



Toronto's Representation.

Mr. Wallace: Take the city of Toronto and the County of York. Toronto is a pretty Conservative city. It is true the Government have only one representative from there now, and their prospects for the future are not good. So they say: We cannot carve a Grit constituency out of the city of Toronto in any way that we know, so we will hive the Tories in the city of Toronto. We will take the Conservative element from the two ridings of East York and West York, and we will add them to the city of Toronto. They will take from the west riding of York probably one-half the constituency, a constituency that has not had its boundaries changed for more than 50 years. They take one-half of that and add it to the city of Toronto. They do practically the same thing with the East Riding of York, taking about one-half of it and adding it to the city of Toronto. Toronto to-day has four members. With the additions to be made from the East and West Ridings of York, Toronto will have a population estimated at over 200,000, so that Toronto will have four members, each representing about 50,000 of a population.

The County of Simcoe is a Conservative county; it usually sends three Conservatives to Parliament and may be depended upon in the future to preserve its record. The unit of population, according to the last census, is 22,900. Simcoe has 65,000 over the unit. Kent, with a population of 58,019, is to have three members, or an average of 19,378. Kent is supposed to be a Liberal county, and 19,000 people in Kent, being Liberals, are as good as 27,000 people in Simcoe being Conservatives.

SKAGUAY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

washington, May 19.—Each of the members of the American branch of the Joint High Commission has received a handsomely prepared invitation from the Chamber of Commerce of Skaguay, through its president, to visit that port and see for themselves the conditions. The invitation recites in strong language the desire of the people of Skaguay to have the commission maintain to the utmost the claims of the United States to every foot of territory within the 30 miles lying between the sea and the boundary line, as it has heretofore been recognized.

It has come to that pass in the negotiations now going on in London between Lord Sanbsbury and Sir Julian Pauncefote on one side and Ambassador Choate on the other, that the resuming of the Joint Commission depends entirely upon the disposition made of this Alaskan boundary question. When the commission adjourned last winter it was because the two branches were unable to agree upon it.


