ENEMY SUFFERS IN COAST RUSH

Setback Considered To Be Disastrous by the War Correspondents.

British Wing and French Centre Neither Bent Nor Broken.

London, April 30—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency).—The correspondents agree that the enemy has suffered nothing less than a disastrous defeat in the first phase of the battle consequent on their desperate attempt to capture the line of hills held by the Allies, which endanger their possession of Mont Kemmel. They have probably used thirteen divisions from the east of Ypres southward on the line of battle, with two more northward, and the violence of the gunfire was never greater or more unceasing at any period of the war.

Our successful defence made the day the bloodiest yet experienced by the enemy, as attack after attack was smashed by our artillery and infantry fire. The Germans had already suffered heavily on Sunday, when their concentrations of troops were caught and shattered by gunfire. Their waves yesterday were moved down, and the British wings and French centre neither bent nor broke.

Poilus Once More In Control of Locre, Much. Coveted By Enemy, While Haig's Troops Move Lines Ahead Near Villers-Bretonneux-German Losses In Monday's Disastrous All-Day Assaults Believed To Be Enormous-Allied Line In Flanders Is Neither Bent Nor Broken At Any Point.

London, April 30 .- The French now hold the entire village of Locre, west of Kemmel, says the official statement from the war office today.

In the vicinity of Locre, the French, by counter-attacks, yesterday afternoon and evening, drove the Germans from the remainder of the ground they had gained in the morning. The Germans, having been heavily repulsed all along the northern battlefront, the night passed in comparative quiet.

Today's reports from the Flanders battlefront only serve to emphasize the completeness of the victory won by the Anglo-French forces yesterday in withstanding the tremendous assault by which the Germans hoped to break into the Allied hill positions southwest of Ypres and begin cutting their way on toward the channel ports.

Germans Stopped.

ALLIED LINES UNCHANGED.

With the British Army, April 30. This morning the Allied lines in Flanders were, to all intents, the same as when the Germans under the defending positions grey-uniformed men lay in great numbers, representing the awful price paid by the Germans.

FRENCH HOLD ALL OF LOCKE

The text of the statement reads: 'Successful counter-attacks carried out by French troops yes terday afternoon and evening drove the enemy from the remainder of the ground gained by him during the morning in the neighborhood of Locre, and captured a number of prisoners. The whole of the village is in the hands of our Allies. QUIET DURING NIGHT.

'After the heavy repulse inflicted on the enemy yesterday, the night passed comparatively quietly on the northern battlefront. "We advanced our line slightly during the night east of Villers-Bretonneux.

"On the remainder of the British front there is nothing to report beyond artillery activity on both sides in certain sectors.

BRITISH ADVANCE ON SOMME.

London, April 30 .- During the night the British advanced their line east of Villers-Bretonneux, on the front before Amiens.

Paris, April 30 .- Heavy artillery fighting occurred last night north and south of the Avre, in the sector of Noyon, and along,

"The artillery battle was waged with considerable violence north and south of the Avre, in the sector of Noyon and on the south bank of the Oise. French patrols were active along all this front and brought back fifteen prisoners.

DAY OF AWFUL BLOODSHED. With the British Army in France, April 29.—By the Associated Press.—This has been one of the bitterest days of fighting that the Flanders battle ground has seen since the present offensive began. 

A.—Under the new order-in-council, those who have attained the age of 19 years, are made members of class one. Such men can be called to the service by proclamation, though no proclamation has been issued yet. Under the new regulations, a man is liable to be called when he reaches the age of 19. As you are not 19, and as no order has been issued yet calling such men, you cannot report for duty yet. You may volunteer if you wish.

CANNING DEMANDS

Sugar Regulations Over Line Ride Too Lightly Now.

Under the new sugar hoarding regu ations of the Canada food board London grocers will soon be sharing the lot of American grocers who are being importuned to break the United States rule which holds that not more than five pounds of sugar can be sold to people in towns and not more than ten to those in the country. The can-

In Canada the regulations call for fifteen days' supply only as the limit of sugar in any household. The ordinary fifteen days' supply will be like the proverbial drop in the bucket when the canning season opens.

In the States, according to a Detroit story, the canning proposition for householders is to be handled by certificates which must be signed at the grocer's by the purchaser before any home canning can be done. These certificates will be turned in to the state administrator within one week

HOW UNITED STATES CHEMICAL INDUSTRIES HAVE GROWN.

[Reprint from Literary Digest, March 9, 1918.]

Before the war Germany sold to the United States somewhere in the neighborhood of \$250,000,000 worth of chemicals every year. By the time the war is over Germany, in the words of a writer in the New York Times, "will have lost that valuable special commerce, because the chemists of the United States, spurred by necessity, have learned to do what the Germans accomplished." Prof. D. D. Jackson of Columbia University is quoted, after surveying more than three years of the war, as seeing it as a "struggle of the chemists, who were called upon to furnish materials for bombing and gassing, fuels for ambulances, supplies for automobiles and airplanes, guncotton for torpedoes, high explosives for depth bombs, cement for concrete defences, gas masks, olls and concentrated foods, potash, nitrogen and phosphorus compounds for fertilizer, khaki color for soldiers' uniforms, and numerous pharmaceutical products for hospitals. "Before the war Germany supplied the world with the better grades of chemical apparatus and reagents, and the United States alone bought many millions of dollars' worth of laboratory glassware annually. Since all of these importations ceased we have been able," Professor Jackson said, "to make our own glassware of a quality superior to that manufactured in Germany or Austria." Professor Jackson is quoted in detail.

"Before 1914 every pound of synthetic phenol came from Europe. Now a score or more plants are producing it in large quantities, chiefly for use in the manufacture of pieric acid for war purposes." The September Chemical Engineer stated that the Edison works at Orange, N.J., are furnishing regularly 3,000,000 pounds of phenol a month.

"At the beginning of the war potash salts, as, for instance, pearl ash, was selling at less than three cents a pound, and shortly after the price rose to \$1.50 a pound or more. Industrial establishments were obliged to use substitutes for all potash compounds or go out of business. Germany produced practically all of the potash at that time. Today many methods are employed in this country to produce potash, some of which may well compete with the German products after the war.

"Before the war Germany made most of our colors used in textiles, feather, straw, feathers, paper, ink, pigments, varnishes and for innumerable other products of our manufacture. At present we are ourselves manufacturing a quantity of color compounds equal to that used by us in normal times, and the number of colors produced is constantly increasing. Many concerns, now manufacturing dye-stuff intermediates, have their own nitrio acid, oleum, nitration, sulfonation and acid recovery plants.

"With proper legislation we can manufacture on a competitive basis prac-

"With proper legislation we can manufacture on a competitive basis practically every chemical product which we now import. Cheap labor is not a factor of importance. The tremendous advantage which Germany had at the beginning of the war has taken more than three years to counteract, and the result has been an awakening in other countries to the necessity of furthering the chemical and metallurgical industries in every possible way.

"The Germans have for many years realized the grave necessity of furthering the work of the chemist and the chemical engineer for warfare, as well as for the necessities if industry in time of peace. They knew that by developing their enormous color establishments in peace times they were producing factories which could be readly changed over to explosive works in time of war.

"They realized that the industries for the fixation of nitrogen used in fertilizers in time of peace could also be used for the production of enormous quantities of pieric acid and trinitrotoluene in wartime. They realized the necessity for acetone, synthetic phenol, industrial alcohol, and all the numerous solvents and compounds used in peace as a still greater necessity for war."

PUBLIC UTILITIES SHOULD BE MAINTAINED IN A GOOD STATE OF EFFICIENCY.

In view of the London Street Railway Company's appeal to the public for a favorable consideration of their position in regard to the maintenance and operation of their property at present low fares, it may be profitable to notice the active co-operation of high government authorities in the United States with the public utility operators in bringing their properties to that degree of efficiency essential to the demands being made upon them, as well as the maintenance of their credit to the end that necessary capital improvements may be made. We, therefore, cite the following correspondence:

LETTER FROM THE SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY TO THE PRESIDENT

Washington, February 15th, 1918.

Dear Mr. President,—I beg to hand you herewith several memoranda and letter relating to street railway and other local public utilities furnishing light, heat and power, which I have been asked to bring to your attention by a com-

mittee representing public utility interests.

These papers indicate the existence of genuine apprehension regarding the adequacy, under present conditions, of the services and rates of local public utilities. The view is expressed that increased wages and the high cost of essential materials and supplies have affected them as they have affected everybody else, and that united effort will be necessary in order to meet alike the public requirements for service and the corporate financial needs upon which that service depends.

A Secretary of the Treasury, I must take official notice of these matters. It is obvious that every part of our industrial and economic life should be maintained at its maximum strength in order that each may contribute in the fullest measure to the vigorous prosecution of the war. Our local public utilities must not be permitted to become weakened. Transportation of workers to and from our vital industries and the health and comfort of our citizens in their homes are dependent upon them, and the necessary power to drive many of our war industries and many other industries essential to the war is produced by them. It may be that here and there, because of the prominence given to less important interests immediately at hand, state and local authorities do not always appreciate the close connection between the soundness and efficiency of the local utilities and the national strength and vigor, and do not resort with sufficient promptness to the call for remedial measures. In such cases, I am confident that all such state and local authorities will respond promptly to the national needs when the matter is fairly and properly brought before them.

Our public service utilities are closely connected with and are an essential part of our preparations for and successful prosecution of the war, and the unfavorable tendencies which the accompanying papers reveal may most effectively be checked, wherever they may be found to exist, and the needed relief obtained, only by prompt action on th part of the respective local authorities.

I carnestly hope that you may feel justified in expressing the conviction that the vital part which the public utilities companies represent in the life and war-making energy of the nation ought to receive fair and just recognition by state and local authorities. Cordially yours,

My Dear Mr. Secretary,—I have examined with care the memoranda and letters which you transmitted to me with your letter of the fifteenth. I fully share the views you express regarding the importance of the public service utilities as a part of our national equipment, especially in wartime. It is essential that these utilities should be maintained at their maximum efficiency, and that everything reasonably possible should be done with that end in view. I hope that state and local authorities, where they have not already done so, will, when the facts are properly laid before them, respond promptly to the necessities of the situation.


