West Toronto Admitted to Full Citizenship, While Bracondale and Wychwood Are Admitted on Terms Fixed by Ontario Municipal Board.

The city council unanimously agreed to terms for the annexation of West Toronto. terms for the annexation of west 10ronto.

The city council yesterday decided in favor of annexing West Toronto on the terms previously agreed upon between the board of control and the West Toronto representatives, also to take in Bracondale and Wychwood on the conditions named by the Ontario Municipal Board.

The first named decision was reached unanimously, and without, in fact, a word of discussion, while by the no uncertain majority of 16 to 6 it was agreed that the northern suburbs should be

that the northern suburbs should annexed.

The council chamber was crowded as it had not been since the license reduction issue last March, Mayor Faird heading a big deputation from West Toronto, while Bracondale and Wychwood were also well represented, many ladies being included. The city council's action was hailed with enthus astic applause, and the visitors departed very well satisfied.

In the case of West Toronto, the parties interested will have to go before the municipal board, but as the understanding is perfect the granting at an

standing is perfect the granting of an order is regarded as a mere formality. The board has already signified the terms under which it will sanction the terms under which it will sanction the annexation of the northern districts, and apparently all that remains to be done is to fix the date upon which annexation will go into effect.

The area of Bracondale and Wyon wood is approximately 598 acres. The assessment is \$831,966, made up of land.

\$533,956; buildings, \$264,930; business assessment, \$8380, and, income, \$24,706.

City Hall Opinion Is That Move Is Desirable and Cost of Work Would Not Be Great.

The World's suggestion as to the widening of Queen-street by five feet on a line with the new Simpson store on the south side was much discussed

widening of Queen-street by five feet on a line with the new Simpson store on the south side was much discussed down town yesterday.

Everybody was in favor of it. In fact so many were in favor of it that they declared the suggestion ought also to apply to the north side, and that the whole street ought to be widened five feet on each side right out to Spadina, or as one man put it later on, right out to the Humber Bay. On the north side the block from Yonge to James-street is bound to be rebuilt. Then comes the city hall open space, which is already widened. Then comes two blocks with only one good building, viz., Manning Chambers. Then Osgoode Hall, and so on right up to the old St. Patrick's market, where the street is already widened. On the south side there is not one good building for nearly a mile. All will be reconstructed at more or less early dates, and this being the case there should be little trouble in the city passing a bill providing that hereafter all buildings erected be placed five feet back from the present street line.

City Hall Views.

Controller Harrison is an ardent advocate of a wider Queen-street, more for the metropolitan aspect it would impart and the general convenience to the public, while he is assured that property owners would find their holdings so increased in value that they could well afford to surrender up the few feet of property required.

Ald. McGhie, who is chairman of the civic works committee, expressed himself as being in favor of the project thru and thru. He remarked that he had advocated such a course in the down-town section of Yonge-street.

"I am in full sympathy with it, if it can be," he said. "Of course we would have to get legislation. I do not think the cost would be very great, as there are only about a dozen good buildings.



MAY DIVERT GRAIN TRAFFIC TO PACIFIC

President Hays of Grand Trunk Pacific Says He Will Do It With His Low Grades.

The following is taken from The New York Times: In an interview here C. M. Havs.

president of the Grand Trunk Pacific, which is financed by Messrs. Rothschild in London and Speyer Brothers in New York, gives an account of his observations during a tour of inspection which took him to Prince Rupert, the western terminal of the new Canadian line.

In answer to questions Mr. Hays said:

"We are doing very well, indeed. The various contractors are in good spirits and well abreast of their dates. Indeed, the financial disaster in New York a year ago was for us a plessing in disguise. Large numbers of men have come north seeking work. Labor is abundant and is more productive, at lower wages. Already our trains are running regularly over the whole section 660 miles west of Winnipeg into Alberta. The newly arrived settlers have harvested a great wheat crop—great both in quantity and in quality, greater still for the price it is bringing. At our Pacific terminal, Prince Rupert, from which I returned this week, good progress is being made with the grading of the first hundred miles east, and I see no reason to doubt that by the autumn of 1911 our first train will break thru to tidewater, passing from the Atlantic to the Pacific."

High Cost and Low Grades.

Asked about alleged "generous expenditures" on the road, Mr. Hayereplied:

penditures" on the road, Mr. Hays replied:

"A number of amiable and glib gentlemen hunting seats in the Dominion Parliament have been talking about the matter on the stump. The Canadian voter has replied to them. The Dominion Government is, as you know, our partner in the enterprise, and to denounce ministers for reckless extravagance is all right and proper from the viewpoint of an opposition. But our expenditures have not been excessive nor beyond the measure of our obligations to the government and the community.

"Bear in mind, please, that railroads are not now built as the earlier transcontinental roads were built, up hill, down dale, on an unbaliasted roadbed of mud. Such uneconomic methods were permissible when there were a mere handful of ranchmen and trappers to serve, and when the promotors' objective was first of all to earn the land grant on which they issued their bonds. What we require to-day and what the traveling public means to have is a first-class roadbed with such low gradients and wide curvatures that our trains can be run at very high speeds with perfect safety.

"We carry our road from Winnipeg over the Rockles to Prince, Rupert with a maximum gradient of 21 feet

The immense economy in hauling freights with gradients so remarkable, every railway man must recognize. We shall be able to put two thousand tons of freight into Prince Rupert from Winnipeg behind a single engine.
