


The British board of trade has issued a greater degree of co-operation bean interesting comparison of British and German shipping. When the war broke

out Britain owned 10,128 ships, aggre-gating 20,523,706 tons; and Germany

out Britain owned 10,128 ships, aggregating 20,528,706 tons; and Germany owned 2,090 ships, aggregating 5,134,720 tons. After sixteen weeks of war only 1.9 per cent of the British ships were unavailable, and only 2.9 per cent of the tonnage; whereas 58.4 per cent of the German ships and 89.8 per cent of their tonnage had been rendered un-available. The board of trade estimated that only ten German steamers were then known to be at sea, as against ten thousand British steamers. Where Responsibility Lies "The German Crown Prince stated a few days ago—at all events he is re-ported as having stated—that this war was the most stupid of all wars. In this we all agree with him; and he might have added, the most criminal of all wars also. The reporter might have asked the Crown Prince. 'Where does the responsibility lie.' We know only too truly that the responsibility must rest upon Germany. We know that the immediate cause was the assassination of the heir apparent of Austria. But it is a matter of history which cannot be explained away that Sir Edward Grey, Britain's Foreign Minister, tried again and again to prevent this incident de-veloping into a general European war, to have a European congress to settle questions arising out of the assassina-tion. All the nations were ready, but the German Emperor alone would not give his consent.



Cavalry During the last ten years the Brit-ish cavalry has been trained with great diligence. Ignoring the advice of ex-tremists, its leaders have taught the men to be expert alike with sword and lance and with the rifle. The result is that both the cold steel and the rifle have been used effectively. Certain high-ly placed observers thus are quoted thus "The training of the cavalry with the rifle has been invaluable, and has given them great advantage over the enemy. There have been up to the present, no cases of large cavalry charges with the 'arme blanche,' but the latter has been used a good deal in small affairs." In distinction to the German method of handling infantry in masses, these officers say that an infantry advance "should not be made in rigid lines, but with clouds of skirmishers five or six yards apart—thrown forward according to the ground and available cover." "The essential thing," says one gen-eral at the front, "is to pay attention to the sound principles on which our train-ing has been based." This is a proud thing to be able to say. British soldlers judged accurately the nature of modern warfare and ad-apted the teaching of their men to it, on the whole with great success. It took brains to do that. "The German infantry," writes an ar-illery officer, "cannot touch ours, and their shooting is deplorable. They seem to depend entirely on their machine guns, which are the very devil and mag-ninfantry advance by itself is sheer nonsense. The German infantry will not face our artillery fire. nor that of the-French."


