of other countries have expended large sums of money in fostering their butter industry by means of bonuses, &c., with the result that their butter industry has prospered and assumed large proportions, as is shown by the official returns of butter imported by Great Britain.

That Canada is specially adapted for and has so many natural advantages for the production of finest butter.

That whereas a large export butter trade would benefit not only the farmers as a whole, but the millions of money it would yearly bring into the country would do incal-

culable good to the whole community.

That, in view of the foregoing facts, our Government should take immediate steps to do something more to assist in the development of our butter trade, and this House is of the opinion that the Government should place in the Estimates for the present Session an amount to be paid to the farmers direct by way of a bonus of one cent per pound on a specified quantity of our finest fresh creamery butter to be exported to Great Britain while fresh and in condition to secure a reputation for itself and establish a lasting demand, and that this bonus be continued for three consecutive years. This bonus to be increased at the discretion of the Government on butter made during the winter months. All such butter to be subject to a rigid Government inspection.

That this bonus be paid to only those farmers who will furnish for export regular

supplies.

And a Debate arising thereon;

Mr. Campbell moved, That the Debate be adjourned.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier laid before the House, by command of His Excellency the Governor General,—Report of the Secretary of State of Canada, for the year ended 31st December, 1897.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 14th March, 1898, for a Return of the number of acres seeded, the nature of the seed sown, the amount of crops grown in each Indian Reserve in the North-west Territories.

Mr. Fitzpatrick presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 14th February, 1898, for reports, recommendations, &c., of the Council of the Montreal Bar, addressed to the Minister of Justice, concerning the Judges of the Province of Quebec.

Mr. Lister, from the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

Price and others, for an Act of Incorporation under the name of the Montmorency Cotton Mills Company, and find that the Notices given thereon are sufficient in point of time, but that they cover only such powers as may be incidental to the main object of the application.

Your Committee have also examined the Petition of the East Kootenay Railway Company, for an Act to confirm their charter; and also the Petition of the Earl of Lonsdale and others, for an Act empowering them to construct and operate a railway from the head of Lynn Canal to Fort Selkirk, and find that no proofs of compliance with the requirements of the 51st Rule have been furnished.

The House resumed the consideration of the proposed motion of Mr. Reid, That the production of cheese in Canada has reached a very high and most satisfactory point, and any expenditure for the further development of this product alone, might be detrimental to the best interests of our dairy industry as a whole.

That Great Britain imports immense quantities of fine butter from foreign countries. of which Canada as one of her most important colonies, at present furnishes a very small

portion.

That proper cold storage transportation facilities have been provided by our Government.

That the governments of other countries have expended large sums of money in fostering their butter industry by means of bonuses, &c., with the result that their butter industry has prospered and assumed large proportions, as is shown by the official returns of butter imported by Great Britain.

That Canada is specially adapted for and has so many natural advantages for the

production of finest butter.

That whereas a large export butter trade would benefit not only the farmers as a whole, but the millions of money it would yearly bring into the country would do incal-

culable good to the whole community.

That, in view of the foregoing facts, our Government should take immediate steps to do something more to assist in the development of our butter trade, and this House is of the opinion that the Government should place in the Estimates for the present Session an amount to be paid to the farmers direct by way of a bonus of one cent per pound on a specified quantity of our finest fresh creamery butter to be exported to Great Britain while fresh and in condition to secure a reputation for itself and establish a lasting demand, and that this bonus be continued for three consecutive years. This bonus to be increased at the discretion of the Government on butter made during the winter months. All such butter to be subject to a rigid Government inspection.

That this bonus be paid to only those farmers who will furnish for export regular supplies; and the motion of Mr. Campbell for the adjournment of the Debate.

The motion for the adjournment of the Debate was, with leave of the House, withdrawn.

And the question being proposed on the motion,

Mr. Sutherland moved in amendment thereto, That all the words after "That" in the first line of the said motion be struck out, and the following added instead thereof:

—"this House views with satisfaction the great progress which has been made in the butter making branch of the dairy industry, as shown in the great and regular increase of our export trade in butter and the high reputation which the Canadian product has made, especially during last season, since the establishment of complete cold storage transportation, and believes that the course already pursued by the Government, if continued on the same lines, will result in still greater benefits to the farmers of our Dominion."

. Of James Bray, Reeve, and others, of Portage la Prairie and Burnside, Manitoba;

praying that no legislation be passed taking binder twine off the free list.

3. That running powers over the said railway and all its branches and connections, or any portions thereof, and all lines of railway now hereafter owned or leased by or operated on account of the company between Lake Superior and the city of Winnipeg, and the necessary use of its tracks, stations and station grounds are hereby expressly conferred on the Grand Trunk Railway, the Canadian Government Railway System, the Canadian Pacific Railway, or any other road designated by the Railway Committee, of the Privy Council or the Parliament of Canada upon such terms as such Committee or the Parliament of Canada may determine, and according to the provisions of the Railway Act, and of such other general Acts relating to railways as are from time to time passed by Parliament, but nothing herein shall be held to imply that such running powers might not be so granted without the special provisions herein contained.

That so soon as the said railway or any portion of it is opened for traffic, the rates and tolls on the railway, and on any other railway or steamers used in connection therewith and now or hereafter owned or leased by or operated on account of the company, shall be first approved by the Governor in Council, or by a railway commission, if and when such commission is established by law, and shall at all times thereafter and

from time to time be subject to revision and control in the manner aforesaid.

That two cents shall be the maximum passenger rate per mile over the said railway

or any of its connections between Lake Superior and Winnipeg.

That the maximum freight charged on the articles hereunder mentioned shall be as follows between Winnipeg and Port Arthur:—

"The railway company shall from time to time as required by Order in Council deposit with the Minister of Railways a statement of the earnings of the railway and the expense of carrying it on, including repairs and improvements, for each year, or part of year, during which the railway is operated, in such form, and giving such particulars as may be required from time to time by the Governor in Council;

"The Governor in Council may from time to time fix rates, terms and conditions for the carriage of freight and passengers over the railway of the company, or for the passage

of cars or trains other than those of the company over the said railway:

"Provided that the earnings of the railway over and above operating expenses, and cost of repairs and improvements, which improvements must be sanctioned by the Minister of Railways, amounts to over six per cent on the actual cost of construction, less any aid granted by Canada, or by any province or municipality, the Governor in Council may make such reduction in the rates for the carriage of passengers, or freight, or for the passage of cars or trains other than those of the company over its tracks, as may be necessary to bring the net earnings within six per cent on the above mentioned net cost:

"Provided always that the rates specified in section — of this Act shall govern until a reduction becomes necessary as above herein provided."



Six Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

Mr. Lister, from the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, pre-

sented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

Your Committee have had under consideration Bill No. 57, an Act respecting the Manufacturers' Guarantee and Accident Insurance Company, and to change its name to "The Dominion of Canada Guarantee and Accident Insurance Company," and have agreed to report the same with amendments.

Your Committee have also had under consideration Bill No. 59, an Act to incorporate the Victoria Fire Insurance Company, and have agreed to report the same with amendments, and recommend that its name be changed to "The Victoria-Montreal

Fire Insurance Company."

Your Committee have also had under consideration Bill No. 42, an Act respecting the Canadian Railway Accident Insurance Company, and recommend that the same be withdrawn, as the promoters have signified their desire not to proceed further with this measure during the present Session of Parliament

Your Committee also recommend that the fees paid on the last mentioned Bill be

refunded, less the cost of printing and translation.

Mr. Landerkin, from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented

the Eleventh Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

Your Committee have examined the notices given on the Petition of the Montreal Island Belt Line Railway Company, for amendments to their Act of Incorporation, and find them somewhat short in point of time, but as they will have matured before the Bill is considered in Committee, your Committee recommend that they be deemed sufficient.

As the time for presenting Private Bills has expired, your Committee recommend that that portion of the 49th Rule which limits the time for presenting Private Bills be suspended in reference to the Bill respecting the foregoing company, and also in reference to the Bill respecting the Montreal, Ottawa and Georgian Bay Canal Company.

Of the Hamilton Trades and Labour Council; praying that the Bill now before Parliament, further to amend the Chinese Immigration Act, may become law;—and

Of William Maxwell and others; praying that no legislation be passed taking binder twine off the free list.

Mr. Landerkin, from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Twelfth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee have examined the Notices given on the Petition of Elias Rogers and others, for an Act of Incorporation enabling them to construct and operate a line of railway from Alberta to the Yukon River, and find them sufficient.

As the time for presenting Private Bills has expired, your Committee recommend that that portion of the 49th Rule which limits the time for presenting Private Bills be suspended in reference to the Bills based upon the two last mentioned Petitions.

Mr. Bain, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

On motion of Sir Richard Cartwright, it was Resolved, That the Order of the House to go into Committee of Ways and Means, and any motion in reference thereto, be made the first Order of the Day after Questions on Wednesday, April 6th, and on subsequent days until the Debate on such Order is completed.

On motion of Sir Richard Cartwright, it was Resolved, That when the House adjourns on Wednesday next, it shall stand adjourned until the following Tuesday, April 12th.

The Bill No. 71, an Act further to amend the Weights and Measures Act, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, and further progress having been made and reported,—the Committee obtained leave to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

RESOLUTIONS

TO BE PROPOSED BY MR. FIELDING IN COMMITTEE OF WAYS AND MEANS RELATIVE TO DUTIES OF CUSTOMS, EXCISE, ETC.

1. That it is expedient to repeal section six of "The Customs Tariff, 1897," and to

substitute the following section therefor :-

6. The importation into Canada of any goods enumerated, described or referred to in Schedule C to this Act is prohibited; and any such goods imported shall thereby become forfeited to the Crown and may be destroyed or otherwise dealt with as the Minister of Customs may direct; and any person importing any such prohibited goods, or causing or permitting them to be imported shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars.

2. That it is expedient to provide that section seventeen of "The Customs Tariff. 1897," shall be repealed on and after the first day of August in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and that the following section shall be sub-

stituded therefor :-

17. Articles which are the growth, produce or manufacture of any of the following countries may, when imported direct into Canada from any of such countries, be entered for duty or taken out of warehouse for consumption in Canada at the reduced rate of duty provided in the British preferential tariff set forth in Schedule D to this Act:-

(a.) The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

(b.) The British Colony of Bermuda.

(c.) The British Colonies commonly called the British West Indies, including the following :-

The Bahamas.

Jamaica.

Turks Island and the Caicos Islands.

The Leeward Islands (Antigua, St. Christopher-Nevis, Dominica, Monserrat, and the Virgin Islands).

The Windward Islands (Grenada, St. Vincent and St. Lucia).

Barbados.

Trinidad and Tobago.

British Guiana.

(d.) Any other British Colony or possession the Customs tariff of which, on the whole, is as favourable to Canada as the British preferential tariff herein

referred to is to such colony or possession.

Provided, however, that manufactured articles to be admitted under such preferential tariff shall be bona fide the manufactures of a country or countries entitled to the benefits of such tariff, and that such benefits shall not extend to the importation of articles into the production of which there has not entered a substantial portion of the labour of such countries. Any question that may arise as to any articles being entitled to such benefits shall be decided by the Minister of Customs, whose decision shall be final.

(2.) The Minister of Customs, with the approval of the Governor in Council, shall determine what British Colonies or possessions shall be entitled to the benefits of the preferential tariff under clause (d) of this section.

(3.) The Minister of Customs may, with the approval of the Governor in Council, make such regulations as may be deemed necessary for carrying out the intention of this section.

1. That it is expedient to provide that Schedule D to "The Customs Tariff, 1897," shall be repealed on and after the first day of August in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and that the following schedule shall be substituted therefor :-

SCHEDULE "D."

BRITISH PREFERENTIAL TARIFF.

On articles the growth, produce or manufacture of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of any British colony or possession entitled to the benefits of this preferential tariff under section seventeen, the duties mentioned in Schedule A shall be reduced as follows: The reduction shall be one-fourth of the duty mentioned in Schedule A, and the duty to be levied, collected and paid shall be three-fourths of the duty mentioned in Schedule A.

Provided, however, that this reduction shall not apply to any of the following articles and that such articles shall in all cases be subject to the duties mentioned in Schedule A, viz.: wines, malt liquors, spirits, spirituous liquors, liquid medicines and articles containing alcohol; tobacco, cigars and cigarettes.

Provided further, that the reduction shall only apply to refined sugar, when evidence satisfactory to the Minister of Customs is furnished that such refined sugar has been manufactured wholly from raw sugar produced in the British Colonies or possessions.

5. That it is expedient to repeal items 435 and 436 of Schedule A to "The Customs Tariff, 1897," and to substitute the following therefor:—

435. All sugar above number sixteen Dutch standard in colour, and all refined sugars of whatever kinds, grades or standards, testing not more than eighty-eight degrees by the polariscope, one dollar and eight cents per one hundred pounds, and for each additional degree one and one-half cents per one hundred pounds. Fractions of five-tenths of a degree or less not to be subject to duty,

and fractions of more than five-tenths to be dutiable as a degree.

436. Sugar n.e.s. not above number sixteen Dutch standard in colour, sugar drainings or pumpings drained in transit, melado or concentrated melado, tank bottoms and sugar concrete, testing not more than seventy-five degrees by the polariscope, forty cents per one hundred pounds, and for each additional degree one and one-half cents per one hundred pounds. Fractions of five-tenths of a degree or less not to be subject to duty, and fractions of more than five-tenths to be dutiable as a degree. The usual packages in which imported to be free.

6. That it is expedient to provide that items 445 and 446 of Schedule A to "The Customs Tariff, 1897," shall be repealed on and after the first day of July in the present

year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.

7. That it is expedient to provide that on and after the first day of July in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, the following items shall be added to Schedule B to "The Customs Tariff, 1897":—

636. Tobacco, unmanufactured, for excise purpose under conditions of the Inland Revenue Act.

S. That it is expedient to provide that on and after the first day of July in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, in addition to the excise duties at present levied on manufactured tobacco, cigars and cigarettes, there shall be levied and collected the following excise duties, that is to say:

(a.) On all foreign raw leaf tobacco, unstemmed, taken out of warehouse for manufacture in any cigar or tobacco manufactory, ten cents per pound.

(b.) On all foreign raw leaf tobacco, stemmed, taken out of warehouse for manufacture in any cigar or tobacco manufactory, fourteen cents per pound.

Provided that the weight upon which such duty shall be computed shall be with reference to the standard mentioned in paragraph (c) of section 247 of the Inland Revenue Act.

And also,—Return to an Order of the House of the 12th April, 1897, for a return showing the number of fishing licenses granted to fish in Lake Erie, opposite East and West Elgin, and their location, whether pound net, gill net or seine license, and to whom granted during the years 1895 and 1896. Also, the names of all applicants for licenses for the year 1897, giving the names of those applicants who were granted licenses and the amount paid by each of them. Also, all telegrams, letters, reports and correspondence of every description in any wise relating to the granting or refusal of such licenses.

Sir Henri Joly de Lotbinière presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 30th March, 1898, for a return showing the number of bushels of wheat graded into elevators at Fort William from 15th September, 1897, to 15th January, 1898, and the grades of the same as allowed by the Government grain inspector at that point; also, the number of bushels of wheat graded out of the above mentioned elevators during the same period, and the grades of the same as allowed by the said Government inspector.

Mr. Craig moved, That the House do now adjourn; which motion was, with leave of the House, withdrawn.

The House resumed the adjourned Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Fielding: "That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair for the House to go into Committee to consider of the Ways and Means for raising the Supply to be granted to Her Majesty."

PRAYERS.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of Duncan Mackenzie and others, of the Townships of Proton and Egremont, County of Grey, Ontario; praying that no legislation be passed taking binder twine off the free list.

Of the Municipal Council of the County of Bruce, Ontario; praying for certain

amendments of the Criminal Code.

Of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Manitoba; praying for such amendment of "The Railway Act" as will compel all railway companies in that province to furnish increased facilities to farmers in the shipping of their products.

Mr. Scriver, from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Library of Parliament, presented the First Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

On motion of Mr. Landerkin, it was Resolved, That a Message be sent to the Senate to return to that House the evidence, etc., taken before the Select Committee of the Senate, to whom was referred the Bill (A) No. 87, intituled: "An Act for the relief of Robert Augustus Baldwin Hart."

The Bill No. 48, an Act to incorporate the Cowichan Valley Railway Company, was considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Order of the Day for the House in Committee on Bill No. 96, an Act to incorporate the Nickel Steel Company of Canada, as amended by the Select Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, being read; Mr. Wood (Hamilton) moved, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.

Mr. LaRivière moved in amendment thereto, That Mr. Speaker do not now leave the Chair, but that the said Bill, as amended by the Select Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, be referred to the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines; which was agreed to.

The said Bill was accordingly referred to the Select Standing Committee on Rail-

ways, Canals and Telegraph Lines.

Bill No. 46, an Act respecting the Canadian Pacific Railway Company.

Bill No. 51, an Act respecting the Calgary and Edmonton Railway Company.

Bill No. 58, an Act respecting the Queenston Heights Bridge Company.

Bill No. 54, an Act respecting the Edmonton District Railway Company;—and Bill No. 66, an Act respecting the Lake Manitoba Railway and Canal Company.

Bill (C) No. 112, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act for the relief of Edwin Heyward;" also, the evidence, etc., taken before the Select Committee of the Senate on Divorce. (On a division.)

By Mr. Powell:—Order of the House for a Return containing a statement of expenditure out of income made for permanent improvements, extensions, additions and betterments, exclusive of works for ordinary maintenance and renewals, on account of the Intercolonial Railway from 30th June, 1891, to 1st July, 1897.

By Mr. Monk:—Address to His Excellency the Governor General, praying for a copy of the report forwarded to the Government by Mr. Wilfrid Mercier, appointed to hold an investigation into the conduct of employees on the St. Ann lock on the Ottawa River.

By Mr. McMullen:—Order of the House for a Return showing the sums paid to the several Deputy Heads of the several Departments, over and above their stated salaries, for services supposed to be rendered by them in excess of their ordinary duties or otherwise for the years 1890, 1891, 1892, 1893, 1894, 1895, 1896 and 1897; also, the sums paid to any of the Inside Service outside of their stated salaries for the same period.

tenance and repairs of buildings.

And also,—Order of the House for a Return showing, by Departments, the expenditure in each year, beginning July 1st, 1890, for salaries in the outside service of the Post Office, Customs and Inland Revenue Departments, detailed by posts and sub-posts in the case of the Inland Revenue and Customs, and by Post Offices in case of employees in the postal service, of all employees, whether temporary or permanent.

By Mr. Broder:—Order of the House for a Return showing names of parties from whom lands were purchased for new improvements on Iroquois Section of Galops Canal, and amounts paid to each person for property so purchased from them, also quantity of land purchased from each person.

PRAYERS.

One Petition was brought up, and laid on the Table.

Mr. Gibson, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Sixth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee have had under consideration the following Bills, and have agreed

to report the same with amendments, viz.:-

Bill No. 31, an Act to incorporate the Lake Bennett and Klondike Railway and Tramway Company.

Bill No. 47, an Act respecting the Brandon and South-Western Railway Company;

—and

Bill No. 52, an Act respecting the Nakusp and Slocan Railway Company.

Your Committee have also had under consideration Bill No. 40, an Act to incorporate the Pacific and Eastern Railway Company, and recommend that the same be withdrawn, as the promoters have signified their desire not to proceed further with the proposed measure during the present Session. Your Committee also recommend that the fees paid on the last mentioned Bill be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation.

Mr. McMullen, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, presented the First Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee recommend that the House authorize them to employ a short-hand writer to take down such evidence as they may deem necessary.

Mr. Gibson, from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

The Committee recommend that three hundred copies of "The Dominion Law Index" in the better class of binding, viz.: in English half-calf, as per sample submitted by the publishers, be purchased for the use of Hon. Senators and Members of the House of Commons, at the sum of two dollars and twenty-five cents per copy.

On motion of Mr. McMullen, leave was granted to the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts to employ a short-hand writer to take down such evidence as the Committee may deem necessary, in accordance with the recommendation contained in the First Report of said Committee.

On motion of Mr. Sutherland, the Bill No. 40, an Act to incorporate the Pacific and Eastern Railway Company, was withdrawn, and the fees paid thereon ordered to be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation, in accordance with the recommendation contained in the Sixth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines.

On motion of Mr. Gibson, the First Report of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, was concurred in.

Mr. Hurley introduced a Bill No. 120, an Act respecting the North American Telegraph Company, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading tomorrow.

1. Resolved, That it is expedient to repeal section six of "The Customs Tariff,

1897," and to substitute the following section therefor:-

6. The importation into Canada of any goods enumerated, described or referred to in Schedule C to this Act is prohibited; and any such goods imported shall thereby become forfeited to the Crown and may be destroyed or otherwise dealt with as the

Minister of Customs may direct; and any person importing any such prohibited goods, or causing or permitting them to be imported shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars.

2. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that section seventeen of "The Customs Tariff, 1897," shall be repealed on and after the first day of August in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and that the following section shall be substituted therefor :-

17. Articles which are the growth, produce or manufacture of any of the following countries may, when imported direct into Canada from any of such countries, be entered for duty or taken out of warehouse for consumption in Canada at the reduced rate of duty provided in the British preferential tariff set forth in Schedule D to this Act:-

(a.) The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

(b.) The British Colony of Bermuda.

(c.) The British Colonies commonly called the British West Indies, including the following :-

The Bahamas.

Jamaica.

Turks Island and the Caicos Islands.

The Leeward Islands (Antigua, St. Christopher-Nevis, Dominica, Montserrat, and the Virgin Islands).

The Windward Islands (Grenada, St. Vincent and St. Lucia).

Barbados.

Trinidad and Tobago.

British Guiana.

(d.) Any other British Colony or possession the Customs tariff of which, on the whole, is as favourable to Canada as the British preferential tariff herein referred to is to such colony or possession.

Provided, however, that manufactured articles to be admitted under such preferential tariff shall be bona fide the manufactures of a country or countries entitled to the benefits of such tariff, and that such benefits shall not extend to the importation of articles into the production of which there has not entered a substantial portion of the labour of such countries. Any question that may arise as to any article being entitled to such benefits shall be decided by the Minister of Customs, whose decision shall be

(2.) The Minister of Customs, with the approval of the Governor in Council, shall determine what British Colonies or possessions shall be entitled to the benefits of the preferential tariff under clause (d) of this section.

(3.) The Minister of Customs may, with the approval of the Governor in Council, make such regulations as may be deemed necessary for carrying out the intention of this

3. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that Schedule D to "The Customs Tariff, 1897," shall be repealed on and after the first day of August in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and that the following schedule shall be

SCHEDULE "D."

BRITISH PREFERENTIAL TARIFF.

On articles the growth, produce or manufacture of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of any British colony or possession entitled to the benefits of this preferential tariff under section seventeen, the duties mentioned in Schedule A shall be reduced as follows: The reduction shall be one-fourth of the duty mentioned in Schedule A, and the duty to be levied, collected and paid shall be three-fourths of the duty mentioned in Schedule A.

Provided, however, that this reduction shall not apply to any of the following articles and that such articles shall in all cases be subject to the duties mentioned in Schedule A, viz.: wines, malt liquors, spirits, spirituous liquors, liquid medicines and

articles containing alcohol; tobacco, cigars and cigarettes.

Provided further, that the reduction shall only apply to refined sugar, when evidence satisfactory to the Minister of Customs is furnished that such refined sugar has been manufactured wholly from raw sugar produced in the British Colonies or possessions.

4. Resolved, That it is expedient to repeal items 435 and 436 of Schedule A to

"The Customs Tariff, 1897," and to substitute the following therefor:-

435. All sugar above number sixteen Dutch standard in colour, and all refined sugars of whatever kinds, grades or standards, testing not more than eightyeight degrees by the polariscope, one dollar and eight cents per one hundred pounds, and for each additional degree one and one-half cents per one hundred pounds. Fractions of five-tenths of a degree or less not to be subject to duty,

and fractions of more than five tenths to be dutiable as a degree.

436. Sugar n.e.s. not above number sixteen Dutch standard in colour, sugar drainings or pumpings drained in transit, melado or concentrated melado, tank bottoms and sugar concrete, testing not more than seventy-five degrees by the polariscope, forty cents per one hundred pounds, and for each additional degree one and one-half cents per one hundred pounds. Fractions of fivetenths of a degree or less not to be subject to duty, and fractions of more than five-tenths to be dutiable as a degree. The usual packages in which imported to be free.

5. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that items 445 and 446 of Schedule A to "The Customs Tariff, 1897," shall be repealed on and after the first day of July in the

present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.

6. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that on and after the first day of July in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, the following items shall be added to Schedule B to "The Customs Tariff, 1897":

636. Tobacco, unmanufactured, for excise purpose under conditions of the Inland

Revenue Act.

7. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that on and after the first day of July in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, in addition to the excise duties at present levied on manufactured tobacco, cigars and cigarettes, there shall be levied and collected the following excise duties, that is to say:

(a.) On all foreign raw leaf tobacco, unstemmed, taken out of warehouse for manufacture in any cigar or tobacco manufactory, ten cents per pound.

(b.) On all foreign raw leaf tobacco, stemmed, taken out of warehouse for manufacture in any cigar or tobacco manufactory, fourteen cents per pound.

Provided that the weight upon which such duty shall be computed shall be with reference to the standard mentioned in paragraph (c) of section 247 of the Inland Revenue Act.

The Committee fully recognize the utter inadequacy of the present accommodation. The whole staff, both English and French, are crowded into one small room. There is no proper ventilation, and consequently the work is done under extremely unsanitary conditions. The noise and confusion caused by dictation and typewriting being carried on by so many persons simultaneously, greatly increase the difficulty of the work, and endanger accuracy. Indeed, it is extraordinary that so complete and accurate a report is produced with such promptitude, under such pressure and unfavourable conditions.

Your Committee, therefore, urgently recommend that before next Session steps be taken to provide enlarged and improved accommodation for the Official Reporters of

the Debates.

Of the Trades and Labour Council, of the City of Montreal; praying that the Bill now before Parliament in further amendment of the Trade Mark and Design Act, may become law.

On motion of Mr. McMullen, the Second and Third Reports of the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, were concurred in.

Mr. Bertram introduced a Bill No. 122, an Act to incorporate the Supreme Grand Lodge of the Sons of England Benefit Society, which was read the first time and ordered for a second reading on Monday next.

That this regulation shall come into force and take effect on, from and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight. Dated at Ottawa this twenty-third day of November, 1897.

Mr. Scriver, from the Select Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee have considered the following Bills, and have agreed to report the

same with amendments, viz.:-

Bill No. 109, an Act to incorporate the British American Light and Power Company;—and

Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of the 3rd May, 1897, for a copy of Schedule B, showing recommendations of the Treasury Board as submitted by report of Council to His Excellency the Governor General on the 6th and 7th July, 1896, and intended to be approved by him, laid upon the Table of the House last Session, with a statement of the action taken by the Government on each of these appointments as made by the said Order in Council approved by His Excellency, or, where no action has been taken, the reason for such a course.—(Sessional Papers.)

54. Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of the 17th May, 1897, for copies of all correspondence, &c., not already brought down, between the Government of Canada and the Government of Newfoundland, in reference to the admission of Newfoundland into the Union with Canada; also, copies of all correspondence between the Government of Canada and that of Newfoundland in reference to the establishment of freer trade relations between Newfoundland and Canada.—(Sessional Papers.)

63. In accordance with a Resolution of the Eighth Report of the Printing Committee of 1891, recommending that as all the printed documents for distribution to the members of both Houses should be issued from the office under the charge of Mr. Botterell, and entered in his books, all such documents from the several departments should be sent to the Distribution Office in these buildings direct, and thence distributed to members. This sub-committee begs to recommend that steps be taken forthwith to carry out such recommendation.

Mr. Landerkin, from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented

the Sixteenth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :-

Bill No 130, an Act further to amend the Dominion Lands Act.

Bill No. 131, an Act further to amend the Acts respecting the North-west Territories.

Bill No. 132, an Act to further amend the Land Titles Act, 1894;—and

Bill No. 133, an Act to make further provision respecting Grants of Land to members of the Militia Force on active service in the North-west.

The Bill No. 121, an Act respecting the Prohibition of the importation, manufacture and sale of Intoxicating Liquors, was read the second time, on a division, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, and ordered for a third reading at the next sitting of the House.

13. The Railway Act, except such sections as authorize the construction of branch lines and such sections as are inconsistent either with this Act or with the objects of the Company and of its undertaking, shall apply to the Company and its undertaking.

2. Wherever in the Railway Act the word "company" occurs, it shall mean the

Company hereby incorporated.

3. Wherever in the Railway Act the word "railway" occurs it shall, unless the context otherwise requires, in so far as it applies to the provisions of this Act, or the Company hereby incorporated, mean the tramways or other works authorized by this Act to be constructed.

Bill No. 66, an Act respecting the Lake Manitoba Railway and Canal Company,

amended as follows :-

Page 1, line 11.—After "Company" insert the following:—

"Provided such amalgamation with the Winnipeg and Great Northern Railway Company shall not apply to that portion of the aforesaid railway that lies between the terminus of the Lake Manitoba Railway and Canal Company and the Saskatchewan River."

Rome, 26th November, 1897.

"Eminence,—I have just arrived at Rome once again, at the urgent request of the "Catholic members of the Government and of the Parliament of Canada, in whose name "I have already presented myself to you. Although I have come so far I do not dare "to present myself to Your Eminence, because I would not in the least like, at this "moment, to seem to be bringing pressure to bear or to wish to impede the complete "liberty of His Holiness. Moreover, I know how busy Your Eminence is, and I "remember with what patience Your Eminence has so many times before heard our "representations on the subject of Manitoba, which, besides, Your Eminence now fully

"I should not even like to give you the trouble to read this letter if I had not been "very particularly asked to go to Rome by those whom I represent, and who, living far "from Rome, do not know quite what to do in order to plead their cause and fulfil

"This is, therefore, why I take the liberty of writing to Your Eminence as "follows :-

"Some days ago the Canadian newspapers caused to appear an item by which it "was set forth that His Holiness had published a letter condemning in the most formal "terms the concessions obtained for the Manitoba schools."

"A few days afterwards a declaration of official appearance made it known that "no such letter existed.

"Although not resting upon any foundation, the publication of this news has "created in Canada such a state of feeling that my principals thought they would be "wanting in their duty to His Holiness if they did not bring their respectful representa-

"The object of my visit is to call the attention of Your Eminence to the subject "upon which I have so often negotiated, to know that such a condemnation would have "the most disastrous effects for the peace of Canada and the cause of Catholic educa-"tion in this country, while at the same time it would sow discord among the Catholics "themselves.

"We do not solicit His Holiness to sanction as perfect the concessions obtained, "but that in his wisdom he will be pleased to regard them as a beginning of justice. "With the aid of time and thanks to the patient work of persuasion by their compa-"triots, the Catholics of Manitoba may hope to obtain satisfaction. The condemnation "of the concession made would, at the present hour, render (I am begged to insist upon "this point) any further concessions impossible.

"My instructions enjoin me again to renew to Your Eminence the desire, which I "had already the honour to express to you, that His Holiness will be pleased to name "a permanent delegate in Canada. The representative of His Holiness would reside on "the spot, but would be outside local interests, and thus he could with more wisdom "guide Catholics through the difficulties which they have to surmount.

"There is another point which I dare to beg Your Eminence to be good enough to

"consider. "Almost immediately when the Latin text of the letter of the Holy Father appears, "difficult and even contradictory translations will appear and, I am sure of it, most "regrettable discussions will at once arise as to the interpretation of the words of His " Holiness.

"In order to avoid such a misfortune, may I be permitted to suggest to Your "Eminence, how desirable it would be that the Latin text should be accompanied by "authorized texts in French and English. This procedure has been followed, if I "recollect aright, on several occasions in the case of France and of England.

"I shall leave Rome on Saturday; till that day I am entirely at the disposal of "Your Eminence."

1. Whether the words "at the urgent request of the Catholic members of the Government" can in the present instance be applied to any other Government than to the Government of which the Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier is the Prime Minister?

2. Whether Mr. Russell tells the truth when he affirms that he went to Rome at

the request of the Catholic members of the Government?

3. Whether Mr. Russell tells the truth when he affirms that he had already presented himself to the Secretary of State in the name of the same Catholic members of the Government?

4. Whether Mr. Russell tells the truth when he affirms that he was particularly requested to go to Rome by the Catholic members of the Government whom he represents?

5. Whether Mr. Russell tells the truth when he affirms that those whom he represents, living far from Rome, do not know quite what to do in order to fulfil their

duty to the Holy See?

6. Whether Mr. Russell tells the truth when he affirms that his "principals the Catholic members of the Government" thought they would be wanting in their duty to His Holiness if they did not bring their respectful representations before him?

7. Whether Mr. Russell tells the truth when he affirms that the Catholic members of the Government beg him to insist upon the fact that the condemnation at present of the concessions already made in the School Question would render impossible any future concession?

8. Whether Mr. Russell tells the truth when he affirms that his instructions enjoin upon him to renew the demand which he has already made for the nomination of a

permanent delegate? 9. If Mr. Russell tells the truth, how can the answer given up to this date in the Senate by some members of the Government be reconciled with such contradictory

assertions? 10. If Mr. Russell does not tell the truth, is it the intention of the Government to continue to make use of a man whose assertions it is obliged to disavow?

Mr. Gauthier—On Thursday next—Inquiry of Ministry—1. Whether the Government is aware that the Laurentian Railway, between St. Thérèse and St. Lin, is not provided with a telegraph line for the regulating of its trains, which constitutes a serious danger for those who travel thereon?

2. Is the Government aware that the said line is not sufficiently ballasted to insure

the safety of trains running on its rails?

3. Is it the intention of the Government to inquire into the truth of these facts, and to compel the company working the railway to make such improvements as may insure the safety and comfort of travellers?

PRAYERS.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of the Allied Printing Trades Council, of Toronto, Ontario; of the Vancouver Trades and Labour Council, B.C.; and of the Victoria Trades and Labour Council, B.C.; severally praying that the Bill now before Parliament further to amend the Chinese Immigration Act, may become law.

On motion of Mr. Gibson, the Third Report of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, was concurred in.

Mr. Blair presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 30th March, 1898, for copies of papers, correspondence and orders concerning the dismissal of François Corbeil, formerly wharfinger on the Lachine Canal.

And also,—Return to an Order of the House of the 14th March, 1898, for copies of reports, correspondence and papers relating to the dismissal of Charles Hoar, an employee of the Intercolonial Railway at Pictou, Nova Scotia.

On motion of Mr. Taylor, the Bill (K) No. 129, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to incorporate the Tobique Manufacturing Company," was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading on Friday next.

Mr. Sutherland moved, That as it appears from the Votes and Proceedings of the 15th April, 1898, that the proposed motion for the second reading of the amendment made in Committee of the Whole to Bill No. 26, an Act to incorporate the Kettle River Valley Railway Company, was negatived on a division the Accountant of this House be authorized to refund the fees paid on the said Bill, less the cost of printing and translation; which was agreed to.

Mr. Borden (King's) presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 14th March, 1898, for copies of all correspondence between the Mayor and Corporation of Gananoque, or any other person, with the Government in reference to the removal of the drill shed at Gananoque. Also, all correspondence in reference to the sale or purchase of a new site. Also, all offers made by the President of the Agricultural Society of Gananoque, or any other person, offering to rent or sell a suitable building in which to store the arms and clothing; and also, all other correspondence with the Government dealing with this question.

Mr. Flint introduced a Bill No. 134, an Act further to amend the Criminal Code, 1892, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow.

The Bill No. 114, an Act further to amend the Act respecting the Department of the Geological Survey, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Bill No. 72, an Act to amend the Adulteration Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time, and passed.

The Bill (G) No. 111, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act for better securing the safety of certain Fishermen," was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, and ordered for a third reading at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Fielding moved, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.

And a Debate arising thereon;

And the said amendment being read a second time,

Mr. Bostock moved, That the said amendment be disagreed to, for the reason that it merely allows an amalgamation with a portion of a road owned by a company with which it is proposed to amalgamate, and is therefore inconsistent with the object of the proposed amalgamation between the two companies, and is moreover repugnant to the object of the Bill; which was agreed to.

On motion of Mr. Bostock, it was Resolved, That a Message be sent to the Senate to inform their Honours that this House has disagreed to their amendment to the said Bill, for the reason above set forth.

Sir Richard Cartwright—On Friday next—The following Resolution:—That the supplemental contract between Her Majesty the Queen and Messrs. Petersen, Tate & Co., dated the twenty-third day of April, 1898, respecting the Fast Atlantic Mail Service, modifying, explaining and defining certain of the provisions of the contract, (of date the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven,) be approved by the House of Commons, which said supplemental contract is as follows:—

This Agreement, made this 13th day of April, 1898, between Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria, herein represented by the Honourable Richard Reid Dobell, one of Her Majesty's Ministers for the Dominion of Canada, of the one part, and William Petersen, of Newcastle-on-Tyne, in the County of Northumberland, England, and Arthur Tate, of same place, trading together under the name and style of "Petersen, Tate & Co.," ship-owners (hereinafter called "the contractors,") of the other part.

Whereas this Agreement is to be read, construed and take effect as supplemental to an agreement (hereinafter described as the Principal Agreement), dated the 24th March, 1897, and made between Her Majesty and the contractors, being an agreement for the establishment of a fast steamship service between Canada and the United Kingdom.

And whereas the contractors contend that by reason of the strike in the engineering trade they are entitled to an extension of time allowed by the principal agreement for the commencement of the service.

And whereas the Government of Canada, while not admitting the contractors' contention, are willing to allow an extension of time on the terms and subject to the conditions hereinafter mentioned, and are otherwise willing to modify or explain the principal agreement in manner hereinafter expressed.

And whereas the said Richard Reid Dobell has represented to the contractors that he has authority to bind the Canadian Government and the Minister by this agreement.

Now this agreement witnesseth that the contractors, for and in consideration of the premises and of the covenants and agreements on the part of Her Majesty hereinafter contained, for themselves, their executors, administrators and assigns, do hereby warrant, promise and agree with Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors; and Her Majesty for herself, Her heirs and successors, hereby covenants to and with the contractors, their executors, administrators and assigns in manner following; that is to say:—

1. The time for commencement of the service shall be extended to the first day of May, 1900, and the contractors agree that on that day all four steamers mentioned in the principal agreement shall be ready and complete in all respects to commence the service, and that from that day the service shall be a weekly service respectively from and to Great Britain and Canada.

2. The Minister hereby approves Wednesday as the day of sailing from the port of departure in Great Britain, and Saturday as the day of sailing from the port of departure in Canada, subject, nevertheless to the right to change the day of sailing (but only by agreement with the contractors or the company) or to delay the sailing of a steamer

as given by the principal agreement.

3. The Minister hereby approves the changes and modifications in the plans (figures and specifications) incorporated with the principal agreement which are shown in the modified plans (figures and specifications) which were submitted to the Minister during the month of February, 1898, and such modified plans (figures and specifications) are incorporated with and to be read and treated as part of this agreement, provided that the vessels are to be built under the supervision of the Admiralty, and in conformity with the requirements of Her Majesty's Imperial Government respecting armed cruisers and also of the British Board of Trade.

4. A permanent mail room of 2,000 cubic feet capacity shall be erected on each steamer (in position shown on the said modified plans, or as may be approved by the Minister) and the contractors or the company undertake to find proper storage for any extra mail matter, as required under the principal agreement, such as is the practice in

the existing Atlantic Mail Services.

5. The draught of water of the steamers, when fully equipped, loaded, and ready for sea, may exceed 25 ft. 6 in., if and so far as the steamers may safely and without infringing other conditions of this and the principal agreement be loaded deeper.

- 6. Section (a) of clause 2 of the principal agreement shall be read and construed as if the following words and figures, namely, "an average speed of 500 knots per 24 hours" were substituted therein for the words and figures, "a speed of 500 knots in every 24 hours." Clause 18 of the principal agreement shall be read and construed as if after the words "500 knots per 24 hours" were inserted the words "in ordinary weather."
- 7. This agreement and the principal agreement shall be read and construed as if they were one instrument and in this agreement and the principal agreement "The Minister" means Her Majesty's Minister of Trade and Commerce for the Dominion of Canada for the time being.
- 8. Provided terms and conditions satisfactory to the contractors or the company with respect to calling at an Irish port and with respect to the compensation for the additional obligations imposed in consequence of the stoppages at such port and as to all other matters connected with such calling shall be agreed upon between the company and the Minister, the steamers shall, if required by the Minister, call at an Irish port to be hereafter agreed upon between the contractors or the company and the Minister.

9. The contractors covenant that on or before the 30th day of May next:

(a.) The company contemplated by the principal agreement and having a capital in shares and debentures, or either of them, of not less than £1,250,000 sterling shall have been incorporated and its capital responsibly subscribed;

(b.) Proper contracts shall have been made by the contractors or the company

with responsible ship-builders for the construction of the four steamers; and

(c.) Two of the steamers shall be substantially under construction. If the contractors shall have failed to perform this covenant or any part of it then this agreement shall determine and the principal agreement shall remain in force as if this agreement had not been made.

10. This agreement shall not be binding upon either party unless Her Majesty's Imperial Government consent to contribute the proportion of £51,500 sterling of the subsidy under the terms of the principal agreement as altered by this agreement, and

such assent is notified to the contractors by the Minister.

11. This agreement shall not be binding upon Her Majesty unless within a week of the date hereof the contractors give to the Minister a guarantee in a form to be approved by him for the sum of ten thousand pounds sterling from the North Eastern Banking Company, Limited, who furnished the guarantee under the principal agreement by which the said Banking Company shall bind themselves to secure the performance of the principal agreement as modified by this agreement, and so soon as this

agreement becomes binding upon both parties hereto the guaranters shall be released from their guarantee under the principal agreement and this guarantee substituted therefor, and this guarantee together with the deposit under the principal agreement shall be held as security for the performance of the principal agreement as modified by this agreement.

12. If this agreement does not become binding under clause 10 and 11 it shall be absolutely void and of no effect and the principal agreement and all rights thereunder and the guarantee given under the principal agreement shall remain in force as if this

agreement had not been made.

13. For all the purposes of this agreement time shall be deemed to be of the essence of the contract.

Macpherson, M.P., and others, of the City of Hamilton, Ontario; praying to be permitted to lay before the House a Petition for the passing of an Act to amend the Act of Incorporation of the International Radial Railway Company, notwithstanding the expiration of the time for presenting Petitions for Private Bills, was read and received.

Mr. Scriver, from the Select Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, presented the Sixth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee have considered the following Bill, and have agreed to report the

same with amendments, viz. :-

Bill No. 101, an Act respecting the Harbour of the City of Saint John, in the Province of New Brunswick.

Mr. Sutherland, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Eleventh Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Mr. Richardson—In Committee of the Whole or on the third reading of Bill No. 19, "An Act to regulate the transit of grain in Manitoba and the North-west Territories," —The following be substituted for clause one of said Bill:—

1. Every railway company engaged in the carriage of grain in the Province of Manitoba and the North-west Territories shall at every station on its railway from which grain is shipped, either provide at its own expense adequate facilities for the receiving and shipping grain at such station or grant to any person who demands it in writing the privilege of erecting, maintaining and using on its station grounds, not required for railway purposes, adjoining the main track, siding or spur at such station, an elevator or flat warehouse for the purpose of storing and shipping grain by the said railway, but the said elevator or flat warehouse shall not be used for any other purpose.

That the following clauses be inserted in the Bill after clause one:-

2. The right or license so granted by the railway company shall continue so long as the warehouse or elevator is used for the purposes mentioned in this Act but not exceeding the period of twenty-one years. Provided that if the company require the land on which the elevator or warehouse is erected for railway purposes prior to the expiration of the said period of twenty-one years, the company may, on giving to the owner thereof twelve months notice in writing, determine the license on payment of the value of the elevator or warehouse erected on the station ground, which value in case of dispute shall be ascertained by arbitration and the provisions of "The Consolidated Railway Act" as to arbitration respecting the value of lands taken thereunder shall so far as the same are applicable apply thereto.

3. In the event of the company notifying the person who has made the demand in the preceding section provided for of its inability to erect or to permit the erection of an elevator or warehouse on the station grounds owing to their being required for railway purposes, it shall be the duty of the company on the request of the person so applying forthwith to build and thereafter to maintain a side track or spur from said station grounds to any land or premises near thereto where such person has built or acquired or is building a flat warehouse or elevator for the receiving and shipping grain

by such railway. Provided always that should the said elevator or warehouse be at a greater distance from the said station grounds than three hundred yards that the additional cost of building and maintaining the said track or spur shall be borne and paid by the person applying for the said privilege or by the owner of such elevator or warehouse.

4. The company shall on reasonable demand on that behalf supply cars for the purpose of carrying the grain received or stored in the said elevators or warehouses, and it shall be lawful for the company to add to its charges for carrying such grain any

sum chargeable for demurrage under the provisions hereof.

5. Every railway company to whom this Act applies shall on reasonable notice on that behalf provide and furnish a car or curs for receiving and shipping grain at and from any station on its line of railway, and such company shall permit any person shipping such grain who desires to do so to load the same direct from his vehicle into the car or over a portable platform erected by him at his own expense.

6, In the event of the cars not being loaded within a reasonable time, customary

demurrage charges may be exacted from the shippers by the company.

7. The tolls or rates to be charged by the railway company for facilities of receiving and shipping the said grain or by any person who, under the provisions of this Act is possessed of a warehouse or elevator on the station grounds of the company or on the grounds to which the company have built a side track or spur, as provided for herein, shall not exceed the following sums:—

(a.) For receiving, storing and shipping grain, 1 cent per bushel.

(b.) For cleaning the same in addition if required by the shipper, $\frac{1}{2}$ cent per bushel.

(c.) For storing beyond twenty days, if stored at the request of the shippers, \frac{1}{2} cent per bushel, and so for each additional thirty days thereafter.

8. The provisions of this Act shall apply to every elevator or warehouse now situate on the station grounds or property of the railway company mentioned in the first

section hereof and to which this Act applies.

9. Nothing herein contained shall interfere with the duties and obligations of the railway company as common carriers at common law and under the provisions of "The Consolidated Railway Act," and that clauses 2, 3 and 4 of said Bill be made clauses 10, 11 and 12.

And also, that the Senate hath agreed to the amendments made by the House of Commons to the Bill (G) No. 111, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act for better securing the safety of certain Fishermen," without any amendment.

On motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Order of the Day for consideration of Bill No. 4, an Act further to secure the safety of Railway employees and passengers, as amended in Committee of the Whole, was discharged, and the Bill recommitted to a Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments.

And the question being proposed on the consideration of the Bill as amended;

Mr. Casey moved in amendment, that the Bill be not now considered as amended, but that it be recommitted to a Committee of the Whole with instructions to add the following section as section 7:—

7. Every employee of a railway company injured while in the discharge of his duty shall, for every day during which he is thereby unfitted for duty, be entitled to compensation from the railway company at the rate of not less than sixty per cent of the current rate of wages for men similarly employed by the company, at the time the injury occurs, to be paid for not more than fifty-two weeks.

2. Every such employee permanently disabled while in the discharge of his duty, shall be entitled to compensation from the railway company to the amount of not less

than four years' wages at the rate thereof at the time of the accident.

3. The family or dependents of every employee who is killed, or who dies from injuries received, while in the discharge of his duty, within six months after such injury, shall be entitled to compensation from the railway company to the amount of four years' wages at the rate thereof at the time of the accident, but not exceeding in all three thousand dollars.

4. If any employee, or the representatives of any employee, accept the compensation provided by this Act, he or they shall have no further claim at law against the

company.

5. The rights under the foregoing provisions shall not be capable of being renounced or given up by such employee by any agreement or contract with the railway company, for value or otherwise, and the said provisions shall not be made void by any rules or regulations of the railway.

6. The certificate of two duly qualified disinterested physicians shall be sufficient to prove permanent disability; and the certificate of the attending physician shall be sufficient to prove unfitness for duty, for a period not exceeding ten weeks, after which time

a monthly certificate of a physician named by the company shall be sufficient.

7. The foregoing provisions as to compensation shall be void in the case of any employee whose injury, disablement or death is caused by his own negligence,—the burden of proof of such negligence being upon the railway company; but if such injury, disablement or death occurs by reason of the handling or use of trains, locomotives, cars or appliances which are out of repair, or insufficient, or not in accordance with the provisions of this Act, the railway company shall not be allowed to plead contributory negligence on the part of the employee so injured, disabled or killed.

8. In any suit for damages by an employee against a railway company, the act, default or negligence of any fellow employee shall not be pleaded or given in evidence

on behalf of the company as a defence to such suit.

And the question being put on the amendment; it was negatived on the following division:—

PRAYERS.

Mr. Landerkin, from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Eighteenth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :-

Your Committee have examined the Petition of the International Radial Railway Company, for an Act to amend their charter, and find the Notices given thereon sufficient.

Your Committee have also considered the Petition of the Anglo-French Telegraph Company, Limited, for an Act of Incorporation, and find that Notices have only been published for one week, but as the necessity for the application has only just arisen, and as the company are willing, if considered advisable, to put up a deposit, to be forfeited if they do not carry out the purpose for which they are to be incorporated within a reasonable time, your Committee recommend that the 51st Rule be suspended in reference to this Petition.

As the time for presenting Private Bills has expired, your Committee also recommend that that portion of the 49th Rule which limits the time for presenting Private Bills be also suspended in reference to both the foregoing Petitions.

Mr. Bain, from the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization,

presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

The Committee have had under consideration Bill 83, intituled: "An Act to prohibit improper speculation in the sale of Butter and Cheese," and recommend that no further legislative action be taken on the said Bill, in the current Session of Parliament, but with a view to obtaining fuller information than at present available, that circulars enclosing copies of the Bill be issued under the authority of the Committee, and sent to Boards of Trade, Dairy Associations, Dealers in dairy products, Salesmen and Managers of Cheese Factories and Creameries throughout the Dominion, asking their opinion as to the probable effects upon the Dairy industry, if the provisions of the said Bill were passed into law.

Mr. Gibson, from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :-

The Committee carefully examined the following document and recommend that

it be printed, viz. :-

69. Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of the 18th April, 1898, for copies of all correspondence, reports, Orders in Council and papers relating to the giving the work of printing the Klondike Official Guide to Mr. Daniel Rose of Toronto.

The Committee would also recommend that the following documents be not printed,

viz. :--

Mr. Landerkin moved, That in accordance with the recommendation contained in the Eighteenth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, the 51st Rule of this House be suspended in reference to the Petition of the Anglo-French Telegraph Company, Limited; praying for an Act of Incorporation, and that that portion of the 49th Rule which limits the time for presenting Private Bills be also suspended as regards the foregoing Bill, and that of the International Radial Railway Company; which was agreed to.

Mr. Macpherson introduced a Bill No. 137, an Act to revive and amend the Acts respecting the International Radial Railway Company, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow.

Sir Richard Cartwright moved, That it be Resolved, That the supplemental contract between Her Majesty the Queen and Messrs. Petersen, Tate & Co., dated the twenty-third day of April, 1898, respecting the Fast Atlantic Mail Service, modifying, explaining and defining certain of the provisions of the contract, (of date the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven,) be approved by the House of Commons, which said supplemental contract is as follows:—

This Agreement, made this 13th day of April, 1898, between Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria, herein represented by the Honourable Richard Reid Dobell, one of Her Majesty's Ministers for the Dominion of Canada, of the one part, and William Petersen, of Newcastle-on-Tyne, in the County of Northumberland, England, and Arthur Tate, of same place, trading together under the name and style of "Petersen, Tate & Co.," ship-owners (hereinafter called "the contractors,") of the other part.

Whereas this Agreement is to be read, construed and take effect as supplemental to an agreement (hereinafter described as the Principal Agreement), dated the 24th March, 1897, and made between Her Majesty and the contractors, being an agreement for the establishment of a fast steamship service between Canada and the United Kingdom.

And whereas the contractors contend that by reason of the strike in the engineering trade they are entitled to an extension of time allowed by the principal agreement for the commencement of the service.

And whereas the Government of Canada, while not admitting the contractors' contention, are willing to allow an extension of time on the terms and subject to the conditions hereinafter mentioned, and are otherwise willing to modify or explain the principal agreement in manner hereinafter expressed.

And whereas the said Richard Reid Dobell has represented to the contractors that he has authority to bind the Canadian Government and the Minister by this agreement.

Now this agreement witnesseth that the contractors, for and in consideration of the premises and of the covenants and agreements on the part of Her Majesty hereinafter contained, for themselves, their executors, administrators and assigns, do hereby warrant, promise and agree with Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors; and Her Majesty for herself, Her heirs and successors, hereby covenants to and with the contractors, their executors, administrators and assigns in manner following; that is to say:—

1. The time for commencement of the service shall be extended to the first day of May, 1900, and the contractors agree that on that day all four steamers mentioned in the principal agreement shall be ready and complete in all respects to commence the service, and that from that day the service shall be a weekly service respectively from

and to Great Britain and Canada.

2. The Minister hereby approves Wednesday as the day of sailing from the port of departure in Great Britain, and Saturday as the day of sailing from the port of departure in Canada, subject, nevertheless to the right to change the day of sailing (but only by agreement with the contractors or the company) or to delay the sailing of a steamer

as given by the principal agreement.

3. The Minister hereby approves the changes and modifications in the plans (figures and specifications) incorporated with the principal agreement which are shown in the modified plans (figures and specifications) which were submitted to the Minister during the month of February, 1898, and such modified plans (figures and specifications) are incorporated with and to be read and treated as part of this agreement, provided that the vessels are to be built under the supervision of the Admiralty, and in conformity with the requirements of Her Majesty's Imperial Government respecting armed cruisers and also of the British Board of Trade.

4. A permanent mail room of 2,000 cubic feet capacity shall be erected on each steamer (in position shown on the said modified plans, or as may be approved by the Minister) and the contractors or the company undertake to find proper storage for any extra mail matter, as required under the principal agreement, such as is the practice in

the existing Atlantic Mail Services.

5. The draught of water of the steamers, when fully equipped, loaded, and ready for sea, may exceed 25 ft. 6 in., if and so far as the steamers may safely and without

infringing other conditions of this and the principal agreement be loaded deeper.

6. Section (a) of clause 2 of the principal agreement shall be read and construed as if the following words and figures, namely, "an average speed of 500 knots per 24 hours" were substituted therein for the words and figures, "a speed of 500 knots in every 24 hours." Clause 18 of the principal agreement shall be read and construed as if after the words "500 knots per 24 hours" were inserted the words "in ordinary weather."

7. This agreement and the principal agreement shall be read and construed as if they were one instrument and in this agreement and the principal agreement "The Minister" means Her Majesty's Minister of Trade and Commerce for the Dominion of

Canada for the time being.

8. Provided terms and conditions satisfactory to the contractors or the company with respect to calling at an Irish port and with respect to the compensation for the additional obligations imposed in consequence of the stoppages at such port and as to all other matters connected with such calling shall be agreed upon between the company and the Minister, the steamers shall, if required by the Minister, call at an Irish port to be hereafter agreed upon between the contractors or the company and the Minister.

9. The contractors covenant that on or before the 30th day of May next:

(a.) The company contemplated by the principal agreement and having a capital in shares and debentures, or either of them, of not less than £1,250,000 sterling shall have been incorporated and its capital responsibly subscribed;

(b.) Proper contracts shall have been made by the contractors or the company

with responsible ship-builders for the construction of the four steamers; and

(c.) Two of the steamers shall be substantially under construction. If the contractors shall have failed to perform this covenant or any part of it then this agreement shall determine and the principal agreement shall remain in force as if this agreement had not been made.

10. This agreement shall not be binding upon either party unless Her Majesty's Imperial Government consent to contribute the proportion of £51,500 sterling of the subsidy under the terms of the principal agreement as altered by this agreement, and

such assent is notified to the contractors by the Minister.

11. This agreement shall not be binding upon Her Majesty unless within a week of the date hereof the contractors give to the Minister a guarantee in a form to be approved by him for the sum of ten thousand pounds sterling from the North Eastern Banking Company, Limited, who furnished the guarantee under the principal agreement by which the said Banking Company shall bind themselves to secure the performance of the principal agreement as modified by this agreement, and so soon as this

agreement becomes binding upon both parties hereto the guaranters shall be released from their guarantee under the principal agreement and this guarantee substituted therefor, and this guarantee together with the deposit under the principal agreement shall be held as security for the performance of the principal agreement as modified by this agreement.

12. If this agreement does not become binding under clause 10 and 11 it shall be absolutely void and of no effect and the principal agreement and all rights thereunder and the guarantee given under the principal agreement shall remain in force as if this

agreement had not been made.

13. For all the purposes of this agreement time shall be deemed to be of the essence of the contract.

Mr. Sutherland, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Twelfth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee have had under consideration the following Bills, and have agreed to report the same with amendments, viz.:—

Bill No. 104, an Act respecting the Montreal, Ottawa and Georgian Bay Canal Company.

That to each of the judges of the Court of Queen's Bench in the Province of Quebec, for attending the said court for a part only of a term, or for the purpose of disposing of cases already heard, or for attending for the performance of any other judicial duty, or attending at Montreal or Quebec at the written request of the chief justice or judge perorming the duties of chief justice for the purpose of conference and délibéré as to appeals heard, there shall be paid, for travelling allowances, \$6 for each day's absence from his place of residence, provided that three days' absence at least shall always be allowed.

That to each of the judges of the Superior or Circuit Courts attending as such, at the request in writing of the chief justice or judge discharging the duties of chief justice in the district, any court held at any other place than that at which he is directed to reside, for each day he is absent from the said place of residence, there shall be paid, for travelling allowances, six dollars; but no travelling allowance shall be granted to any

judge requested to sit in review under the first section of the Act of the Legislature of Quebec, 61 Victoria, chapter 20, unless it is certified by the chief justice or judge discharging the duties of chief justice in the district that the attendance of such judge was necessary by reason of illness, incapacity or absence of one of the judges resident at Montreal or Quebec, as the case may be.

14. The Railway Act, except such sections as authorize the construction of branch lines and such sections as are inconsistent either with this Act or with the objects of the Company and of its undertaking, shall apply to the Company and its undertaking.

2. Wherever in the Railway Act the word "company" occurs, it shall mean the

Company hereby incorporated.

3. Wherever in the Railway Act the word "railway" occurs it shall, unless the context otherwise requires, in so far as it applies to the provisions of this Act, or the

Company hereby incorporated, mean the tramways or other works authorized by this

Act to be constructed.

Page 3, line 43.—After "Act" insert the following: "or in case the consent of the Governor in Council for the construction of a railway or tramway to run on either side of Miles Cañon and White Horse Rapids is obtained by the Company, under subsection 2 of section 4, if such last mentioned railway or tramway is not commenced within one year and finished and put into operation within two years from the date of such consent."

And also,—with the following Bill of their own, to which the concurrence of this House was desired, viz.:—

Bill (N) No. 143, intituled: "An Act to amend the Canada Evidence Act, 1893."

Mr. Sutherland, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Thirteenth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Bill No. 81, an Act respecting the Montreal and Southern Counties Railway Company;—and

Bill No. 97, an Act to incorporate the North Shore Electric Railway Company.

Mr. Mulock presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 3rd May, 1897, for copies of all letters, papers and correspondence relating to the closing in March last of the post office at Oak Bay Mills, Quebec.

Mr. Blair presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 14th March, 1898, for copies of all papers, reports and correspondence referring to or connected with the dismissal of D. Bain, Esq., station agent at Port Mulgrave, Intercolonial Railway.

of amending the same, as follows :-

"Notwithstanding anything in this Act, or in any Act heretofore enacted, or hereafter to be enacted by the legislature of any province, there shall be in the provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Manitoba, for the purposes of revising and amending the voters' list to be used in the election of members for the House of Commons an appeal from said lists as prepared by the registration clerks and revisors to the respective judges of the county courts in each of the said provinces for the different counties in which the polling divisions for which such voters' lists have been prepared are respec-

tively situate.

dated the 10th day of December, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, and executed by the said company under the provisions of and in accordance with the said statute, shall continue and remain in full force and effect during the said extended period, and on the further condition that the Government may, if it should be found advisable, take possession of the bridge, railway and appurtenances, at any time within five years from the date of the beginning of such extended period, on payment of the difference of the amounts then due to the Government for advances and interest and the sum of the total amount expended by the company as the cost of the said bridge, railway and works and ten per centum on such amount; the company to execute, to the satisfaction of the Minister of Justice, any deeds, mortgages or instruments necessary for the proper carrying into effect of the foregoing.

Whereupon Mr. Fielding informed the House, that His Excellency the Governor General having been informed of the subject-matter of the said proposed Resolution, recommends it to the House.

Ordered, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, to-morrow, to consider the said Resolution.

Sir Richard Cartwright presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of the 14th February, 1898, for copies of all correspondence, calls for tenders, tenders received, reports and Orders in Council, contracts entered into and all related papers in respect to the Winter Steamship Service from St. John and Halifax to Great Britain since 1st July, 1897.

The Committee appointed to prepare a Resolution of condolence on the death of the Right Honourable W. E. Gladstone beg leave to submit the following Resolution to the House:—

Resolved, That the House of Commons of Canada desire to record their profound sense of the loss the Empire has sustained in the death of the Right Honourable William Ewart Gladstone.

For a period of more than half a century, Mr. Gladstone has been one of the most

conspicuous figures in the Parliament of Great Britain.

Four times Premier of the United Kingdom, his tenure of office was distinguished by the inauguration of sound fiscal and political reforms of the greatest and most farreaching character, and he passes away, full of years and honours, among a nation's tears, the most illustrious man of his generation.

The people of the entire Empire are his mourners and the House of Commons of Canada lays reverently on his bier this tribute in testimony of the respect and affection

with which they regard the great statesman who has departed.

On motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, seconded by Sir Charles Tupper, the said Report was adopted.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier moved, That the Resolution of condolence on the death of the Right Honourable William Ewart Gladstone be communicated to Mrs. Gladstone on behalf of this House by Mr. Speaker; which was agreed to.

That on and after July 1st, 1898, the salaries of the judges and junior judges of the County Courts of Ontario, other than the judge of the County Court of the County of York, shall be each \$2,000 per annum during the first three years of service, and after three years of service each \$2,400 per annum.

That on and after the said date the salary of the judge of the County Court of the

County of Halifax shall be \$3,000 per annum.

That on and after the said dete, in Prince Edward Island, the salary of the judge of the County Court of Queen's County shall be \$3,000 per annum, and the salaries of two other county court judges each \$2,000 per annum during the first three years of

service, and after three years of service each \$2,400 per annum.

That to each of the judges of the Court of Queen's Bench in the Province of Quebec, for attending the said court for a part only of a term, or for the purpose of disposing of cases already heard, or for attending for the performance of any other judicial duty, or attending at Montreal or Quebec at the written request of the chief justice or judge performing the duties of chief justice for the purpose of conference and delibéré as to appeals heard, there shall be paid, for travelling allowances, \$6 for each day's absence from his place of residence, provided that three days' absence at least shall always be allowed.

That to each of the judges of the Superior or Circuit Courts attending as such, at the request in writing of the chief justice or judge discharging the duties of chief justice in the district, any court held at any other place than that at which he is directed to reside, for each day he is absent from the said place of residence, there shall be paid, for travelling allowances, six dollars; but no travelling allowance shall be granted to any judge requested to sit in review under the first section of the Act of the Legislature of Quebec, 61 Victoria, chapter 20, unless it is certified by the chief justice or judge discharging the duties of chief justice in the district that the attendance of such judge was necessary by reason of illness, incapacity or absence of one of the judges resident at Montreal or Quebec, as the case may be.

That to the judge of the Supreme Court of the Yukon Territory there shall be paid

such travelling allowances as the Governor in Council determines.

That to each judge of a District Court in the Province of Ontario there shall be paid, for travelling allowances, an annual sum of \$500.

Whenever such tramway company or person acting for it in that behalf fails to agree with the company building or having built the wagon road as to the value of any

lands or property so entered upon, taken or promised, as aforesaid the company or person acting for it may tender the reasonable value in the estimation of the company or person so acting with a notice that if the same is not accepted the question will be submitted to the Governor in Council.

The compensation money agreed upon or awarded by the Governor in Council for any land or property acquired or taken by the company shall stand in the stead of such land or property; and any claim or encumbrance upon such land or property shall as respects the company so taking the land or property be converted into a claim to such compensation money or to a proportionate amount thereof and shall be void as respects the land or property which shall by the fact of the taking possession thereof become and be absolutely vested in the said company, subject always to the determination of the compensation to be paid and to the payment thereof when such conveyance, agreement or award has been made.

The remaining amendments being read the second time, were severally agreed to.

On motion of Mr. Blair, a Message was sent to the Senate to acquaint their Honours that this House hath agreed to their amendments to the foregoing Bill, with a consequential amendment, to which their concurrence was desired.

The amendments made by the Senate to the Bill No. 77, an Act to incorporate the Toronto and Hudson Bay Railway Company, were taken into consideration, and severally agreed to.

A Message was received from the Senate, agreeing to the Bill No. 94, an Act to authorize the Canada Eastern Railway Company to convey its railway to the Alexander Gibson Railway and Manufacturing Company, with amendments, which are as follows:—

Page 1, line 18.—Leave out from "property" to "provided" in line 20, and insert "and thereupon the Company may take and operate the said railway, and may hold the said property, and exercise the said rights, franchises, powers and privileges, with all the rights and powers in respect thereof mentioned in the said Act, and subject to all the restrictions, obligations, charges and liabilities mentioned in the said Act."

Page 1, line 25.—After "purpose" insert "of which meeting two weeks notice shall be sufficient."

PRAYERS.

The Petition of Annabella Hubert, of Arichat, County of Richmond, Nova Scotia; complaining of harsh and unjust treatment received by her in regard to certain property rights in the aforesaid place, and praying the House to cause an investigation into her case in the premises, was read and received.

Mr. Lister, from the Special Committee appointed to inquire into the expenditure of the subsidies granted in aid of the Drummond County Railway, etc., presented the Second Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

TUESDAY, May 31st, 1898.

The Special Committee appointed under an Order of Reference made on the 15th day of February last, past, to inquire into the expenditure of subsidies granted in aid of the Drummond County Railway, and into all negotiations and transactions between the Government of Canada or any member or officer thereof, or any person in its behalf and the Drummond County Railway Company or any director, officer or person in the company's behalf, relating to the acquiring of the said railway by the Government, beg leave to present the following as their second and final

Your Committee have made the inquiry directed by the said Order of Reference; that in so doing the testimony of sixteen witnesses has been taken and a large number of documents have been received and examined. That no evidence whatever was given or offered which affected in the least degree the honour or integrity of any member of the Government in connection with the acquiring of the said railway from the said company. At the close of the evidence Mr. Haggart and Mr. Powell (the two Conservative members of the committee present at the said sitting) in answer to the chairman stated respectively as follows:-Mr. Haggart, "We never made any charges of corruption." Mr. Powell, "Candidly, I never heard anything in the House about corruption" (see page 158 of the evidence). That as far back as 1894, Mr. Haggart, late Minister of Railways, on account of the difficulties in making connection with the Grand Trunk Railway, and trouble with the Canadian Pacific Company, thought it would be in the interest of the country, that the Intercolonial Railway should be extended into the city of Montreal. (See page 150 of the evidence).

From the evidence given and statements made by Conservative members of the committee, it is clear that there is no difference of opinion as to the wisdom of the policy of the Government in extending the Intercolonial into Montreal. The only

difference between parties being the price to be paid for such extension.

The Drummon I County Railway, as it exists, consists of a completed line from Ste. Rosalie to Chaadière, a distance of one hundred and fifteen and one-half miles, and the branch known as the "Nicolet Branch," extending from St. Leonard to Nicolet on Lake St. Peter, a distance of seventeen miles, making a total mileage of

one hundred and thirty-two and one-half miles.

That in order to connect the Intercolonial with the city of Montreal, it was necessary that the said road should be extended from Moose Park Station to Chaudière Junction, a distance of about forty-two and one half-miles. That has been done by the owners of the road and the road now has a total mileage, including the Nicolet branch, of one hundred and thirty-two and one-half miles, as before stated, and has actually cost in its construction upwards of two million one hundred thousand dol-

(See evidence of S. Newton, p. 46.)

In the year 1894 negotiations of an informal character were begun with the then Minister of Railways with a view to the sale by the Company to the Government, of the road, the expectation of the owners being that they would receive two million five hundred thousand dollars cash, or one hundred thousand dollars a year rental; and under instructions of the said Minister a valuation of the road on the basis of its extension to Chaudière Junction was made by Mr. Schreiber, Deputy Minister of Railways, who estimated the value of the same at \$1,535,500, but it must not be overlooked that this valuation was made on the reports of others and not on the personal knowledge of Mr. Schreiber, who admitted that he had never seen the road. It should also be remembered that this valuation was based upon the assumption that the forty-two and one-half miles to be completed, would be of the same description as the then finished portion of the road, whereas in fact it is now of a standard equal to if not higher than the Intercolonial.

To your Committee it seems almost incredible that a great railway such as the Intercolonial which has cost Canada between \$40,000 and \$50,000 per mile and on the whole over \$55,000,000, should for so long a time have had its terminus at Levis, instead of a great commercial city such as Montreal, where it would be in a position to compete upon equal terms or nearly so, with the other great railways of the Dominion, and in all probability thereby cease to be such a heavy burden upon the taxpayers of Canada, and in the opinion of your Committee no action on the part of the government could be more likely to make it self-sustaining than this extension, and it seems reasonably clear, from the evidence, that this was the

opinion of the late government.

The Drummond County Railway is the most direct, cheapest and best route by

which to bring the Intercolonial Railway into the city of Montreal.

The said Railway Company have received as subsidies from the Government of Canada the sum of \$287,936, all of which appears to have been expended on construction.

That portion of the new road between Moose Park Station and Chaudière is constructed up to, and in some respects superior to the standard of the Intercolonial which is admittedly a very high standard. The rails on such new portion being seventy pounds to the yard as against fifty-six and sixty-seven pounds on the Intercolonial.

Evidence has been given by Mr. Wainwright that other railways in the Province of Quebec, no better than the Drummond County Railway, have cost from \$17,000 to \$19,000 per mile. Taking the lower figure, namely, \$17,000 per mile, the Drummond County Railway would cost for the construction of its one hundred and thirtytwo and one-half miles the sum of \$2,252,500, a little more than it has been sworn

the road actually cost.

That prior to the fifteenth day of May, 1897, the Minister of Railways appreciating the urgent necessity in the interests of the country of extending the Intercolonial to a business centre opened negotiations with the said Drummond Railway Company, with a view of acquiring control of their road for the purpose of such extension, and an agreement was entered into between the Company and Her Majesty, whereby the Company agreed to lease the said road to be completed as in said agreement specified, for a term of ninety-nine years, at a net annual rental of sixty-four thousand dollars, being four per cent on \$1,600,000, at the expiration of which time the said railway was to become the absolute property of Canada; this result would require the Company to apply a sufficient portion of its accruing rental to the creation of a sinking fund, which would ultimately amount to enough to extinguish the principal money. No doubt if the Company could have borrowed the \$1,600,000 at an equally low rate as the Government, viz., a fraction over three per cent (which was the best Government rate up to that date), the annual rental would have produced more than enough to repay the \$1,600,000, but even with a straight Government guarantee of the Company's bonds, the Company could not have made their loan at so low a rate as the Government.

In consequence of the first agreement not being ratified by Parliament on the 25th day of February, 1898, a further agreement, being in the nature of a temporary lease from year to year, was entered into between the Company and Her Majesty, but containing a stipulation that the Government should have the right or option to

purchase the whole property for the sum of \$1,600,000 cash.

The result of the investigation clearly shows that in the event of the purchase of the Drummond County Railway line being completed, the road will cost the country only about \$12,000 per mile,—a good deal less than its actual cost to the Company,—even if you add to the price to be paid under the existing option, the amount of subsidy received from the Federal Government, as the cost of construction, as sworn to,

is over \$2,100,000.

The estimate by the Government Chief Engineer, Mr. Schreiber, made when the question of acquiring this road was under consideration by the late Minister of Railways and Canals, and confirmed and verified by his estimate to the present Minister, of the probable cost of the road completed from Ste. Rosalie to Chaudière of the character and description of that portion of the Drummond County line then constructed was \$1,535,500. The price, therefore, to be paid under the option only exceeds the cost estimated by Mr. Schreiber by \$64,500, and this sum, in all probability, would be more than absorbed if we are to judge by the experience in the construction of Government works in the past, had the Government, instead of acquiring this road, undertaken to construct another of the same description and character. Moreover, it is to be observed that the road, as now finished by the Drummond County Railway Company, under the contract with the present Government, is of its last 43 miles, a very much better road than the other part of the road,—heavier rails—improved standard,—and must have cost more than enough to make up the difference between the estimated and the option price.

Information as to the present workings of the new road since the 1st of March have only been forthcoming for one month. These show that the earnings for that month are encouraging, and it is fair to assume that as the Intercolonial Railway extension to Montreal becomes established and business arrangements in connection therewith are completed there will be a material and satisfactory increase in the

earnings attributable to such extension.

It appears to your Committee that the arrangement between the Government and the Company is so manifestly in the public interest that such legislation as may be necessary to sanction the same should be passed at an early date.

On motion of Mr. Lister, it was Ordered, That the Second Report of the Special Committee appointed to inquire into the expenditure of the subsidies granted in aid of the Drummond County Railway, etc., and the evidence, etc., accompanying the same, be printed forthwith, and that Rule 94 be suspended in relation thereto.

The Resolution adopted in Committee of the Whole on Friday, the 27th May last, respecting the payment of the money advanced by the Dominion Government to the Saint John Bridge and Railway Extension Company, under and by virtue of Chapter 26 of the Statutes of 1883. was reported, read the second time, and agreed to.

Mr. Fielding then introduced a Bill No. 157, an Act respecting the repayment of the moneys advanced to "The Saint John Bridge and Railway Extension Company," which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House. The Bill No. 71, an Act further to amend the Weights and Measures Act, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time, and passed.

The Order of the Day being read for the House to go again into Committee of Supply;

Mr. Fielding moved, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.

And a Debate arising thereon,—the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Davin, adjourned.

The House then adjourned until Three o'clock, P.M.

Mr. Fitzpatrick moved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, at its

next sitting, to consider the following proposed Resolution:-

That it is expedient to ratify the award of the Honourable G. W. Burbidge in favour of the Dominion Atlantic Railway Company, and to authorize the payment to that company of the sum of one hundred thousand dollars for the commutation of its privilege with respect to the drawback of customs or import duties.

Whereupon Sir Wilfrid Laurier informed the House, that His Excellency the Governor General having been informed of the subject-matter of the said proposed Resolu-

tion, recommends it to the House.

Ordered, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, at its next sitting, to consider the said Resolution.

Mr. Fielding moved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, at

its next sitting, to consider the following proposed Resolutions:-

1. That it is expedient to provide that the sum of two hundred and eighty-four thousand four hundred and fifty-six dollars and forty-seven cents, being the cost of the erection and furnishing of the Legislative Buildings and Government House at Winnipeg, which sum was charged against the "Province of Manitoba Debt Account," may, on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight be credited to the said account, and that the interest payable to the said Province on the said first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, on the balance at the credit of the said Debt Account shall be calculated on the balance at the credit of the said account after the said sum of two hundred and eighty-four thousand four hundred and fifty-six dollars and forty-seven cents has been credited as above provided.

2. Mr. Fitzpatrick moved, That the Bill No. 150, an Act further to amend the Act respecting the Judges of Provincial Courts, be now read the second time.

Bill No. 115, respecting the British Yukon Mining, Trading and Transportation Company, and to change its name to the White Pass and Yukon Company; and have agreed to recommend that the said Bills be withdrawn, because it is inexpedient to proceed further with the same at the present time.

Your Committee also recommend that the fees paid on the last three mentioned

Bills be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation.

On motion of Mr. Sutherland, the Bill (F) No. 151, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to incorporate the Pacific and Yukon Railway, Navigation, Trading and Mining Company;" Bill No. 107, an Act to incorporate the Yukon Overland Transportation Company; Bill No. 108, an Act to incorporate the Alaska and North-Western Railway Company, and Bill No. 115, an Act respecting the British Yukon Mining, Trading and Transportation Company, and to change its name to the White Pass and Yukon Company, were severally withdrawn, and the fees paid on the three last mentioned Bills were ordered to be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation, in accordance with the recommendation contained in the Sixteenth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines.

Milton Barnes, set out on pages L-77 and 78 of the Report of the Auditor General for the year ended 30th June, 1897, and in connection therewith have examined witnesses under oath, and for the information of the House report herewith the evidence given by such witnesses and the exhibits fyled during the said examination, and your Committee recommend that the said evidence and exhibits be printed.

(For the evidence, exhibits, &c., accompanying this Report, see Appendix to Journals, No. 2d.)

Mr. Somerville, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, presented

the Ninth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :--

Your Committee have had under consideration an item of \$10,964.41 to Archibald & Howell, J. D. Cameron and W. E. Perdue for legal services and expenses in connection with prosecutions for election frauds in Manitoba (including \$4,000 transferred from Unforeseen Expenses), as set forth under the heading "Miscellaneous Justice-Northwest Territories," on page I-7 of the Report of the Auditor General for the year ended 30th June, 1897; and in connection therewith have examined witnesses under oath, and for the information of the House report herewith the evidence given by such witnesses and the exhibits fyled during the said examination, so that the inquiry may be dealt with and continued at the first available opportunity at the next Session of Parliament; and your Committee recommend that the said evidence and exhibits be printed.

(For the evidence, &c., accompanying this Report, see Appendix to Journals, No. 2e.)

Mr. Somerville, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, presented

the Tenth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :-

The Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts beg leave to present as their Tenth Report the report of their Sub-Committee, which they appointed to examine into all differences, including the Treasury Board over-rulings, shown by the Report of the Auditor General for the year ended 30th June, 1897, to have arisen between the Departments and the Audit Office.

REPORT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE.

"The Sub-Committee appointed on the 29th day of April last 'to examine all the differences, including the Treasury Board over-rulings, which the year's report shows to have arisen between the Departments and the Audit Office, with authority to report its findings and recommendations to the Public Accounts Committee,' beg to report:

"That owing to the late period of the Session at which this Sub-Committee was appointed and to the amount of business before your Committee and other Committees of the House upon which various members of this Committee were desirous of attending, it has been found impracticable to secure satisfactory meetings of the Sub-Committee, and there seems no prospect of your Sub-Committee being able in the time remaining before the close of the Session, to give proper attention to the important matters referred to them.

"Therefore, your Sub-Committee respectfully suggest that the matter be laid over to the next Session of Parliament, and recommend that at an early day in the ensuing Session of Parliament the subject be again taken up and a Sub-Committee appointed to consider it."

On motion of Mr. McMullen, it was Ordered, That the Eighth, Ninth and Tenth Reports of the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts and the evidence, etc., accompanying the same, be printed forthwith, and that Rule 94 be suspended in relation thereto.

Mr. Blair introduced a Bill No. 161, an Act respecting the payment of grants in aid of the construction of Public Works, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

On motion of Mr. Paterson, an Order of the House was issued to the proper officer for a Return showing all the changes that have been made in the officials and employees of the Customs Department in the County of Cape Breton since June, 1896, and giving copies of all letters, papers, petitions, telegrams, recommendations and correspondence relating to such changes.

Mr. Paterson presented,—Return to the foregoing Order.

Mr. Sifton presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of the 14th February, 1898, for copies of all correspondence, calls for tenders, tenders received, reports and Orders in Council, permits, licenses or leases, with the names of the parties receiving them and the conditions attached thereto, and generally all papers in connection with the disposal of timber berths or areas in the North-west Territories, including the Yukon, since 1st July, 1897.

Mr. Fitzpatrick laid before the House, by command of His Excellency the Governor General,—Report of the Minister of Justice as to Penitentiaries of Canada, for the year ended 30th June, 1897.

Mr. Fisher laid before the House, by command of His Excellency the Governor General,—Annual Report of the Department of Public Printing and Stationery, for the year ended 30th June, 1897.

Mr. Borden (King's) presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 18th April, 1898, for copies of all reports, correspondence, documents and papers in relation to a claim by one Amable Frigon, of Montreal, for an indemnity for an injury received by him at the military camp of Laprairie in September, 1891.

The House resumed the adjourned Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Fielding: That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair for the House to go into Committee of the Whole to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting an advance to the Harbour Commissioners of Montreal in addition to the amount authorized by Chapter 10 of the Statutes of 1896 (first session).

And the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

The House went accordingly into Committee to consider the proposed Resolution.

(In the Committee.)

The following Resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That it is expedient that the Governor in Council may advance to the Harbour Commissioners of Montreal, in addition to the amount authorized by chapter ten of the Statutes of 1896 (first session), to be advanced to the said commissioners, a further sum not exceeding two million dollars for the completion and construction of certain works in the harbour of Montreal, the said commissioners thereupon depositing with the Minister of Finance their debentures to an equal amount in par value to the advance so made by the Governor in Council, repayable within twenty-five years from the date of their issue and bearing interest at the rate of three per cent per annum, payable half-yearly.

Resolution to be reported.

Report to be received at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Mulock moved, That the Bill No. 76, an Act to provide for the abolition of the Civil Service Superannuation Act and for the retirement of members of the Civil Service, be now read the third time.

Mr. Bell (Pictou) moved in amendment thereto, That the Bill be not now read a third time, but that it be recommitted to a Committee of the Whole for the purpose of amending the same by inserting the word "five" instead of the word "four" in section five.

And the question being put on the amendment; it was negatived on a division.

And the question being put on the main motion; it was agreed to.

The said Bill was accordingly read the third time, and passed.

At Six o'clock, P.M., Mr. Speaker left the Chair, to resume the same at half-past Seven o'clock, P.M.

The Bill No. 99, an Act to incorporate the Lake Champlain and River St. Lawrence Ship Canal Company, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, and further progress having been made and reported,—the Committee obtained leave to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on Bill No. 118, an Act to incorporate the Dawson City Electric Lighting and Tramway Company.

The hour devoted to Private Bills under Rule 19 having expired, the House proceeded to Government Orders.

The Bill No. 146, an Act to amend and consolidate the North-west Irrigation Acts of 1894 and 1895, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Bill No. 152, an Act further to amend the Customs Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time, and passed.

A Message was received from the Senate, agreeing to the Bill No. 56, an Act respecting the Montreal and Province Line Railway Company, with an amendment, which is as follows:—

Page 1, line 21.—After "section" insert the following as Clause A:—

Clause A.

Section 11 of Chapter 26 of the Statutes of 1896 (first session) is hereby amended by inserting after the word "Company" in the third line thereof, the words "The United Counties Railway Company."

And also,—the Bill No. 97, an Act to incorporate the North Shore Electric Railway Company, with several amendments, which are as follows:—

Page 1, line 12.—After the second "the" insert "Three Rivers and."

Page 1, line 18.—After "operate" insert "by electricity."

Page 1, line 19.—After "from" insert "Shawenegan to."

Page 1, line 23.—Leave out the third "and."

Page 1, line 24.—After "Maisonneuve" insert "and St. Louis and the village of Verdun and the parishes of Longue Pointe and Pointe aux Trembles, except also through the parish of St. Paul l'Hermite."

Page 2, line 5.—Leave out "one hundred" and insert "two hundred and fifty."

Page 2, line 17.—Leave out "five."

Page 2, line 34.—After "Montreal" insert "Ottawa."

Page 3, line 34.—After "used" insert "with power to transmit the same."

Page 3, line 35.—Leave out paragraph (e).

Page 3, line 41.—After "use" insert the following as Clause A:—

Clause A.

With the consent of the municipal council or other authority having jurisdiction over any highway or public place, the company may enter thereon for the purpose of constructing and maintaining its lines, for the transmission of light, heat, power or electricity and, when deemed necessary by the company for such purpose, may erect, equip and maintain poles and other works and devices, and stretch wires and other contrivances thereon, and, as often as the company thinks proper, may break up and open any highway or public place, subject, however, to the following provisions:—

(a.) The company shall not interfere with the public right of travel, or in any way

obstruct the entrance to any door or gateway, or free access to any building.

(b.) The company shall not affix any wire less than twenty-two feet above the ground, nor, without the consent of the municipal council, erect more than one line of poles along any highway.

(c.) All poles shall be as nearly as possible straight and perpendicular, and shall, in

cities, be painted, if so required by any by-law of the council.

(d.) The company shall not be entitled to damages on account of its poles or wires being cut by direction of the officer in charge of the fire brigade at any fire, if, in the opinion of such officer, it is advisable that such poles or wires be cut.

(e.) The company shall not cut down or mutilate any shade, fruit or ornamental

-tree.

(f.) The opening up of streets for the erection of poles, or for carrying wires under ground, shall be subject to the direction and approval of such person as the municipal council appoints, and shall be done in such manner as the said council directs; the council may also designate the places where such poles shall be erected; and the streets shall, without any unnecessary delay, be restored, as far as possible, to their former condition, by and at the expense of the company.

(g.) In case efficient means are devised for carrying wires underground, no Act of Parliament requiring the company to adopt such means, and abrogating the right given by this section to carry lines on poles, shall be deemed an infringement of the privileges granted by this Act, and the company shall not be entitled to damages therefor.

(h.) Every person employed upon the work of erecting or repairing any line or instrument of the company shall have conspicuously attached to his dress a badge, on which are legibly inscribed the name of the company and a number by which he can be readily identified.

(i.) Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to authorize the company to enter upon any private property for the purpose of erecting, maintaining or repairing any of its works, without the previous assent of the owner or occupant of the property for the

time being.

(j.) If for the purpose of removing buildings or in the exercise of the public right of travel, it is necessary that the said wires or poles be temporarily removed, by cutting or otherwise, the company shall, at its own expense, upon reasonable notice in writing from any person requiring it, remove such wires or poles; and in default of the company so doing, such person may remove such wires and poles at the expense of the company. The said notice may be given either at any office of the company, or to any agent or officer of the company in the municipality wherein are the wires or poles required to be

removed, or in the case of a municipality wherein there is no such agent or officer, then either at the head office or to any agent or officer of the company in the nearest or any adjoining municipality to that in which such wires or poles are.

(k.) The company shall be responsible for all damage which it causes in carrying

out or maintaining any of its said works.

After "the" insert "Three Rivers and."

The Bill No. 153, an Act further to protect the Customs and Fisheries, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider a proposed Resolution respecting the award of the Hon. G. W. Burbidge in favour of the Dominion Atlantic Railway Company.

(In the Committee.)

The following Resolution was adopted:

That it is expedient to ratify the award of the Honourable G. W. Burbidge in favour of the Dominion Atlantic Railway Company, and to authorize the payment to that company of the sum of one hundred thousand dollars for the commutation of its privilege with respect to the drawback of customs or import duties.

Resolution to be reported.

The said Resolution was reported, read the second time, and agreed to.

Mr. Fitzpatrick then introduced a Bill No. 162, an Act to confirm a certain award in favour of the Dominion Atlantic Railway Company, which was read the first and a second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Bill (R) No. 156, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act respecting the identification of Criminals," was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Bill (O) No. 155, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to amend Chapter 11 of the Statutes of 1897, intituled: 'An Act to restrict the importation and employment of Aliens,'" was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, and ordered for a third reading at the next sitting of the House.

The House went again into Committee of Supply.

Mr. McDougall.—On Monday next—Inquiry of Ministry—Has the Right Hon. the First Minister addressed a letter or any communication to His Eminence Cardinal Rampolla at Rome with statement contained therein to the following effect:—

OTTAWA, 30th October, 1897.

"EMINENCE,—I made known to you, in the month of August last, when Your Eminence did me the honour to grant me an audience, the happy result which the mission of Monseigneur Merry del Val had accomplished among the Catholics of Canada, and the profound impression which his high Christian virtues and his talents as a statesman—I say statesman, and the expression is not too strong—had created in all classes of our population.

"Having now returned to my country for several months, I wish to make known to Your Eminence that, if these happy results are to remain permanent and efficacious, it is desirable, if not necessary, that the mission of Monseigneur Merry del Val should be renewed, or rather continued, and that he should be present in the midst of us for a

more or less prolonged time as the accredited representative of the Holy See.

"I have established, since my return, that there is among a certain class of Catholics an underhand agitation against the work accomplished by Monseigneur Merry del Val, a work of pacification, concord and union.

"The same reason of state which inspired His Holiness in the affairs of France, and which caused him to prescribe to the Catholics of this country the duty of abandoning the old strifes of the past and to accept the state of things agreed upon, has quite as much force in Canada as in France.

"Such is the opinion of a great number of the Catholics among us. I admit that it is not the unanimous opinion; this very divergence of opinion only renders more necessary among us the presence of a man at once firm and conciliatory like Monseigneur Merry del Val, and of one who above all would understand all the danger there is of exasperating the men who are sincere, convinced, and who wish to be faithful to their duty as Catholics, while remaining faithful to what they believe to be their duties as citizens.

"May I be permitted to ask Your Eminence to be good enough to lay these considerations before His Holiness, while assuring him at the same time of my profound respect and of my filial attachment.

"Accept, Eminence, the expression of the high consideration with which I remain,

etc., etc."



PRAYERS.

Mr. Bain, from the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization, presented the Fifth and final Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

The Committee have had under review matters affecting the interests of agriculture throughout the Dominion of Canada, constituting the first division of their investigations; also immigration and colonization was considered, and formed the second division

of their investigations.

Under the head of agriculture the following witnesses were examined in relation to the several branches included in their respective official spheres of labour. These were Professor James W. Robertson, Commissioner of Agriculture and Dairying, and Mr. W. T. Crandall, Agent of the Department of Agriculture, together with the several officers stationed at the Central Experimental Farm, viz.: Dr. William Saunders, Director of the Dominion Experimental Farms; Dr. James Fletcher, Entomologist and Botanist; Mr. Frank T. Shutt, Chief Chemist; Mr. T. W. Macoun, Horticulturist, and Mr. A. G. Gilbert, Manager Poultry Branch.

On the subjects relating to the second division-immigration and colonization-

Mr. J. A. Smart, Deputy Minister of Interior, was heard in evidence.

Mr. James W. Robertson, Commissioner of Agriculture and Dairying, appeared before the Committee on five different dates, and submitted valuable evidence on the various branches of Agriculture coming under his supervision as Commissioner to the

Department of Agriculture.

On the occasion of his first appearance before the Committee, his evidence dealt mainly on the means by which the Department of Agriculture has given and is giving direct assistance to farmers, through (1) Dominion Dairy Stations, (2) Cold Storage, (3) by obtaining and furnishing information on markets for farm products, including a brief statement of his observations during while on a visit to Great Britain and Ireland in 1897.

On the subsequent appearances by Mr. Robertson before the Committee, he submitted valuable evidence, furnishing details on various subjects of superlative interest to agriculture, in both the productive and commercial phases of the industry, viz.: The establishment of "Illustration Stations for Farmers; the export trade in fruit and on the trial shipment of tender fruits to Great Britain from Grimsby, Ontario; the poultry and egg trade, indicating how an extension of both might be made, with much advantage to the producers in Canada; the present standing of the Dominion Dairy Stations and the directions in which they have promoted the interests of agriculture; and the value of cold storage when applied locally and to the export of readily perishable food products.

Dominion Dairy Stations.—Mr. Robertson detailed the objects in view, in the establishment of these, by the department, and with other functions performed by them was, incidentally that of dairy schools. At one station, St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, the average attendance for four years, was two hundred and seventy-one pupils. He submitted tables showing the number of dairy stations under charge of the Department of Agriculture in different years; and also stated that the department had now withdrawn from that work, except in the North-west Territories. In the case of the Territories, a statement submitted shows that the dairy stations there, in 1897, were patronized by 1,148 farmers, and during the summer, up to the end of October, butter had been manufac-

tured to the value of \$85,264.00, and shipments of butter from those creameries have been made to Japan with good prospects of the development of a large and profitable export trade. The Dairy Stations in the North-west have also given valuable service as Illustration Stations, in demonstrating the capabilities of these Territories, to delegates representing possible or intending immigrants.

Shipments of butter have been also made from the dairy station at Nappan, Nova Scotia, to Bermuda and the West Indies, and, as a whole, that the prospects for Canadian butter in outside markets, to the west and to the east are good. Directions for the packing of butter, in a manner best adapted to the several markets are fully furnished

in Mr. Robertson's evidence, appended.

Cold Storage.—Upon this subject Mr. Robertson furnished most valuable evidence, both as to the methods of providing cold storage and its value in practical application. In connection with the latter he instanced a case in which 267 barrels of early fall apples, sent in cold storage, sold in Great Britain at an average of 18 shillings per barrel; while 325 barrels, of the same lot, sent in the usual way, without cold storage, sold at an average of 8 shillings per barrel,—sixty-three per cent of the latter being reported as "wet" or "slack," when landed.

He said the department was now in correspondence with steamship companies, in order to perfecting arrangements, of which he gave details, with a view to securing an enlargement of the cold storage system, by means of improved methods of keeping cold the hold of ships, to assist the export and arrival abroad in good condition, of such products as apples, eggs, fruits and butter; and he also furnished directions for the

proper treatment of such products after landing.

In connection with the cold storage system on steamships he made the important statement that it was most desirable to have the perishable food products from Canada, landed in Great Britain, regularly on stated days of the week, because that regularity in delivery facilitates trade, and helps to retain customers who can depend upon receiving a supply of butter, eggs, bacon or fruits, every week in their season.

On the matter of cold storage annexed to creameries, Mr. Robertson stated that 69 creameries have availed themselves of the Government bonus to such, in 1897, that a large number of applications for plans during the winter of this year, had been received at the department, and that the Minister of Agriculture had decided to continue the

bonus for the current year, 1898.

The Commissioner made a brief statement of his observations in the markets of Great Britain during his visit last year, stating that Canadian products are now being more generally sold under their own name; but that beef from Canadian fed cattle is still often sold in the retail shops as "best English," or "best Scotch." And that the finest British made cheese sell for higher prices than Canadian cheese, mainly because the former are cured at a lower or more even temperature.

ILLUSTRATION STATIONS FOR FARMERS,

As proposed by the Minister of Agriculture, was a subject upon which Mr. Robertson furnished important information in detail, and as to the ends in view for their establishment, which he said were much of the same character in relation to the cultivation of the soil, as the establishment of Dairies under Government aid and supervision had filled in relation to the production of butter and cheese, viz., the production of larger quantities of improved quality, and with profits enhanced to the producers. They were intended, he said, to educate the farming population, in their industry, by furnishing

examples of operations and results obtained.

He said that much greater progress had been made in Canada in the making and handling of animal products than in the productions of the soil. That the average yield of most crops in Canada was not equal in quantity per acre, to the same kinds of crop in Great Britain and France, but that he believed that through these Illustration Stations, the practices of most of the farmers of this country, could be so much improved as to result in a tremendous increase in the yields of crop. He cited France as an example. There, over four thousand "Example Plots" are maintained by the Government, and these are acknowledged to have been very useful in improving the methods of Agriculture in that country.

A perusal of Mr. Robertson's evidence will furnish the details of the plan upon

which it is proposed to conduct these Illustration Stations.

Also the statement of the Committee on the 4th May, by the Honourable Mr. Fisher, Minister of Agriculture, on his views and policy in relation to Illustration Stations and the objects intended to be accomplished through them furnishes additional valuable information on this point of the Committee's investigations.

Mr. W. T. Crandall, Agent of the Department of Agriculture, was before the Committee, and furnished information of importance to both farmers and exporters of Canadian animal products and fruits to Great Britain. His statements were mainly in regard to comparative prices there realized for these classes of products from the Dominion, and those of other countries in competition. He made statements also of value in relation to the conditions of preparation, shipment and delivery of these products, necessary to insure them a ready reception at paying prices in the leading market cities of the British Islands, at home.

Mr. Saunders, Director of the Experimental Farms, submitted a large amount of evidence of much interest and value to a practical farmer, whose aim it is to conserve, and even increase, the fertility of his soil, and simultaneously increase the crop yield per acre. He stated there is a manifestly increasing interest on the part of agriculturists in the test work of the Experimental Farms, and a widely increasing desire to

The Director furnished interesting details of the experimental lines pursued upon the Dominion farms, and supplied easily understood directions on the methods of conducting these experiments, Experiments are still continued to ascertain the best methods of handling barn-yard manures; and also in ascertaining the value of green manures and artificial fertilizers. Of the two latter, clovers are found to take first place in fertilizing value.

Fodder Crops, he said, continue as a subject of experimental investigation, and that the great value of Awnless Brome Grass, particularly on the prairies, might now be considered as established, especially as the experiments of last year demonstrated that it thrives on the saline soils of the North-west Territories, and there has arisen a general

inquiry for it all over the Dominion.

Cereals.—Mr. Saunders presented a number of valuable facts in relation to tests made to ascertain the best species from among the various cereals, in point of productiveness and best adapted to given vocations. This, he said, was the next point of importance to the farmer, following the fertility of the soil. He also exhibited varieties of the same grain, produced from cross-breeding, and stated as his conclusions from repeated experiments in test growing, that some of these new varieties would prove valuable in agriculture both as to quality and prolificness.

Fattening Animals.—Mr. Saunders furnished also very full details of experiments carried on at the Central Farm last year, in the lines of fattening groups of steers and hogs respectively. The gain in weight by these groups, from stated rations, the effects of different kinds of rations and their comparative cost and results all form matters of material interest towards aiding farmers to obtain the best results from feeding, at the

minimum of cost.

Mr. Fletcher, Dominion Entomologist and Botanist, in the course of his evidence, gave valuable information of practical use to all cultivators, whether of field or orchard, in reference to insect pests and how to overcome them. His evidence will be found to have dealt pretty fully with the recently-appeared fruit pest in Canada, known as the San Jose scale, of which he says is the most devastating to fruit trees that has yet appeared in this country. He strongly commended the legislation recently passed by this Parliament, to prohibit importation of fruit trees and nursery stock from States in which the San Jose scale is known to prevail, adding that urgency demanded prompt legislative action to protect the fruit industry and to save the capital invested in it, within the Dominion. He said, also, that the nurserymen of Canada had proved equal to all demands made upon them for local supply, and that they had done so without undue increase in their prices. He gave, also, a presentation of the most efficient means and preparations to overcome this pest. His evidence constitutes a valuable economic

guide to overcoming other crop pests, and to the preparation and application of insec-

Mr. Shutt, Chief Chemist at the Central Farm, was examined by the Committee, on the elementary constituents and the handling of barn yard manure and other fertilizing media, and as the changes produced in the relative quantities of the normal element present, produced by fermentation under cover, and also by exposure, by which the agricultural value of these manures is affected. The information furnished by the Chemist under this head of inquiry is of much practical value to farmers.

He also submitted samples of a recently discovered product extracted by chemical process from the nodules of liguminous plants, and applicable as a fertilizer to either

the seeds of plants or to the soil.

Mr. Macoun, Horticulturist, was examined in relation to the success of the trial cultivation of forest trees, on the Central Farm. He produced numerous specimens of woods which showed a healthy and rapid growth, and which demonstrated that in Eastern Canada at least, many of the woods esteemed valuable for manufacturing purposes as well as coarser grained species useful for fencing, shelter-belts and ornamentation can be grown with success. His explanations of the methods employed at the Central Farm in the department of tree cultivation will be found useful at the present time, when attention to general and domestic forestry is being attracted, over a large portion of the Dominion.

Mr. Gilbert, Manager of the Poultry Branch at the Central Farm, was examined upon the work conducted under his direction, and he submitted evidence of value, as the result of some of his experiments of last year, in the direction of discovering the minimum of cost at which laying hens could be fed consistently with the conditions necessary to sustaining egg producing power. He presented the figures of cost and material of rations in this experiment which considerably reduces the cost of egg production, by a lessened cost for rations.

This point, together with other information of practical value submitted by Mr. Gilbert, lends importance to his evidence in the direction of assisting farmers who are turning their attention to the opportunity now available for a vast expansion of the

Canadian production of poultry and egg for export to Great Britain.

Mr. W. H. Lynch, a Canadian pioneer in improved methods of butter-making in private and public dairies, submitted an interesting statement of the steps that led to the development of the Dairying Industry in its early stages, that finally led to the present effective system of co-operative Dairying which has proved so successful in the Dominion; and in view of the value of this document as an Historical Record of the period, the Committee have annexed it to their report.

The Committee recommend that each member of the Official Staff at the Central Farm be granted five hundred copies, in pamphlet form, of his evidence referred to in

this report, for his personal use in distribution.

Immigration and colonization constituted the second division of the Committee's investigations, and Mr. James A. Smart, Deputy Minister of the Interior. submitted evidence on the means employed by the department in Great Britain, Ireland, and upon the Continent of Europe, to promote emigration from these countries to Canada. matters of interest in relation to this subject will be found stated in detail in Mr. Smart's evidence hereto annexed.

The evidence laid before the Committee upon the various subjects which engaged their deliberations in the current session of Parliament is hereto annexed as a part of this report.

(For the Appendices to this Report, see Appendix to the Journals, No. 3.)

Mr. Gibson, from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, presented the Sixth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

On motion of Mr. Sutherland, it was Ordered, That as it appears from the Minutes of the Senate of the 3rd June, 1898, that Bill No. 120, an Act respecting the North American Telegraph Company, was withdrawn at the request of the promoters, the Accountant of this House be authorized to refund the fees paid on the said Bill, less the cost of printing and translation.

Sir Louis Davies introduced a Bill No. 166, an Act in further amendment of the Fisheries Act, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

'Mr. Borden (King's) presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 14th March, 1898, for a return showing: (1) All contracts for military clothing entered into by the Government of Canada since the 1st of September, 1896; (2) The name of each contractor and the amount of his contract; (3) The mode of calling for tenders in each case, and the names and amounts mentioned by each tenderer.

The House resumed the adjourned Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Fitz-patrick for the third reading of Bill No. 150, an Act further to amend the Act respecting the Judges of Provincial Courts.

The said motion was, with lrave of the House, withdrawn.

Mr. Fitzpatrick moved, That the said Bill be re-committed to a Committee of the Whole this day; which was agreed to.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider a proposed Resolution relating to Judges' Pensions.

(In the Committee.)

Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that any judge now holding office who shall by reason only of his having completed the seventy-fifth year of his age be or become disqualified to hold or retain his office, shall be entitled to a pension under section fifteen of Chapter 138 of the Revised Statutes of Canada although he may not have continued in office for the number of years mentioned in that section.

Resolution to be reported.

The said Resolution was reported, read the second time, and agreed to, and referred to the Committee of the Whole on the foregoing Bill with instructions that they have power to make provision therein pursuant thereto.

The House went again into Committee on Bill No. 150, an Act further to amend the Act respecting the Judges of Provincial Courts, which was reported with a further amendment, considered as amended, read the third time, on a division, and passed.

The Order of the Day being read for the House to go into Committee of the Whole on Bill No. 163, an Act to grant further aid to the Harbour Commissioners of Montreal; Mr. Fielding moved, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair. And a Debate arising thereon:

At Six o'clock, P.M., Mr. Speaker left the Chair, to resume the same at half-past Seven o'clock, P.M.

A Message was received from the Senate,—agreeing to the consequential amendment made by the House of Commons to the Bill No. 31, intituled: "An Act to incorporate the Lake Bennett and Klondike Railway and Tramway Company," without any amendment.

And,—agreeing to the Bill No. 16, an Act to repeal the Electoral Franchise Act, and to further amend the Dominion Elections Act, with several amendments, which are

Page 1, line 27.—After "list" insert "or in which a poll may be held."
Page 2, line 5.—Leave out paragraph (C) and insert in lieu thereof:—

"(c.) The voters' lists shall, except in the provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Manitoba, be those prepared for the several polling divisions so established and which on the sixtieth day next preceding the day fixed for the nomination of candidates for such Dominion election were in force or were last in force under the laws of that province for the purpose of provincial elections, and in the provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Manitoba, shall be the voters' list as amended under the provisions of section 10A of this Act, which were prepared by the registration clerks or revisors for the several polling divisions so established for the purposes of provincial elections and were filed at least sixty days previous to the day fixed for the nomination of candidates for such Dominion election with the officer having by law the custody of the same."

Page 2, line 35.—(f) After "sions" insert "but nothing herein shall enable

any person to vote by schedule or otherwise than by appearing personally."

Page 2, line 39.—Leave out from "election" to (a) and insert "or from having his name on the list merely by reason of any provision of the provincial law disqualifying."

Page 6, line 23.—After "elections" insert the following as clause 10A:—

Clause 10A.

"Notwithstanding anything in this Act, or in any Act heretofore enacted, or hereafter to be enacted by the Legislature of any province, there shall be in the provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Manitoba, for the purpose of revising and amending the voters' lists to be used in the election of members for the House of Commons an appeal from said lists as prepared by the registration clerks and revisors to the respective judges of the county courts in each of the said provinces for the different counties in which the polling divisions for which such voters' lists have been prepared are respectively situate.

"Such appeal may be at the instance of any voter or person entitled to be a voter in the polling division, the voters' list for which is appealed from on all or any of the following grounds, viz.: that the names of voters are through inadvertence or otherwise omitted from voters' lists, or wrongly stated therein, or that the names of persons are through inadvertence or otherwise inserted in the voters' list who are not entitled to be voters, and shall be made to the judge of the county court at any time within twenty days after the voters' lists at first made up shall be filed with

the officer who, under the law of the province, has the custody of the same, and notice of such appeal shall be given in form 'C' in the schedule hereto annexed, by posting the some up in at least three public places within the polling division, and by publishing the same for at least ten days previously to such appeal in some newspaper published in the county and circulating in the said polling division; and if no newspaper is published in the county, then in a newspaper published in the nearest county having a newspaper published therein, provided that in the case of an application to strike off names from the voters' list, such notice shall be mailed, duly registered, with postage prepaid, at least one week previous to such appeal, to the address of such person or persons, if known to the appellant. The judge shall hear the appeals on affidavits, or, if requested by the appellant or by the person opposing the appeal, on evidence viva voce under oath, and may make an order in writing directing that the name of such person as voter shall be struck from or added to said list, and in case of more than one appeal from the same voters' list, the judge shall embody in the one order the results of his adjudications in respect to all such appeals, and such order shall be filed with the officer who has the custody of the said voters' list, who shall in pursuance of said order, strike off from or enter upon said list the names of persons as voters, and such voters' list, so amended, shall be the voters' list for the polling division.

the purposes of elections of members for the House of Commons of Canada the voters'
list for polling district (or sub-district) amended by (adding to the
same the names of the persons mentioned in schedule "A" or striking therefrom the
names of the persons mentioned in schedule "B," or by changing the names A B C D,
&c., to E F G H, &c.)

Page 7, line 17.—After "2" insert the following as clause 18A:

Clause 18A.

"Section 43 of the said Act shall not apply to Prince Edward Island."
Page 8, line 17.—After "administer" insert the following as clause 21A:—

Clause 21A.

"In the Province of Prince Edward Island, if any person desires to vote whose right to vote is objected to on the ground of want of qualification, and if a candidate, or any agent of a candidate, or (in the absence of such agent) any elector acting in the interest of a candidate, so objects in the presence of the elector, the deputy returning officer shall number and place his initials upon such ballot paper before delivering it to such person, and shall place opposite to the name of such person in the poll book a corresponding number, and thereupon such person shall be entitled to receive such ballot paper and to vote."

Page 8, line 31.—After "produce" insert "and in the Province of Prince Edward Island the words 'objected to' opposite the name of such person voting whose right to vote has been objected to under section 21A of this Act."

Page 9, line 2.—After "repealed" insert the following as clauses 26A, 26B and 26C:—

Clause 26A.

"In the Province of Prince Edward Island the deputy returning officer shall also, in counting the ballots, place in a separate envelope or parcel all ballot papers numbered and initialled under section 21A of this Act."

Clause 26B.

"Section 57 of the said Act shall not apply, in the Province of Prince Edward Island, to the determination of the qualification or non-qualification of any voter whose ballot paper has been numbered and initialled under section 21A of this Act."

Clause 26C.

"Section 58 of the said Act as amended by section 8 of Chapter 11 of the Statutes of 1888 is hereby further amended by striking out all the words from "candidate" in line four to "of" in line nine, and by inserting after the word "papers" in line ten the words "and of the ballot papers numbered and initialled by him under section 21A of this Act."

Page 9, line 5.—After "twenty-eight" insert "and by substituting therefor: '(3.) In the Province of Prince Edward Island that any person not duly qualified to vote in such electoral district has so voted."

Page 9, line 12.—After "twenty-four" insert the following as clause 27A:—

Clause 27 A.

"Section 133 of the said Act is hereby repealed."

Page 9, line 25.—After "cents" add the following as clause 30A:—

Clause 30A.

"It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to prepare, as Schedules to this Act, the oaths in the form required to be taken by voters at an election held under the authority of this Act."

And also,—agreeing to the Bill No. 81, an Act respecting the Montreal and Southern Counties Railway Company, with several amendments, which are as follows:--

Page 1, line 10.—Leave out from "amended" to "by" in line 12.

Page 1, line 14.—Leave out from "Napierville" to "3" in line 29.

Page 2, line 1.—Leave out clause 4.

Page 2, line 34.—Leave out paragraph (a) of clause 7.

Page 3, line 2.—Leave out "require" and insert "acquire."

Page 3, line 5.—After "used" insert the following as clause A:—

Clause A.

With the consent of the municipal council or other authority having jurisdiction over any highway or public place, the company may enter thereon for the purpose of constructing and maintaining its lines for the transmission of light, heat, power or electricity, and, when deemed necessary by the company for such purpose, may erect, equip and maintain poles and other works and devices, and stretch wires and other contrivances thereon, and, as often as the company thinks proper, may break up and open any highway or public place, subject, however, to the following provisions:-

(a.) The company shall not interfere with the public right of travel, or in any way

obstruct the entrance to any door or gateway, or free access to any building.

(b.) The company shall not affix any wire less than twenty-two feet above the ground; nor without the consent of the municipal council, erect more than one line of poles along any highway.

(c.) All poles shall be as nearly as possible straight and perpendicular, and shall, in

cities, be painted, if so required by any by-law of the council.

(d.) The company shall not be entitled to damages on account of its poles or wires being cut by direction of the officer in charge of the fire brigade at any fire, if, in the opinion of such officer, it is advisable that such poles or wires be cut.

(e.) The company shall not cut down or mutilate any shade, fruit or ornamental

(f.) The opening up of streets for the erection of poles, or for carrying wires under ground, shall be subject to the direction and approval of such person as the municipal council appoints, and shall be done in such manner as the said council directs; the council may also designate the places where such poles shall be erected; and the streets shall, without any unnecessary delay, be restored, as far as possible, to their former con-

dition, by and at the expense of the company.

(g.) In case efficient means are devised for carrying wires underground, no Act of Parliament requiring the company to adopt such means, and abrogating the right given by this section to carry the lines on poles, shall be deemed an infringement of the privileges granted by this Act, and the company shall not be entitled to damages therefor.

(h.) Every person employed upon the work of erecting or repairing any line or instrument of the company shall have conspicuously attached to his dress a badge, on which are legibly inscribed the name of the company and a number by which he can be

(i.) Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to authorize the company to enter upon any private property for the purpose of erecting, maintaining or repairing any of its works, without the previous assent of the owner or occupant of the property for the

time being.

(j.) If for the purpose of removing buildings or in the exercise of the public right of travel, it is necessary that the said wires or poles be temporarily removed, by cutting or otherwise, the company shall, at its own expense, upon reasonable notice in writing from any person requiring it, remove such wires or poles; and in default of the company so doing, such person may remove such wires and poles at the expense of the company. The said notice may be given either at any office of the company, or to any agent or officer of the company in the municipality wherein are the wires or poles required to be removed, or in the case of a municipality wherein there is no such agent or officer, then either at the head office or to any agent or officer of the company in the nearest or any adjoining municipality to that in which such wires or poles are.

(k.) The company shall be responsible for all damage which it causes in carrying

out or maintaining any of its said works.

Page 3, line 19.—Leave out from the first "one" to "entitling" in line 22, and insert "half of the paid-up capital stock and."

Page 3, line 23.—Leave out "an accumulative" and insert "a."

Mr. Mills—On Wednesday next—Inquiry of Ministry—1. Has the Postmaster General received a petition from the town of Middleton, Nova Scotia, of which the following is a true copy:—

"To the Honourable WILLIAM MULOCK,

"Postmaster General of Canada.

"The petition, in three parts, of the undersigned adult citizens of the Middleton Post Office District in the County of Annapolis and Province of Nova Scotia, humbly showeth:—

"1. That the present post office accommodations in the town of Middleton are quite nadequate to the town requirements; the waiting room is very small, and without any heating privileges, and the whole post office is on a meagre scale, and not at all in keep-

ing with the other public buildings and the private residences in said town.

"2. That the Commercial Bank of Windsor propose erecting forthwith a new brick and stone structure for banking business in said town, on the most central cornor lot within four rods of the site of the present post office and have signified their willingness to provide ample quarters for a post office in said building with all modern appliances, including fire and burglar-proof vault, lock boxes, register heat, &c., provided they are given an official guarantee that said premises will be occupied as a post office for a period of not less than ten years.

"3. That the council of the Middleton Board of Trade, favouring the proposed new site, recently convened a public meeting of the citizens to discuss the proposition made by said Bank, and a resolution was at such meeting passed unanimously in favour of the

acceptance of said proposition.

"4. That the rental of the new premises will be only about one hundred dollars per year, while the rental of the present meagre quarters is sixty to eighty dollars per year. "5. That the proposed change would greatly benefit our town, at a very limited in-

crease of cost to your department over the present rental.

"Therefore we humbly ask your Honour to take the premises into consideration and to grant us the boon of the proposed change of post office site, and to grant to the said Bank the required guarantee for the continuance of at least ten years' occupancy of the premises for said post office purposes; and your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray, &c., &c.

"This is no new idea for me—I have for years favoured the abolition of the irresponsible body. The time has come for this great reform, and Mr. Laurier may rest assured that he will have the majority of the people with him.

"We have no need any longer of a Senate which retards the march of progress and prevents the realization of national enterprises, such as the Yukon railway.

On motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, seconded by Sir Richard Cartwright, an Address was voted to His Excellency the Governor General in the following words:—

To His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir John Campbell Hamilton-Gordon, Earl of Aberdeen; Viscount Formartine, Baron Haddo, Methlic, Tarves and Kellie, in the Peerage of Scotland; Viscount Gordon of Aberdeen, County of Aberdeen, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Baronet of Nova Scotia, &c., &c., Governor General of Canada, and Vice-Admiral of the same.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :-

have endeared her to all classes of the community.

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Canada in Parliament assembled, on the occasion of the approaching termination of Your Excellency's official connection with this country, hasten to assure you, the representative of Her Most Gracious Majesty, of the unswerving loyalty and devotion of the Canadian people to the Crown and Empire of Great Britain, and to express the hope that you will in person convey these assurances to our beloved Queen.

It is our pleasant duty to assure Your Excellency of the high appreciation by the people of Canada of the unfailing courtesy and assiduous care with which you have presided over the affairs of the Dominion for the last five years, a period which, it must be no small gratification to Your Excellency to know, has been characterized by a marked growth of progress and prosperity; and to testify to the generous and kindly interest which you have displayed in all that pertains to the welfare and advancement of the people irrespective of distinctions of class or creed.

We are also highly sensible of the great degree in which the literature, science and art of the Dominion have benefitted from the deep and practical interest which Your Excellency has taken therein.

The important services which Your Excellency has rendered to this country have been heightened by the zealous co-operation of Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen, whose untiring efforts to promote the social and moral welfare of our people

We beg to convey the assurances that Your Excellency and your distinguished consort will bear from our shores our profound respect and esteem, coupled with our warm wishes for your future welfare and happiness, and we indulge the hope that this country may continue to have in Your Excellency a friend and advocate in the councils of the Empire.

On motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, it was Resolved, That a Message be sent to the Senate, informing their Honours that this House has passed an Address to His Excellency the Governor General on the occasion of the approaching termination of His Excellency's official connection with this Country,—and requesting their Honours to unite with this House in the said Address.

Mr. Fielding moved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, at

its next sitting, to consider the following proposed Resolution :-

That it is expedient to provide that for the present Session of Parliament and for each Session of Parliament hereafter held, the deduction of eight dollars per day mentioned in section twenty-six of the Act respecting the Senate and House of Commons, being Chapter eleven of the Revised Statutes, shall not be made for fifteen days in the case of a member who has been absent from a sitting of the House of which he is a member, or of some committee thereof, during such number of days; but this provision shall not operate to extend the maximum amount mentioned in section twenty-five of the said Act, nor in the case of a member elected since the commencement of the present or of any subsequent Session shall it apply to days prior to his election.

Whereupon Mr. Fielding informed the House, that His Excellency the Governor General having been informed of the subject-matter of the said proposed Resolution,

recommends it to the House.

Ordered, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, at its next sitting, to consider the said proposed Resolution.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider certain proposed Resolutions relative to the Legislative Buildings and Government House at Winnipeg, in the Province of Manitoba.

(In the Committee.)

The following Resolutions were adopted:-

1. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that the sum of two hundred and sixtyseven thousand and twenty-six dollars and forty-three cents, being the cost of the erection of the Legislative Buildings and Government House at Winnipeg, which sum was charged against the "Province of Manitoba Debt Account," may, on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, be credited to the said account, and that the interest payable to the said Province on the said first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, on the balance at the credit of the said Debt Account may be calculated on the balance at the credit of the said account after the said sum of two hundred and sixty-one thousand and twenty-six dollars and forty-three cents has

been credited as above provided.

2. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that the Government of Canada may, on the said first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, pay to the Government of the Province of Manitoba the sum of two hundred and thirty-one thousand five hundred and seventy-five dollars and forty-seven cents, being the sum of the amounts which would have been payable to the Province of Manitoba by the Dominion, in excess of the amounts actually paid as interest from time to time payable on the balance at the credit of the said Debt Account had the cost of the erection of the said Legislative Buildings and Government House at Winnipeg not been charged against the said Debt Account, together with interest at the rate of five per centum per annum on each of the amounts so payable in excess of the amounts actually paid, from the date when the same would have been payable to the said first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.

The Bill (H) No. 124, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act incorporating the Alberta and Yukon Railway, Navigation and Mining Company," was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time, and passed, as amended. (Title changed to "An Act incorporating the Western Alberta Railway Company.")

The Bill No. 139, an Act to incorporate the Anglo-French Telegraph Company, Limited, was considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed. (Title changed to "An Act to incorporate the Northern Commercial Telegraph Company, Limited.")

The House went into Committee of the Whole on Bill (L) No. 141, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act respecting the Great North-West Central Railway Company."

The hour devoted to Private Bills having expired, the House resumed in Committee of the Whole on the Resolution respecting the Manitoba School Fund.

The following Resolution was adopted:-

Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that the Governor in Council may, from the moneys invested under the provisions of subsection three of section twenty-five of Chapter fifty-four of the Revised Statutes of Canada, forming the School Fund for the Province of Manitoba, pay from time to time to the Government of Manitoba, on the request of the said Government, such sum or sums as the said Governor in Council thinks proper, not exceeding in the whole the sum of three hundred thousand dollars, the sum or sums so paid over to be expended by the said Government of Manitoba in the support and maintenance of the public schools in that Province; provided always that not more than two hundred thousand dollars shall be so paid to the said Government for the purpose aforesaid during the present calendar year.

Resolution to be reported.

The said Resolution was reported, read the second time, and agreed to.

Mr. Fielding then introduced a Bill No. 168, an Act respecting the Manitoba School Fund, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

A Message was received from the Senate, agreeing to the following Bills without any amendment, viz.:—

Bill No. 142, an Act to authorize the Quebec Harbour Commissioners to borrow

money; -and

Bill No. 149, an Act to authorize certain contracts with Steamship Companies for Cold Storage accommodation.

And,—agreeing to the Bill No. 125, an Act to incorporate the Ottawa Interprovincial Bridge Company, with an amendment, which is as follows:—

Page 7, line 4.—Leave out from "engineers" to the end of clause 20.

And also,—agreeing to the Bill No. 145, an Act further to amend the Railway Act, with several amendments, which are as follows:—

Page 1, line 3.—Leave out from "follows" to the end of the Bill and insert the

following clauses :—

"1. Section 240 of *The Railway Act* is hereby amended by inserting in its sixth line next after the word "vehicles" the words "and likewise to every other carrier of

passengers or goods by land or by water."

"2. In any case in which the toll charged by a company for a carriage partly on a railway and partly on a steamship or line of steamships is expressed in a single sum, the Railway Committee, for the purpose of determining whether a toll has been charged which is discriminatory or contrary in any way to the provisions of *The Railway Act*, may definitely determine what portion of such single sum is to be properly assumed as having been charged in respect of the railway transportation and may decide accordingly.

"3. Section 52 of *The Railway Act*, is hereby amended by inserting in the fifth line next after the word "directors" the words "unless otherwise provided by by-law."

The Resolutions adopted in Committee of the Whole at the First Sitting, this day, relative to the Legislative Buildings and Government House at Winnipeg, in the Pro. vince of Manitoba, were reported, read the second time, and agreed to.

Mr. Fielding then introduced a Bill No. 169, an Act respecting the Province of Manitoba Debt Account, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

The Bill No. 166, an Act in further amendment of the Fisheries Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Bill (S) No. 165, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to amend the Companies Act," was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with an amendment, considered as amended, read the third time, and passed, as amended.

The amendments made by the Senate to the Bill No. 16, an Act to amend the Electoral Franchise Act, and to further amend the Dominion Elections Act, were taken into consideration;

The First, Third, Sixth and Twelfth of the amendments, were read the second time, and severally agreed to.

The remaining amendments having been read a second time, their further consideration was postponed until the next sitting of the House.

NOTICES OF MOTIONS.

Mr. Gauvreau—On Friday next—Inquiry of Ministry—Whether the Minister of Customs is aware:

1. That Rivière du Loup Station, in the County of Temiscouata, is the central terminal point of the railway lines of the Intercolonial (lower section, and former Grand Trunk section) and of the Temiscouata Railway which terminates beyond the frontier?

2. That smugglers often avail themselves of the proximity of the river to this central point to ship their contraband goods?

3. That a preventive officer was formerly always stationed at this point, and rendered notable service to the Department and the Treasury?

4. That the services of that officer were dispensed with some eighteen months ago, thus leaving a free field for smugglers?

If so, is it the intention of the Department to appoint, at an early day, a preventive officer for Rivière du Loup Station?

If not, why not?

Mr. Gauvreau—On Friday next—Inquiry of Ministry—1. Whether it is contrary to the regulations of the Department for a postmaster to be a retailer of alcoholic liquors?

2. Whether the Postmaster General is aware that Mr. I. A. Hebert, postmaster of Princeville, in the Township of Stanfold, is a retailer of alcoholic liquors, either for himself or for another, or under the style and title of any firm or joint stock company?

3. Whether it is the intention of the Honourable Postmaster General to discharge the said I. A. Hebert from his position, or at least to notify him to make his choice between the position of postmaster and that of a retailer of alcoholic liquors?

Sir Wilfrid Laurier—On Thursday next—That the notice of motion of Mr. Lister "that the Report of the Special Committee appointed to inquire into subsidies granted in aid of the Drummond County Railway be adopted," be made the first Order of the Day at the second sitting this day.

Mr. Fitzpatrick—On Thursday, at first sitting—That the amendments made by the Honourable the Senate to sections 5, 6, 10, 21a, 23, 26a, 26b, 26c, and 27 of Bill 16, "An Act to amend the Electoral Franchise Act and to further amend the Dominion Elections Act," be disagreed to for the following reasons:—

Because the amendment made by the Honourable the Senate to the Bill, excepting from its operation the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Manitoba and providing for a special revision of the voters' lists in those Provinces for elections to this House, is inconsistent with and subversive of the general principle of the Bill.

That the procedure proposed by the Honourable the Senate for securing the revision of such lists, under the authority of this Parliament, is wholly inadequate, and cannot be rendered effective without creating complicated and costly machinery incompatible with the object of the Bill.

That the amendment, therefore, in effect provides for the continuation in the Provinces named of the present unwieldy and expensive system of creating special voters' lists for Dominion elections.

That the passage of the amendment by the Senate after its rejection by the House of Commons is inconsistent with the undoubted right and privilege of this House to determine the principles of the Franchise under which its members are elected, and is the more unwarranted in that the country has emphatically pronounced in favour of the principle of the Bill.

Mr. Roddick—On Friday next—Inquiry of Ministry—Whether the correspondence between the Governor General and Sir Charles Tupper in July, 1896, with reference to certain appointments, was specially brought under the attention of the Imperial Authorities, and if so, whether any opinion was expressed by the Colonial Office to the principle laid down and acted upon by His Excellency with reference to those appointments? lists for Dominion elections.

That the passage of the amendment by the Senate after its rejection by the House of Commons is inconsistent with the undoubted right and privilege of this House to determine the principles of the Franchise under which its members are elected, and is the more unwarranted in that the country has emphatically pronounced in favour of the principle of the Bill.

And a Debate arising thereon,—the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Mills,

adjourned.

The House then adjourned until Three o'clock, P.M.

PRAYERS.

The House resumed the adjourned Debate on the proposed motion of Mr. Fitzpatrick: That the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth and eleventh of the amendments made by the Senate to the Bill No. 16, an Act to amend the Electoral Franchise Act, and to further amend the Dominion Elections Act, be disagreed to.

And the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to on a division.

On motion of Mr. Fitzpatrick, it was Resolved, That a Message be sent to the Senate to acquaint their Honours that this House agrees to the first, third, sixth and twelfth of their amendments to the Bill No. 16, an Act to amend the Electoral Franchise Act, and to further amend the Dominion Elections Act, and disagrees to the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth and eleventh of their amendments for the following reasons:-

Because the amendment made by the Honourable the Senate to the Bill, excepting from its operation the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Manitoba, and providing for a special revision of the voters' lists in those Provinces for elections to this

House, is inconsistent with and subversive of the general principle of the Bill.

That the procedure proposed by the Honourable the Senate for securing the revision of such lists, under the authority of this Parliament, is wholly inadequate, and cannot be rendered effective without creating complicated and costly machinery incompatible with the object of the Bill.

That the amendment, therefore, in effect provides for the continuation in the Provinces named of the present unwieldy and expensive system of creating special voters'

lists for Dominion elections.

That the passage of the amendment by the Senate after its rejection by the House of Commons is inconsistent with the undoubted right and privilege of this House to determine the principles of the Franchise under which its members are elected, and is the more unwarranted in that the country has emphatically pronounced in favour of the principle of the Bill.

The amendment made by the Senate to the Bill No. 145, an Act further to amend the Railway Act, was taken into consideration, and agreed to.

The Bill No. 161, an Act respecting the payment of grants in aid of the construction of Public Works, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with an amendment, considered as amended, read the third time, and passed.

Mr. Fielding moved, That the Bill No. 168, an Act respecting the Manitoba School Fund, be now read the second time;

The Bill was accordingly read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, and ordered for a third reading at the next sitting of the House.

The Bill No. 169, an Act respecting the Province of Manitoba Debt Account, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Bill No. 167, an Act in further amendment of the Post Office Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time, and passed.

The Bill (T) No. 170, from the Senate, intituled: "An Act further to amend the Act respecting Public Officers," was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Order of the Day being read for receiving Report of Committee of Ways and Means;

Mr. Fielding moved, That the said Order be discharged, and the Resolutions adopted in Committee on the 19th April last, be referred back to the Committee for further consideration.

The House accordingly went again into Committee of Ways and Means.

(In the Committee.)

The following Resolutions were adopted:-

1. Resolved, That it is expedient to repeal section six of "The Customs Tariff,

1897," and to substitute the following section therefor:

- 6. The importation into Canada of any goods enumerated, described or referred to in Schedule C to this Act is prohibited; and any such goods imported shall thereby become forfeited to the Crown and may be destroyed or otherwise dealt with as the Minister of Customs may direct; and any person importing any such prohibited goods, or causing or permitting them to be imported shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars.
- 2. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that section seventeen of "The Customs Tariff, 1897," shall be repealed on and after the first day of August in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and that the following section shall be substituted therefor:—
- 17. Articles which are the growth, produce or manufacture of any of the following countries may, when imported direct into Canada from any of such countries, be entered for duty or taken out of warehouse for consumption in Canada at the reduced rate of duty provided in the British preferential tariff set forth in Schedule D to this Act:—

(a.) The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

(b.) The British Colony of Bermuda.

(c.) The British Colonies commonly called the British West Indies, including the following:—

The Bahamas.

Jamaica.

Turks Island and the Caicos Islands.

The Leeward Islands (Antigua, St. Christopher-Nevis, Dominica, Montserrat, and the Virgin Islands).

The Windward Islands (Grenada, St. Vincent and St. Lucia).

Barbados.

Trinidad and Tobago.

British Guiana.

(d.) Any other British Colony or possession the Customs tariff of which, on the whole, is as favourable to Canada as the British preferential tariff herein

referred to is to such colony or possession.

Provided, however, that manufactured articles to be admitted under such preferential tariff shall be bona fide the manufactures of a country or countries entitled to the benefits of such tariff, and that such benefits shall not extend to the importation of articles into the production of which there has not entered a substantial portion of the labour of such countries. Any question that may arise as to any article being entitled to such benefits shall be decided by the Minister of Customs, whose decision shall be final.

(2.) Raw Sugar, including all sugar described in item 436 of Schedule A, may] when imported direct from any British Colony or possession, be entered for duty or taken out of warehouse for consumption in Canada at the reduced rate of duty provided in the British preferential tariff.

(3.) The Minister of Customs, with the approval of the Governor in Council, shall determine what British Colonies or possessions shall be entitled to the benefits of the preferential tariff under clause (d) of this section.

(4.) The Minister of Customs may, with the approval of the Governor in Council, make such regulations as may be deemed necessary for carrying out the intention of this

section.

3. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that Schedule D to "The Customs Tariff, 1897," shall be repealed on and after the first day of August in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and that the following schedule shall be substituted therefor:—

SCHEDULE "D."

BRITISH PREFERENTIAL TARIFF.

On articles entitled to the benefits of this preferential tariff under section seventeen, the duties mentioned in Schedule A shall be reduced as follows: The reduction shall be one-fourth of the duty mentioned in Schedule A, and the duty to be levied, collected and paid shall be three-fourths of the duty mentioned in Schedule A.

Provided, however, that this reduction shall not apply to any of the following articles and that such articles shall in all cases be subject to the duties mentioned in Schedule A, viz.: wines, malt liquors, spirits, spirituous liquors, liquid medicines and

articles containing alcohol; tobacco, cigars and cigarettes.

Provided further, that the reduction shall only apply to refined sugar, when evidence satisfactory to the Minister of Customs is furnished that such refined sugar has been manufactured wholly from raw sugar produced in the British Colonies or possessions.

4. Resolved, That it is expedient to repeal item 221 of Schedule A to "The Cus-

toms Tariff, 1897," and to substitute the following item :-

5. Resolved, That it is expedient to repeal items 435 and 436 of Schedule A to

"The Customs Tariff, 1897," and to substitute the following therefor:—

435. All sugar above number sixteen Dutch standard in colour, and all refined sugars of whatever kinds, grades or standards, testing not more than eighty-eight degrees by the polariscope, one dollar and eight cents per one hundred pounds, and for each additional degree one and one-half cents per one hundred pounds. Fractions of five-tenths of a degree or less not to be subject to duty,

and fractions of more than five-tenths to be dutiable as a degree.

436. Sugar n.e.s. not above number sixteen Dutch standard in colour, sugar drainings or pumpings drained in transit, melado or concentrated melado, tank bottoms and sugar concrete, testing not more than seventy-five degrees by the polariscope, forty cents per one hundred pounds, and for each additional degree one and one-half cents per one hundred pounds. Fractions of five-tenths of a degree or less not to be subject to duty, and fractions of more than five-tenths to be dutiable as a degree. The usual packages in which imported to be free.

6. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that items 445 and 446 of Schedule A to "The Customs Tariff, 1897," shall be repealed on and after the first day of July in the

present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.

7. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that on and after the first day of July in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, the following items shall be added to Schedule B to "The Customs Tariff, 1897":—

636. Tobacco, unmanufactured, for excise purpose under conditions of the Inland

Revenue Act.

S. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that on and after the first day of July in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, in addition to the excise duties at present levied on manufactured tobacco, cigars and cigarettes, there shall be levied and collected the following excise duties, that is to say:

(a.) On all foreign raw leaf tobacco, unstemmed, taken out of warehouse for manufacture in any cigar or tobacco manufactory, ten cents per pound.

(b.) On all foreign raw leaf tobacco, stemmed, taken out of warehouse for manufacture in any cigar or tobacco manufactory, fourteen cents per pound.

Provided that the weight upon which such duty shall be computed shall be with reference to the standard mentioned in paragraph (c) of section 247 of the Inland Revenue Act.

9. Resolved, That except as herein otherwise provided this Act shall be held to have come into force on the sixth day of April in the present year, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.

Resolutions to be reported.

The said Resolutions were accordingly reported, read the second time, and agreed to. Committee to sit again at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Fielding then introduced a Bill No. 171, an Act to amend the Customs Tariff, 1897, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

He also introduced a Bill No. 172, an Act further to amend the Inland Revenue Act, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting

of the House.

Mr. Borden (King's) presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 14th March, 1898, for a return showing the names of all parties furnishing supplies for the Military Camp at Aldershot, King's County, Nova Scotia, since July, 1896, the rate of allowance or payment of each class of articles supplied, the names of the tenderers, the amount asked by each tenderer, and the amount allowed.

Also, a schedule of prices paid for each class of supplies for the Camp at Aldershot, from 1888 to 1897, inclusive, and the names of the parties supplying each class of articles.

The House went again into Committee of Supply.

Because these amendments are necessary to adapt the Dominion Elections Act, as modified by the said Bill, to the circumstances of Prince Edward Island, where there are no voters' lists, and to provide adequate means for recording and determining, in a manner similar to that provided by the provincial law, objections to the votes of any persons whose qualification to vote is questioned.

3. That the Senate doth insist on its constitutional right to reject or amend the said Bill, or any Bill of a similar character that may at any time be presented to the

Senate.

Bill No. 171, an Act to amend the Customs Tariff of 1897;—and Bill No. 172, an Act to amend the Inland Revenue Act.

NOTICE OF MOTION.

Mr. Oliver—On Monday next—Inquiry of Ministry—Has the Government knowledge of the following petition from residents of the Yukon District, and if so, what are the intentions of the Government regarding the prayer of the petition? To His Excellency the Governor General in Council of the Dominion of Canada:

Whereas changes having recently been made in the mining regulations governing the placers of the Yukon District of the North-west Territories, whereby certain new restrictions, together with a royalty, are imposed upon the miners engaged in develop-

ing the mineral resources of the region;

Therefore, the Yukon Order of Pioneers would respectfully petition Government as follows: The regulation limiting the length of "creek" and "river" placer claims to one hundred feet be so amended as to allow five hundred feet to each claim, as under former regulations; that the reservation of alternate claims for the Crown be discontinued, and that all claims so reserved up to the present time be put up at public auction, or otherwise transferred to the miners who are seeking claims to develop: that no royalties upon the gold output be exacted, as has been ordered.

In support of our petition we beg leave to present statements explanatory of adverse conditions by which we are surrounded, calling attention to certain difficulties which all but overwhelm in the effort to conduct placer mining operations under the

new code of regulations.

Owing to the isolation of this region from the centres of population and the exaggerated statements which were made by certain individuals and published by the newspapers in the United States and Canada, the impression was created that the hills and valleys of the Klondike were enormously rich in gold, and that a miner could uncover a fortune at almost any point where he might see fit to strike a pick into the gravel. Such an impression is not justified by an examination of the placers. On the contrary, it is found that few of the claims so far developed will pay more than small profits to the owners after deducting operating expenses. Perhaps two score or more El Dorado and Bonanza claims are extraordinarily rich, but these are exceptions to the rule. It is possible and even probable that gulches yet to be prospected will yield large quantities of gold, but with the present imperfect knowledge of the auriferous deposits, it

would be mere assumption on our part to put for h any definite claims.

For more than a decade the pioneer miners of this region have been steadily at work upon the gravel bars of scores of rivers and creeks tributary to the Yukon, and but few really profitable gold discoveries have been made. "Colours" obtainable almost anywhere indicating apparently a widespread diffusion of precious metal, led the prospectors for gold on, however, from year to year in search of paying deposits. They made their own trails, toiling through bogs in summer and deep snow in winter; they faced severe privations and dangers. Provisions were scarce and high-priced and scurvy and starvation often threatened. Cut off from the outside world with no mail facilities or other benefits furnished by the Government-almost forgotten in the midst of dreary desolation, the pioneer miners still look forward to a day when their efforts would be rewarded. At last the placers of the Klondike were discovered and renewed hope and energy aroused. The miners sought for gold in numerous gulches. Some found the metal in good paying quantities, but the fact soon became apparent that there was not enough for all-far from it. In the meantime word of the discovery, borne to the outside world, speedily brought thousands of people to the spot, all anxious to secure profitable claims. Failing to find anything left for them, these newcomers together with pioneers that had failed to secure profitable Klondike ground. began to scatter over the creeks and other promising localities. Then came word of the cutting down of claims to one hundred feet and of the assessment of heavy royalties upon the output of gold. Prospectors were discouraged at the outlook and many began to slacken their efforts. One hundred-foot claims were generally considered insufficient in view of the broken character of pay-streaks and the expense of sinking shafts to reach the same. Men who had formerly searched anxiously for good five hundred-foot claims for themselves gave up the effort and some began to stake off and record one hund ed-foot claims hap-hazard, without prospecting the same, intending to dispose of their holdings to speculators and others residing in the cities of Canada and United States. The Yukon Order of Pioneers has antagonized this evil as best it could, but with slight success. It is the belief of our petitioners that the restoration of the former regulations providing for five hundred-foot claims will prove an incentive to all men to thoroughly prospect the country in the hope of finding valuable placer properties of sufficient size to yield fortunes. Thousands will toil as prospectors with the possibility of big rewards, whereas even hundreds may not be found who will pursue the search for placers with the certainty that, at best, their efforts can be but moderately rewarded.

Referring to that clause in our petition relating to alternate claims, we beg leave to call attention to the methods in vogue among miners in the Yukon Valley in operating claims. Owing to the cost of labour and the difficulty of building sluiceways, ditches, etc., it is the common and economical practice for two or three miners to combine together, secure adjoining claims and work the same conjointly with one dam, one set of ditches and so forth, handling tailings on each other's property so as not to interfere with the profitable and speedy working of the whole block of ground. Such a combination of interests and of efforts make it possible to work placers at a profit that other wise could not be developed. Alternate claims held for the Crown and ultimately disposed of at public or private sale, might easily fall into the hands of speculators, who would follow up a policy of non-action, declining to work their ground in unison with their neighbours and awaiting such developments on the adjoining claims as would indicate the location and value of pay-streaks, and the presence of worthless strips of ground. In this way speculative combinations would have an unjust advantage over the bonafide efforts of miners who are obliged to speedily develop and work out their property.

In regard to the imposition of royalties upon the gold output, we desire to state that very many claims, moderately rich and which would be operated at a profit despite heavy expenses were no royalties exacted, would of necessity, remain undeveloped in case the Government were to insist upon receiving a portion of the gross proceeds of each one. It is a rich claim indeed, all conditions considered, which can pay a large profit, even with no royalty to be considered. Ordinary unskilled labour is only obtainable at one dollar and fifty cents per hour; flour costs twelve dollars per hundred weight in the stores; bacon is sold for fifty cents per pound; fresh beef and mutton at one dollar a pound; rubber boots at seventeen dollars per pair; fur robes at one hundred and fifty to two hundred and fifty dollars each, and all other supplies in proportion.

During frequent periods of scarcity and threatened famine the ruling prices for provisions sold on the streets outside of the trading companies stores are excessive, flour commanding from two to three hundred dollars per barrel, and all other food stuffs from

one dollar to one dollar twenty-five per pound.

Severe climatic conditions furthermore, hinder mine-owners' operations and materially increase their expenses. The soil being frozen throughout the year, necessitates the employment of fire for sinking prospect-holes and for drifting purposes, this method being extremely slow in operation. But a few frozen bucketsful of gravel can be taken from one of these fire drifts in a day, whereas, were the soil not frozen, hundreds of bucketsful could be secured. While other placers can be operated during the summer, owing to high and comparatively dry locations, by far the largest number must be developed during the winter when the days are very short, and the temperature ranges from freezing point to eighty degrees below zero.

It is unreasonable to expect a speedy modification of the ruling prices of either provisions or labour. The principal trading companies find it impossible as yet to supply the demand for provisions made upon them, and this difficulty bids fair to continue for several years. Labour will continue to be scarce and high-priced, owing to the fact that the majority of men coming to this region naturally prefer to prospect for

themselves, if their conditions will permit. Even were there to be a surplus of labour it will still command a high price, owing to the cost of living.

In the foregoing petition we have endeavoured as best we could to represent facts and conditions with which we have become familiar through an experience of some

years spent in prospecting and mining in the Canadian North-west.

We turn without hesitation to Government, knowing full well that our petition will receive careful and painstaking consideration. In conclusion, we confidently appeal to that keen sense of justice which is so marked a feature of British Government the world over, and which dictates prompt investigation and the redress of any just grievances that may exist.

Page 9, line 36.—After "works" insert "and the maximum rates to be charged by the licensee," be not agreed to, because it is impracticable to fix the maximum rates before the conclusion of the work and before it is ascertained what the cost of constructing and maintaining the same will be; which was agreed to.

After which His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to close the THIRD Session of the Eighth, Parliament of the Dominion with the following Speech :-

Honourable Centlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

Fam glad to be able to relieve you from further attendance in Parliament. Whilst all the measures which public interest seemed to demand and to which I invited your consideration at the opening of this Session, have not received the concurrence of both Houses of Parliament, I congratulate you on the very important legislation which has been the outcome of your deliberations, particularly the Plebiscite Act and the new Franchise Act, which, it is confidently expected, will work satisfactorily in all parts of the Dominion.

I rejoice that during my term of office, it has been my good fortune to witness the improved relations that have grown up between Canada and the neighbouring Republic, and I look forward with much satisfaction to the great benefits that will flow from a settlement of the many questions that have caused irritation in the past.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I thank you for the liberal provision which you have made for the public service.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I now wish to express the earnest hope that the work of the Session may materially advance the prosperity of the country.

I cannot be unmindful of the fact that this is the last occasion on which it will be my privilege to address you from this seat as the Representative of the Sovereign.

In bidding you a cordial farewell, I have to return my warm acknowledgments of the parting Address, full of loyalty to the Queen and of kindly good-will to myself, which I am officially informed has been unanimously passed by both Houses of Parliament, and which will always constitute a valued token and memorial of my stay amongst you; and in conclusion I desire to express my most hearty good wishes for your personal happiness and for the welfare of the great interests entrusted to you.


