Erie, Pa., Dec. 12.-With her flag at half-mast, the state fisheries boat, the Commodore Perry, Cart. Jerry Driscoll commanding, brought to this port late today the dead and frozen bodies of nine of the crew of Marquette and Bessemer ferry No. 2, which left Conneaut, Ohio, Tuesday morning, carrying 32 men, and which foundered in middle of Lake Erie. For the last 48 hours the Commo-

As the lookout on the Perry sighted the yawl, orders were given to steam down on the object. The use of glasses discovered the boat to be loaded with nine men. As the Perry came up the men saw they had arrived too The nine occupants of the boat

Capt. Johnson of the life saving station of this port, had already sighted the contents of the vawl, had notified the Erie chief of police from Presque Isle reninsula, who in turn notified the coroner. The police reserves were called out and ambulances lined the wharves as the Perry docked.

The Bodies Identified. News of the fluding of the bodies bad reached the city and thousands of persons swarmed to the wharves, As soon as the fish boat made fast a force of men with tackle set to work raising the dead bodies of the men to the dock, where dead wagons were in waiting. The procession of dead passed through the principal streets of the city with hundreds of people

The cook of the car ferry was the only man to wear an overcoat. The eight other men were dressed in overalls and jumpers, indicating that the departure from the car ferry had been hurried. In the bow of the boat was found complete clothing for one man and it is the belief that the yawl originally contained ten men and that one becoming crazed had discarded his clothing and jumped into the icy waters of the lake.

Albert Weis Perished.

Albert J. Weis, of this city, treasurthe Bay State Iron Works, was a passenger on the ill-fated boat. His relatives and friends had not yet given up with schedules. About the most up hope until the yawl containing the nine men was towed into this port. As yet his body had not been found. The officers of the car ferry company gave up all hope Saturday and since Thursday every available tug between Buffalo, Cleveland, and other lake ports has been searching the lake for some news of the wrecked craft. Driscoll said tonight:

There was a heavy sea running at the time we sighted the yawl and we had some difficulty in reaching it. As we made her out with our glasses, eight of the men were sitting up in the boat, their life preservers strapped about their shoulders. The ninth man lay at the bottom of the boat, frozen to the slat flooring. Their clothing was heavy with ice. We did not attempt to take the nine dead men on board as we feared that the yawl would capsize if my men at-tepmted to board it."



To prohibit the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors in the Municipality of the Township of Lobo.

The Municipal Council of the Township of Lobo hereby enacts as follows:

1.—That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors is and shall be prohibited in every tavern, inn or other house or place of public entertainment in the said municipality, and the sale thereof, except by wholesale is and shall be prohibited in every shop or place other than a house of public entertainment in the said municipality.

2.—That the vote of the electors of the said Township of Lobo will be taken on this byiaw by the deputy returning officers hereinafter named, on Monday, the third day of January, 1919, commencing at 9 o'clock in the morning, and continuing until 6 o'clock in the afternoon at the undermentioned places:

Canadian Underwriters' Association Sent a Circular to Chief Aitken.

Fire Chief Aitken has received the following circular from the Canadian Underwriters' Association regarding Christmas decorations and the danger from fires:

Dear Sir,-Following our usual custom at this season of the year I beg to call your attention to the dangers to life and property from Christmas decorations, displays, etc., which are frequently made at this time of the year. The use of Christmas greens, harvest specimens and other inflammable materials such as draperies, scenery, cotton to represent snow, and the like (especially in connection with electric and other lighting systems), is decidedly an increase of hazard, it being impossible to make displays of that nature perfectly safe.

The third statutory condition of

your insurance policy reads in part as follows: "Any change material to the risk, but within the control or knowledge of the assured, shall void the policy, as to the part affected thereby, unless the change is promptly notified in writing to the company or its local


