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HIGHEST COPPER CAMP IN WORLD

IS PROPOSED FOR THE TELKWA DISTRICT

H. Howson Gives Interesting Description of the Vast Richness of Northern British Columbia

Harry Howson, the manager of the Telkwa Mining, Milling & Development Company, representing Chicago and East Canadian capitalists, has reached the city after spending the summer in superintending work on the vast interests which his company has in the northern part of British Columbia.

At the present time the Telkwa Mining, Milling & Development Company has a hotel, an assay office and a number of cabins. The intention next summer is to put in a sawmill. This would have been done this year had the transportation facilities been at all adequate to the needs of the district.

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The district in which the claims are located is at the headwaters of the south fork of the Telkwa river. The greatest difficulty with which the company has to contend at present is the lack of transportation facilities.

As the higher waters of the Skeena from Kistlas canyon to Hazelton are navigable only a small part of the year the season for getting supplies in by the cautious route was very short.

Mr. Howson in common with others interested in that district and in the Bulkley valley has been hoping to see a wagon road built from the mouth of the Skeena river to the interior.

The distance from where the Copper river empties into the Skeena to the Telkwa Mining, Milling & Development Company's properties is, according to the route suggested, only 60 miles.

Mr. Howson in an interview to-day outlined the work which his company had in hand and the prospects of the district. He says that his company has undoubtedly the largest coal area discovered in British Columbia.

The copper claims begin at the townsite and run west and northwest for a distance of about twelve miles. Mr. Howson's company has 10 groups embracing 41 claims in this district.

Speaking of the formation Mr. Howson says there are vast bodies of low grade copper ore in sight. The formation is a basalt rock with porphyry dykes cutting it in with veins of ore.

In the Mayflower Group the ledge is 70 feet in width. An open cut has been put across the entire vein, and the average shows 5 per cent. in copper.

There are rich veins running through the low grade ore. Very high values have been got on some of these veins.

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HEALTH AND BEAUTY



It's Important to Keep Them Perfectly Clean

RUBBER gloves are so old an invention that they are scarcely known to the woman who does her own work, yet who has the right to be proud of her own appearance, who doesn't use them for at least the majority of things.

With nine out of ten women that is all there is to it. How the gloves are worn, in what condition, they are kept, how the hands are treated before and after putting them on are points that mean as much in the beauty of the hands as does the actual protection of the glove itself.

Absolute cleanliness, both of hands and of gloves must be observed; the gloves washed thoroughly in warm water with plenty of soap, both inside and out each time after they have been used, and left dry where there is plenty of fresh air blowing to keep them sweet.

The hands must be not less carefully washed; carefully drawing a pair of heavy rubber gloves over hands hastily wrung out of ammonia or turpentine water must never be allowed, after washing them, dry them thoroughly and powder well with talcum powder before putting on the dry, clean gloves.

HOW TO DRY THE HANDS

After you are through work, and have washed your gloves, wash your hands again and rub into them the least bit of a good simple cold cream or white vaseline. In a few moments, wipe the hands again, in case you have used a little more of the emollient than the skin will take up.

All this takes very little time, and does not do it to tell, but it counts mightily in its effect upon the hands. The same rules apply, though only in a measure, of course, to the loose old gloves discarded by the men of the family, which prove so useful if you have any rubber gloves. Old Depilatory.

One of the oldest depilatories manufactured, and which has a very large sale, is composed of the following ingredients: Sulphate of soda, 100 grains; chalk, 30 grains.

Mix thoroughly and keep dry in well-closed bottles until wanted for use. Take enough to make a paste and add warm water to it until the proper consistency is reached.

Brown Hair Stain.

Green walnut shells, 2 ounces; alum, ¼ ounce; pure oil, 4 ounces. Heat together in a water bath until the water has been completely evaporated. Then excess, filter and perfume.

My hair is very oily and I have a great deal of dandruff. It is hardly advisable for me to wear a hat, as it is so uncomfortable. I cannot recommend to you any such places as you ask about, for that is against my rules. But I shall be glad to suggest some remedy to you. Try this dandruff cure; also the lotion for oily hair.

To Remove Dandruff.

Tincture of cantharides, 1 ounce; liquid ammonia, 1 dram; glycerine, 1 ounce; oil of rose, 1 ounce; perfume, 1 ounce. Mix all together with six ounces of rose-water. Shake thoroughly. Use as directed.

Lotion for Oily, Damp Hair.

For greasy, moist hair the following is an excellent dry lotion. If used daily it tends to produce a crisp condition and an abundant growth of hair.

Perfumed bicarbonate of soda, borate of soda (also powdered), ¼ ounce of each; eau de cologne, 1 fluid ounce; alcohol, 1 ounce; lime-water, 1 fluid ounce; distilled water, 1 ounce.

Mix all together in a bottle until solution is complete for general usage.

An Ounce of Prevention—Rubber Gloves

For the rest, caring for the nails so that they are fairly short (no longer than the tip of the finger) is the correct method, and using only thin instruments in the work of caring for them, except for the shoring of the curved blade scissor; powdering the hands when they are moist with perspiration, apparently without excess, and first, and always, bathing them—and there you are.

Change Methods of Treatment

M. J. F.—I do not know that the troubles with your hair and scalp are due directly to the causes you mention, but at any rate they must be removed for the present. Discontinue the use of borax entirely. Also discontinue the "rat," following the hair to be loosened and comfortably on the head, except at night, when it should be carefully brushed and combed and smoothed out in two plaits. Never sleep with your hair up.

There are many brillianines, but all contain more or less oil. Under the circumstances it is hardly advisable to use it. The proprietary article you speak of is quite unknown to me, other than its name; therefore, I could say nothing about it, for or against.
