BUSINESS PART OF COBALT WAS SWEEPED BY FIRE

Several Buildings Burned With Loss Estimated At \$160,000

STARTED IN A THEATRE Audience Left in Orderly Manner, Piano Player Keeping at It Till All Reached the Street—Principal Loss Was in Hotel Building

(Canadian Press) Cobalt, Ont., June 6.—The most serious fire in Cobalt since the big conflagration of 1901, swept the heart of the business section last night with \$160,000 as a conservative estimate of the loss. The blaze was in that part of the city known as "the square." It carried with it the Lyric Theatre building, the Cobalt Hotel, Milton Carr building, Cole's building, Harrington's restaurant and Eter properties. That no lives were lost and no one seriously injured is regarded as a miracle.

WAR ON CATERPILLARS

Armed with ladders and clothes 100 men first examined all trees on public property and also looked after those on private grounds in cases where permission to enter was granted by the proprietors. Thousands of caterpillars were gathered up to be burned.

Montreal, June 6.—A cable message received by Vice-President William Wainwright of the Grand Trunk announced the sudden death of Major James Stephenson, probably the oldest veteran of the Grand Trunk service. It was said that he had had his death as the result of an accident.

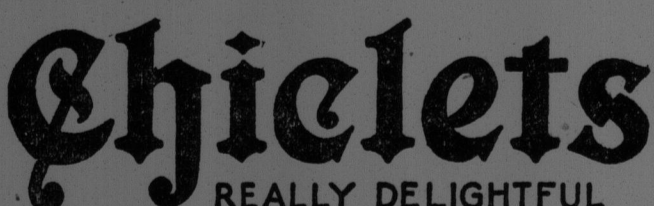

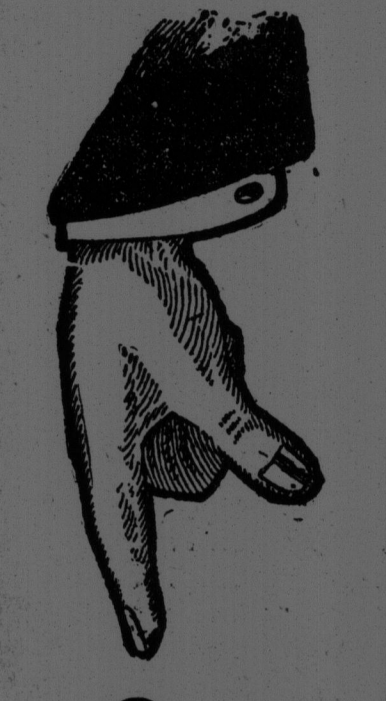

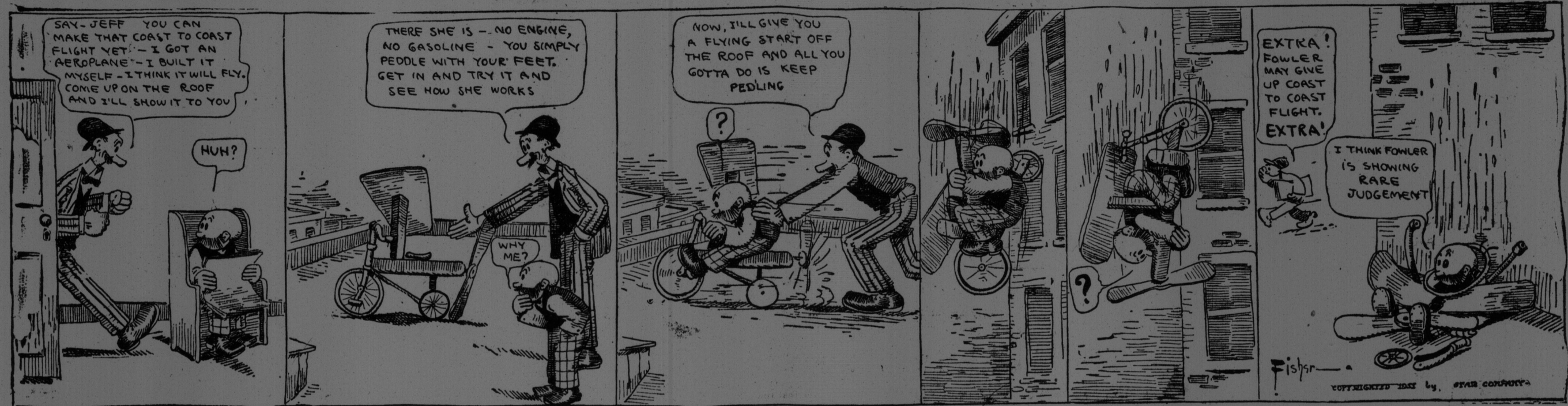
