

Then it is mixed with water and a very thin batter prepared. This batter is spread on a hot stone over the fire, where it is allowed to bake for considerable time.

When one side is baked the other is turned, Sheet after sheet is baked in this manner. No salt is used in the batter, and the bread has a sweetish taste. It is usually blue, taking the color of the corn from which it is made.





OFFICIAL REPORT ON

erday issued a bulletin on the crops of terday issued a bulletin on the crops of Canada as prepared from reports made up to the end of October.

The closing months of the year give good reports for nearly all the field crops of the dominion. Potatoes alone indicate partial failure, and in all the provinces there are complaints of rot in the fields and in the heaps for winter storage. The area is 503, 262 acres and the estimated yield 74,048,000 bushels, being an average of about 147 bushels an acre, which is nearly uniform for all the provinces. The quality is 84.42 per cent.

Census Office Figures From Reports up to End of October

Ottawa, Nov. 12-The Census office yes-

Turnips and other field roots show a quality of 88.57, a yield of 402 bushels an acre, and a total yield of 95.207,000 bushels for a crop of 236,622 acres.

Hay and clover are computed for 8,515,400 acres and a yield of 1.82 tons an acre. The quality is 90.45 per cent., and the total yield 15,497,000 tons.

Fodder corn has an estimated yield of 9.38 tons an acre, which, upon an area of 271,960 acres, gives a product of 2,551,000 tons.



Sugar beets are grown most extensively in Ontario and Alberta, where they supply roots for three sugar factories. The area in crop this year is 16,000 acres, which is a substantial increase upon last year. The yield is 9.69 tons an acre, the total yield 155,000 tons, and the quality 93.15 per cent. The roots supplied to the Berlin factory are testing 17 per cent of sugar and at the Wallaceburg factory 16 per cent.; but a product of 5,000—acres in Ontario is being shipped to factories in Michigan. The product of 8,200 acres in that province is marketed at Wallaceburg and Berlin, where the average price is about \$5.86 a ton or better than \$57.80 an acre.

All bells after they are cast and finished must go through a process of tuning the same as any other musical instrument be-fore they respond with a clear, true tone. Every bell sounds five notes, which must blend together in order to produce perfect

harmony.

The tuning of a bell is done by means of shaving thin bits from various parts of the metal. It is as easy for an expert bell tuner to put a bell in tune as it is for a piano tuner to adjust his instrument to perfect chords.

At first thought it would seem that a bell would be ruined should the tuner shave off too much at the last tuning, or the fifth sound, but such is not the case. He would, however, be obliged to begin over, starting again with the first tone and shaving the bell until it gave forth its harmonious sound at the fifth tone.—Scientific American.
