BODY ITCHING

At this season of the year, owing to change in temperature, habits and diet, many people experience what is known as body itching. It is a most uncomfortable and unhealthy condition, most pronounced at retiring or arising, also when sitting near a hot stove or other heater and noticeable under certain conditions when wearing heavy clothing.

Free perspiration and a moist skin, owing to lack of proper exercise and also from absence of any adequate bathing facilities undergoes a great change and becomes dry, hard and irritated. This condition produces small surface scales. When the skin is rubbed or scratched these scales, which somewhat resemble dry, scaly dandruff, fall off.

Lack of activity in many ways causes this condition. Change in dict is another cause.

Reverse the casual habits, get good exercise, proper ventilation and avoid food excesses. The skin must function in winter as well as súmmer to insure skin health and proper elimination. Do not neglect frequent baths. They tone the skin in a way no other agent can.


Never sleep in the undergarments you have had on all day. Foot poisoning results from this habit, causing scaly condition and cracks between the toes with intense itching.

For body itching as a temporary relief, try a bath of soda. One-half pound of ordinary baking soda dissolved in a tub of tepid water will do the business. Have the soda bath of not more than ten minutes' duration, dry with a soft towel. Do not rub the body, but simply pat dry.

Five Robbers Also Hear a Scathing Comment From Toronto Judge.

Toronto, Dec. 20—Sentence of ten years in Kingston penitentiary, plus ten lashes within one month, was meted out by Judge Coatsworth in the Court of General Sessions to Harry Westwood (alias Jackson), Merle Ferris, Sam Gould, James Levoy and Gordon Henry, for having robbed, with violence, William H. Tindall, 301 Wallace avenue, of \$192 in money and a check for \$28.80. On a charge of being armed at the time of the robbery, each was given ten years in the same insti-

check for \$28.80. On a charge of being armed at the time of the robbery, each was given ten years in the same institution, to run concurrently with the first term. Jackson and Ferris were also given two years' imprisonment, to run consecutively with the other terms, for having robbed Winnifred Thompson, whom they took to Hamilton, of two rings and a watch. For stealing \$180 and £9 from Henry and Martha Hedges, with whom he lodged, Jackson was given another two years to run concurrently with the other sentences. In addition to the sentences imposed yesterday, Jackson has also a sentence of two years imposed in the police court for breaking parole.

Despite a plea for leniency by Jackson's wife, who was present with her infant child, His Honor refused to reduce the sentence on Jackson. "He is no good to you," the judge said, after listening to her whispered statement that her husband was not a criminal, and her appeal to consider her and her baby. All the accused, with the exception of Ferris, pleaded for a light sentence, to which Mis Honor replied: "I do not feel that you are entitled to any consideration. You have been convicted of a deliberate hold-up, and a mean feature of your conduct has been your attempts to drag in the innocent taxi driver. I have to see that the citizens are protected, and that men with such tendencies as you have shown are warned, so I am going to pronounce a severe sentence."




