

GERMAN PAPER SAYS BRITAIN IS NOT SUPREME

Conservative Organ Approves of Declaration of London

'Kreuz Zeitung' Declares that Action of Liberal Ministry is Forced by Knowledge that British Navy is Not Dictator on the Sea—Greater Figures Prove it

(Special Times Correspondence.) Berlin, July 26.—The recent decision of the British house of commons on the subject of the ratification of the Declaration of London leads the 'Kreuz Zeitung' to consider the question why the liberal ministry has decided to abandon the old standpoint of might and to adopt a standpoint of right.

England, as the greatest maritime power, it states, 'has hitherto enjoyed special privileges. When naval wars were fought under traditional law it was,' says the Conservative journal, 'England's great navy which has secured for her the right of her own, whereby she reaped great profit and advantage, and it declares that England has consented to adopt a new standpoint because she fears that, since navies have arisen which compel the respect of the English, she would herself suffer too grievously from the consequences of inadequate naval war law.'

The Conservative organ declares further that England has also lost her lead in respect of the capabilities of individual ships and must consequently accept a new standard in the construction of machinery and artillery. England would recover some of the ground it has lost, if it gained in technical superiority, but there is no sign of such superiority.

The 'Kreuz Zeitung' concludes as follows: 'Sir Edward Grey said in the house of commons on July 25: "Your two-power standard or your three-power standard is no longer going to be the world-power standard. It will no longer be possible for any single power to have a world standard." These words seem to imply that the English, to begin with, the liberal party, have arrived at an appreciation of the fact that in the existing state of affairs even the strongest naval power is unable to maintain exclusive supremacy on the sea. If this is the case, the cause of world peace is very considerably furthered.'

PERSIAN GOVERNMENT UNITED IN DANGER OF EX-SHAH'S REVOLUTION

Reported That Brother of Former Ruler Has Been Executed—New Cabinet Formed.

Tehran, July 26.—The demand of the National Council for the resignation of Premier Siphahar has been followed by the organization of a new cabinet, with Samsam Es Saltanah as premier, and minister of war and Vooch Ed Dowich as foreign minister.

The government appears to be united in the face of difficulties. It is reported that Mofid Ed Dowich, the reactionary leader of the Kadjar family, was arrested Sunday and has been executed in spite of the intervention of the British legation. A large body of volunteers is being organized for the defence of the capital against the ex-Shah, who is reportedly engaged in securing adherents in Kiristan and other districts.

Boston, July 26.—George Tracy, fourteen, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Tracy, of Crescent street, Cambridge, was hanging from two ropes in the cellar of his home yesterday by his sister, Miss Gertrude Tracy. He had strangled himself in a strange manner, became tangled up in the ropes and in that way met his death.

LOBBYISTS LEAVE WASHINGTON FOR WORK AT OTTAWA

100 LOSE LIVES IN STORM WHICH SWEEPS JAPAN

Forty Bodies Already Recovered—Property and Shipping Loss Will Be Large—Awful Fate of Inmates of House of Ill Fame

Tokyo, July 26.—More than a hundred people are believed to have lost their lives early today in the typhoon which swept over Tokyo, and Yokohama during the night. Forty bodies were recovered this morning in the Sumida territory including twenty-three occupants of a house of ill-fame, which was washed away before the storm could reach it.

SAN FRANCISCO GETS PERMANENT BUILDINGS OF PACIFIC EXPOSITION

San Francisco, Cal., July 26.—(Canadian Press)—The Panama Pacific International exposition to be held in 1915 has been selected after several months of deliberation by the city of San Francisco. The industrial buildings and other temporary structures will be placed at Harbor View on the Bay Shore, overlooking the entrance to the harbor. All permanent buildings will be placed in Golden Gate Park, excepting an enormous convention hall to be located at the civic centre of the city.

The Evening Chit-Chat

A SOCIETY called the "Gideons" which is composed of Christian Commercial Travellers has recently started a crusade to place Bibles in the guest-rooms of all the hotels in the country.

Many thousands have been gladly accepted by the managers of all classes of hotels from the most fashionable and expensive of hostilities to the one night lodging houses.

In New York the Hotel Savoy received a hundred Bibles, the Plaza 700, and the Hotel Astor 800.

Now, when they get all the hotels in the country supplied, I have another suggestion for the Gideons and that is that they start a crusade to place Bibles in our homes.

I really think that everyone would be astonished if a census could be taken showing how many homes—houses I would say—are absolutely without a Bible.

You see, the furniture dealers, who advertise to fit out our people for housekeeping at the rate of forty-nine or ninety-eight dollars for four rooms, probably don't include Bibles in that furnishing.

And as for the huge family Bible which I have seen at a wedding, I don't think I have ever seen one at a wedding.

But not all the homes that lack a Bible are of the four-room-for-ninety-eight-dollar class. I was visiting in a beautiful house the other day, when some question of Bible history arose.

We argued over it for a few minutes and then decided to look it up. What was the question? That beautiful place came forward and actually declared that there wasn't a Bible in the house.

I am happy to say that she did have the grace to be very much ashamed. The beautiful old custom of grace before meat has become almost entirely a thing of the past.

Need I send them to your home? In the Bible to go out of the home, too? Will we have to go to Church to read the Bible some day?

If you don't believe in the Bible as an inspired book surely you do want it as the most beautiful book of moral precepts that has ever been enunciated.

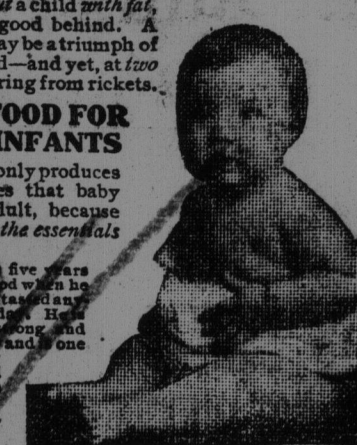

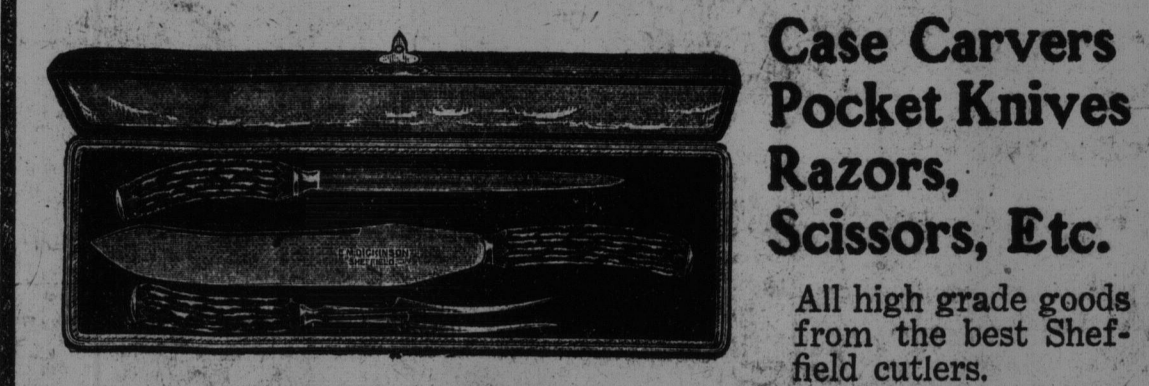

## CONSERVATIVES IN QUEBEC WILL CRY ANNEXATION

Will Try to Frighten French-Canadians With Cry That Province of Quebec Will be Annexed to United States if Reciprocity is Passed

## TORIES DODGE MOTION ON LAURIER'S POSITION AT IMPERIAL CONFERENCE

Opposition, Hopelessly Divided, Do Not Permit Mr. Monk's Amendment to Come to Vote—Three Widely Divergent Complaints by Borden and His Followers

Ottawa, Ont., July 25.—The opposition amendment to Honorable Mr. Fielding's resolution to resume the receding discussion in parliament today was not permitted to come to a vote. It was prudently dropped by being declared "Lost in division."  
The discussion related to the premier's position at the imperial conference, and found the opposition unable to agree upon any specific criticism other than general condemnation of Canada's representation. Mr. Monk, who submitted the amendment calling for the production of the full text of the proceedings, contended because the premier had not asked for the autonomy of Canada, but had advocated and agreed to "a proposal which there shall be consultation" between the mother country and the dominions.  
Then Mr. Borden also contended because the premier had worn "the well-recognized and somewhat threadbare gab of sever of the autonomy of Canada," and finally, W. F. MacLean, condemned a somewhat straddling condemnation. He sided with his leader, but condemned the premier for permitting Britain and the colonial office from "still regarding Canada as a mere colony," adding his submission that Sir Wilfrid should "wake them up and show them what Canada is."  
The discussion served only to emphasize the schisms which exist in the opposition ranks in relation to imperial relations and the effort which is being made to face both ways.

The text of Mr. Monk's want of confidence amendment set forth that the government should communicate to parliament forthwith "The complete report of the proceedings of the imperial conference of 1909." He argued that while Sir Wilfrid Laurier was being extolled by the ministerial press of Montreal for retaining the status upon Canadian autonomy, he had in reality lent himself to the development of closer imperial ties.  
Notwithstanding that parliament was asked to vote large sums for military and naval matters, no light had been given as to the authority of imperial generals and admirals, and the Canadian premier had advocated a proposal under which there should be consultation and co-operation. The Canadian navy had been established by the premier for the purpose of carrying out the policy for the imperial conference of 1909, and it was incumbent upon the government to give the house a report on the proceedings of the recent conference that the facts might be determined.  
Sir Wilfrid Laurier heartily concurred in the statement that this information should be placed before the house as soon as it reached the government from the colonial office. He would consent with the government on his return to Ottawa tonight with a view to calling for it.  
It was the decision of the conference that all its proceedings, reported verbatim, should be made public, and with that end in view the colonial office was printing the proceedings. These, however, had not yet come to hand.  
For himself, he had given out nothing to the ministerial press of Montreal, nor to any other source. The official report would speak for itself.  
"I shall be only too happy to lay it upon the table of the house upon its arrival," added Sir Wilfrid. "If an anxious to have my conduct at the conference discussed in this house and in the country. It will be a pleasure to have the opportunity of vindicating my course."  
There were those who had not waited to see what he had said before undertaking to discuss and to criticize his attitude, and the sooner the report came to hand the better it would be for the government.

The premier added that it was unusual to submit a want of confidence resolution condemning the government for something for which they were in no way responsible, but were in the hands of the colonial office.  
Mr. Borden applauded Mr. Lancaster and other of his supporters who had been approving Mr. Monk's utterances by stating that he entirely agreed with the position regarding the official report. He held, however, that the reports of the premier's ministerial organs throughout the country must have emanated from the ministerial colleagues of Sir Wilfrid who attended the conference.  
"Wherein had the premier saved the autonomy of Canada," he asked, "make any difference whether it was Balfour or Chamberlain or Asquith and Haldane, and Sir Wilfrid's committee had no Canadian autonomy. This time it was Mr. Asquith who had committed the assault on the autonomy of Canada."  
Turning to his supporters, Mr. Borden assumed a dramatic role, and continued: "Oh, no, it makes no difference whether it is Selborne, Tweedmouth or McKenna, or whether it is good Liberals like Lloyd-George and Churchill, it is always necessary for my right honorable friend to don his sword and shield and white plume and save the Canadian people. Canadian autonomy has been so well preserved that it ought to be in cold storage by now."
