MUKDEN, May 24.—The Russians on May 16th made a sudden attack upon the town of Anju, Korea, from the village of Hai Tchen and captured the town, destroying it. The Japanest garrison set fire to the houses and tores and retired in perfect order. SEOUL, May 23.—3.30 p. m.—Further reports are being received that the Russians are advancing along the great South Road from Song Ching. Koreans estimate their number at about six hundred.

The Cossacks who fought with the The Cossacks who fought with the Koreans at Hamheung are supposed to have retired to Chang Chin. The latest reports from Hamheung are that the Russians burned five hundred houses in the suburbs and partly destroyed the long bridge in Korea, which there spans the Song Chung river. Their Numbers, Nationality and Their

The annual report on the British army issued recently, forms an elaborate statistical guide to the numerical strength, the nationality, the religious beliefs, the progress, and condition of recruiting of the British army. The report is only for the first nine months of 1903, because of the decision of the secretary of war that it should be rendered annually in future as from Oct. 1st, instead of Jan. 1st.

For the regular army the number of recruits enlisted in the period under re-derview was 29,324, and for the militia 25,774, these figures showing a large iminution on the numbers in the coresponding period of previous years. The falling off, however, says the in-spector-general of recruiting, is easily xplained. At the commencement of
