London, April 22.—With the improvement in the wea ther, the artillery, assisted by aerial observers, is becoming exceedingly violent in many sectors along the battle front. Field Marshal Haig in today's commique reports a heavy bombardment from Lens around Festubert bend to the Niephe Forest, covering the western approach to Haze brouck. Near Albert and at the junction of the British and French armies east of Aimens the big guns have also been de cidedly active.







The Cry of Peace.

Does it not seem a paradox that at this time of war, of stress, of bloodshed it is possible for the talk of peace to be absolutely wrong? The reason is that in times like these we have got to take words at an entirely different value from the meanings they had in the old calm days

of quiet and security.

People who talk of Peace nowadays, have been given an especial name. They are called "Pacifists" and that word is very far from meaning the Peace-makers spoken of in the Beatitudes. A pacifist is one who is so opposed to war that he will even state that he would rather see his aged mother dragged from her home by the cruel Germans (as they have done in many well authenticated instances) than strike a blow in her defence. "A pacifist" has almost the meaning of "a coward."

"a coward."

A pacifist is in direct opposition to the man who at the first insult to the person or thing he loves, family, wife, children, or country at once springs to arms, glad only to be privileged to fight and considering that what is worth loving is worth defending. The pacifist holds his life and opinion dearer than his people or country—the patriot country his honor which the honor of his family and country far above life itself. Our soldiers and sailors have proved themselves patriots and we owe them our most loyal support.

The worst of the enemy we are fighting now is that they work in methods which are so opposed to our British ways that we are apt either not to notice the means, or else undervalue their cunning. Just lately a number of people have dared to say that "Well what would it matter if we were governed by the Germans—what difference would it make to us?" and "Are the Germans as bad as they are painted, or is

that only talk."

To thinking people these questions are absurd, but to the thought-less there is something attractive about them. By answering the second, the first question is disposed of.

The Bryce Report published sworn statements of the most fright-ful atroctities perpetrated in Belgium. Things too absolutely awful to print were it not right that the world should know the kind of enemy we have to face. Ask any man of the first contingent if he would like to have German soldiers enter his home town and see what he will tell you. Did you read the account of how women of the German Red Cross held food and drink in front of hungry wounded men and then took it away, or spit into the bowls of soup so as to spoil it for the suffering soldiers? Could anything be worse than that? Thousands of similar instances could be named, to say nothing of the inhuman methods of warfare?

Well, those are Germans and how would you like people so absolutely devoid of human feelings to rule over us? Besides which the common people of Germany are taxed to the uttermost and have practically no rights or liberties whatever under the system of militarism

In the United States they are taking swift measures with people who speak good words on the German side and many a man has been fitted with a coat of tar and feathers and requesed to leave the town where he made the requester.

Trace the source of talk like this back and you will find it springs from disloyalty somewhere. Let us supress it wherever we meet it, as some evil growth to be stamped out and let the person who expresses anti-war sentiments be boycotted and made to feel that they are either cowards or in league with the enemy. War is fearful indeed but war is the only way to deal with those who went to war to conquer the world and until we can win a rightful and lasting peace let there be no talk of peace.

BENTLEY & SONS WERE FINED FIFTY IN POLICE COURT

George Rideout, Chief of Dominion Police, Obtained Conviction-Firm Had in Employ Man Eligible for Service.

That it is the intention of George dideout, chief of the Dominion police for the Maritime Provinces, to enfor the military service act in this district as far as lies in his power was made manifest yesterday afternoon when, before Magistrate Ritchie he obtained maintest yesterday atternoon when, before Magistrate Ritchle he obtained a conviction against the firm of A. F. Bentley & Sons of St. Martins for having in their employ a young man eligible for service under the act. This is probably the first conviction in this part of the country for a violation of section 108, wherein among other things provision is made for a fine of not less than \$50 and not to exceed \$5000 or three months in jail, or both, for employing men liable for service. The president of the company, A. F., Bentley, and the secretary, Wendell Bentley, were summoned to appear yesterday afternoon. Only the secretary appeared and he pleaded guilty to the charge. Magistrate Ritchle imposed the minimum penalty, \$50, and allowed the fine to stand.
