PEACE NOT RATIFIED.
Czerin Thus Replies to Russian Notification of Ambassadorial Appointment.

Vienna, via London, April 7.—Count Czerin, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, replying to a message of the people's commissariat at Moscow regarding the appointment of Kamenetz to the post of ambassador to Austria, said that he desired to point out that according to article 10 of the peace treaty, diplomatic and consular relations must be resumed only after the ratification of the peace treaty and that only then will the moment have arrived for the selection of mutual representatives.

WARNING TO GERMANY.
Russian Foreign Minister Protests Against Landing of Troops in Finland.

Moscow, April 7.—Foreign Minister Tchitcherin, in his protest to the Berlin government against the landing of German troops in Finland, characterizes it as a violation of the Brest-Litovsk peace treaty. He cautions Germany against the further movement of German warships in the direction of Helsinki and the seizure of Russian ports, saying that such acts may lead to sad consequences for both sides.

ITALY PRAISES CANADA'S TROOPS
Message Expresses Profound Admiration for Their Fighting Spirit.

Ottawa, April 7.—The following cablegram has been received by Sir George Foster: "Milan, April 4th, 1918.—The sublime heroism with which the brave Canadian troops are fighting the cause of justice and freedom fills our hearts with the greatest enthusiasm, and we beg Your Excellency to accept the expression of our most profound and reverent admiration for the Dominion whose sons are giving such splendid examples of intrepidity and fighting spirit."
To which the following reply was sent by Sir George Foster: "The government and people of Canada greatly appreciate your kind expression of sympathy and accord with their soldiers who on the battle lines are fighting with the brave troops of Italy and the expression of our most profound and reverent admiration for the Dominion whose sons are giving such splendid examples of intrepidity and fighting spirit."

FRENCH ARTILLERY CHECKS ATTACKS
Attempts by Enemy to Make Gains on Sunday Stopped.

Paris, April 7.—Attempts by the Germans to make gains against the French troops in the region of Hangard-en-Santerre, Sunday, were blocked by the artillery. The French artillery took under its fire troop concentrations at various points on the front north of Montdidier.

CANADIAN-RUSSIANS EAGER TO FIGHT
Delegation of People Who Emigrated From Austria-Hungary Waits on Premier.

Ottawa, April 7.—On Saturday a delegation representing the Stovour population who have emigrated from portions of the Austro-Hungarian Empire to Canada waited upon the prime minister and strongly affirmed their warm support of the allied cause, and of their utter detestation of the purpose and methods of the central powers. They affirm that since the war broke out many of their immediate relatives and friends resident within the Austrian Empire have been persecuted, imprisoned and even murdered by reason of their well known sympathy with the allied cause.

WEST IS FIRM BEHIND UNION
Believe However That Military Service Act Should Be More Drastic.

Ottawa, April 7.—The long debate that kept the house of commons sitting until daylight Saturday morning is now being reviewed from several angles. It gave an opportunity, for example, to the Province of Quebec to present her case to the west. That case was well presented, not only by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Lapointe, but by several of the new members. Quebec has a stronger representation in the house than she has had for many years, but for all that Quebec failed to convince the west. The west members were evidently interested. They listened intently, and had little to say, but their judgment in the case was no doubt accurately expressed by Mr. Redman, Unionist member for Calgary.

RUSSIANS IN ENGLAND ARE ANXIOUS TO LEAVE
American Consulate Deluged With Applications From "Students" for Passports.

London, April 7.—The American consulate has been deluged for the past few days by applications from Russians resident in England for passports to America. This is the result of current reports as to the features of the new act for enlarging conscription which, it is said, may embolden the residents of foreign nationality. There are many thousands of the various races of Russian nationality living in the Whitechapel district, and there is considerable feeling among the English people, especially workmen, against these foreigners who are living in the country and enjoying the protection of its army, navy and laws, but taking virtually no share in its military burdens. Moreover, many of them are stepping into the shoes of small business men, who abandoned their occupations to join the army, or they are taking the jobs of workmen who enlist.

NO RESUMPTION SUNDAY OF ANY BIG FIGHTING
London, April 7.—There was no resumption on Sunday of the heavy fighting along the British front. The Germans, according to the report from Petrograd, started two attacks at night, but were repelled. The report says: "Successful minor operations undertaken by us this morning south of the Somme led to sharp local fighting. The enemy counter-attacked strongly in an attempt to regain his former positions, and suffered heavy losses. The number of German prisoners taken has increased to over 140; several machine guns also were captured."
This morning the enemy made two attempts to deliver attacks against our position at Bucuoy, but in each case his troops were stopped and dispersed by our artillery fire.

GERMAN SHIPPING RUINED.
Enemy Owners Face Uncertain Prospects After War—Loss Important Trades.

ALL ENEMY ASSAULTS MEET WITH POWERFUL RESISTANCE, BUT FIGHTING IS OF PURELY LOCAL CHARACTER.

The second phase of the great battle along the Somme, which the Germans began on Thursday, has died down. It lasted less than three days, and the fighting has resolved itself into more or less isolated engagements, in which the French and British allies have more than held their own.

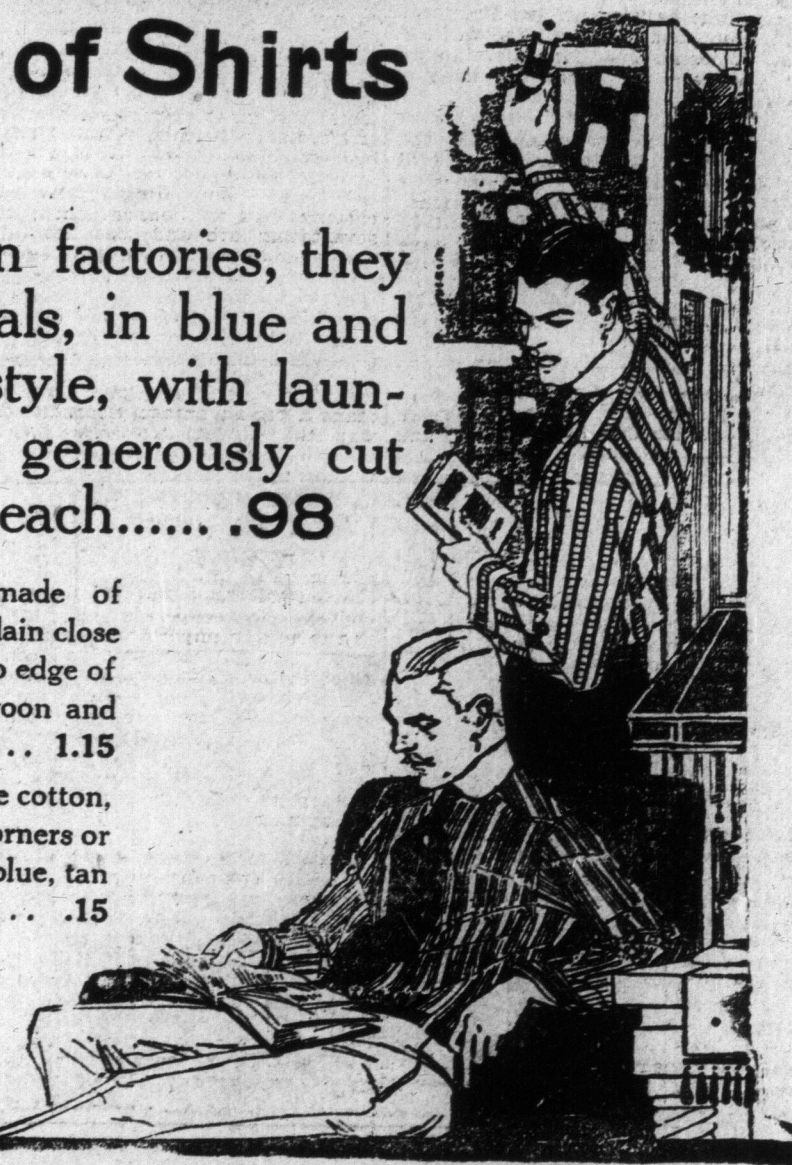

**SPECTACULAR FIRE
BURNS OIL PLANT**

Two Hundred Thousand Gallons Destroyed in Blaze.

DAMAGE IS HEAVY

Second \$300,000 Fire in Toronto Within Week.

Jets of liquid fire, pouring 75 feet in the air, and explosions of barrels of oil that sounded like the cannonading on the western front, made one of the most spectacular daylight fires in many years, when the Galena-Signal Oil Company's plant at 120 Royce avenue, Toronto Junction, was destroyed by fire Saturday. Two hundred thousand gallons of oil, much of it the finest lubricating oil on the market, went up in smoke. The entire main building of the plant was destroyed, but the office and seven large oil tanks near the building were saved thru the efforts of the firemen.

Many Narrow Escapes.
The firemen had many narrow escapes. When the Ossington avenue section arrived they took up the task of preventing the blaze from crossing the C.P.R. tracks to the plant of the Bateman-Wilkinson Company Limited. No sooner had they laid their hose than a series of terrific explosions occurred. Barrels and barrel-tops flew in every direction, one of them striking District Chief Charles Dunn on the head. He escaped miraculously without injury. A few minutes later the north wall caved in, the bricks falling on both sides of the firemen.

Caught From Tank Car.
The fire is believed to have caught from a hot journal-box one of six tank cars on the Grand Trunk siding. Employees of the company noticed the fire in the box, and tearing left the building should catch fire they tried to find an engine to move the row of cars. The only engine in sight was a "dummy" engine, belonging to the Canadian Albia-Chalmers Company. It was on the C.P.R. tracks which cross the G.T.R. tracks at this point. A man who was in the vicinity at the time said that the employees of the two railways had an argument, the result of which was that the G.T.R. refused to allow the "dummy" engine on its tracks. The fire quickly spread to the main building. Later the six tank cars were removed to safety, and the fire in the journal-box was extinguished.

Main Building Total Loss.
The main building was a total loss, and the firemen directed their efforts to prevent the fire spreading to the seven large tanks about 150 feet away. Eighteen of the twenty-five lines of hose were put in action at this point. The oil from the tanks in the building had flooded outside and the men were standing in oil to their hips. They had to watch carefully to see that the fire did not ignite the oil in which they were standing.

Benzene Tank Under Furnace.
An 8,000 gallon tank of benzene was stored underneath the main building, but it was prevented from exploding by firemen who kept three lines of hose playing on the ground immediately above it. The fire was not able to spread to the neighboring tanks because the stop-cocks had been turned off.

The first alarm was rung in at 12:10. No one was in the building at the time, although rumors spread thru the crowd of 50,000 people that gathered to watch the spectacle. It had been set by three foreigners who had been taken on for work in the morning. When District Chief Dunn arrived he sent in the second alarm and shortly afterwards the third and last alarm was sent in. It was not found necessary to send in a general alarm. The fire was still burning in the late afternoon, and Deputy Chief Russell expressed the opinion that it would burn all night.

Railway Traffic Tied Up.
Railway traffic on both the C. P. R. and G. T. R. lines was tied up for four hours, after which the lines of hose were strung underneath the tracks. Telegraph wires on both lines were down, but within an hour electricians were stringing them again. They had to work under difficulties. Dark clouds of smoke carried by the strong southerly wind blew into their faces, while the flames had scorched the telegraph poles until they were almost breaking. Officials of the company refused to discuss the fire, or to give any details of the insurance.

NEWS OF LABOR

TOO MANY SOCIALISTS IS GIBBONS' OPINION

Joseph Gibbons, business agent for Local 112 of the International Union of Street Railwaymen of America, stated on Saturday that he was not over sanguine as to the future of the newly-formed Canadian Labor Party. "The trouble with the Ontario section, at any rate, is that it is composed of too many diverse elements, and the chief among the disturbing elements is the socialist faction, which, in my estimation, is likely to use the organization for the furtherance of its Utopian aims. The ordinary socialist may be all right, but the trouble with the faction is that it has within its ranks too many fire-eaters and class-

hating enthusiasts. These people are always on the job, and are never at a loss to make themselves heard no matter what opposition may be lined up against them. "In the course of time these fire-eaters will so upset the meetings that they will make the moderates disgusted with things generally and they will refuse to attend the meetings. With what result? Why, the haters of the bourgeoisie will take time by the forelock; they will hold caucuses for their own, and when the conventions are held they will outnumber the moderates already disgusted with the influence of fiery invective, and as a result will elect officials and representatives from their own number. Finally the party will become controlled by the impulsive element of the socialists, whose views will conflict with every aim of the moderates, and the party will evolve into a socialist organization."

C. E. Hill, general agent for the Commercial Telegraphers' Union, stated Saturday that the case of the operators charged by the G. N. W. with misusing the wires was being laid over until next Friday, the men having been remanded until that day. He stated that the men in the union with the present situation. The investigation was being held. It was true, but it was equally true that the four accused men had not been remanded pending the result of the investigation. "It is all I can do to hold the men in," said Mr. Hill. "They are aroused over the matter to an unusual degree. "My impression is that the company has a very weak case against the men," continued Mr. Hill. "One thing is certain, and that is that the

company itself will be involved in the course of the investigation. We have all kinds of evidence against it. The company will be dragged into the investigation. We have succeeded in having the investigation held, and for the present this will be enough."

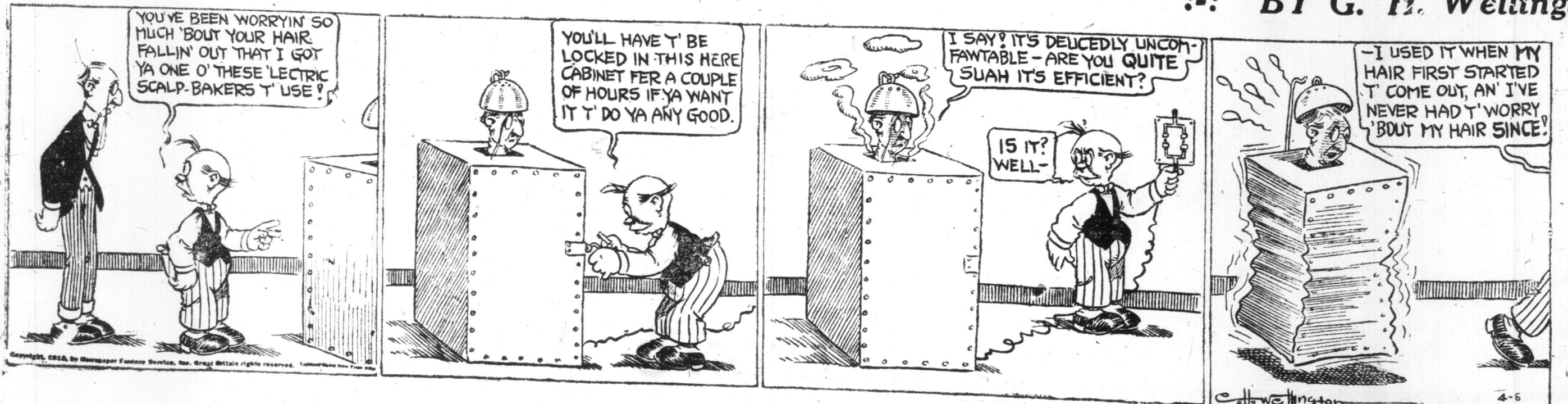

MASS ATTACKS FAIL TO SHAKE BRITONS IN AREA OF CORBIE

Terrible Artillery Defence Probably Postponed Time of German Onset.

COUNTER-DRIVE GAINS

Enemy Loses Ground in Sharp Engagement Near Aveluy Wood.

With the British Army in Franco, April 7.—The enemy infantry continued its mass attacks just east of Corbie on the Somme during the early hours yesterday, and there was every indication that a heavy assault would be made. At noon, however, it was stated that the storm had not yet broken.

In the meantime the British artillery was maintaining a terrible bombardment of the enemy's assembling places, and it is possible that this may have delayed the onslaught.

North of the Somme the most important event thus far reported was a British counter-attack southwest of Aveluy Wood, in which some ground was regained after a sharp engagement.

The enemy Saturday continued to make raids along the northern section of the battle front for the purpose of learning what British troops were opposing them. German prisoners captured on April 3 declared that their latest orders were to be ready to push on further, but, so well was the secrecy of the plans preserved, they knew nothing more of the impending operations. That there would be another drive shortly, however, seemed to be the general opinion.

ing in the Albert sector Friday were very heavy. At numerous places it was possible with the naked eye to see them forming for the attack, and in every case the British artillery and machine guns played havoc among the assembling troops.

Near Hebuterne German concentrations were caught in machine gun barrages on three occasions and badly smashed.
Lassigny Farm, south of Hebuterne, also was the scene of very heavy fighting on Friday before the Germans finally regained it. No less than three attacks were delivered against the British positions. The first two were repulsed, but the third, which was delivered with large forces, compelled the British to fall back a little and abandon the place to the enemy.

Pounding of Germans.
The British artillery continued to pound the Germans all along the battle front. An example of the fine work being done by the gunners is to be seen at Erville, which the Germans have been forced to abandon because of the heavy fire. Mory has also been made virtually untenable, and other places are not very comfortable.

It was apparent on Friday before the attack began that the Germans would attempt an advance, and the British artillery concentrated on all known places of assembly with a tremendous bombardment. This undoubtedly weakened the assault which followed.
