We must, therefore, know how to adapt our activity to the mutual class relations existing within our own and other countries, that we may be able for a long time to retain the dictatorship of the proletariat, and, at least gradually, to cure all the ills besetting us. Only such a view of the problem will be correct and sober."

In conclusion he expressed the hope that in upbuilding Palestine the Jews might repay to the world in some small degree the debt of gratitude that was owing to all nations.





two million railroad employes, but every citizen who has a stake in the return to normal of industrial and commercial conditions will be concerned if, as a statistician for the railroad labor unions charges, inefficient management is costing the roads a bill of waste of more than \$1,000,000,000 a year. This charge is part of railroad labor's reply to the movement for a reduction of railroad wages, the argument being that elimination of this colossal waste would make wage reductions unnecessary. 

Capt. S. F. Knowlton, the master of the schooner, said the explosion was undoubtedly caused by gases from the cargo she had carried from Port Arthur, from which the holds had not been freed. The force of the explosion blew the forward and after hatches high in the air, started a fire in the hold and on deck and set the sail ablaze. The fire spread with such rapidity that the men saved only part of their belongings. The captain said his personal loss would exceed \$1,000, besides his interest in the vessel, which was not insured. The crew jumped into the power boat, and, with the small boat towing astern, they headed for Havana. 

Clue Found in Skulls.

Working upon a clue which he found last winter in a survey of the skulls of apes and anthropoids in the Anthropological Museum of San Diego, California, Professor Hill-Tout has discovered evidence which he has incorporated in a paper which he wills read before the Royal Society of Canada at its annual meeting this month. In substantiation of his claim he has prepared a large number of photographs of skulls, including those of baby and adult gorillas, showing that a baby gorilla's head very nearly approximates the human in conformation, though changes are rapid with growth.

Professor Hill-Tout is recognized as one of the world's foremost anthropologists. He is a member of the Acceutive committee of the American Institute of Research, member of the Archaeological Institute of America, fellow of the Royal Anthropological Institute of Great Britain. In addition, he is said to be the greatest living authority on Indian languages and folklore.

The Vancouver savant explains his discovery in these words:

"The theoretical conception of anomosimous precursor the ancestor common to man and apes, is shown to be, founded in fact by the discovery of the most interesting of all our fossil remains, Eoanthropus, or the 'Dawn Man.'



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

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
