Miscellaneous.

Death of General Colin Mackenzie.

The death of General Colin Mackenzie, at the age of 75, withdraws from the scene a veteran who in his early career played a romantic part in more than one of the most stirring events of Indian history. He was stationed at Cabul in 1841, when our puppet Shah Shojah was the nominal ruler of Afghanistan; and he was in actual attendance upon Sir William Macnaghten, the British Envoy, at the moment when, by orders and in the presence of Akbar Khan, that unfortunate officer was murdered. General Mackenzie's escape from a similar fate was due to the friendly interference of an Afghan chief with whom he was acquainted; but even after his life was spared he was for some time apprehensive that he might be sold as a slave to the Turcomans. During the Indian mutiny his regiment revolted and he attacked their commander, who covered with wounds, was supposed at that moment to have received mortal injuries; but a vigorous constitution, combined with a brave and equable spirit gave him a new lease of life. When Lord Lawrence opposed the Afghan policy of the late Government he warmly supported the views of that eminent statesman, and became an active member of the Afghan Committee. Few men had a greater knowledge of the frontier politics of India, or a better acquaintance with the great men who during the last fifty years have governed our Indian empire.—*English paper.*

"On the Hip."

This rather inelegant expression, used popularly to indicate that one person holds another securely by some circumstance, word or act, finds literal exemplification in the following narrative by Mr. John Bouke, of Ottawa, Canada. The Church of England raises, voluntarily over £5,500,000 a year; that is nearly £460,000 a month.

Shop Heroes.

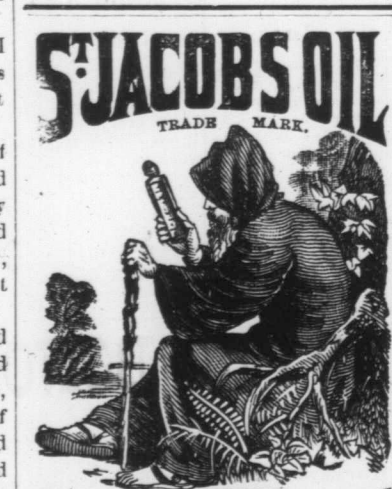
For every splendid act of heroism done on the battle-field, a hundred are done in shops and quarries, and on the storm-tossed ocean.—*Youth's Companion.*
