HISTORICAL MEMORANDA

IN CONNECTION WITH

Crescent Street Church, Montreal

(FORMERLY FREE CHURCH, COTÉ STREET.)

- The Congregation owes its origin to the deep interest which some individuals had in the struggles of the Free Church party in Scotland, and who met together to advance Free Church principles. They were called the Free Church Committee. The Congregation was organized, and for seven years ministered to by Deputies from the Free Church of Scotland.
- 1844.—January 10. First Meeting of Free Church Committee. Invitation sent to REV. DR. CUNNINGHAM, then in the United States, to come to Montreal.
- “ Arrival of DR. BURNS, of Paisley, the First Deputy from the Free Church.
- “ May.—A call for a Minister sent to the Free Church Colonial Committee, with promise of adequate support. A call sent to REV. W. C. BURNS at the same time to come out as an Evangelist.
- “ End of summer.—REV. MR. KING, of Glasgow, and REV. MR. MACNAUGHTAN, of Paisley, Deputies from the Free Church arrived. REV. W. C. BURNS, arrived about the same time and preached in St. Gabriel Street Church.
- 1845.—The REV. J. BONAR, of Larbert, arrived in Spring, preached in St. Gabriel Street Church till a temporary wooden church was erected on Lagache'siere Street. He opened this Church on May 11th, and on the 25th of May inducted the first elders, viz: John Redpath, James R. Orr, David Ferguson, Evander MacIver.
- “ The REV. W. ARNOT, of Glasgow, arrived about this time, and supplied the pulpit till the end of September.
- “ The REV. A. N. SOMERVILLE, of Glasgow, took charge during October and November.
- “ The REV. W. C. BURNS, in November, received but declined a call to labour in Canada, the Congregation promising to support him. In December he was again urged to fall in with this request, but finally declined on January 19th, 1846.
- 1846.—The REV. G. STEVENSON, of Pulteneytown, ministered from January to April.
- “ The REV. T. MACLAUGHLAN, of Stratherrick, ministered during May and June.
- “ The REV. J. MUNRO, of Rutherglen, ministered during July and August.
- “ The REV. J. ALEXANDER, of Kirkcaldy, ministered from November to March, 1847.
- 1847.—The REV. J. B. DUNCAN, then a Student, ministered during April and part of May.
- “ The REV. J. MACGILLIVRAY, of Aberdeen, opened the Church in Coté Street, on Sabbath, the 16th of May, preaching morning and evening, while the Rev. Henry Wilkes preached in the afternoon.
- “ The REV. J. BUCHANAN, of Bothwell, ministered from May to October.
- “ The REV. R. BREMNER, of Glasgow, ministered from November to April.
- 1848.—The REV. J. PATTERSON, of Tranent, ministered from May to October.
- 1849.—The REV. J. LEWIS, of Leith, ministered from April to August.
- “ The REV. J. C. BURNS, of Kirkliston, ministered from September to February, 1850.
- 1850.—The REV. J. C. F. IRBAIRN, of Allanton, ministered from August to October.
- “ The REV. D. COOPER, of Burntisland, ministered from November to February, 1850.
- 1851.—The REV. D. FRASER, ordained Pastor, August 8th, 1851.
- 1859.—The REV. D. FRASER, translated to Inverness, Scotland, February 3rd, 1859.
- “ The REV. B. F. GREIG, ministered four months from April, 1859.
- “ The REV. HUGH COBBAN, of Braemar, ministered from Sept., 1859, to Jan., 1860.

- 1860.—The REV. GEORGE LEWIS, ministered several months from May.
 “ The REV. WM. SCRIMGEOUR, ministered from Nov., till Jan., 1861.
 1860.—Debt on Coté Street Church extinguished.
 1861.—The REV. D. H. MACVICAR, inducted pastor, January 30th, 1861.
 1868.—The REV. D. H. MACVICAR, translated to the Presbyterian College, Montreal, Sept. 10th, 1868.
 1870.—The REV. R. F. BURNS, inducted pastor, May 4th, 1870.

When Dr. Paton of the New Hebrides was with us, the feature in our congregational life which pleased him most was our Sabbath morning prayer meeting. As we were going together into the vestry he heard the singing in the library and asked what it was. I told him that it was some of the congregation gathered to ask God's blessing on the word that was to be spoken and on all the work we were doing. The Apostolic Missionary was greatly pleased, and, as you may remember, in the course of his address, urged all who could to join that company. Are all doing so who could? Why are you not there? Is it because of home duties, or because your heart is not in such things and you have little faith in the power of prayer and no enjoyment of such a gathering? Those of you who, from the pressure of other responsibilities, cannot go to that meeting, can unite in spirit with those who do, and beseech the blessing of the Lord, without which all our work will be in vain. And if as a people the spirit of grace and supplication is poured out upon us, abundant usefulness and fruitfulness will be the result. Who are our greatest benefactors? who are furthering most efficiently the work of the Lord among us? Those who are most faithful to the standing orders of the great Head of the Church. "Rejoice always; pray without ceasing; in everything give thanks." If there is ceaseless prayer, there will be constant joy and universal thanksgiving, and the blessing of the Lord will

rest upon us more and more. But if our prayers are languid, formal, fitful, the work of the Lord will be greatly hindered. Would that I could convince every one of this, and stir up all to be the Lord's remembrancers, to take no rest and to give Him no rest, till He pour upon us Pentecostal blessings. Who will join this company of the prayerful, and always in private, and as frequently as possible in public, but especially at the prayer meeting on Sabbath morning, wait on the Lord for that blessing, without which all our preaching and teaching and giving and working are a beating of the air?

Report of the Deacons' Court,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1895

In the report and statements for the year which the Deacons have now to submit to the Congregation, there is nothing calling for special comment. The accounts will show that the finances of the Congregation are in a fairly satisfactory condition, and the liberality of the Congregation fully up to the average of past years. We have much cause for gratitude to God who has blessed us as a Congregation with the means and willingness of mind to do what we have done for the carrying on of His work both at home and abroad.

WEEKLY OFFERINGS.

The ordinary and special receipts under this head for the year amount to \$10,279.81, of which \$7,062.80 was by envelope, \$1,547.11 in open collection, and \$1,669.90 by

special subscriptions, making a weekly average of \$197.70. The net results for the year showing an increase of \$1,057.32 as compared with 1894. This increase is mainly due to the special contribution towards the salary of our Congregational Missionary. It is satisfactory, however, to note that the contributions by envelope and open collection show a gain of \$407.78.

In this connection we may refer to the circular issued in October last, and the Congregational Meeting held on 6th November. Following up the decision come to at that meeting, the Court has endeavored, both by appeals from the pulpit and by visitation in part, to accomplish the end in view, that is to increase the offerings by envelope to the sum of \$200 per Sabbath. The returns so far from 63 new subscribers and 153 old subscribers who have responded, show an increase of over \$2,100, that is presuming that old subscribers who have not responded to our appeal shall contribute as heretofore. Accordingly, the Court will be able to carry out the first two items of their proposal, viz., to support a congregational and foreign missionary out of the weekly offerings; and if those who are yet to be heard from respond with equal liberality to those who have already declared their purpose, there will be no difficulty in carrying out the scheme as a whole. We trust that this consideration will ensure a hearty and speedy response from all such, so that there may not only be the consolidation but also the extension of our gifts for the work of the Lord.

PEW RENTS.

The revenue from this source for the year has been \$4,424.21, showing a slight advance over 1894. The charges against this account have been slightly in excess of the receipts, which is owing to some extra expenditure.

BUILDING FUND.

The balance at debit of this fund, \$636.97, remains the same as last year. We have been disappointed in not having been able to provide for this, but the Court trusts that ere long this liability will be dealt with.

FOREIGN MISSION FUND (CHINA.)

In our last report we referred to the fact that the work of our missionary, the Rev. J. H. MacVicar, was suspended for the time being. It is with much regret we have

now to report that owing to the state of Mrs. MacVicar's health, which it was considered would not permit her to remain in the mission field, Mr. MacVicar has felt constrained to sever his connection with us. Notwithstanding that we are as yet without a successor to Mr. MacVicar, subscriptions for this work to the extent of \$311 have been received during the year, and the balance now at credit of this fund is \$574.15. With this sum in hand, and the increase in the weekly offering, the Court has agreed to inform the Foreign Mission Committee that they purpose to support Wm. McClure, M.D., as their Foreign Missionary from the first of January, 1896.

CHURCH PRAISE.

Commencing in February last a change was made in the mode of conducting our Service of Praise, and the Court considered themselves fortunate in having been able to secure the services of Mr. Joseph Gould in this connection. With the very efficient choir under his leadership, this important part of our worship has been rendered in a manner which they hope has been generally acceptable.

It is with pleasure the Court would note the hearty manner in which the congregation join in the rendering of the Psalms and Hymns contained in our admirable Hymnal, proving that a well trained choir can be made a help instead of a hindrance in leading our Songs of Praise. The cost has, necessarily, been somewhat increased, however, only \$1000, or a reduction of \$300 on the previous year, has been charged to the ordinary revenues of the church, and the balance has been provided for by special subscriptions.

CONCLUSION.

From the foregoing report it will be gathered that the various schemes of the Church have been liberally sustained.

God grant that during the year upon which we have entered, the Congregation may by their prayers and offerings show an increasing interest in all the work we have undertaken to do.

ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31ST, 1895.

The work of our Sabbath School for the year 1895, has proceeded on much the same lines as heretofore. Perhaps the most noteworthy expansion has been the undertaking of work among the city Chinese. This department, with Mr. H. M. Cockfield as superintendent, was organized Feb. 25, and has been continued ever since. The work is, of course, elementary, as the Chinese must first be taught English. Religious truth is instilled by Bible reading and the singing of hymns. In order to make this work more effective, a teacher has in most cases been provided for each pupil, and some of the older members of our school have engaged in this good work.

The average attendance of teachers has been 17, and of Chinese 19. The collections amount to \$47.66. This sum was paid directly into the church funds, and is not, therefore, included in school funds mentioned below.

Early in the year it was decided to devote the collections during certain periods to particular schemes, so that the children would know exactly to what they were contributing, and that some of the money, if need be, might be paid before the end of the year.

Ratification of these payments will be asked of the meeting, when the allocations of the rest of the money are made. Short addresses on the various objects were given from time to time by Mr. Morrice, Rev. E. Scott and others, and we trust that the children's knowledge of and interest in the mission work of the church have been greatly increased thereby.

Last spring a committee of teachers was appointed to purchase books for the library. A large number were distributed among the teachers, and after careful examination, some 59 were approved of and placed on the library shelves. At the same time a number of old books which had been much read were rebound for continued use, while others have been sent to outside schools less favoured than our own.

The following papers have been distributed among the various classes: The "Westminster Quarterly," The "British Workwoman," The "Children's Record," The "Children's Friend," and "Our Little Dots."

For the past three years the annual picnic has been held at Sherringham Park, but this year a change was thought desirable and Otterburn Park was chosen. Thither an unusually large number resorted on Saturday, June 1st, and thoroughly enjoyed themselves in the perfect weather with which we were favored. We again desire to tender our best thanks to those who contributed their time and means to make the picnic successful.

Last year we noted with pleasure the alterations and improvements in the Infant Class room, and now our thanks are again due to the Deacons' Court for adding to its appearance and comfort by a carpet.

At the close of the year, the teachers accepted with regret the resignation of Mr. George Hyde as Assistant Superintendent. For three years Mr. Hyde has acceptably performed the duties of this office and those of twenty-five years previous, and I am sure I am voicing the sentiments of the staff in expressing the highest appreciation of his services to the school during this period: Such a record constrained the teachers, however reluctantly, to meet Mr. Hyde's wish to be relieved. We are glad to have him still a member of the staff, and at the same time feel sure that the duties of Assistant Superintendent will be ably performed by his successor, Mr. Munro.

In concluding our report for the year, we, as a staff of teachers, desire to express our deep sense of the importance of the work in which we are engaged, and, while confessing that we have not always done what we could in the past, we shall strive to go on in God's strength, asking His blessing upon our efforts during the year before us.

Nazareth Street Mission.

With feelings of devout thankfulness to God, your Missionary reviews the work of the Mission for another year.

The regular Sabbath services, the weekly prayer meetings, and the Mission band meetings have been held regularly during the whole year.

The attendance at the Sabbath evening services has been somewhat larger than the preceding year, and the interest manifested is gratifying.

The attendance at the weekly prayer is about the same as usual.

Monthly missionary meetings were held during the year, when addresses were delivered on the various mission fields of the church.

The Mission Band raised about twenty dollars, and it has been allotted to Home Mission work.

About one hundred homes have been visited during the year, and over five hundred visits have been made. Scripture has been read, and prayers offered in the homes when practicable. Tracts and leaflets have also been distributed.

There has been a good deal of sickness in connection with the Mission, and some of a protracted nature. In such cases small prayer meetings have been held in order to comfort and cheer the sick. Death has also been doing its work. Five deaths have occurred, taking away both old and young. Several cases of distress have been relieved, clothing has been distributed, and letters of recommendation have been given to the various charitable institutions whereby food and fuel have been obtained. Children have been looked after and sent to public schools, and thus the work in its several branches goes on.

Two or three letters have been received from young men who have been attending the Mission in past years, but who are now in other places; some of them across the Atlantic. The letters have been very gratifying to me, and no doubt will be to all who are interested in the work of the Mission. One tells of the great good he has received

in attending the meetings of the Mission, and adds. that Eternity alone will be able to tell the amount of good that is being done there.

In reviewing the past I feel that while we can "Thank God and take courage," there is great need for increased faithfulness and persistent effort, if we are to reclaim the wandering ones and lift up the fallen.

Ladies' Visiting and Aid Society.

The first meeting for the season 1895-1896 was held October eleventh, and was well attended. As Mrs. D. Crawford, who had filled the office of President for several years, wished to resign, Mrs. Hyde was elected to fill the place and consented to do so.

After some consideration it was decided to have the meetings for sewing in connection with the Ladies' Aid work, instead of, as heretofore, under the auspices of the Woman's Missionary Auxiliary.

A number of ladies' have met to sew, and not only have worked when together, but have taken the work home in order to more quickly complete the garments begun at the meetings. The result has been very satisfactory. Many of the deserving poor have been warmed and cheered.

In some cases an effort had to be made to be at the meetings to minister to the needs of such. To these the Master says, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

Seven cases in the congregation have been attended to. Twenty-five dollars and large parcels of new clothing were given to Nazareth Street Sabbath School Mission through Mr. J. Ross, Superintendent.

In November Alice Brisbois, the young girl in whom we are interested at the Mackay Institute, received a complete outfit of new and nicely made clothing, this was given in addition to a small grant of money sent to supply her needs last May.

Donations of clothing and material were also given to the city work of the Presbyterian Woman's Missionary Society through Miss McSween and Mad. Coté, to the Hervey Institute, the Day Nursery, the Protestant Infant's Home, and the Labrador Mission.

We would acknowledge with grateful thanks the following:—1 piece of gray flannel from Mr. W. J. Morrice, 1 piece gray flannel from Mrs. Walter Cottingham, and a piece of flannelette from Mrs. W. Fullerton. Large parcels of new clothing from Mr. D. Morrice, Miss M. Stewart, Mrs. Munderloh, Mrs. James Alves, and Mrs. Redpath; also a parcel of boots and rubbers from Mr. W. F. Smardon. These donations have all proved very useful in carrying on this work. Some of them being the personal work of the donors, have been much appreciated.

We meet to-day to review the work of another year. The attendance at the meetings, which have been held regularly on the first Friday of the month, has been much the same as last year.

The interest, in the work carried on in the different Mission fields, has been well sustained by letters and papers read during the year.

In April we were favored by an address from the Rev. A. MacVicar, previous to his departure for Nelson, B. C., giving us a description of the place and of the work done

there. Since then we have received from him three letters containing much interesting information, also asking for reading matter, a box of which has been gathered and sent on to Nelson.

In the spring the working meeting of the society sent a large box of clothing to a missionary in the North West. Some of the garments were made by the ladies from material granted by the "Ladies' Aid," others, both new and cast off, were received from members of the congregation. All the things were very much appreciated by the family to whom they were sent. Since beginning our work for this season it was felt that less confusion would be caused if the sewing meetings were held altogether in connection with the "Ladies' Aid Society" and consequently this has been done.

At the sewing class held every Wednesday afternoon in Nazareth Street, the attendance has been very large, so much so, that the teachers have had much difficulty in overtaking the work, and earnestly desire more helpers. The average attendance has been 54 children and 6 teachers.

- THE LADIES' VISITING AND AID SOCIETY** meets once a week during the working season. All the ladies of the Church are members of this Society.

- THE LADIES' AUXILIARY OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY** meets on the first Friday of every month, in the Library, at 3 o'clock.
