

Mexican President Reserves the Right to Determine When His Resignation Becomes Operative-Madero Countermands "On to Mexico" Orders to Insurrectos.

MEXICO CITY, May 7.-General Porfiro Diaz to-night issued a manifesto to the people of Mexico declaring his intention to resign the presidency as soon as peace is restored. In this manner the president has virtually acceded to the demands of Francisco I. Madero that he make announcement of such intention.

Borden's Western Tour to Last Three Weeks — Liberals Also Active-Will Not

Prorogue.

OTTAWA, May 7 .- (Special.) - With the departure of Sir Wilfrid Laurier this week for England, the scene of the political battle will change in a very short while from the capital to the country. Members are arranging for meetings in their constituencies and leaders are arranging for more or less ambitious tours. Naturally the western tour of the leader of the opposition assumes first importance. While the dates are not definitely fixed the tentative program is that Mr. Borden will begin his tour of the west about the middle of June, and that it will last three weeks. Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta will be covered as thoroly as possible in the short time at his dis-posal. British Columbia will not be visited, the assurance of the British Columbia ministers who have been in the capital being that the Pacific pi vince will return no Liberals at the

next general election. There is some prospect now that there will be a general election in the autumn. It will probably take place about the end of November, after the redistribution bill has passed the house.

Liberals Also Active.

In the Liberal camp there is also activity. There will be a strong effort made to render abortive the western tour of Mr. Borden. Indeed, Roderick MacKenzie of The Grain Growers' Gulde, has sent out the call to a number of the Liberal workers who are connected with the Grain Growers' As-sociation, to get together and spoil Mr.

Borden's meetings.

There have been rumors that the government, after parliament adjourns, will prorogue. This may be dismissed as mere speculation. It is altogether improbable that the opposition will allow enough supply to pass the house to lose their hold of the situation. The to lose their hold of the situation. The Conservatives are unanimous in declaring that parliament will not prorogue, but that the reciprocity agreement will be fought to a finish. They have set out to defeat it on national and imperial grounds, and prorogation would only stall off the fight. They want the

LAMILTON APPENINGS

MUST NOT SUPERSEDE THE LAW OF THE LAND

State Must Allow the Liberty Mixed Marriages, Says Rev. E. B. Lancely.

HAMILTON, May 7. — (Special.) — While admitting its right to direct the bonsciences of its members up to a certain point. Rev. E. B. Lancely, in the First Methodist Church here tonight, uttered a vigorous protest against the interference by the Roman Catholic Church with the civil rights of individuals, not of its faith. This, he claimed, the Roman church attempts to do in the enforcement of the Ne Temere decree. If civil law is not to be superseded by Roman canon law, the speaker contended that the state must allow the liberty of mixed marriages, hold the parties thereto to their obligations, provide for the children of such unions, and not allow religious scruples to interfere with the marriage bontract.

Mr. Lancely reviewed the Ne Temere matter at some length, and called attention to the intimate association of the question with the nationalist movement in Quebec, with which, he declared, neither the Gonservative nor the Liberal party could afford to make a ruce, if English dominance in Canada is to be maintained. In reply to the query as to whether he was pessimistic regarding the matter, he referred to the Henri Lemay article in The Revue Canadienne, a translation of which appears in the current Canadian Magazipe. The impossibility of a happy mixed marriage when one of the parties thereto is made a criminal by the Ne Temere secree was one of the points brought out by Mr. Lancely. The consistency of Father Minehan's assertion that there is no sacredness in mixed marriages was criticized by the speaker, in view of the fact that the Roman Church grant dispensations for such harriages. Mr. Lancely cautioned young people to be careful of their alliances, and advised against mixed marriages, they are usually unhappy.

The Strike Situation.







TO accomplish this result an entirely new method had to be I invented, and something very like genius was needed to conceive and carry out that method-the kind of genius which is born of practical imagination and intelligent patience. When the necessary organization had been established and the old methods had been revolutionized, it took eight years and nearly a million and a quarter dollars to bring the Encyclopædia Britannica to the form in which it is now offered to the public. Yet such is the perfection of the new method that the 29 volumes are practically of a uniform date—the year 1910.

FAULTS OF FORMER EDITIONS

THE last completely new edition, the Ninth, was a very great work, the product of great minds, the fruit of great traditions and splendid intentions. But apart from the fact that it is now woefully out of date, it had serious drawbacks and grave faults. The object of this Advance Offer was to ascertain the relative proportions in which the two formats of the book (India paper and ordinary book paper) and the various bindings would be required. 


