## **Experts Say Onward** March of Enemy In Poland Is Checked

London, July 6-Military experts here, apparently drawing their inspira-tion from Petrograd, declare that the Austro-German advance in Poland is practically checked. As they put it: After drawing on the invading armies between Bug and the Vistila, to a more favorable battle ground, the Russians have been making a very determined sstand in the last few days. The scene of the present battles is in the area which forms the base of the Polish triangle of which the sides are the Bug and the Vistula, and the apex the river
