Naturally this makes the job a longer one, but the work is progressing at a satisfactory pace. The sewer work on Aaron Street has also been started.

REST. CO. RICH IN WILD FLOWERS

Forty Different Varieties of Wild Flowers Gathered by Pupils at Grammar School.

That botany is an interesting subject is borne out by the accompanying list of wild flowers recently gathered by school children here. Although few of the flowers may be altogether new to readers, yet the list contains several which we did not know were indigenous to this part of the country. Below is a list of flowers gathered during the month of May by some of the pupils of Miss MacPherson's room at the Grammar School:—

JAPS UNRULY IN HAWAII

Japanese Clergyman Accuses Them of Rapidly Re-organizing the Country.

That the Japanese in Hawaii are rattling good bootleggers, promote Sunday resting bouts, conduct gambling dens and are otherwise "not to be trusted" are statements contained in a lengthy report just received by the Federal Council of Churches from the Rev. Tada Okamura, a Japanese clergyman in Hawaii.

The Rev. Mr. Okamura, in one section of his report says, "America is a country of religious freedom. But can the American people sit quietly by and gaze at the rapidity with which their country is being re-organized as a Christian country, it being thoroughly re-organized. Ideas are being imported. Temples are being erected in every nook and corner of the territory and pagan rites are being held. Traditional Sunday observances are giving way to noisy festivals and wrestling tournaments at the temples and shrines."

"Japanese children who should be taught and trained into good American citizens are being taught Japanese ideas and ideals. Some schools have changed their policy, but many cling to the old, out-of-date system. Since the prohibition law went into effect and offenders engaged in the illicit liquor traffic are Japanese. A majority of the offenders in gambling cases are also Japanese."

The chief cause of all difficulties in Hawaii, between the Japanese and Americans, says Okamura, is the difference in ideas. "Many Japanese," he says, "think that every movement of the Japanese, even if it is a bad one, should be backed by the Japanese; and any Japanese opposing a movement is a traitor. Once a Japanese always a Japanese. Hawaii is a mere stepping stone to fortune. There are some of these men."

The remedy—according to Okamura, lies in the educational campaign now being waged. "Our objective is first of all to encourage the Japanese to discard their mistaken ideas; secondly, to urge them to adapt themselves to American customs and manners; thirdly, to make them realize that the education or training of children born in these islands into a good and loyal element of Hawaii and American is not an act of dilatoriness to their country or their forefathers, and, fourthly, to encourage the Japanese in taking the initiative in bringing about a peaceful and harmonious union of the two peoples."



He leaves three children, two sons and one daughter, Mrs. Fred Warrman of Ferguson Manor, N. B. Wm. Good of Abbotsford, B. C., and John D. Good of this city; two brothers and two sisters survive. Mrs. Hannah Thomas Good and Mrs. Sarah Beckingham of Dalhousie; William Good, of Seattle, and James Good, of Dalhousie.

Mr. Good was a member of the local Masonic lodge, the Oddfellows and Rebekahs, members of all three lodges attending the funeral. The Oddfellows sent a floral pillow, the Eagles a wreath, and the Rebekahs a wreath. Mrs. C. L. Dwyer had charge of the music and two hymns, "Abide With Me" and "Rock of Ages", were sung by Misses Dorothy and Daphne McCallum and at the request of the dead pioneer, the "Star Spangled Banner" was played at the audience held out by Pallbearers were: "H. THOUGHTS ON THE EMPIRE.
 (Held over from last week.)
 At times the British Empire seems almost too vast and shapeless to be real and the imagination is confounded upon attempting to visualize a picture of its numerous dominions whose shores are washed by every sea. Then some event strains the cord of universal kinship, and our vague vision of the empire brightens into a vivid picture of a great kingdom inseparably united by the bonds of loyal devotion and responding to the pulse-beat of the Motherland with a patriotic singleness of heart. The occasion of King George's memorable speech at Terlinchun cemetery in France is an event of this significance. The following is an extract from His Majesty's remarkable address which he delivered after a few days pilgrimage through the great war-buried ground, where the ashes of patriots from every corner of the empire enrich the soil upon which they fought and died that liberty and right might be victorious.

"For the past few days I have been on a solemn pilgrimage in honor of a people who died for all free men. At the close of that pilgrimage, on which I followed ways already marked by many footsteps of love and pride and grief, I should like to send a message to all who have lost those dear to them in Great War, and in this the Queen joins me today amidst these surroundings so wonderfully typical of that single-hearted assembly of nations and of races which form our Empire. For here, in their last quarters, the sons of every portion of that Empire, across, as it were, the threshold of the Motherland which they guarded, that freedom might be saved in the uttermost ends of the earth."

Such words as these, prompted by the memory of those who made the supreme sacrifice and pregnant with deepest pride and gratitude cannot fail to create a feeling of unity and brotherhood in the hearts of all their hearers. Regardless of the vastness of the empire, the myriad crosses above the battlefields will ever be proof of the virtue of the empire's sons and a memorial to the great selfishness of spirit with which they defended the great cause of freedom. As the graves of the honored dead literally girdle the circuit of the earth, so will the bonds of patriotism and brotherhood strengthened by their sacrifice, ever girdle and bind our vast and scattered empire into a spiritually united whole and serve to keep fresh in our memories the lofty heights of true devotion to which they rose and the worthy principles for which they fought and died.


