## SHORTAGE OF HOUSES

ONE OF THE PROBLEMS FACING OUR COUNTRY.

Town-planning Expert Tells of Difficulties in the Way of Supplying Houses For the Working Hen of Canada, and He Boldy Advocates A New Policy of Creating Hew Towns So That Speculators Will Not Get the Profits.

SERIOUS problem facing Canada to-day is the short-age of houses which is reported from all parts of the Dominion, Mr. Thomas Adams, the town-blanning expert of the Canadian Commission of Conservation, said recently in the sourse of a most valuable and instructive statement. "There is the same need for obtaining increased accommodation for the working classes in Canada during the war as there is in the United the war as there is in the United States and Great Britain. The short-age and dearness of capital, labor and material have the effect of destroy-ing private enterprise in building, as the cost is so great as to make it un-likely that an adequate return will be obtained on the Investment. There are serious difficulties at the present time in promoting the creetion of houses by Government enterprise, "It is true that we have a serious housing problem on this continent, but its worst aspect is connected with the lack of conirol of sanitation by our local Government, rather than that which is connected with increas-ed congestion seniced during the bes-

that which is connected with increas-ed congestion exused during the bes-sation of building operations in the last few years. In other words, hous-ing whit that are more injurious, in my oblinion, are those that have been sanctioned and encouraged for yant of proper building regulations at a time when we had no war expendi-ture, and building was cheap. "If we can sare mublic momen

"If we can spare public money, labor and material in building houses other than for returned soldiers, we should not do so without simultan-cously enforcing a higher standard of sanitation in regard to existing working-class dwellings in our cities. working-class dwellings in our cities. One of the chief drawbacks in build-ing houses with modern sanitary fit-tings of a durable material is that they have to compete with old, dilapi-dated property which can be rented at a low rate, because of its small capital value. Another danger we must avoid in promoting Government housing is in allowing any portion of the Government subsidy to go into any pockets other than those of the class they are intended to relieve. We have also to avoid, in these free countries, the giving of public relief to any class that will have the taint of charity. "Houses built by Government en-terprise should not be subsidized for the benefit of any class or be used as a means of assisting real estate spec-ulators. These difficulties and dan-gers can be obviated by proper regu-lations, and I mention them not be-cause of any lack of entinesiam for housing reform and for aggressive action at the present time, but be-cause 1 foresee that if we do not provide the proper safeguards to be-gin with, we shall run the risk of One of the chief drawbacks in build-
