exposed the action of three other conspirators who had for years systematically laid the free, and too little the land of the morally brave. In other words, whether or not, in various directions, license has taken the place of liberty, and corruption has run riot at the expense of patriotism.

PROTECTION NEEDED

It is stated that two men went to the bathing house at Seaside Park on Saturday evening; demanded bathing suits from a boy in charge; received them and went in bathing, and one of the two was drowned. It is further stated that there is no life line from the shore to the small raft anchored a short distance out, and that after the man had been drowned it was necessary to send a long distance for a boat, large enough to hold the men who sought to recover the body.

THE PLAYGROUNDS

Perhaps the fatality of Saturday could not easily have been prevented, as the men were said to be somewhat aggressive in their manner toward the boy in charge of the bathing house. But it must now be quite clear that better provision should be made for the rescue of any bather who is in danger of being drowned. The officers on duty should also keep a very sharp eye on persons who appear to be under the influence of liquor. If Seaside Park is to be a popular resort it should be kept free from such unhappy incidents as that of Saturday evening.

The playgrounds fund is now close to \$100. The city council will no doubt apply the compulsory attendance act at once, and enable the school board to set about its task without delay.

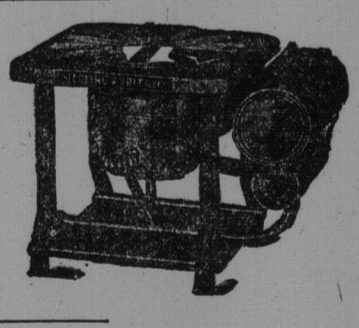

New York Life Gives Out Statement

New York, July 2.-A special committee of the board of trustees of the New York Life Insurance Company, appointed December 13, 1905, to consider the evidence submitted to the legislative committee and the report of its five special commissioners of insurance, who were then examining the company's affairs, made its final report to the board of trustees today.

The report of the balance sheet expert accountants, especially engaged for the work of reporting on the company's finances which in part says: "We have verified all the assets of the company, and after providing sufficient reserves for possible losses, find that on December 31, 1905, the total assets amounted to \$48,780,015.09, and are fully worth that sum."

"We have tested the clerical accuracy of the insurance reserve as certified by the actuary of the company, which amounts to \$379,151,063.70, and exceeds that required by the insurance department of the state of New York by the sum of \$7,801,720.19, and having made a provision of \$5,580,775 for all other liabilities, we find that there was on December 31, 1905, a balance of \$84,047,170.29 available for dividends on participating policies (including deferred dividend policies at the end of their several accumulation periods) and for contingencies. This balance exceeds that claimed by the company in its annual report for 1905."

THE PICNIC AT GAGETOWN

Conservatives Had Good Time Yesterday and Listened to Clever Speakers.

Nearly three thousand people attended the political picnic at Gagetown yesterday, conducted by the Conservative workers. Six steamers were chartered for the occasion. Arrived at Gagetown the wharf presented a busy appearance. The ladies of the Tabernacle Baptist church, who had charge of the catering department in the court house, were busy early supplying the wants of the first comers and the space not until after two o'clock that the picnic commenced, and between the speeches.

On the platform were S. L. Peters, president of the Queens County Conservative Association; Senator Wood, A. Broder, ex-M. P. for Dundas, (Ont.); R. Pope, ex-M. P. for Cookshire, (Que.); J. W. Daniel, M. P. G. W. Fowler, M. P. Donald Morrison, M. P. P., B. Frank Smith, M. P. P., Parker Glazier, M. P. P., R. Maxwell, M. P. P., W. W. Hubbard, M. P. P., E. R. Chapman and Councilors A. T. Camp, J. D. Case, A. Mott, Arthur Alexander, O. B. Nickerson, of Queens county, and others.

Mr. Peters expressed his regret that R. L. Borden had found it impossible to leave Ottawa to be present and dwelt briefly on the marvelous prosperity of Canada, which was due, he said, to the liberal party but to the policy of the late Sir John A. Macdonald. Mr. Peters then introduced Dr. Daniel, M. P., as the first speaker.

Dr. Daniel said the occasion was his first political picnic. In referring to the absence of Mr. Borden, he said that he was the only member of the Conservative party in the house at Ottawa. Turning to the past attitude of the Liberal party, Dr. Daniel referred to the opposition raised by them in parliament to the building of the C. P. R., which had opened up the west and done so much to increase the welfare of Canada.

The Liberals had said the Atlantic Trading Co., \$5 a head to bring to the west and other strange people whose only idea of government was the cash, and had given them free homes to the Canadians who had fought in South Africa. Dr. Daniel quoted in glowing terms the auditor-general's report on articles supplied to the ice breaker Montcalm and ridiculed the expenditure as extravagant and unnecessary.

A. Broder, M. P., followed in a witty and characteristic speech and he had always been in the opposition. He would rather address the people as a farmer and knew of no class of people that received so much gratuitous advice from people knowing nothing of the business. He assured his hearers of Mr. Borden's disappointments at being unable to attend, and referred in glowing terms to his ability as a man and politician.

The Liberals, he said, adopted their opponents' policy on coming into power, and after promising free trade, had invented British preference. He ridiculed the idea of Hon. Sydney Fisher being turned a farmer. He had examined Mr. Fisher's effort in the chamber business. He had spent \$18,000 and got back \$8,000 which was a nice object lesson for a farmer to hold up to his sons and daughters.

The first duty of his hearers, Mr. Broder went on, was to put the Grits out; the Liberal-Conservative party would look after the rest.

Senator Wood said the prosperity of Canada had little to do with the government. The population had increased half a million in the last five years and agricultural products had risen from \$30,000,000 in 1896 to \$85,000,000 in 1905. These things were largely due to the farmer.

The Liberals had not carried out free trade or any other of their numerous policies put forward while in opposition. It was the coming into power they adopted the policy of their predecessors, and all the features put forward in 1897.

Senator Wood also commented on the American Trading Company and the increased rate of taxation under Liberal rule.

The chairman then introduced A. W. Baird, who delivered a patriotic reading.

Mr. Pope, ex-M. P., caused some amusement by alluding to the extreme generosity of his Liberal friends who had given him a vacation. After paying a tribute to R. L. Borden, Mr. Pope said their opponents had been living for the past eight or nine years in glitter and circus, but the time was coming when the Conservative party would prevail.

Mr. Heaton, as leader of the local opposition, was greeted with cheers. He spoke strongly against the highway act and promised to repeal it if returned to power, giving the municipal council a law which would give them a larger control. He also condemned the agricultural policy of the local government and claimed that more money had been spent in lawyers' bills than had been expended on agricultural societies and dairy and cheese factories in the province.

The boats started for St. John about 6.30 p. m., the first steamer reaching Inlandtown at 10.05. Before leaving her wharf at Gagetown some trouble was experienced on the Victoria with a passenger from St. John who became embroiled with another man in a fight on board. Police Sergeant Baxter and Policeman Sample, who went up with the steamer, handcuffed him as he was for a time unmanageable, but before the boat left he was allowed to go on condition that he went ashore.

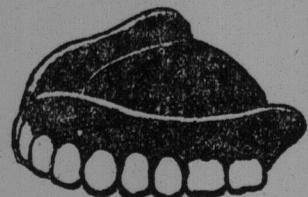

REV. DR. MACRAE HITS FROM THE SHOULDER

Preaching in St. Stephen's Church He Contrasts the Attitude of the Present Day Churches With That of Christ While on Earth.

Rev. Dr. Macrae, who has just celebrated his fiftieth anniversary as a clergyman of the Presbyterian church, created a profound impression by his sermon preached in St. Stephen's church on Sunday morning last. His theme was remembrance of God, and in the course of his remarks he dwelt on the duty of the Christian church in this regard. Rev. Dr. Macrae took for his text Deuteronomy V 12. "Beware lest thou forget Jehovah." He first referred to the exploitation of what might be called "secular" resources on such an occasion as this—the proud reference to the resources of the country the reference to its great institutions, its rapid progress and the predictions of wonderful things for the future. This same spirit pervaded all nations, and the same thing had been done on similar occasions at all times. At such a time there was a tendency to forget that all the duties of the church and its greatness were due to God. He approved of the spirit of patriotism and national pride. Canadians could truthfully say with St. Paul who referred to a people as "citizens of no mean city." No right thinking man should speak slightly of the land of his birth. After referring to the many reasons for gratitude on the part of Canadians that they lived in such a country, the reverend gentleman dwelt on the fact, which, 40 years ago, were held by the opponents of confederation and which had now passed away; but it was well to remember that the existence of a nation depends upon the will of God. It was well that the resources of the country should be developed and its population should be increased, and its institutions strengthened and improved; but it was also well to remember that the true strength of a country depended not upon its material resources or upon its importance upon the globe, but upon its loyalty to God. There had been vast empires in bygone days, but they had vanished. Paving the way in teaching the nation to remember God and the way in which that duty was fulfilled Rev. Dr. Macrae said: "Is sufficient evidence that Christ's works are being done and His spirit is being manifested if we point to the splendid buildings devoted to the purposes of worship; if we point to the character of our service, to the well-doing and the welfare of our people, to the liberality on behalf of missions and philanthropic purposes, while there are outcasts in the midst of any given community to whom no guiding hand has been extended by the worshippers, and who did they seek a seat in one of those splendid buildings would certainly be refused or cast out?" "Is it not an ominous sign of the times that in lands where the separation between class and class is more marked than in Canada the working classes as a body have deserted the church, for instance in Scotland and are there no indications pointing in that direction even in Canada?" "Is not the number of non-church-going on the increase, and are there not social movements of the age that foster this tendency?" "Why is this if not in part that the worldliness of spirit is widespread; if not

in part that religion as practiced by too many is regarded by many more as a pretense? "Our Saviour, when on earth, was known as a friend of publicans and sinners, a friend of those viewed by the profane as the off-scourings of the earth; yet how many in any so-called respectable congregation would be seen talking to, or taking one of those so regarded to the heart? Has not that aspect of our Lord's character, so prominent in His earthly life, slipped practically out of sight in well nigh all our churches, existing only or mainly, in certain organizations, the Salvation Army, for example, spoken of by many with pity and contempt. "The poor ye have always with you," said our Lord; poor not simply in circumstance, but in mental faculty, in moral character, in spiritual life. Yet these poor are God's creatures in some sense. Permitted by Him to exist, we know not why in all respects but for this reason, at any rate, we must all believe, to appeal to and call forth certain elements in our being such as pity, the stretching forth of the helping hand, the effort to reclaim in the spirit of Christ. "Is there much of that disposition in our church?" "May it not be truly and sadly said of most that they have degenerated into respectability and lost sight, in a large measure, of the chief purpose for which the church exists? And what, in the last resort, does this mean other than that the churches are forgetting God?" "On the whole, notwithstanding these gloomy reflections, there is much in the movements of our country and in her history as a dominion to cheer and encourage."

"It is something, for example, and of no mean importance, that the attention of our statesmen has been at last drawn to the duty and the necessity of legislation for a better Sunday observance; but would it not be vastly more significant of progress if no legislation of this sort had been needed; if our people of all departments of pursuit and calling had been so imbued with the spirit of their real duty that the least law bearing thereupon should be unneeded?" "It is well, also, that, as today in this community certain conditions require to be met, the welfare of the children are being thought of and provided. It is well that much liberality, on behalf of the heathen people in other lands is being displayed. I could wish that at least corresponding efforts were put forth on behalf of the heathen around our own doors. "It is well, too, that the duty of union among professing Christians is being felt on all hands in this Canada of ours, and that, despite indifference and opposition the prospect for its accomplishment is brightening; with that verily effected in the churches we may hope for increased activity and prosperity in all worthy Christian enterprises, we may look forward humbly but confidently to large outpourings of the spirit of all grace, wisdom, unity and prosperity; and we may trust, even as let us fervently pray, that however our city may become great and goodly, and our homes be filled with all good things we, and our fellow countrymen at large will not forget God."

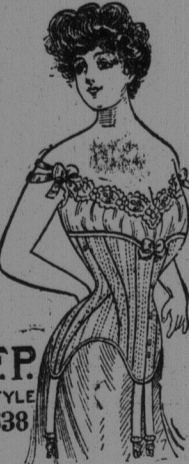
