JOHN MARTIN WAS POISONED

Coroner's Jury Could Not Say Whether or Not the Poison Was Self-Administered.

CARBOLIC ACID CAUSED DEATH.

He Had Threatened to Take His Own Life Because He Could Not Get Work.

Ten witnesses were examined at the inquest conducted by Coroner Craig last night at the Appellate Station on the body of John Martin, the laborer who was found dead at his home in the rear of 50 Agnes street on Tuesday morning.

Dr. Healy, who made the post-mortem examination of the remains, said he was satisfied that death had resulted from poisoning, although there was evidence of alcoholism.

Police Constable George Kennedy called the facts leading up to the finding in the deceased's home of a bottle which was about one-fourth full of carbolic acid, and another which had a color of poison.
