Germans Counter-Attacking Heavily Along Entire Front

Entente Forces In Northern Russia Soon In Conflict With German Troops

Opposing Armies Building Roads For Advance

British Government Defines Its Aims; No Infringement of Territorial Integrity; Japan Loans Money to Siberian Government; Negotiations With The United States

London, July 30.—A conflict between Entente forces in the Murmansk region and combined Finnish and German troops is imminent near Enebrejen, according to passengers on the first steamer to arrive at Vardo, Norway, from Archangel since the autumn of 1917, says a Christiania despatch to the Daily Express.

The Germans are reported to be moving toward Petchenga, on the coast from Enebrejen and are repairing a road built some years ago by the Russo-Finnish government. It is believed the Entente forces are constructing a road from Petchenga to Sallijarvi to meet the foe half way.

British Aims.—London, July 30.—The British government has defined its aims regarding Russia, in a reply to the provisions of the Daily Mail's correspondent at Vladivostok. The statement is telegraphed by the correspondent follows:

"The aim of his majesty's government is to secure the political and economic restoration of Russia without internal interference of any kind and to bring out the expelled and enemy population."

"His majesty's government categorically declares that it has no intention of infringing in the least degree the territorial integrity of Russia."

Refugees Not Popular.—Petrograd, July 30.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Refugees from the Russian provinces occupied by German troops bring reports of increasing hatred among the peasants for the Germans.

In the Pskov region, it is declared, the Germans have confiscated all the foodstuffs they can carry away except for a small allowance of grain for each inhabitant.

There is starvation among the working classes in Riga on the Baltic according to reports reaching here. Under the Germans the bread allowance has often been so low as one pound a month per person.

Peasants Exasperated.—New York, July 30.—Much political importance is attached to reports from Bolshevik sources that there is a decided revulsion of feeling against the Germans among the Russian people, according to Hans Vork, editor in the Tagblatt of Berlin on June 15, a copy of which has been received here. He says that the same peasants who only a few months ago could not be kept in the trenches are now reported to be in a state of exasperation.

MACHINE GUNS SUPPRESS NEW STRIKE IN PRUSSIA

Amsterdam, July 30.—A new strike has broken out at Kalk, Rhineland Prussia, near Cologne, according to the Echo Beige. Machine guns were used to suppress the movement and the leaders were arrested, the paper declares.

The police, it is added, were still busy when the report was sent, dispersing the crowds which continued to gather in the streets.

WAR APPROPRIATION OF £70,000,000 THE BIGGEST YET

London, July 30.—The biggest appropriation demanded since the beginning of the war will be submitted to the house of commons Thursday, says the Daily Telegraph. The vote of credit to be asked will be for £70,000,000. The previous highest was £250,000,000, voted a year ago. The new appropriation is required to finance the war until the end of October.

PREMIERS' DAY AT TRIAL

Three Former Premiers of France Give Evidence in Treason Case—Had Nothing Against the Prisoner

Paris, July 29.—Former Premiers Viviani, Briand and Ribot were heard today at the trial of Louis J. Malvy, former minister of the interior, charged with holding communication with the enemy. This was known as Premier's Day, all three witnesses having been president of the council when Malvy was head of the interior department.

M. Viviani protested against the report that M. Malvy had been the creator of M. Caillaux. He said Malvy had always done his duty.

M. Briand said that when he formed a cabinet he intended to exclude Malvy as he was no personal friend of his and differed in politics, but at the eleventh hour he decided to confide the portfolio of the interior to Malvy as the best man available.

M. Ribot testified that during the three years he was the colleague of M. Malvy nothing occurred for which the minister could be reproached.

OUTSPOKEN GERMAN GLASSES LEADERS AS GUILTY CRIMINALS

Amsterdam, July 30.—A memorandum demanding ruthless action against the men at the helm of the German government in 1914, as guilty criminals, has been issued by former Captain Von Boerfeldt, says a Berlin telegram quoting the Cologne Volks Zeitung. The memorandum is entitled "A necessary correction of the German white book," and was sent to the members of the Reichstag last week by the captain, who was prominent in connection with the Prince Lichnowsky affair brought about by the capture of Von Boerfeldt's memo says that the German leaders at the beginning of the war were guilty of appalling deeds and that the service of traitors, who were responsible for the war, was a considerable number of fresh graves to be dug, there being close to a hundred in Fennish alone. 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NEW YORK, JULY 30.—MUCH POLITICAL IMPORTANCE IS ATTACHED TO REPORTS FROM BOLSHEWIKI SOURCES THAT THERE IS A DECIDED REVULSION OF FEELING AGAINST THE GERMANS AMONG THE RUSSIAN PEOPLE, ACCORDING TO HANS VORK, EDITOR IN THE TAGBLATT OF BERLIN ON JUNE 15, A COPY OF WHICH HAS BEEN RECEIVED HERE. HE SAYS THAT THE SAME PEASANTS WHO ONLY A FEW MONTHS AGO COULD NOT BE KEPT IN THE TRENCHES ARE NOW REPORTED TO BE IN A STATE OF EXASPERATION.

Mr. Henderson was one of St. John's best known and respected citizens and up until the time of his retirement a short time ago was a familiar figure in the Union depot. Mr. Henderson's willingness to aid the traveling public won for him many friends, who will learn of his death with sincere regret.

Mr. Henderson, who was sixty-nine years old, leaves three sisters—Mrs. W. S. Lafreles of Dorchester, Conn., Mrs. Thomas Dearness of Bridgetown, N. S., and Miss Henderson at home; two brothers, James Henderson of Danbury, Mass., and Fred Henderson of Truro, N. S. The funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon from his late residence.

Winnipeg, July 29.—While Winnipeg's postal workers' strike continues, and a general strike in sympathy with the men who are out is threatened, Hon. T. W. Crothers, minister of labor, late tonight voiced confidence that it is only a matter of a little time before the men get back to work.

STRUCK IN CARLETON

FIERCENESS OF FIGHTING TAKEN AS INDICATION THAT ENEMY WILL MAKE A STAND

Enemy Preparing For Defence on a New Line

Expected to Use All Of Von Boehm's Army and Prince Rupprecht's Reserves in Effort to Halt Retreat—Enemy Artillery Active on Flanders Front

London, July 30.—(By the Associated Press)—The Germans have been counter-attacking very heavily along virtually the entire battle front, according to news that reached London shortly after noon today. Their attack was an especially heavy one in the American sector, resulting in driving the Americans out of the village of Chages, about five and a half miles southeast of Fere-en-Tardenois. Another thrust drove the Americans back from Beugnez, near Grandrozy, northwest of Fere-en-Tardenois.

Paris, July 29.—The fierceness of the fighting Monday, it is believed here, is a sign that the German retreat has reached its limit and that the enemy will make a stand with his right wing on the plateau south of the Crise and with his left on the hills east of the Aisne. For the defence of this line, it is held, the Germans will devote all of General Von Boehm's army and the reserve divisions taken from Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria.

Paris, July 29.—There was no change in the situation north of the Marne last night, says the statement from the war office today. The statement reads: "During the night no event of importance was reported from the front north of the Marne."

Activity in Flanders.—London, July 30.—German positions in the Merse region on the Flanders front were entered last night by Australian troops, who took forty prisoners, the war office announced today.

NEW AIRPLANE LIKE FLYING STEAMSHIP

Paris, July 29.—A giant plane carrying 100 men and equipped with engines equal in power to those in a medium sized steamship will be developed within three weeks, says Glenn Curtiss, inventor of the Caproni bombing planes, in an interview.

The bombing planes now in use, says Curtiss, are compared with those to be developed. There is a surprise in store for the Germans, and the statements issued by the war office tonight say:

"On the night of July 29, in spite of low clouds, our airplanes were able to carry out several reconnaissances and take many photographs of the enemy's positions. The bombs were distributed and railway stations and billets in the neighborhood of Douai, Arras, Valenciennes, Bapaume and Chaules.

In the early morning there was a certain amount of fighting in the air. Nine hostile machines were brought down and two hostile balloons were shot down in flames. Four of our machines are missing.

"During the night Bapaume and active hostile divisions of which ten belong were bombed, all our machines returning."

EARL OF LICHFIELD FOUND DEAD WITH BULLET IN HEAD

London, July 30.—Thomas Francis Anson, the third Earl of Lichfield, banker of England and of the Bank of Australia, was found dead today in the grounds of his estate at Shugborough in Leicestershire with a gun shot wound in the head. Lord Lichfield was born in 1856.

COMMISSIONER'S COMMENT

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Turkey Will Defy German Policy In The Caucasus

Intimation Given By Constantinople Newspaper—Refuse to be Bound by the Brest-Litovsk Treaty—Trouble Between Central Powers

Amsterdam, July 30.—Turkey is going to handle the situation in the Caucasus according to her own ideas. This is indicated in a telegram from Constantinople dated July 28, which quotes an article in the newspaper Nasilik Ekisar presenting the Turkish viewpoint.

"We have nothing to say against the principles laid down in the Brest-Litovsk treaty," says the newspaper, "but when the Caucasus, newly re-organized, turned toward us, and master of its own destinies, refused to be bound by the treaty, what was more natural for us than to take into consideration the necessities of the new situation created on our important eastern front? Could we close our ears to the appeal of the government of a people largely of the same race and same creed as ourselves?"

"We are aware of the action, and its present progress, to place under German control Tiflis and Baku. That is a logical consequence of the application of the Brest-Litovsk treaty. How could this treaty be taken into consideration in the affairs of the Caucasus, seeing that the Bolshevik government has not even been able to return to us, in accordance with the treaty, our eastern frontier and that in the Caucasus influences freely independent of the Bolshevik government have arisen."

This reported attitude on the part of Turkey may account in part for the report received through Copenhagen that Turkey and Germany had severed relations.

THREE LINERS ESCAPE AFTER RUNNING FIGHT WITH SUBMARINES

An Atlantic Port, July 29.—Three trans-Atlantic liners which arrived here today reported having been attacked by German submarines, each of them when about two hundred miles off the Atlantic coast in latitude 38.35, longitude 70.40. All three vessels, by superior speed, escaped unharmed after a running fight which lasted several hours.

The master of another vessel in port reported that three days ago wireless calls were caught by his ship coming from a vessel in plain sight asking for assistance and which upon closer observation proved to be a submarine with telescopic masts and was in many respects similar to that of a sailing vessel in a sinking condition.

INTER-ALLIED FOOD COUNCIL NOW IS AN ACCOMPLISHED FACT

London, July 29.—The conference in London between the food controllers of the United Kingdom, United States, France and Italy is continuing its labors. Meetings are being held almost daily and it is expected that the controllers will complete their discussions by the end of the week. Replying to further questions, Bonar Law said there would be no opportunity of carrying out the policy in war time, but the imperial government had put itself in line with the dominions government by accepting the principle.

SYSTEMATIC PERSECUTIONS OF JEWS BY CENTRAL POWERS

Stockholm, July 30.—A great sensation has been caused among the Jewish workmen in Warsaw by the sudden disappearance of nineteen members of the executive of the Jewish Trade Union, according to Jewish newspapers of Warsaw, says the Jewish Press Bureau here. The men had been working with the Zionist and Socialist organizations. Their disappearance, it is added, is apparently due to the mysterious arrests connected with the persecution of Jews now going on throughout Poland, Germany and Austria.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND SEEMS TO BE A FAVORITE COVEYING SPOT THIS YEAR

Prince Edward Island seems to be a favorite coveying spot this year. Already there have been several religious and fraternal gatherings of an inter-provincial character held there and now the all-Canada meeting of the Orange order and the Pythian Grand Lodge is booked for Summerside late in August. Hotel men and merchants in Charlottetown and Summerside are jubilant. Windfalls like these in our war times are doubly welcome.

IS USEFUL MAN AT FRONT

Lieut. F. J. Nisbit, manager of the N. B. Telephone Co., who has been at the front for nearly two years, is at his own line of work again and, of course, is proving a highly efficient and fast-working expert. He is assisting in the superintending of the telephone systems installed through various posts on the battle front and this keeps him continually busy. Mr. Nisbit is a man who has worked from the elementary phases of the telephone business to the manager's roll-top and knows what it is to climb poles and string wires as well as to lay out blueprints for big jobs, so quite naturally he is a valuable man to the higher command.

Orange Delegate Gave Address
Meeting Held in Centenary School Room — Visitors Are Entertained
"Don't think that that rumpus at Guelph is all over; we are going to arouse Canada from end to end over this matter," said William Banks, a prominent Orangeman from Toronto (Ont.), who last night addressed a large assemblage of members of the order in the Centenary church assembly hall.
"We are going to take a committee to Ottawa at the next session of the House, a bigger committee than the farmers took last session, and we want every representative in parliament who is not afraid of Rome to take his stand in this matter."
Francis Kerr acted as chairman. The address delivered by Mr. Banks was bubbling over with Scotch humor, and he kept his audience in fine fettle throughout. Following up his brief statement relative to the Guelph affair, he told some interesting things about the farmers' convention at Ottawa, of those who had no sons at all to go to the front, and of Arthur Hawkes, L. A. LaPointe and other politicians who knew nothing of farming but who took a lively interest in the proceedings.
He expressed great disappointment at the manner in which Quebec province has responded to the call, and added that had it not been for the laxity in that province on the part of the eligible young men coming forward there would not have been the need of taking so many farmers' sons for active service overseas.
Of the response by the Orangemen throughout Canada to the call to arms he spoke with much pride. He said that they had proven true to the principles

THE WAR OUTLOOK.

If we are a bit disappointed that the Allies failed to destroy or capture the German army in the Marne salient we have only to ask ourselves how we would like the general result of the fighting since July 15 if we were Germans instead of Canadians.

When we look back to the closing days of March and remember the dismay with which we read the news of that formidable drive which for some days carried all before it, the news of those later days, and the knowledge we have of the renewed strength given to the Allied arm by the hard-fighting Americans, give us no cause for dissatisfaction, but the very best reason for the opposite feeling.

Of course the Germans and the German guns so skillfully withdrawn from the Marne salient must be met on a new front and overcome; but there is little fear of another German drive for some time, and the soldiers from the United States are still pouring into France, while more and more of those already there are completing their training and moving into the front lines.

We need not expect immediate results from the fit of cadnor that has come upon some German writers and politicians, prompting them to tell the people more of the truth of the situation than has hitherto been permitted, but that cadnor will gradually spread, and the people, having knowledge of this defeat of their armies at the Marne, will begin to ask awkward questions. The Austrian people, who have been fed on assurances of an early and complete victory for the Central Powers, will not rely another year of war. The Allies have more to hope than fear from Russia. The Kaiser has been talking of a decisive stroke, but that stroke will not be delivered by Germany, upon whose crimes judgment has been pronounced by the civilized world.

WAR COMMENT.

There are rumors of a break between Turkey and Germany. That would be a serious blow to the eastern ambitions of Germany. Any disputes that arise between Turkey and Bulgaria or between either of them and Germany will be of advantage to the Allies.

The declaration by the British government of its aims regarding Russia should have a good effect in that country. The aim of His Majesty's government is to secure the political and economic restoration of Russia without internal interference of any kind and to bring about the expulsion of enemy forces from Russian soil, and his Majesty's government categorically declares that it has no intention of infringing to the slightest degree the territorial integrity of Russia.

German submarines are operating two hundred miles off the American coast. Three liners reported yesterday that each of them had been attacked. All of them escaped, and a fourth vessel reports that it discovered in time that a vessel asking assistance was really a submarine with telescopic masts, and rigged up as a decoy.

The announcement that the United States has 230 warships in European waters, and that the number will rapidly increase, is another evidence of the whole-hearted way the Americans are throwing themselves into the war.

Today's cables express the view that the German retirement in the Marne salient has not reached its limit, and that the enemy, with the aid of his reserves, will endeavor to make a stand. He has succeeded in withdrawing his army and his guns without sacrificing any considerable number of men since the retreat began, and it may be that he feels he can now meet the Allied forces on more even terms. There is much speculation as to whether Ludendorff will now accept the defensive along the whole line or endeavor to strike another blow on some other part of the extended front.

Mr. Frank H. Simonds declares that to accept the defensive would be to confess failure for the year and for the war. If that should be the German view also, we may expect more terrific fighting.

Meanwhile Foch still has the initiative and each day records some further success gained by the Allies.

SOME SHARP CRITICISM.

The strike of the postmen has called forth some very sharp criticism of the government, both in Ottawa and Toronto.

For example, the Ottawa Journal-Press says: "Probably the present dispute would not have arisen had the postmen received with reasonable promptness the salary bonuses voted them months ago."

The Toronto Globe gets down to cases and fixes the responsibility in the following vigorous article: "It is impossible to avoid accepting the verdict of the man on the street that responsibility for this dislocation of business rests primarily with the government at Ottawa. The bonus passed to the letter carriers by parliament has never been paid. The government either neglected the repeated petitions of the men or refused to take them seriously."

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NEWS OF SOLDIERS.

Many of the senior officers in this military district on hearing of the proposal to raise a corps of Rough Riders for general service in South Africa have expressed their eagerness to become identified with such a unit.

Flight Lieutenant Curtis L. Hicks of the Royal Air Force, son of Allan W. Hicks, postmaster at Hampton, arrived home on Sunday at noon from Toronto, where he qualified as a flight lieutenant. He will leave for overseas at an early date.

FRENCH PAY LESS THAN U. S. TROOPS FOR THEIR GAINS.

London, July 30.—Comparing the work of the French and American troops in the battle now going on, Reuter's correspondent at American headquarters writes: "The French have had four years of hard study, and the lesson most laid to heart is the value to France of live Frenchmen and dead Germans. When sacrifices are required, they are quite ready to make them, but their pride is to kill and pay little for killing."

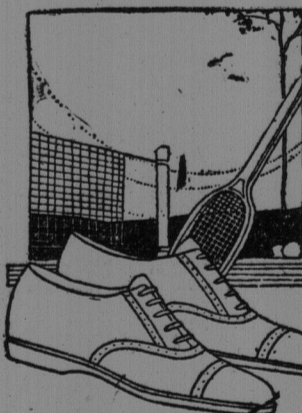



VERDICT GIVEN FOR W. E. SCULLY

Judgment in Martello Hotel Case—Judge Finds Nothing to Support Claim That Money Was Paid for Political Purposes

In the circuit court this morning His Honor Judge Chandler entered a verdict for the defendant in the case of Brannan vs. Scully.

In this case George F. Brannan brought suit against the defendant for the sum of \$500, the payment arising out of the sale of the Martello Hotel on west side to the dominion government, and the plaintiff alleged that the \$500 had to do with a political campaign fund. The defendant denied that at the time of the sale of Martello Hotel any mention was ever made of a political contribution and further denied that any mention was made of the name of the minister of public works or that any contribution was made to him.

When the court met this morning His Honor Judge Chandler ordered that a verdict be entered for the defendant, and said that if the parties desired it, he would deliver a written judgment later.

Francis Kerr and Dr. J. B. Baxter, K. C. appeared for the plaintiff and J. A. Barry for the defendant.

LIEUT.-COL. CORBET AGAIN IS IN FRANCE

Left Comfortable Post in London to Organize New Field Ambulance Which He Now Commands

Lieut.-Colonel G. G. Corbet of this city is now in France again in command of a field ambulance unit. After a period of arduous service at the front, Dr. Corbet returned to St. John and recruited a field ambulance corps which he took overseas. When the fifth division was broken up his unit shared the fate of others and the men went to reserve depots or to the front in drafts.

Afterwards Lieut.-Colonel Corbet was given an important post in London. He regarded this as too easy a post for an able-bodied man and, when the opportunity offered, a fortnight later, he accepted a chance to get to the front again.

The task which was presented to him was the organization of another field ambulance corps. He rounded up the men, completed organization and training and had them in France in a month.

With the new unit which Lieut.-Colonel Corbet commands, the 14th Field Ambulance, are several St. John officers and quite a large number of St. John men.
