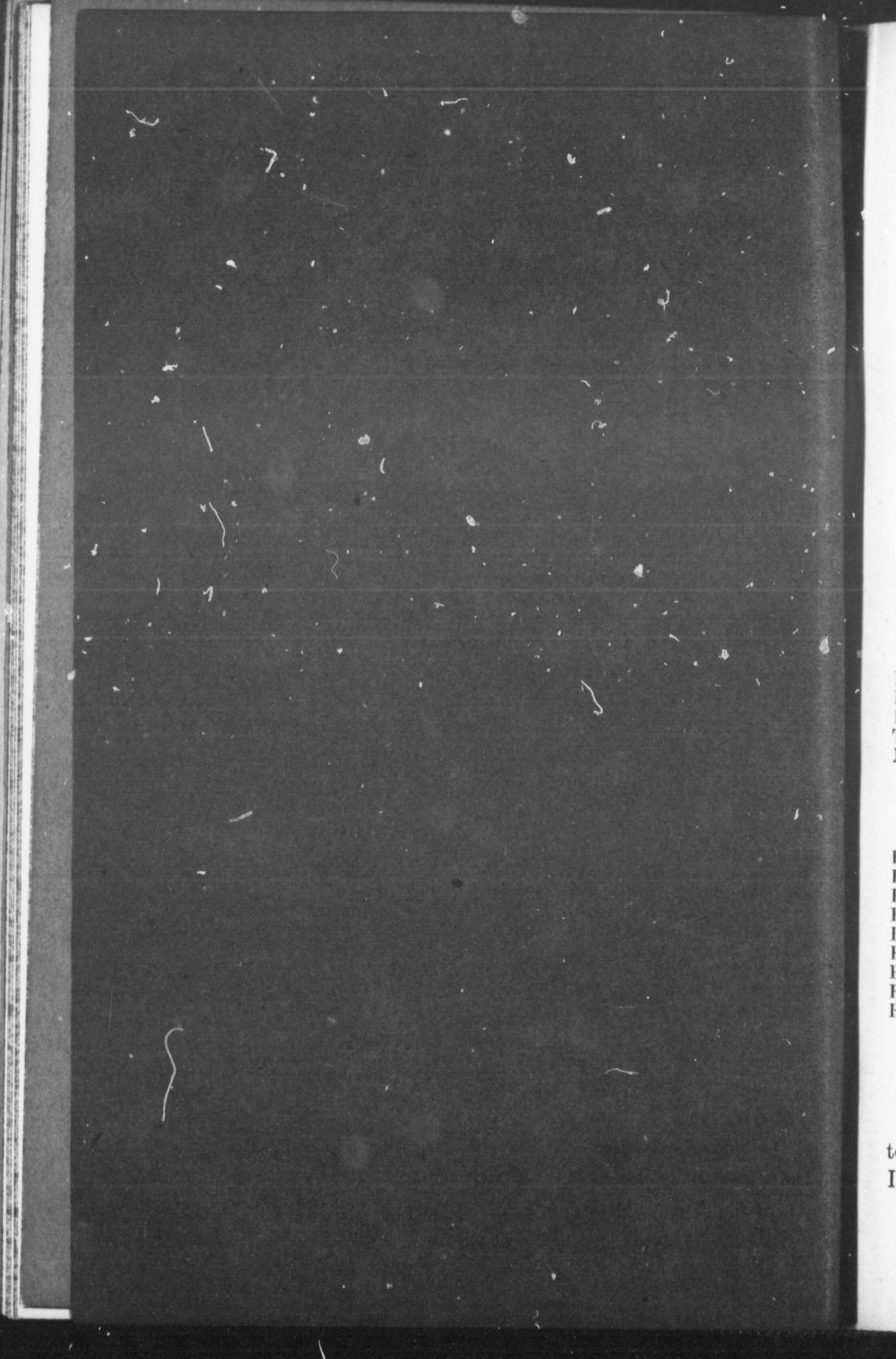

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

The number of deaths during the year was less than the average, being only eleven—six men aged respectively 68, 78, 78, 56, 75 and 64 years; two women aged 86 years each; and three children aged 10, 5 and 5 weeks respectively, one of whom died while out at nurse. The report concluded :—

While it is gratifying that so few have died during the last year, I look forward with some apprehension to the coming summer, with its threatened scourge, as I know well the result of its introduction among the class of persons we have to deal with in a place so over-crowded as the House of Industry always is.

I would therefore urge upon the public the necessity of providing the committee with sufficient means to place the House in the best possible sanitary condition before the danger arrives; and I would urge upon the committee the propriety of furnishing the House with pure water for drinking and cooking purposes, and to remove, without delay, all sources of contamination and danger from about the premises, as it is well known that outbreaks of cholera are not always limited to the site of their first development.

REPORT.

The Trustees and Managers of the Toronto House of Industry, in accordance with the requirements of their Act of Incorporation, have much pleasure in placing the following report of the working, management and general statement of the affairs of the institution, for the year 1865, before the subscribers and the public generally, and believe it will be found that the House of Industry continues to fulfil, in a satisfactory manner, the objects for which it was originally established.

Fully alive to the duty of giving, and the importance of doing so, not only liberally but prudently, it has been the especial care of those entrusted with the distribution of the funds so munificently bestowed to see that the recipients were worthy of the relief applied for, and with this view the ward visitors, referred to in former reports, have continued their valuable labors, and visited personally every case seeking aid from the charity. In this way, it is believed, they have checked impositions and confined the relief to such as might properly claim it, namely, those who from age or sickness are incapa-

citated from earning a living, or unable from want of employment (particularly during the winter months) to procure the necessaries of life.

The Trustees and Managers would earnestly request that all those who take an interest in the institution would inform themselves of its motives and the manner in which it is conducted, by visiting the House at any time, where every information will be given them by the Superintendent and Matron, or by attending on the stated days, (Tuesdays and Fridays), when relief is afforded to the applicants by the weekly committees.

It is but too true that many needing and deserving relief are to be found, apart from the unfortunate and needy applicants, and there is reason to fear that many suffer in silence whose claims for relief cannot be gainsayed. As this is a class not likely to fall under the notice of the committee, the Board would feel obliged by subscribers informing them of any such cases, when means will at once be taken to afford relief, if possible, in a manner commensurate with the nature of the demand.

The Trustees and Managers desire especially to refer in this report to one of the benefits of the institution arising from the power given them to apprentice destitute and orphan children, as they have frequent proofs of the excellence of the plan,

which not only provides for the present wants, but cares for the future welfare of the friendless.

The Board refers with much pleasure to the liberal grant made to this institution by the Corporation of this city, but for which the extent of relief afforded would necessarily have been very materially lessened. They must also express the high pleasure and great encouragement they have experienced by the cordial and liberal manner in which the subscribers have continued to respond to the annual call made upon them for the support of this charity.

In addition to the large number of inmates supported in the institution, the usual out-door relief (particularly during the winter months) is extended to large numbers of deserving applicants, as will be more fully shewn by the Superintendent's statement herewith submitted for the past year.

A soup kitchen has also been again opened this winter, as in former years, in connection with the house, from which soup is distributed daily, and a large amount of additional relief afforded by this means.

The Board desire again to express their entire satisfaction with the manner in which the Superintendent and Matron of the institution have discharged their duties during the past year.

Annexed will be found a detailed statement of the Treasurer's accounts for the year, duly audited,

from which it will be seen that the funds of the charity are in a very satisfactory state, also the report of the Medical Officer, and the Superintendent's report of the amount and nature of relief afforded through the past year.

STORM moved, "That the chairman be requested to convey to the ward visitors in connection with the House of Industry the sincere thanks of the meeting for the great labour and care bestowed by them during the past year in visiting the poor and destitute throughout the city, with a view to their relief when deserving."

This resolution was also unanimously adopted.
