The Crisis.

If the liberties of this Province be struck down in the Dominion Parliament; if our laws are to be trampled upon and the independence of our Legislature subverted; if the compact under which New Brunswick entered the Union is to be torn into shreds whenever it may suit the interests of the larger Provinces to disturb the terms of agreement; if the gloomy predictions of the prophets of evil are to be verified, and the good faith of the preponderating sections of the Union is to become a by-word and a reproach; if section is to be arrayed against section, creed against creed, race and race, the fault will not lie with the Press of New Brunswick or our representatives in Parliament. The Press has done itself high honor by its manly protest against the amendment of our rights now attempted at Ottawa. The utterances of the *Telegraph* and *News* have been especially earnest, just and courageous; the *Globe*, though favoring Separate Schools, pronounces against the ruthless over-riding of Local Laws; the *Christian Visitor*, *Religious Intelligencer* and *Protestant Advocate* are no doubt, to be heard from before the work is out in the same spirit; while our country exchanges, without reference to Party, will boldly protest against this fresh injury to high places. Only the *Freeman* and *the Montrealer Academie* (a weekly whose circulation is confined to a special class, will have a word to say in favor of the efforts of outside parties to degrade the Legislature and People of the Province. In the Commons only Messrs. Anglin, Cowling and Read, from this Province, will venture to invoke the aid of the larger Provinces to crush us. Only the *Telegraph* and *the Montrealer Academie* will be such a popular up-raiser in the Maritime Provinces as has never been witnessed in all their history.

BINDERIES, HARNESS, &c.

If Fredericton does not do something in the way of printing, it does something in that of binding books. Beverley & Son, stationers, (Rible Street) carry on the oldest bindery in Fredericton. The father commenced 44 years ago. They do a good deal of Government work, binding the laws and journals of the Legislative Council, and books in the Legislative Library. The "son" of the establishment has worked in some of the leading houses in New York, and is prepared to do all kinds of binding in the best style. He is very proud of his assortment of finishing trades, having in his time visited the Old and Australia, he thinks that nothing but protection can build colonies up to independence, self supporting countries. Waited on leather we may step into the Boot and Shoe Factory, the only one in town, carried on by E. N. CLARK on the Front street, a little above the People's Bank. Mr. Clark keeps rather a store house he does custom work, but supplies a number of the retail stores in town. He also sells in St. John, along Western Extension, and the North Shore and up river. His work is his specialty and he prides himself on his lumber and steamdriving books which have a great reputation, of which he sells from 2000 to 4000 pairs a year, supplying the great lumber operators. In his factory he employs sixteen hands generally, some of whom work by the piece and others by the week. His factory is supplied with a number of ingenious machines for doing work in the most expeditious manner—stripping machines and "dicing" machines for putting out soles to

any size in a finished manner. "rolling," "punching" and "eyelet" setting machines, was thread and common sewing machines, various machines for turning bootlegs inside out and outside in, and for closing. Mr. Clark thinks that manufacturers in Fredericton and St. John can hold their own against imported manufactured goods, but that prices of manufactured goods do not bear a sufficiently remunerative proportion to the price of stock, leather, &c. Besides numerous dealers in boots and shoes who, besides doing custom work, resole old shoes, and do foreign manufacture, as the Lunys, Tufts and Wallace, McGoldrick, Doherty, &c., there are others who put out nothing but their own work and come under the class of manual manufacturers, as J. Sutherland, Jarvis, Hennessey, &c. Mr. Sutherland does an immense deal in supplying lumbering parties. Having mentioned the sutural, something must be said of the sutural department. Those who have read "Sutural Remnants," in which the mystic German professor, Herr Tufelsdrack, expounds his far reaching "clothes philosophy," must be convinced of the immense importance of the sutural art. "Useless as it may seem, it is a poor bear horse animal," as poor old Lear says.

James Howie, at the upper end of the front street, claims that his establishment is the largest in the Province, and that he singly turns out more work than half a dozen ordinary establishments. He employs three cutters and 70 hands, and could do more. Besides their large city and country custom they make up, in the best material and best style, piles of suits of clothing, and people come to him and send him from all parts of the Province, even from St. John, and some places in the United States. Mr. Howie is a Scotchman, and good for him.

MATTHEW S. BLANCK, on the Front street, keeps a large establishment, having two cutters and over a score of hands. Besides their large city and country custom they make up everything from best imported broadcloths and tweeds, and keep piles of ready-made clothing on hand. They have customers all over the Province, in Maine, Massachusetts, and send work as far as Chicago, the fact being, that having the art of pleasing their clients they generally retain their custom. No sweeter customers all over the Province, than the boundless continent to which they may resort.

J. O'Conner, next the dry goods establishment of John McDonald, does a large business. He keeps the intervals of the Morris Brothers, on the front street, keep 18 hands at work, and besides their ordinary business supply several lumbering parties in the Province. Mr. O'Conner has had some of our readers in Fredericton (aunt might be said), there is no reason why the people in the city and province should not be the best dressed people in the continent. It is not dress, but the choice of what to wear, and how to wear it.

LOCALS.

Work was commenced yesterday by the contractors on the Railway Extension to the Breakwater. The work is to be completed by the end of December.

Messrs. Lanergan and Chubb returned from a successful fishing cruise last night. They struck a new route to the head waters of the St. Croix, and didn't reach the lake they first started for. They brought back a good sized basket of trout.

Readings at the Academy. Mr. Crawford, who is a reader of considerable ability, will favor the public with readings at the Academy of Music on Thursday evening. The great favor which his previous readings have been received will ensure him a good house on the occasion. The Band of the 62nd Bataillon, which has not been heard in public since the Rink closed, will furnish music in the Park.

Supreme Court. The case of Hugh Maynes, for assaulting John Kinney, was finished yesterday. Evidence was produced as to the previous good character of Maynes, and that the assault was on the impulse of the moment. Kinney having been very abusive. Mr. Crawford, on behalf of the prisoner, addressed the Jury briefly. At half-past four the Jury retired, and after a short absence returned into Court with a verdict of Not Guilty.

The cars will be delivered at Ottawa up to June 10th and the cars must be delivered at St. John by September 1st.

Doctor Williams and the Lightning Oil. Doctor Williams appears to have struck a run of ill luck here. His handsome medicine carriage was delayed in reaching here some time, and when it did come, rainy weather prevented him from using it. When the driver arrived, he had the carriage upset and broken by the simplicity of the police refused to allow him to sell. Finally he procured a license, but the police again interfered. It would appear that the authorities exact forty dollars for a license, in all fairness the Doctor should be allowed to proceed with his business, or if they prohibit the Doctor's public appearance they should refund the license money. There is, however, a strong feeling against using the public streets for these performances, and it would be well if an understanding were arrived at between the Mayor and the Police as to extension of the power, and in pursuance of a common policy. It will not do for one authority to be sanctioning and the other suppressing these "Lightning Oil" and other street exhibitions.

British and Foreign.

London, May 27. The Treaty, in amended form, was discussed in the Commons this evening. Gladstone expressed regret at the premature publication in America of the supplemental article. Disraeli asked if it was true that the American Senate had adopted the supplemental article; whether it had been modified; the nature of the modifications; whether Parliament will be permitted to sanction it; and if negotiations would be completed in time for English representatives to appear at the next meeting of the arbitrators.

Gladstone replied that the Government had been officially informed of the acceptance by the American Senate of the article, but the remainder of the questions could not now be answered. Disraeli repeated the question whether the article would be submitted to Parliament. Gladstone declined to answer without a notice, which was given. The remaining portion had been released, Gladstone answered No.

William Russell, eighth Duke of Bedford, and nephew of Earl Russell, died on Monday, aged 64. Sir Henry Lytton Bulwer, brother of Lord Lytton, died on Sunday night aged 68. The French Assembly debated the Army Bill.

Gen. Trochu, in a speech, charged the Bonapartes with corrupting the army, and was greeted with applause from all parts of the Chamber. Ten were killed and seriously injured by a large explosion in New York harbor yesterday.

They were joined together to represent the "Siamese Twins," and with Harry Talbot as an old musician, and Joseph as a P. T. Barnum, it caused a great deal of laughter.

On Wednesday next a regular galaxy of stars will appear. Prof. M. O. Reardon on the Tambourillon, has been engaged in the leading variety theatres of New York and Boston; Hank Mudge, clog dancer; John Hogan, song and dance artist, and Master Willis, the great contortionist, bird and animal imitator. All these should crowd the house in every part. The bill for to night is also a good one.

Charity Minstrels. A combination announced as the Royal Charity Minstrels performed at the Institute last night. Previous to the opening Harry Lewis walked from a rope fastened at one end to the Institute, at the other the tower of Calvin Church. He walked the distance, about a hundred feet, and on returning, half way across, he sat down on the rope and performed some feats, the rain pouring down all the time; he then got up and returned to the starting point, amid the cheers of an immense crowd. A good audience soon filled the hall, and waited till half past eight before the performance commenced. Last night the Company had nine performers. Harry Leslie was tambourillon; M. B. Leavitt, intercomedian; and D. Nash, jester. The singing was poor, the jokes poorer. Harry Leslie was fair in his impersonations, and O. P. Sweet, late of Bishop's Serenaders, sang "The Good Old Friends" very well, and received an encore. The performance would not bear a repetition here. They did wisely in playing only one night.
