As a matter of fact there have been no deaths whatever from starvation in St. John for a very long time, as starvation is properly understood. In one or two instances persons with ample means but miserly dispositions, have died as the result of their own fallure to provide themselves with sufficient food. But the deaths of children to which reference has been made, have in every single instance been due to what the doctors describe as inanition—a very different thing from starvation as generally accepted. 


