UNDECIDED YET ABOUT DISCIPLINE

Committee of Methodist Episcopal Church Fails to Agree On Amusements.

Matter of Card Playing and Dancing Likely to be Left to Conscience of Its Members.

Minneapolis, Minn., May 10.—Paragraph 299 of the discipline of the Methodist Episcopal church is still undecided, and the question of whether dancing, card playing and kindred amusements are to be left only to the "conscience" remains open. The members of the church are a bone of contention in the committee on the state of the church. For three hours this afternoon the committee debated the question after the majority report of the sub-committee had been made favoring striking out that portion of the discipline. Members clamored for recognition from the chair, and often the speakers advocating one side of the question or the other were greeted with cries of "No, no," and occasionally groans. Dr. Leander W. Munhall, of Philadelphia, administered a rebuff to the college of Bishops of the church when he said in opposing the striking out of the section that "The Bishops' duties are such that they cannot give full consideration to the spiritual affairs of the church and their judgment in this case is not of the best." "The Bishops in their report urge the abolishing of the section, but in so doing said that they did not mean that the church should favor such amusements."

SEVEN DAY SERVICE ON THE MAIN LINE OF INTERCOLONIAL

But Only Six Trains Weekly Between St. John and Halifax—Ministers in the Sister City.

Special to The Standard. Halifax, May 10.—Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railroads, arrived this evening, pursuing his tour of railway inspection. He is accompanied by P. G. Gullis, the commissioner appointed to investigate the national transcontinental, T. H. Lennox, M.P.P. for North York, Ont., is with the party in an unofficial capacity. Hon. Mr. Cochrane will spend Saturday and Sunday in Halifax, and on Monday morning he is scheduled to go from Pictou across to Charlottetown. The trip has now taken ten days, and the latter is about 1 1/2 days ahead of the original itinerary.

The Halifax board of trade and others, propose a dinner for Hon. Mr. Cochrane on Saturday night. It has been decided to run trains daily, Sunday included, on the main line of the I. C. R. to Montreal, commencing with the summer timetable. Only six trains a week will be run as usual between Halifax and St. John.

HUSBAND FOUND NOT GUILTY OF THE MURDER OF WIFE

Despite Admission of Woman's Ante-mortem Statement in Evidence Jury Acquits Davidge of Crime.

Toronto, May 10.—Although Justice Middleton overruled the objections of the prisoner's counsel and admitted the ante-mortem statement of Mrs. William Davidge as evidence against her husband, charged with her murder, the jury this afternoon found Davidge cured subsequent to the performance of an illegal operation.

POLICEMEN SUFFER WHEN MEET STRIKERS

Newark, May 10.—Two policemen were wounded this afternoon in a clash with striking laborers at Seventh and Clifton avenues. Several of the laborers also sustained injuries. The wounded policemen are Thomas J. Crane and Michael Owens.

CREW TRIED TO RUSH TITANIC'S LIFEBOATS

Disgraceful Conduct Brought Out in Investigation

INVADED STEERAGE

When Quarters of Seamen Were Flooded Men Rushed to Third Class Cabins for Lifebelts and Later Took Possession of Boat.

London, May 10.—That all the members of the crew did not act in a manner expected from men of their calling on the night of the disaster is slowly drawn out from the witnesses at the British Board of Trade inquiry under the searching examination of Sir Rufus Isaacs and other counsel. It came out during yesterday's hearing that the firemen of the Titanic when the water flooded their quarters invaded the third class saloon for life preservers. "Certainly, as it is pointed out, these were not needed by passengers, as the vessel carried only a small proportion of her complement of third class passengers."

DISTINGUISHED MEN FROM OLD COUNTRY TO VISIT HALIFAX

Lord Mayor of Bristol With Delegation to Attend Dedication of Memorial Tower—Bring Contributions.

Ottawa, May 10.—Word has been received by Sir Sanford Fleming, a representative delegation from Bristol, England, headed by the lord mayor, will come to Halifax in August to attend the ceremony of dedication of the Nova Scotia memorial tower. The delegation will bring with it a bronze tablet depicting the departure of the Cabots and also a fac-simile of the banner placed by Henry VII. in the hands of the Cabots.

ISMAI REACHES BRITISH SOIL ON THE S.S. ADRIATIC

White Star Liner Docks at Southampton—Managing Director Seldom Seen by Passengers During Voyage.

Southampton, May 10.—The White Star liner Adriatic arrived here from New York at 1 1/2 o'clock this afternoon. No reporters were permitted to go on board. The passengers report that J. Bruce Ismay, managing director of the White Star Line, is in good health. He kept to his own stateroom nearly all the time throughout the voyage, very seldom appearing on deck. Mrs. Ismay went out on the tender to join him.

RICHESON IN OLD QUARTERS

Pending Reports on Sanity of Condemned Murderer He Is Not Removed to Cell Adjoining Death Chamber.

Boston, May 10.—Had the usual procedure been followed, Clarence V. T. Richeson, the murderer of Miss Avis Linnell, would have wakened today in a cell in the State prison, close to the chamber where he is condemned to die during the week of May 15. Executive action, pending reports as to his sanity by certain experts has delayed his transfer from the county jail.

MINISTERS TO CROSS OCEAN

Hon. George E. Foster Will Attend Meeting of Imperial Trade Commission—Mr. Hazen and Premier Plan Trip

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, May 10.—Hon. Geo. E. Foster leaves on the 31st for England to attend the Imperial Trade Commission which Lord Incheape is chairman. A number of other ministers are planning to leave the capital during the coming summer.

CELEBRATION OF ANNIVERSARY TO BE ARRANGED NOW

Committee Will Be Organized at Early Date to Co-operate With England and United States.

Ottawa, May 10.—To arrange for a celebration of the hundred years of peace between Canada and the United States, a meeting has been summoned for Ottawa on June 4. A committee will then be organized to co-operate with those of Great Britain and the United States. The call is signed by Senator Cox, Senator Dandurand, Sir Louis Bett, Sir Alex. Lacoste, Sir William Mackenzie, Sir W. R. Meredith, Sir William Mulock, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy and Sir Edmund Walker.

CURIOUS SHOCKS DRIVING PEOPLE FROM THEIR HOMES

Gundalajara, Mex., May 9.—A state of terror exists in this city as the result of earth shocks which in the 24 hours since Wednesday morning have numbered over 25. Many shocks were felt today, but their force was more severe than those of yesterday. The people continue to live in the open squares. Some churches and stores have been seriously damaged by the earthquakes.

TWO BOYS KILLED BY FALLING COAL

Mount Carmel, Pa., May 10.—Two boys were killed and three were seriously injured today by a fall of coal in an abandoned mine working.

CHANGES CURRENCY OF THE DOMINION

Four Dollar Bills and "Shin-plasters" to be Gradually Withdrawn.

Former Will Be Superseded by New Issue of Fives—Soiled and Faded Notes to Be Recalled.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, May 10.—The day of the dirty dollar is passing. The new bank note will be brought down almost immediately upon the reassembling of parliament and in it there will be a provision under which it will be the duty of the banks not to re-issue soiled or faded notes. The banks have already a standing request from the Department of Finance to return for exchange all soiled Dominion notes, which come into their possession. The old "shin-plaster," or twenty-five cent note is likely to disappear in a short time as it is understood the Minister of Finance does not favor it.

HIS MAJESTY IN THE FRAY

Battleship Bearing King George Attacked by Submarines in Sham Battle—Near Approach to War Conditions.

Weymouth, Eng., May 10.—King George spent a long day today on board the battleship Neptune which headed the first and second squadrons of the fleet out into the Channel for two battle practice manoeuvres. The weather continues hazy, but the gun practice and other manoeuvres were able to carry out their gunnery practice 12 miles out at sea and during the afternoon the roar of the big guns was distinctly audible here, and dours for His Majesty therefore experienced a near war conditions as is possible in time of peace. Today's manoeuvres at sea ended with a submarine attack on the battleships Neptune and Hercules.

WANTS PATENT LAWS REVISED

President Taft Points Out That American Regulations Are Sadly in Need of Improvement—Some Abuses.

Washington, D. C., May 10.—President Taft today took a decided step towards revision of the patent laws, which have remained practically unchanged since 1870. He sent a special message to congress asking for legislation to authorize him to appoint a commission to investigate the patent laws and report what changes were necessary to make them fully modern conditions.

TAKING CAMPAIGN TO INVOLVE SIXTY-THREE SPEECHES

President May Not Be As Strenuous as Some, But Theodore Hasn't Got Mustering Patented.

Washington, May 10.—The complete schedule of President Taft's final campaign tour of Ohio before the presidential primaries there on May 21 was made public here tonight. As announced tonight, the President will make sixty-three speeches but there is a possibility that this number may be increased if the railroads can work on additional stops. On every day he speaks he will make ten speeches except on Saturday, May 18, when he will make twelve, and on Thursday, when he will speak at a big night gathering at Cleveland.

EVEN REPAIR WORK TO BE CALLED OFF IN THE COAL FIELDS

Hazleton, Pa., May 10.—At the district office of the United Mine Workers it was announced today that the local unions throughout the Lehigh coal field have adopted resolutions asking that all repair work at the mines be discontinued, but agreeing to permit the engineers, firemen and pump runners to remain on duty to prevent the colliers from being stranded.

TRADERS AND ROYAL BANKS MAKE MERGE

MAKES ATTACK ON ASQUITH

Mr. Bonar Law Charges Premier With Assisting United States in Designs Upon This Country.

London, May 10.—Andrew Bonar Law, the leader of the opposition in the British House of Commons, addressing the annual gathering of the Primrose League in the Albert Hall today, directly charged Premier Asquith's government with assisting the United States in its alleged designs on Canada. The Unionist leader said: "The quarrel between President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt showed that the object of the reciprocity negotiations was to make Canada an adjunct to the United States, while it was the duty of President Taft to look after the interests of the United States. It was also the duty of the British government to look after the interests of the British Empire, but it went out of its way to try and make Canada an adjunct of the United States from which was saved by the instinct of the Canadian people."

AMALGAMATION PROPOSED BY LATTER MAY BE CONSUMMATED

UNDER CONSIDERATION

Directors View Plan with Favor and Decide to Submit Matter to Shareholders of Both Institutions—Would be of Mutual Benefit.

Toronto, May 10.—The following official announcement of the directors of the Traders Bank of Canada was made at a meeting of the board held on Friday morning, the 10th day of May, and given to the press by the general manager. A proposition was submitted by the Royal Bank of Canada to this bank a few weeks ago of having an amalgamation of the two banks and as the terms appeared to be favorable to the shareholders and customers of this bank the directors decided to consider the matter and discuss the same and conditions upon which the proposal was based.

RIOTING IN COAL FIELDS IS NOW OVER

Slight Disturbances Quickly Quelled and All is Now Quiet.

Miners Urged to Adopt Agreement of Sub-Committee—United Mine Workers Seek to Maintain Order.

Philadelphia, May 10.—Outside of the attack on the Cayuga break of the Lackawanna Coal Company, in North Scranton by about 2,000 foreigners, there was no rioting of consequence in the hard coal fields today. The North Scranton disturbance was quickly quelled and everything is quiet today.

COHEN ACQUITTED OF THE CHARGE OF MURDER OF WOMAN

Grand Jury Returns No Bill Despite Verdict of Coroner's Jury—New Phase of the Case Develops.

Toronto, May 10.—The verdict of the coroner's jury charging Abe Cohen with the murder of Rebecca Berger, alias Cooper, who was fatally shot while standing on the doorstep of a house on Chestnut street, on March 25 last, was reversed, when the grand jury of the session returned no bill this afternoon. One of the witnesses before the grand jury in the Cohen case, has communicated to the police the fact that he can identify the real perpetrator of the murder. This witness states that he has since learned the identity of the murderer, whom he chased for some distance up a lane before losing trace of him. The police are now working on this information.

WARDEN OF KINGSTON PENITENTIARY SOON TO BE SUPERANNUATED

Ottawa, May 10.—The investigation into conditions at the Kingston penitentiary as the result of the escape of the Manitoba convicts, will be concluded today and the report will be submitted to the Minister of Justice next week. It is, however, practically certain that Dr. Platt, the warden of the penitentiary, will soon be superannuated.

## A STRIKING CONTRAST.

A few days ago the Telegraph made a veiled attempt to prove that the Fleming Government were spending too much money on bridge and wharf repairs. Considering the way in which the Telegraph's friends starved the public services of the country in order that a few of their political henchmen could get richer by falling to pay the stampage that was properly due the Province, it is not surprising that the Telegraph should attack the Fleming Administration for spending money to maintain in a respectable manner the roads and bridges of the country.

The Auditor also informed the Committee that all accounts for work done for the Public Works Department were attested to under oath by those who had charge of the work, and that all payments were made by cheque to the individuals who performed the labor or purchased the supplies. This system will be generally recognized as a satisfactory method of keeping track of the expenditures. Before any payment can be made the account properly attested to with vouchers attached must be presented to the Auditor-General for audit and examination. He does not pay the money to the superintendent but sends to each one whose name appears on the voucher an individual cheque which the recipient must endorse before he can get the money. The public treasury is thus doubly safeguarded and the man who would stuff his payroll or submit improper vouchers is compelled to commit both forgery and perjury before he can benefit financially by the transaction, a rather risky occupation which is not believed to be at all general in the Public Works Department.

Contrast this with the methods of the old Government—with Mr. LaBillette's methods for instance, who was Chief Commissioner before Mr. Morrissey, and who is still a member of the House. No vouchers were required for the payment of bills under the old Government. Some write to Mr. LaBillette that somebody's horse had fallen through a bridge or that somebody else had done some work on a road or a bridge that had not been paid for. Immediately Mr. LaBillette would sit down and write a letter to Mr. Winslow, Secretary of the Public Works Department, to send out cheques to these people and the cheques would be sent.

A very simple process indeed, and a very effective one so far as the individuals were concerned, but rather a loose way of doing business, particularly when the Chief Commissioner added as a postscript to his letter to the Secretary of the Department a request like the following: "Please accept small draft." No mention is made in the paragraph in which this appears as to what the draft was for or for whose benefit it was drawn. That is left to the imagination. One thing is absolutely certain that if the Secretary accepted the draft and paid it there is no voucher to show its purpose.

Mr. LaBillette was present in the House when this interesting communication of his was read. He spoke before the debate closed but made no reference whatever to this remarkable letter, which had been discovered in the files of the Public Works Department.

The Telegraph has recently displayed some familiarity with the Public Accounts of the Province and has criticized quite severely some of the expenditures of the present Administration, but it has yet to make its first reference to the exposures of corruption and malfeasance which existed in the Public Works Department during the period it was under the administration of Mr. LaBillette.

In three years some \$29,000 of public money disappeared without any accounts having been rendered to show what had been done with it. No such misconduct can be charged against the Hazen or Fleming Administrations. Every dollar that has come into the Public Treasury has been properly accounted for. There have been no leakages like those of the Central Railway. There have been no suspense accounts running for years to be closed up in a hurry when certain gentlemen retired from Provincial politics. The Province has not acted as banker for any member of the Government nor have members of the Government been permitted to draw large sums of money from the Public Treasury to be paid for by services to be rendered at a later date. The Public Works Department no longer advances money to contractors before they have entered upon their contracts as was done with political favorites under the old regime.

Of course Mr. Copp and his supporters in the Legislature would like to escape responsibility for the misgovernment of the past and start with a clean record. This, however, is impossible while the leader of the Opposition has among his followers Mr. Sweeney, who failed to collect much more than half of the Crown Land stampage, and Mr. LaBillette, who spent the people's money as his own and failed to get vouchers signed to show where it went to, to say nothing of Mr. Copp himself, who accepted \$1,465 from the Central Railway crowd for services of a very doubtful character.

With a record like this staring him in the face it is no wonder that Mr. Copp approaches a general election knowing that his defeat is certain and that no bluff that he can put up can save him or his friends from their misdeeds of the past. The people of New Brunswick have had enough of the old crowd of grafters and they are not to be humbugged by any eleventh hour repentance. They are for honest government and will clean out what is left in the Legislature of the old gang, who misgoverned the Province for ten years and saddled it with an unnecessary debt that future generations will have to provide for.

The people of the Province have had an experience of honest government during the past four years and it will take more than misrepresentations of the Telegraph and Times combined to change their minds regarding the character of the Government which was turned out by Mr. Hazen in 1908.

## NEWFOUNDLAND.

It is rumored that the approaching visit of Sir Ralph Williams, the Governor of Newfoundland, to Ottawa, may result in the renewal of negotiations for the ancient colony to join the Confederation. All such rumors, un-

less supported by direct evidence, must be taken with the proverbial grain of salt. Newfoundland has never shown at all events in recent years, any serious desire to link her fortunes with the Dominion.

Forty-five years ago her people declined to come into Confederation and overtures from Ottawa on several occasions have been rejected. During the Premiership of Sir Mackenzie Bowell, seventeen years ago, negotiations began to take definite shape but the terms on which Newfoundland insisted were out of the question and the opportunity lapsed. Financial embarrassment at the time was one of the main causes which induced the Island Colony to consider the proposition. No such argument could be advanced today as her financial position has greatly improved.

As an "adjunct" of the Dominion, Newfoundland would be a very desirable asset. Apart from sentimental reasons the colony controls a Labrador and a large area on the Eastern coast of the Continent. The development of the North Eastern portion of Quebec may at some future time be seriously interfered with owing to the uncertainty as to the jurisdiction of the Newfoundland Government. Political union would solve this difficulty which has on more than one occasion been referred to in Parliament. Judging by the independence which is very pronounced on the island, any movement towards union today would be a matter of long and systematic education. There are no indications that the majority of Newfoundlanders are in favor of it.

## THE LADY MAYORESS.

A rather forcible example of a woman, by tact and perseverance, vindicating the ability of her sex to compete with mere man in municipal affairs comes from Hunsell, Kansas, where Mrs. Ella Wilson has just celebrated the first anniversary of her election to the Mayoralty. On her election a year ago Mrs. Wilson found herself in the throes of a struggle with the ungalant men of the burg. The male members of the Council would not attend meetings, declined to confirm her police appointments, insisted on a pool license in the town, and in every way sought to humiliate her. When she appeared on the street naughty boys made fun of her. It was reported that she was heart-broken and intended to resign.

But the Mayoress did not resign, her heart was not broken, and she did not even indulge in a "good cry" in public. She never made a single appeal for sympathy to her woman sponsors in Hunsell. She went about her business, governing the town as Sancho Panza governed his island, with dignity and tact, if not with success, until at last it dawned upon the women that they ought to help her. They did. They took their stand in hand, Hunsell was convinced of her bad manners and returned. Then the male councillors got the idea through their heads, too. From then on it grew more and more easy for Mrs. Wilson, until on her first anniversary all the men pledged her support.

This anniversary was a notable function in Hunsell. According to the Minneapolis Journal the desk of Her Honor, Mrs. Ella Wilson, was covered with flowers, and the male members of the City Council all made speeches congratulating her on her administration, and pledging themselves to kick out of Hunsell any "houn dawg" who should have the temerity to run against her, when her present term expires. Somehow one cannot help thinking that the patient little Mayoress of this Kansas village has done rather more for woman suffrage than the window-smashing brigade, and certainly not less for womanhood.

## WITHOUT FOUNDATION.

The Evening Times, under date of Fredericton, May 9, makes public a statement that Mr. Pinder, M.P.P., has secured the guarantee of \$150,000 in bonds for the Southampton Railway, which he is constructing from Millville Station on the C. P. R., to Hawkeshaw on the St. John river. The story is false, as shown by the answer to an inquiry made by Mr. Upham, during the session of the Legislature, which is also published in the Times. The answer made to this inquiry was that the bonds of the company had been guaranteed to the extent of \$50,000 for which the Government has taken a first mortgage on that portion of the road completed and in operation.

Under the contract the road has been leased to the Canadian Pacific Railway Co., which corporation is to pay forty per cent. of the gross earnings towards the interest on the guaranteed bonds. The transaction is altogether misrepresented by the Times for a second time, as the whole story was published a month or six weeks ago. There is nothing wrong with the transaction whatever, as the road bids fair to do an excellent business and open up a good agricultural country in the centre of York, which has hitherto been without railway facilities.

The circulation of untruthful statements suggesting deals and compromises between candidates in the local elections is a pastime to which the Telegraph and Times are much addicted these days. Reference was made in both journals yesterday to propositions relating to St. John City and County having been "laid before the Opposition leader and firmly rejected." No such propositions could have been rejected because no such propositions have been made.

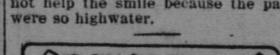

**MUCH ACTIVITY IN REAL ESTATE LINE**

An Important Purchase—New Sub-Division to go on Market Today—Joseph Weizel to Build.

The largest and most important property deal yet made in St. John, was concluded Thursday afternoon, when Thomas Nagle, representing a syndicate of outside interests, became the owner of the Benbow Ferguson properties on Dock street. The purchase comprises 1650 ft. of five brick buildings and warehouses, with a frontage of 22 1/2 feet on the eastern side of Dock street, and extending back to the properties of Hon. Wm. Pugsley on Chipman Hill. The buildings on the property are all under lease, the tenants being R. Sullivan and Co., wholesale wine and spirit merchants; John Daley, barber; Massey-Harris Co., Barry Supply Co., D. Boyaner, optical; National Clothing Company, Auer Light Company, Barrett, Smith, Mrs. J. Marcus, the Williams Sewing Machine Co., H. A. Pierce, barber, J. Benson Mahoney, druggist, Wm. Tall, watchmaker, and Mrs. A. Simpson, groceries. The property was owned by Mrs. Annie M. Ferguson, now resident in Chicago, widow of Benbow Ferguson, who at one time ran a large grocery establishment on Dock street. It was sold for her by her brother, F. H. McKelvey, and rumor says the price paid by Mr. Nagle and those associated with him was \$75,000. The city valued the property for assessment purposes at \$40,000.

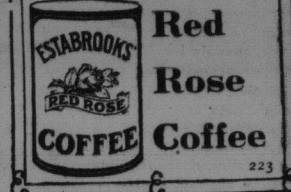

**Keith's Theatre Plans.** The plans for Keith's new theatre were released yesterday and associate architect F. Neil Brodie will ask for estimates next week.

**Police Court.** The preliminary examination of J. A. Wilcox charged with obtaining \$20 from Thomas Reynolds of the Royal Hotel, was taken up in the police court yesterday morning. There were also other charges against the prisoner. E. S. Ritchie appeared for the prisoner. Several witnesses gave evidence but nothing more than is already known was brought out. The prisoner was then further remanded.

**Fire Loss Adjusted.** The loss to the building adjoining the Queen Hotel, Fredericton, owned by J. J. McAffrey, which was destroyed by fire on Tuesday night, was appraised by Edgar H. Fairweather and H. W. Frink, St. John. The appraisers granted \$2,000 to the owner of the insurance on the building. The loss to the stock of J. G. Adams was appraised at \$1,000, and was fully covered in the London Assurance Company.

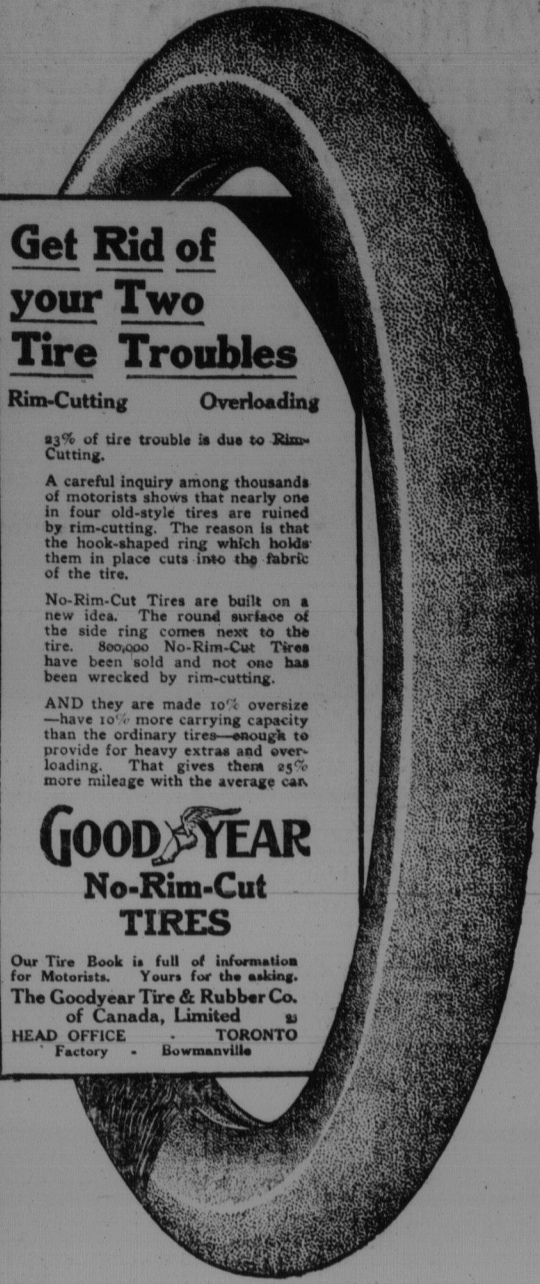

## MARATHON UNIFORMS NEXT WEEK

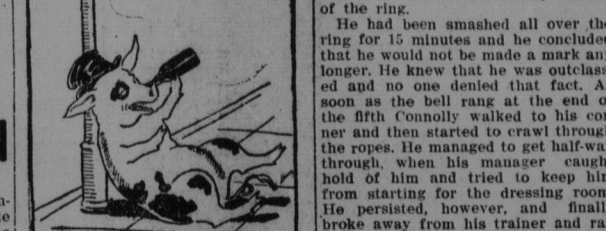

Shortly after the family had retired last night, Mr. Beasley started coughing. Mrs. Beasley arose from the bed saying that she would procure the cough mixture and give him some to relieve him. She went to the mantelpiece and took down the bottle of acid.

**SCOTT E. MORRELL WAS ARRESTED LAST NIGHT**

**Well Known Barrister Charged with Obtaining Money from Frederick Ramsay Under False Pretences.**

A sensation was sprung on the public last evening at eight o'clock when Scott E. Morrell, one of the city's best known barristers, was placed under arrest by Deputy Chief W. Jenkins and Detective Patrick Killen. Mr. Morrell was conducted to the Central Police Station and was locked up in one of the cells to await his appearance before the Police Magistrate this morning. The charge which appears opposite the lawyer's name on the police blotter is "With having obtained money under false pretences."

It was on April 22nd that a warrant was sworn out for the arrest of Mr. Morrell by Frederick Ramsay, who made the charge that on the 23rd day of February last Mr. Morrell had obtained \$50 from Frederick Ramsay under false pretences, saying that he had initiated a suit at law for the said Frederick Ramsay and had issued a writ against the Prudential Life Insurance Company of Canada, and that the case would come on at the Central Police Station and that the case has aroused much interest.

**CITY MAY START AN INCINERATOR PLANT**

**Board of Health's Annual Spring Cleaning Campaign Brings Garbage Question to Life Again.**

The Board of Health starts its annual spring cleaning next week. Nine inspectors will be sent out to examine backyards and alleys, and see that the householders get busy removing the accumulated rubbish of the winter.

A question which will have to be faced very soon is that of providing a modern system of doing away with the refuse of the city. The city is getting too big for the old fashioned dump, and at the present time about the only places available for disposing of the refuse are located on private properties. There is a dump at the back of Peter's tannery and another near the Marlborough grounds, and both of these will have to be closed up in a short time.

The other day an official of a company which constructs incinerators was in the city and had an interview with the city engineer and officials of the Board of Health. He exhibited plans for incinerators capable of handling from 10 to 50 tons of refuse a day, the prices of which without the building ranged from \$6,000 to \$12,000.

Some time ago the city secured legislation enabling it to erect an incinerator and organize a system of house to house collection of garbage and refuse at frequent intervals. Tenders for handling the city garbage were called for, but contractors objected to the specifications and no bids were received. It is probable the new commission will take up the matter and see what they can do about it.
