TURKEY TO BE COERCED.

GREAT BRITAIN, RUSSIA AND FRANCE AGREE ON A PLAN TO DEAL WITH THE SULTAN—OTHER POWERS APPROVE.
BOSTON, Dec. 9.—A special to the Globe from London says: The deadlock which has been the foulest reproach to modern civilization and to the humanity of the age is broken at last. So also is that contemptible thing which the world has known during the past year as the "concert of Europe." The Turk is to be coerced. The Sultan is to be reduced in fact, if not actually in name, to vassalage. His fate will be made known to him probably before the end of the present week. Russia, France and Great Britain have decreed it. Should he resist or fall at once to the inevitable, then the combined fleets of those three powers will enforce their behest. Such, in brief, is the news which will bring relief and a sense of restored self-respect to the whole Christian world. It is not officially announced yet. It may even be discredited in certain quarters for some time as a mere rumor. Nevertheless, it may be affirmed with absolute certainty. It was not until yesterday that the conclusion was reached. Russia, France and Great Britain arrived at a substantial agreement upon the plan of action last week; but there remained the necessity of getting the consent of the other three powers which were signatories to the Berlin convention. Italy and Germany agreed without much demur. Austria hesitated long and it was not until yesterday's emergency cabinet council in London, which discussed and approved the whole plan, that the Austro-ambassador notified Salisbury of the rather unwilling consent of the government that the Russian, French and British fleets shall force the execution of the new policy. It is impossible at this moment to furnish the exact details of the solution of the Turkish problem which has been agreed upon. It may, however, be partially defined in a negative way. It provides nothing so radical as a division of the Turkish Empire. Such a project has not been for a moment considered. The integrity of Turkey will be substantially maintained. The terms of the new policy have practically been dictated by Russia.

NEWS NOTES.

It is said that the Grand Trunk Railway company intend to ask the Dominion government for financial aid to double track and extend the Victoria bridge at Montreal. They will, it is said, give the public a free foot passage to the bridge, and in return the government will give them a subsidy of \$1,000,000. DISSATISFACTION IN ST. BONIFACE.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 4.—On Monday last at a meeting of the trustees having charge of educational matters in St. Boniface, a member brought up a resolution to protest against the school settlements. After a brief discussion it was found advisable to drop any protestations as the board, composed of eight, stood five to three against any declaration on the question.

STORM IN THE ENGLISH CHANNEL.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—A southeast gale is prevailing in the English Channel and the North Sea, and a tremendous sea is running. Many casualties have been reported. The historic chain pier at Brighton, which was erected in 1829, has been demolished. The pier was damaged in a recent storm and there was some talk of taking it down. It was reported at the time that a number of Americans intended to purchase it and erect it at one of the seaside resorts in the United States. One of the Olden packet boats was thrown violently by a heavy sea against the pier at Dover, and narrowly escaped going on the rocks.

A SMALL-POX INFESTED SHIP.

COLOMBO, Dec. 7.—The British steamer "Castle Eden," Capt. Scutcliffe from Sierra Leone, with six hundred African laborers for the Panama Canal at board, has arrived here. A number of cases of smallpox were discovered among the Africans and the ship has been placed in quarantine.

THE POWERS AND THE PORTS.

A representative of the United Associated Press stated the Foreign Office today for the purpose of ascertaining the truth or falsity of a despatch published by a New York newspaper this morning, which stated that the British fleet, under the command of Admiral Fisher, was to be sent to the Mediterranean to enforce the reforms in Turkey that had been promised, but it would be a long time before they would think of moving troops and ships. General Intelligence.**ASSASSINATION CHARGED.**

CUBANS SAY GENERAL MACRO WAS MURDERED—WHILE UNDER A FLAG OF TRUCE—OFFICIAL SPANISH DENIAL.

CINCINNATI, Dec. 14.—A Jacksonville, Fla., despatch says: This city was thrown into great excitement by the news Sunday afternoon that the patriots had admitted the correctness of the report that Antonio Maceo had been murdered. C. M. Dehan, chief of the Florida Cuban Junta, gave out the following: A letter received by a prominent Cuban in this city gives a detailed account of the assassination of Gen. Maceo and his entire staff, with the exception of Dr. Zertuche, who was Maceo's physician. The letter came from a reliable source in Havana, but the correspondent's name is withheld for the obvious reason, said Mr. Dehan, that the writer would be shot within an hour by the Spanish authorities if they knew who gave away the details of one of the most horrible atrocities ever chronicled in modern warfare. From the letter it appears that the Marquis of Alameda, who has officiated as captain general of Cuba during Weyler's absence in the field, sent a letter to Maceo inviting the Cuban leader to a conference. Maceo, never for a moment thinking that treachery was intended, especially as the invitation came from such a prominent Spaniard as the Marquis Alameda, immediately returned answer saying he would be glad to meet the Spanish general, and only accompanied by his staff went to the rendezvous, little dreaming of the awful fate in store for him. Arriving at the trocha the Spanish soldiers there, acting under orders, actually saluted the rebel chieftain as he passed, and after reaching the rendezvous the Cuban leader was surprised to see, instead of the Marquis of Alameda, a large body of Spanish soldiers, who seemed to come from every side. The actions of the Spanish troops were so suspicious Maceo felt they had him cruelly trapped and his suspicions were confirmed when a peremptory order came from a splendidly mounted officer to surrender. 'Never,' was the reply, and hardly had the words been uttered when volley after volley poured into the little band of patriots, who, although hemmed in on all sides, outnumbered almost one hundred to one, stuck spurs to their horses and with a gallant shout, rode gallantly to death. Maceo is reported to have fallen as the first fire with a bullet through his head, breaking his jaw. Another hit him in the abdomen. Both were fatal. Gomez went next to fall, and in a few moments a number of bloody corpses, shot almost beyond recognition, were all that remained of the gallant Cubans who trusted to Spanish honor. Only one member of the staff escaped and that was Dr. Zertuche. The letter says the corpses were buried on the field, and every precaution taken to keep the details from being made public.

HAS ANOTHER FLOOD.**THE PACIFIC NORTH-WEST SUFFERS A REPEATER.**

SEATTLE, Wash., December 8.—In its second flood visitation the Pacific North West is suffering to fully as great an extent as during the disastrous November storm. Between Friday and Monday morning all the railroad bridges, which were constructed and the tracks rebuilt during the latter days of last month were again swept away. The Great Northern tracks between Seattle and Everett are inundated to a depth of from twelve feet, and three big bridges over the Skyhook River, in the Cascades, were swept away. Skyhook River is a raging torrent, running in many places like a mill race. Near Seattle, in the fertile valleys, great damage is being done to private property.

The Consul for Sweden and Norway at Quebec has been requested to assist in tracing the relatives of a young Canadian seaman supposed to be of French extraction by name Charles Gohardt. Gohardt formed one of the crew of the Norwegian barque 'Caledonia,' of Drammen, Norway, that foundered in the Bay of Biscay on Oct. 7 last, on which occasion he was drowned.
