—The road from the covered

bridge to Aulac has been turpined

under the direction of Mr. Albert

Anderson, Commissioner. The road

was sadly in need of repair, and the

work that has been done will be a

great improvement.

—Much needed repairs have been

made to the sidewalks of late, and a

great improvement has been effected,

but there are still a few places which

require attention. The sidewalk in

front of Fowler's block is now com-

pleted, and is decidedly the best and

most durable in town.

—The parents of John Sears

whose death by drowning in New

York harbor was reported a fort-

night ago, have received a letter

from Capt. Warren, of the schr.

Fanny Plant, giving particulars of

the sad event. It appears that

Sears, with the captain and crew,

was sitting on deck under an awn-

ing. About ten o'clock something

was said about "turning in" and

Sears started to rise he suddenly

pitched head-first overboard. Every

effort was made to rescue him, but

the strong current swept him under

the wharf, where his body was after-

wards found. His remains were in-

terred in the New York public cem-

etery.
