# JEFF FITZSIMMONS SENATE POOL ROOM SENATE FIGHT

## Champion Scored Clean Knockout by Punch on Jaw—Lanky Bob Had All the Advantage Until Finish Came, Jeffries Bleeding Profusely—Enormous Crowd in Tented Enclosure.

San Francisco, July 25.—After fighting a battle of eight rounds, that was fought with brilliant and courageous work, Robert Fitzsimmons tonight forfeited his last claim upon the heavyweight championship. He was knocked to the floor by James J. Jeffries and counted out after he had so badly punished the champion that it was a foregone conclusion among the spectators that the Cornishman must win. Bleeding from a number of gashes in the face, apparently weakening him clearly, Jeffries delivered two lucky punches as Fitzsimmons passed in his lighting to speak to him and turned the fight over to the pugilistic referee. Fitzsimmons tried to rise, but fell again helplessly and heard himself counted out, whereupon a moment before he had apparently all the better of the fight.

"I will never fight again," said the lanky victor of the ring when he had sufficiently recovered to be able to make his way to the dressing room. "You are the most dangerous man alive," said Jeffries in return, "and I consider myself lucky to have won when I did."

## CANADA'S WHEAT FIELDS AN IMPORTANT FACTOR

### Immigration From United States Discussed in the British House of Lords.

London, July 25.—In the House of Lords, to-day, Lord Burghielie (Liberal) asked Lord Onslow, Under Secretary for the Colonial Office, if he could inform the House regarding the alarming statements that Canadian land was being bought up by Americans, of whom 200,000 were said to have emigrated to Canada this year. The Under Secretary said he thought Lord Burghielie's figures were incorrect. In 1901, the number of Americans who emigrated to Canada was 17,987, while, to the most recent date this year, the number was 24,100. The Under Secretary also said that, in Western Canada, land was being taken up with unexampled rapidity, not only by Americans, but by Englishmen and other Europeans, which bids fair to make Canadian wheat fields an important factor in the wheat supply of the world.

### DRESSMAKER DROPPED DEAD.

Miss Stephenson of Markham-place Expired Without Warning.  
Miss Stephenson, a dressmaker, who lived at No. 2 Markham-place, died suddenly last night. About 8:30 o'clock, while walking across the street, she suddenly fell to the ground. Life was extinct before the doctors arrived. Coroner N. A. Powell was notified, and after making an investigation of the facts, decided an inquest was unnecessary. The body will be buried in the morning.

### RIFLE RECOGNIZED WEAPON.

Lord Dundonald Favors Its Use for Mounted Men.  
Montreal, July 25.—Lord Dundonald, the new commander of the Canadian militia, arrived early this morning and left at 4 o'clock for Ottawa. To the World's new commanding officer, he was a strong proponent of the use of the rifle by cavalry, and said that the rifle was now the recognized weapon for mounted men. He was also highly pleased to learn that rifle clubs were being rapidly formed in the Dominion.

### FATALITIES IN A WINDSTORM

Three Dead and 12 Missing From Vancouver Fishing Fleet.  
Vancouver, B. C., July 25.—Three men were drowned and 12 others are missing, as the result of a furious windstorm here to-day. The havoc was wrought among the fishing fleet, and the extent of the damage is being learned only by the occupants of all vessels are heard from. Many houses were destroyed by the high wind. 

## SOLUTION OF ROBBERY

### REVEALS WHOLE MYSTERY

#### Trained Detective Gives the World Expert Opinion Touching Disclosures in the Evans Warehouse—Police Working on Substantial Clues That May Develop an Inquest.

The Evans warehouse mystery continues the absorbing topic of conversation through the city. There have been no developments during the past forty-eight hours. The police during this time have been very active. The detectives, with the Crown Attorney, were in consultation yesterday over the case and visited the place where the robbery, fires and two mysterious deaths have occurred during the past. They were engaged in the basement where the bodies of Gen and Whalley were found, for some time. The safe that was secured by the alleged burglar was examined and extended notes made of its contents, locations of drugs and other things in the building. It was found that the safe was not locked, and that the door was open. The distance from the safe to the rear door of the basement was carefully measured. The purpose of such a minute examination is obscure. The detectives and the police department are now working on the case, and it is expected that the investigation will be exhaustive. The results of the detectives' efforts are likely to be at least partially developed during the inquest.

### ROBLIN IS NOT HOPEFUL

### PHILADELPHIA HIT HARD

Philadelphia, July 25.—A violent electrical storm broke over this city and surrounding country, causing considerable damage to property. The Flint Glass Works of James J. Murray & Co. in this city were struck by lightning and partially destroyed. Loss is estimated at more than \$50,000. Lightning also struck one of the smaller oil tanks at the Point Breeze Oil Works, but the flames were confined to the one tank. The lightning played havoc with overhead wires and the police, telegraph and telephone services. In all sections the wires were overwound, and cellars were flooded.

LETTER FROM "B-P."

New Westminster, July 25.—Mr. J. Deveraux has received the following letter from Gen. Baden-Powell, touching the death of his son in the last engagement of the war:

South African Constabulary, Johannesburg, June 4, 1902. Mr. J. Deveraux:

Dear Sir,—You will have received by cable the sad news of the death of your son Percy Leonard Deveraux, of this corps. I deeply regret to have to confirm this. He was one of a column of the constabulary who attacked the Boers on the 30th ult., at Buffersdorp, Western Transvaal.

He fell upon the enemy, but in doing so lost one man killed and four wounded, among whom was your poor son, and he succumbed to the wounds the following day, in spite of every care.

EDITOR MACADAM'S CASE

Article in Sandon Paystreak Which Got Him Nine Months in a B.C. Jail.

SAY JUDICIARY WERE CORRUPT

And That He Had a Well-Founded Contempt for That Body.

R. MacAdams, editor of The Saranac Canadian, and father of William MacAdams, editor of The Sandon Paystreak, who has been committed for contempt of court, and whose case has created widespread interest, is in the city.

The article complained of, was sent to prison, is as follows: "J. K. Clark's famous case against J. Frank Collium, for commission of the Arlington deal has again been postponed this time until next December. J. K. Clark now waits eight months trying to break into British Columbia courts but owing to Collium's skill cannot get a hearing, and it is evident that the courts intend to continue putting him off on one pretext or another until he dies or quits the game."

"We pride ourselves on our British fair play, but we maintain a string of judges who are corrupt, lazy, debauched and prejudiced, and we permit them to conduct the business of the province in a manner that is simply outrageous. The two-handed game man is a lesser danger to society than a corrupt judge."

"Summoned for Contempt." It was no time after the publication of the article till a summons was issued against MacAdams. He had disobeyed the first order of the court demanding his appearance at Victoria, claiming that he had no money to pay for the journey, and he published another paragraph, commenting on the proceedings, in which he stated that the charges of contempt were probably all rights, and he was ready to go to jail for the offence.

"Interest in His Case." When MacAdams appeared before the judiciary whom he accused, the morning the court was crowded with interested spectators. The young editor defended himself, and his case was a newspaper man by profession, and he wrote articles which he believed were largely reflections of public opinion—he wrote things which were being said by people in the street. The press of the day, and the people, and in writing the article complained of he was probably in a heated state of mind, and he wrote the article in the heat of the moment. The case in question had not yet been settled. Whether 25,000 men in the case he was not prepared to say. He had no proofs to produce, and he knew little about the case. The parties to the case were Collium and Clark, the former a rich and the latter a poor man. Clark was a mining engineer by profession, and he was one of three men—the others being Collium and Adams—who had been in the Arlington deal on the understanding that they should share the profits. Afterwards Adams and Clark refused to pay Clark anything. He knew nothing about the merits of the case, but it had been in the courts a long time, and Clark had put every cent he possessed into it, and had done all he could to get the case settled. On two occasions the case had been adjourned. MacAdams apologized.

The Chief Justice interrupted him by pointing out that the charge was not in regard to adjournments, but that the court was corrupt. MacAdams admitted that he should not have used the word "corrupt," and he considered an apology due.

The court adjourned for half an hour, and on resuming the Chief Justice said the defendant had been found guilty, on his own admissions, of a serious contempt of court, and of a serious attack upon the court with a view to scandalizing the judiciary before the country. The statements in the article in question stabled the court in its most vital parts, and the administration of justice. The defendant admitted that he had written the article, and should have known better than to write such an article. Not satisfied with one apology, the court ordered an apology was worse than no apology, because he had limited it to one point. The court would be very lenient if it allowed articles of the sort in question to pass unchallenged. He wished to remind MacAdams that he was not going to be made a hero of, as there were heroes in the halls of British Columbia.

The Editor Described. In the lengthy reports of the case published in the British Columbia papers the jailed editor is described as a nice-looking young man, with a clean-shaven, with a clever face, not at all the sort of gentleman one would have expected to see as the author of the red-hot articles that generally distinguish The Paystreak. His is a Canadian name, and has taken recently a prominent part in the municipal affairs of Sandon. He has been seeking to inaugurate a new municipal waterworks and electric light system, and he claims that the present proceedings were initiated against him by a political rival who is interested in the old waterworks at Sandon.

CHANCELLOR'S SWAN SONG SPEECH

T. P. O'Connor Regrets It Should Be Against Ireland.

London, July 25.—In the House of Commons to-day Irish matters came up again. A motion of John J. Clancy (Irish Nationalist), to the effect that the over-taxation of Ireland constitutes a pressing grievance, was defeated by 168 to 117, after a number of Irish Nationalists had spoken and been replied to by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach. The Chancellor said Ireland's share in Imperial taxation was decreasing rather than increasing, and that it was the fattest system which could at present be devised.


