

Kingston and Its Attractions.

KINGSTON is an historic city. Its settlement is almost contemporaneous with that of Quebec. In 1673 Count de Frontenac, Governor of New France, made a voyage hither with one hundred and twenty boats in great state, and established a fortified trading post after his own name, with the favor of the Iroquois tribe. Here La Salle built a vessel, and sailed up the lake, establishing a fort at Niagara, where again he built for the navigation of Lake Erie, a part of his aim for a passage to China and by the Mississippi to Mexico.

About Fort Frontenac, called by the Indians Cataraqui, colonists settled. The treachery of its next commandant, De Denonville, towards the Indians, had its fruit in siege, capture and massacres. Frontenac, recalled from France, rebuilt the fort, and it had a tranquil existence till the British capture under Colonel Bradstreet in 1758. It again became important when the Loyalists rocked over from the United States as a result of the War of Independence, and settled in and about it in great numbers, giving it the name of King's Town.

In 1842 it was made the capital of Upper Canada, and great building enterprise was undertaken, but within a few years the seat of government was withdrawn, dissipating the fortunes of the people, and giving a death blow to enterprise while that generation lasted. It settled down to the life and dependence of a garrison town, fostered by extensive fort building under imperial policy.

The British troops being withdrawn, and lake commerce being on the decline, Kingston roused itself in the sixties, and has steadily advanced from a population of 12,600 to one of 21,000, including the Canadian regulars in garrison and suburbs of Portsmouth.

Here are Queen's College, with 300 students in arts, science, theology and medicine; the Royal Military College, beautifully located and finely equipped; the Royal College of Physicians, a branch of Queen's; the Kingston Young Ladies' College; a College of Mining and Agriculture, including dairying, veterinary and navigation schools; the Dominion Business College, and a Collegiate Institute in unbroken operation since 1794.



Various fortifications at the town's military strength second only to that of Quebec, and its five armed martello towers possess an especial interest for visitors. Here, in the only zone (over Navy Bay) well filled with vessels of war from England, but the dock yard, after many years of idleness, is doing duty as a site for the Military College.

Its commercial importance, before the era of railroads, was pre-eminent in Ontario, due to its position at the junction of Lake Ontario and the River St. Lawrence, with a kind locked highway of access, and to its being at the foot of the St. Lawrence Canal navigation. Extensive grain transhipment takes place from lake vessels to river barges, and the cutting of timber is a vigorous business, and fur, lumber, coal and iron trade is done in vessels.

A dry dock, claimed to be the best on the continent, is complete.


Besides the Grand Trunk Railway, there is the Kingston and Pembroke, running 120 miles north through the iron mining district, and connecting with the Canadian Pacific System; the Kingston, Nipissing and Western, running 100 miles northwest, and the projected Kingston, Smith's Falls and Ottawa Railway, 120 miles to the northeast.

Its industries include locomotive and engine works, which, running full, employ 500 men, a cotton mill, a heavy mill, a car works, machine foundry, stove works and cement, oilcloth, biscuit and broom factories.

Its public institutions include the Dominion penitentiary, with 600 inmates; a provincial asylum with 80 patients; two hospitals, two orphanages and two homes for the aged. The public buildings and churches are all of stone, the city hall, court house and Roman Catholic cathedral being models of architecture. It is the seat of a Roman Catholic archbishop and Anglican archbishop. The assessment of property aggregates \$8,000,000.

In beauty of location in general loveliness and poetry of romance, Kingston, townspeople among the cities of this continent, Toledo, Ohio, is a fine example of a inland city. The grand opening exercises of the International Camp in August, 1886, the author having been one of the hosts of her associations with Africa, Canada, Australia, England, Scotland, France, Germany, Italy, Austria, etc., and the other cities.

The first permanent bridge across the St. Lawrence, at the mouth of the Rideau, was built in 1826, and was 100 feet wide and 1,000 feet long, and it was the first bridge of its size and character ever built in North America. The toll collected in the first year of its use amounted to \$8,000. Since 1826, the bridge has been improved in size, or the number of the wide spans, to three, and classed as the 40th in the world. The bridge is 1,000 feet long, 40 feet wide, and stands on four piers, each 100 feet square, and 100 feet high, and is 100 feet above the water. It connects the Island of York with the British Channel between the two Wolfe Islands, a distance of 14 miles, and is 10 miles from the city of Ottawa, and 10 miles from the town of Gananoque, Ontario, 20 miles.




Kingston rises on its gentle slope, the cool grey buildings and slender spires catching the warm glow of the level sunbeams. Far to the right, beyond the long bridge, the winding Cataraqui shows a misty blue between the high green banks that end in the gorge at Kingston Mills. The City Buildings, the Court House and the tower of Queen's University catch the eye as it travels back along the fringe of shipping towards a point, flanked by a Martello tower, at the extreme left, while, farther back, the outlines of the Asylum can be traced in the distance.

"Opposite to the city rises the slope of Barrfield, with its grey church tower, and the undulating common rising gradually into the Fort Hill, while between this and the city runs out the long, level promontory, on which, irradiated by the early sunshine, stand the old and new buildings of the Military College.

"Turning the point made by the Fort Hill, with its embankments and sally-ports, we glide swiftly past Cedar Island, with its Martello tower, and the river channel—some fourteen miles wide—is fairly entered. Cedar Island first shows the peculiar contour and formation of 'The Thousand Islands,' grey gneiss, encrusted with moss and lichen, bearing a low, luxuriant vegetation of birch and cedar and tangled shrubbery.

"A short distance above Gananoque the island mazes begin, with bold, grey rocks, tufted with dark pines, or little bosky clusters of foliage nestling close to the clear blue waves. On a calm summer morning, when the rich and varied colorings of granite, with overhanging foliage of every shade of living green, are reflected in the glassy river, which the steamer's swell raises—not breaks—into long, heavy undulations, the scene is like a dream. We bid adieu to Kingston, the pleasantest residence city in Canada, with lingering regrets."
