THE GLOBE'S GLAD HAND.

It is interesting to watch the practicing attitude of the Globe now that the mantle of eminent respectability has been thrown upon its shoulders. The Globe without its agas of respectability is quite different from the Globe as we know it before the recent exposure of its duplicity. The Globe has had a long and varied career. We venture to say that no other newspaper in this country has been so successful as its contemporary as this Crown's Nest. Since the regime of the Browns the Globe has pursued a policy of universal good-will and eminent respectability. It has been lavish of praise to friends. It has been equally lavish of rebuke to its enemies. Except in rare instances the Globe has extended the glad hand of friendship to all, even to its enemies, if they were willing to grasp it. This has been a studied policy on the part of the Globe. Kind words have always been scattered broadcast, and country weekly was too humble to escape the magnanimous condescension of the Globe. The glad hand policy of the Globe is analogous to Mayor Fleming's vogue when canvassing in a Mayoralty contest. As the Mayor's glad hand business is assumed and artificially cultivated until it has become a second nature, so the Globe's universal good-will policy has been carried to a high degree of perfection. Mayor Fleming used the glad hand extensively to make votes. The Globe extends the glad hand to diplomats and business men. The same cause which prompted the Globe to cultivate an appearance of eminent respectability is also responsible for its glad hand policy. The Globe directorate or management, or whatever else the controlling power may be called, has had their object to achieve besides the furtherance of the public good. We have already shown several instances where the interests of the management were advocated in preference to the interests of the public. What we assert is this, that the Globe has always been kept up to the highest standard of respectability in order that the advocacy of private interests in the columns of the Globe might escape unnoticed. The use of the glad hand was also carefully cultivated for the same reason. It is a good business proposition to make as few enemies as possible, and to be as agreeable as possible. The president of the Globe knows more about this than we do. Mayor Fleming can also give pointers to anyone desiring special information. So much for the Globe's glad hand and its frock-coated respectability.

A prominent feature of the Globe's management since the regime of the Browns is its exploitation of fads and academic theories. The policy of the Globe for many years back has centered round free trade and unrestricted reciprocity. The Globe for the past decade has been the Don Quixote of Canadian politics. During that time it has been fighting a losing battle against the windmills of protection and tariff. Just for a moment consider the dimensions of this crusade against the Enormity of the age. Almost every day for a generation the Globe has gone forth to do battle against the long-armed giant. If the Globe's free trade editorials were pasted together in a string the latter would form a gridle round the earth. If to these editorials were added the reported speeches of free trade advocates the string would reach half way to the moon. This is the coldest of a university expert, who has based his findings on a well-known law of averages. And what does it all amount to in the end? Simply an academic debate, a Quixotic attack on a windmill. Free trade is an impossibility. It was just as impossible ten years ago as it is today. The Globe has been about as successful in bringing back the free trade regime as Don Quixote was in restoring the age of chivalry. Unrestricted reciprocity is another of the Globe's delusions. Just think of it. Fully one-half of the Globe's editorial money for the past decade has been directed against a couple of unoffending windmills!

The Globe is called a Liberal paper. It has little conception of what liberalism is in the political sense really means. We can readily prove this by citing its attitude on the Sunday street car question. If ever there was a chance for a liberal, progressive newspaper to render the public a service it was in this that is being made in Toronto to break down the barriers of prejudice and superstition and to give the people their personal freedom on Sunday. We believe the liberal policy of the Globe on this question was shaped with a view to retain the good-will and esteem of the church-going community, not that this esteem was in itself of any use or of any satisfaction to the Globe, but if an element of light deal or a Crown's Nest job came along, in which the management of the Globe were interested, it would be a great help to have the support and sympathy of the truly good, the eminently respectable.

But the mantle of eminent respectability no longer covers the Globe. The glad hand policy has proved a failure. The friends of a lifetime even the little country papers that the Globe peered on the back, are sour on the

glad hand act. The Globe fully expected that its reputation for respectability and good-fellowship would see it safely through the little game that its directorate was preparing to work off on the public in connection with the Crown's Nest Railway. The Globe relied on its general reputation to relieve it of even the suspicion of self-interest in its advocacy of a bonus and other concessions to the C. P. R. But the efficacy of its policy of eminent respectability has been put to a severe test and it has been found wanting. The policy of the glad hand has failed. And now the Globe is almost beside itself. It has got into deep water. Being deprived of its protecting mantle, the Globe does not know which way to turn. It is now down on the ground floor with ordinary sinners. It is beginning to swear and curse and to use really infamous language. We hope the exposure will not make it take to drink.

THE BRITISH EMPIRE LEAGUE.
The British Empire League in Canada has been in existence about ten years. When first established the League was generally regarded as an organization pursuing visionary aims and impracticable schemes. With a looked upon as visionary ten years ago is now within the range of practical politics. Inter-empire preferential trade is liable to become a living practical issue at any moment. The commercial hostility of the United States is forcing Great Britain to re-examine her policy in regard to the preferential trade with Great Britain. The splendid isolation of Great Britain has set her statesmen thinking seriously in case of war. It has diverted public attention to the value of the colonies as a possible source of Great Britain's necessities. Events are working rapidly towards imperial federation, both commercially and politically. The League now enjoy the satisfaction of knowing that their efforts have not been in vain. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain has invited the colonies to propose some scheme of preferential trade for Canada to accept this invitation and make some kind of a proposal. It is believed the Government has seriously considered the advisability of reducing the tariff on British goods, and the tariff on American goods just as it is, or even raising it a notch or two. We hope that such is Mr. Laurier's intention. It will be the beginning of practical negotiations between Great Britain and the colonies. The possibilities of an empires scheme of preferential trade are simply beyond conception. Preferential trade is Canada's greater National Policy.

A WARNING TO MR. LAURIER.
Two temptations at least are in attendance on Mr. Laurier. One is to tinker with the tariff sufficient to bring about the same disaster here that followed the Cleveland policy in the United States. The other is to follow the "road" policy of the C. P. R. in connection with the Crown's Nest, Pass and gifts to the Grand Trunk and others in connection with the extension of the Intercolonial to Montreal. There is also the temptation of the Free Pass transaction and a right way to bring the intercolonial to Montreal, but the right way in each case is highly obnoxious to certain parties who wish to plunder the country.

INVESTIGATE THE TEMPESTUVA.
After the revelations in the Montreal courts Parliament should insist on an investigation of the Tempestuova subsidy. It seems to have been a game of plunder. One man apparently was entitled to \$200,000 as his share of the money got from the public. There is a case made out for him to have participated in the plunder. The Dale des Chateaux deal was apparently no worse than what the Tempestuova money to show. Let a committee of the Senate or the House be given power to send for papers and persons and the truth will come out.

BURGLARY AT NEWMARKET.

ANOTHER GUESS AT THE RIDDLE OF EXISTENCE.
[Continued.]
Of the generating causes of motion and of the planetary system.
Matter that comes under our judgment appears to us to be indifferent, from its inertia, to motion, as to repose. If it inclines to a state of repose, its motion is explained in this wise:
The waters of all rivers have a tendency to run into the ocean, their common reservoir. Since all separate agencies, when combined, go to enlarge the general motion, it is, therefore, the greater the general motion in each sphere, the particular agencies deriving their origin from it will be greater, whence it follows that our motion should be in correspondence with the general force of our world.

Although most bodies of a rough and rare nature appear to be stable, it is, nevertheless, certain that their molecular parts are in a state of continual activity; they incessantly combine, divide, and their elements combat, or react, one upon the other, in a thousand different ways. The affinities exercise themselves by a process of mutual attraction. Nature is thus in a state of violent effort, and counter effort, which change some of its parts, but this effort is counterbalanced by an adverse impulse, so that all does not crumble in a true sense, and does not unite in one mass. Thus a just equilibrium is maintained: since all bodies in our world are in a state of mutual reaction, the greater the force of resistance remains proportional to that of surrounding bodies; it therefore follows that all matter in the world is endowed with a resisting force proportional to an impulsive force, so to speak, by which alone this matter exists, and that it is diffuse and impenetrable.

This equilibrium constitutes the essential nature of the world. The universe, as it were, is considered as a grand instrument, whose parts are stretched in unison and proportion, like the chords of a lyre, and correspond together, in a musical sense, to these cosmic qualities that they constitute our bodies; we do not obtain it otherwise: it results from the state of our spirit; we cannot receive more motion and life than commports with its nature.

Nothing can be lost in a system where everything is held together by necessary cords; nothing, moreover, is known to transcend beyond its limits, since everything tends to equilibrium, and finds a counterbalance. It is not because the same quantity of motion always subsists in the universe, that all the stars, planets, comets, and meteors, as Descartes would have demonstrated, have been conserved; in fact, Newton and Leibnitz have demonstrated that if it disappeared, or was destroyed, it was continually restored again in nature.

Heat, electricity, light, etc., exist partly in a free state, and partly enclosed in different terrestrial bodies; those that are in a state of freedom aim to combine or separate themselves; those that are combined seek to be free, and one state triumphs over the other. If all the heat in bodies escaped from its state of combination, it would produce a universal conflagration, for there is no matter that does not contain latent caloric. The striking of a flint, violent attrition of metals, produce heat, which is not only heat, but produce flame. Whilst one part of the world produces heat, another part produces cold; the latter, as we know, produces a permanent repose, as when summer and heat transport themselves successively into some regions of the earth, opposite countries experience frigidity and winter.

We may picture to ourselves, for example, the rigorous climate of the poles, how much the earth is deprived of motion and life in losing the great weight of its heat. The seas and all liquid bodies would first become solid; man, animals and vegetables, ceasing to live, would be motionless. Increasing cold would congregate the air; the hardest materials would acquire extreme fragility; for it is observed in the rude Siberian winter that the most durable iron becomes as brittle as glass, and cannot be used without breaking into a thousand splinters. All the most ductile bodies are so brittle that they are easily turned to powder. THORNY LABOR PROBLEM

Conference Suggested to Consider This Vital Question.

Plain Speaking About the Trades and Labor Council—Toronto Has Lost Some Ground—Aid. Sheppard to Visit Factories—Evils of Bonanza—Will the Grand Trunk Shops be Removed?—Many and Varied Views Expressed by Members of the Special Committee Yesterday.

What most Toronto do to induce manufacturers to locate here? What is the reason that some manufacturing industries have left the city? What must be done to prevent any more from leaving?

These were the questions that occupied the attention of the sub-committee of the Property Committee for two hours yesterday. Aid. Beale thought that something should be done to let it be generally known that Toronto will be given a fair and that other inducements would be offered to any manufacturer who would locate in the city.

CONFERENCE SUGGESTED. Harvey and Van Norman were mentioned as one firm who had left Toronto to take advantage of the cheaper labor in Quebec. Aid. Sheppard said that rumors were flying around that the Grand Trunk shops were being removed from the city, and he knew that there was a feeling that the city was losing its industrial base.

CONFERENCE SUGGESTED. Aid. Burns suggested that a live official should be appointed to collect information for the committee. He said that the J. D. King Company and others had found fault with the present conditions in Toronto.

AID. WOODS' VIEWS. Aid. Woods agreed that the fact that the Grand Trunk shops were being removed from the city was a serious matter. He said that the committee had no right to do anything to prevent this.

AID. GRAHAM'S VIEWS. Aid. J. J. Graham, who has been a member of the committee for some time, said that the committee had not always been in vain. He said that he had been through the efforts of the committee.

ABOUT BONUSES. Aid. Woods asked if legislation could be obtained to put a stop to the bonus business. He said that it could not be done.
